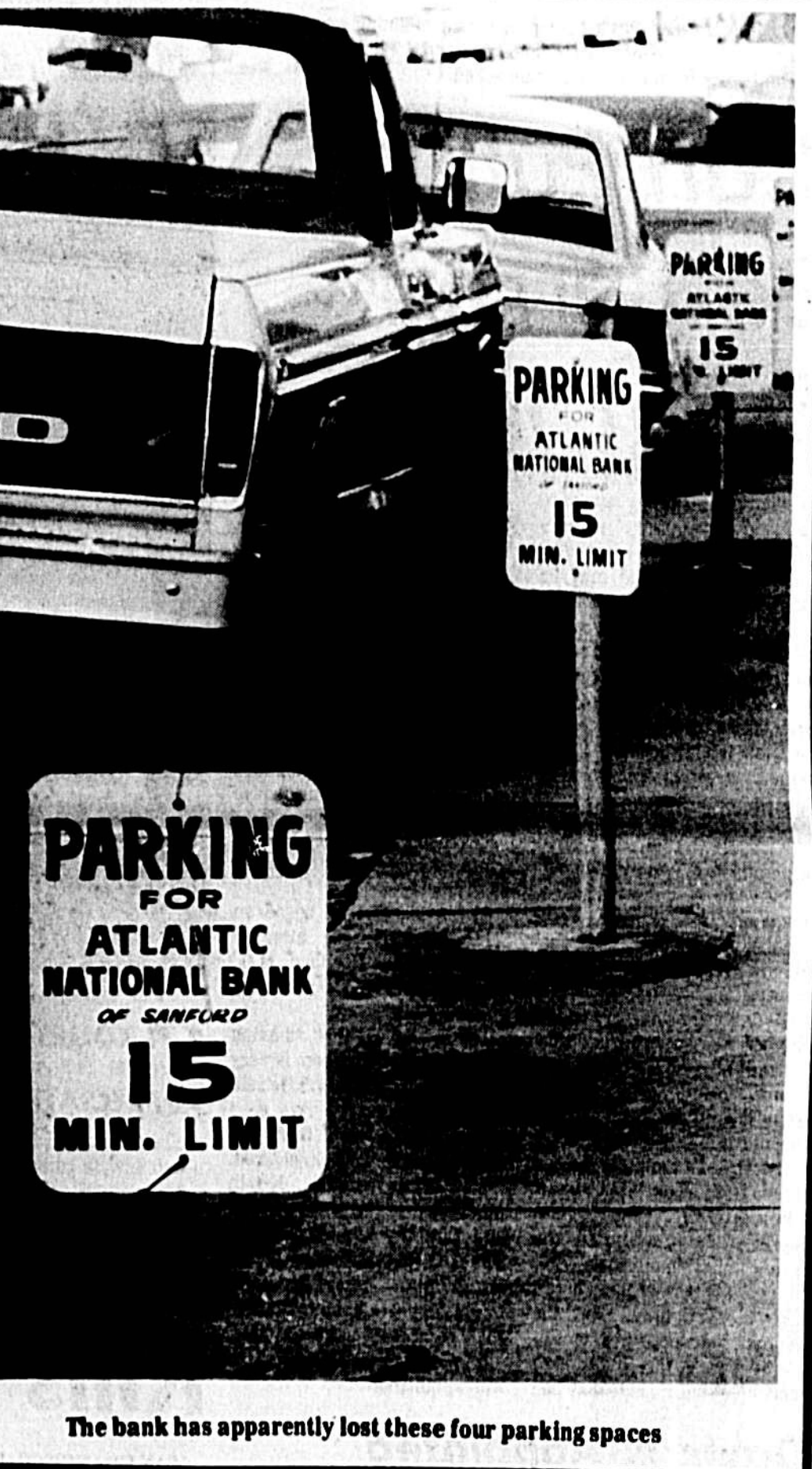

Haitians New Boat People

MIAMI (UPI) — They are South Florida's newest "boat people," but unlike the Cuban exiles who preceded them, Haitian refugees are not finding a welcome mat on these sunny shores.

"They claim the United States is a free country where you can do what you want to do. It's a free country with a free press, that is the impression I was under of the United States," said 19-year-old Christian Louis.

"But when I came, that's what surprised me. I stayed for 24 hours in jail, then they take me to an immigration place," he said. "It looks like me they don't want no Haitians here."

He's right, according to the prevailing policy of U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Services. The Haitians are caught in a quandary of legal definitions that renders them homeless.

INS officials say Louis and most of the 10,000 other Haitians who have come to Florida in recent years are seeking economic well being, not political asylum.

"A refugee is defined by law as a person fleeing their homeland which is Communist-dominated because he fears political persecution if he remained," said INS District Director Raymond Morris. "We recognize that right-wing dictators can be as repressive as left-wing governments. But it wasn't until 1971 that a person fleeing a right-wing government could claim political asylum."

"Haiti doesn't have the oppressive government it once had. They have the freedoms now," Morris said. "and the people we're getting are not politically active."

Most of the refugees disagree, standing firm in their claim of political persecution. Louis, who arrived in South Florida in a small sailboat last summer, said he was a tour guide in Haiti and had been arrested "six or seven times" for talking with people who criticized the government.

"When you get too smart in Haiti they shoot you, kill you," Louis said. "How can somebody live in a country like that?"

Louis and others at the Haitian Refugee Center in Miami blame the drawing of a Haitian mother and five children who were thrown off a smuggler's boat last Monday on both the INS and 28-year-old Haitian President-for-Life Jean-Claude Duvalier.

"All that is the fault of the president of Haiti — if he'd run that country right and give people their human rights they wouldn't have to come here to get political asylum," Louis said angrily. "We need our own country."

"The Haitians are fleeing one of the world's most oppressive regimes," said Rux Jean-Bart, the former director of the refugee center. "We demand equal treatment."

Golden Age Hobby Show Popular With Arts And Crafts Audience

The Hobby Show, held as part of the annual Golden Age Olympics, is popular with participants and spectators alike covering a wide range of arts, crafts, collections and plants.

Held in the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce Building at 400 E. First St., it is sponsored by the Seminole County Homemakers Council. Coordinating the Hobby Show are Louise Poole, Seminole County Home Extension agent and Beverly Dorton, chairman of the Homemakers Council.

According to Mrs. Poole, there was a total of 206 entries last year and she is expecting as many or more to participate this year.

This year there will be 10 divisions including separate divisions for amateurs and professionals in arts and crafts. Other divisions include needlework, home decorations and materials, ceramics (amateur), horticulture, and a display division for works of more than one individual (not eligible for medals).

Winners in each division with that one exception, will receive a gold medal for first, silver, second, and bronze for third. Each category within a division will have first, second, third and fourth place ribbons.

Participants must be 56 years of age or older Nov. 5, 1979. Professionals are defined as those who received compensation for their work or are qualified instructors.

Under arts there will be separate categories for oil, acrylics, watercolors, pastels, photography and graphics. Under crafts categories include macramé, leatherwork, metal work, woodcraft, dolls, jewelry, and miscellaneous.

Needlework categories are crochets, knitting, embroidery, needlepoint, quilts (handmade only), quilts — others Afghan, stitchery, hooked articles, weaving and miscellaneous.

Categories under home decorations and materials include natural materials, live centerpieces, artificial centerpieces, seasonal decorations and miscellaneous decor.

Ceramics categories are stain, glaze, underglaze, overglaze, porcelain, clay, cut outs and decor, mixed media and wheel-thrown pottery.

Only potted plants may be entered in the horticulture division and categories are: hanging baskets, ferns, foliage plants, cacti and succulents, flowering plants, African Violets, bromeliads and terrariums.

Any entry must be the work of the person entering and must not have been entered in a previous Golden Age Olympics. Racks, easels or other holders must accompany entries if they are needed for proper display and judging. All liability and responsibility for the security of items must be assumed by the exhibitor.

Those entering items must bring them to the chamber between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 4. Judging of the exhibits will take place Wednesday between 9 a.m. and noon.

Exhibits will be open to the public on Wednesday 24 p.m.; Thursday, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Friday, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Entries must be picked up between 1 and 4 p.m. on Friday. No entries will be released until that time.

There is an Olympic entry fee of 50 cents per division.

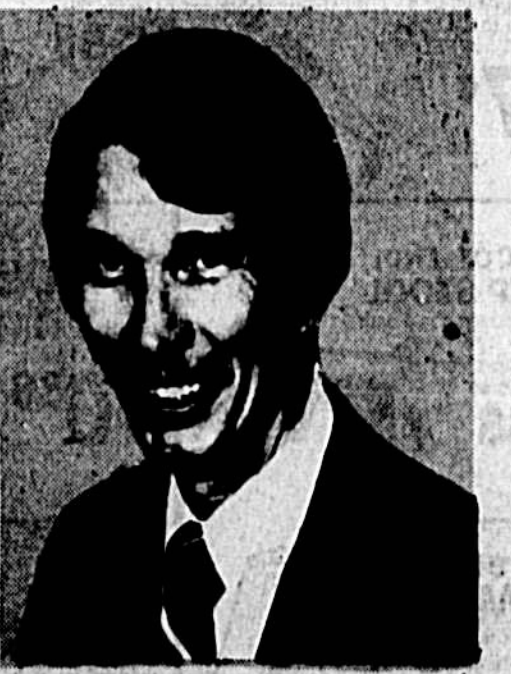

Castro Arrives Amid Tight Security

NEW YORK (UPI) — Cuban President Fidel Castro came to America today for the first time in more than 19 years to address the United Nations and said "I'm glad to be in the United States."

Castro, who is expected to defend the presence of Soviet troops in Cuba in an address to the General Assembly Friday, flew into Kennedy Airport on a red-and-white, Russian-built Cubana airliner that touched down at 12:53 a.m.

In an interview aboard the airliner, broadcast by the NBC television "Today" show, Castro joked about his visit.

The interviewer suggested that what most Americans remembered about his last visit to New York City in September 1960 were his stay in Harlem and tales that members of his entourage plucked chickens in their hotel rooms.

Castro said with a chuckle that none of his aides plucked chickens in their hotel and, "I did not bring any chickens"

this time, although "Cuban chickens taste better than New York chickens."

He said he did bring some lobsters "which I caught myself" in case he wanted to invite guests to dinner.

Castro also said that he had been in New York in 1949 when he had no money.

"I still have no money," he said, adding that the only people to spend money on his current trip would be New York City authorities. "The police will spend money and the mayor's office, the city of New York," he said.

Dressed in his uniform of olive-drab fatigues and smoking the ever-present cigar, Castro said he was glad to be here and got into a waiting car that took him to the well-protected Cuban Mission to the United Nations.

Along the route and especially around the Manhattan building where he is staying, hundreds of police and Secret Service men stood guard, part of the massive security precautions that included helicopters with special lights and police dogs that sniffed for explosives.

'Misunderstanding' Over Bid Specifications

Lake Mary High To Cost \$3.23 Million More To Build

The entire cost to build the Lake Mary High School was estimated by Seminole County Superintendent William Lauer at Wednesday's school board meeting at \$14,480,000 — \$3,237,000 over the base bid approved on Sept. 26.

Lauer said he was most "surprised" that a \$450,000 fixed equipment item was left out by the architect in the original bidding packet sent to contractors. Carl Gutmann, of the Sanford firm of Gutmann-Drageah Associates, said the firm "apologized" for the "misunderstanding" over the bid specifications.

Gutmann listed 11 items, totaling \$1,747,000, that were not included in the base bid awarded to Roger P. Kennedy, 608 Live Oak Blvd., Casselberry. The only items under the architect's responsibility to provide in the bidding packet that were left out were allowance items and the fixed equipment, Gutmann said.

The allowance items for a signage and acoustical tuning system were left out because the state Department of Education would not accept any allowances on a general bid, Gutmann said. The fixed equipment was deleted to "allow time for cost effective research and coordination," Gutmann said. Pressed for time to get the plans to the state for advance funding by June 30, Gutmann said there was "no way" to discuss and design fixed equipment, such as complex scientific materials, before June 30.

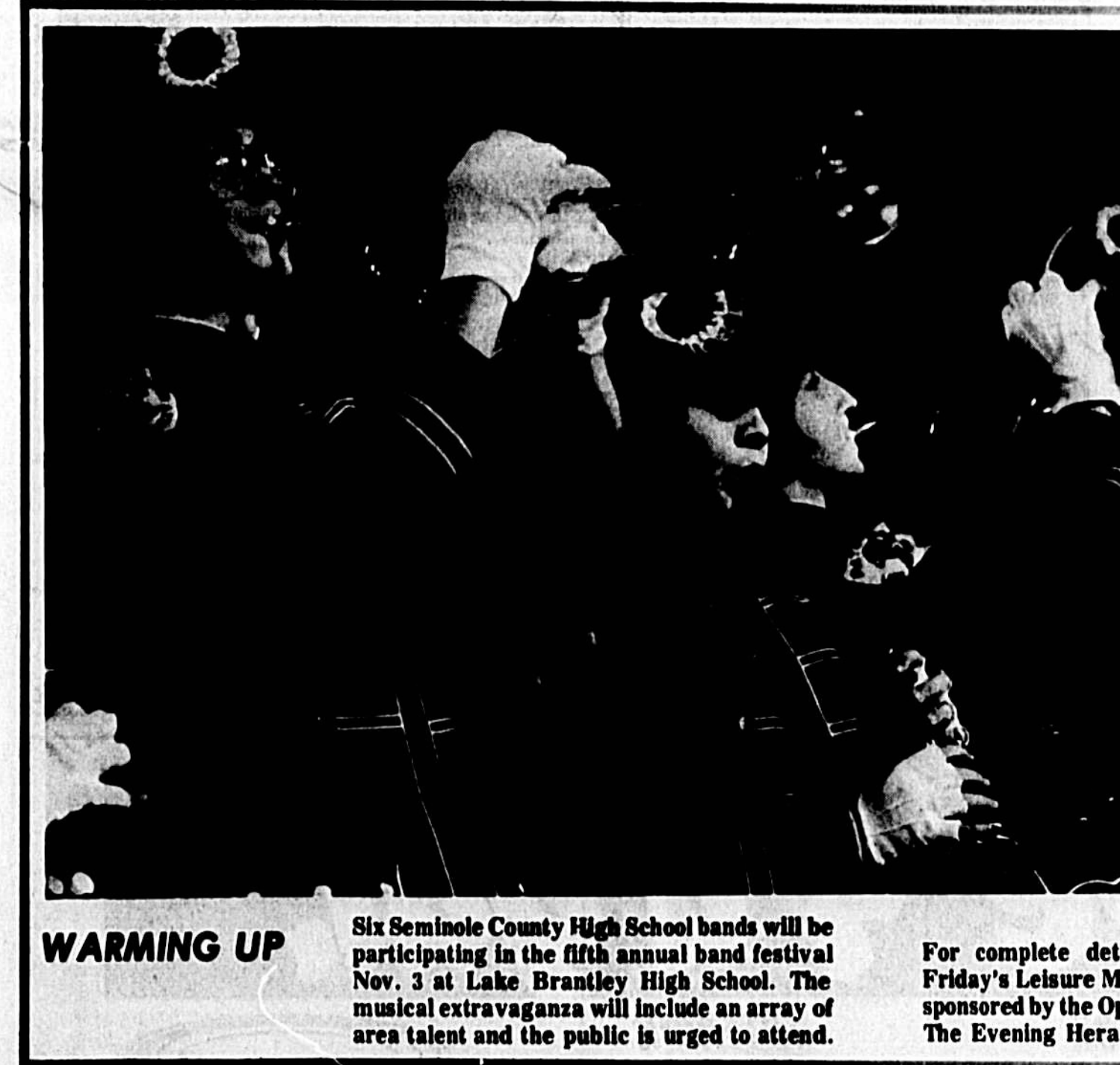
Lauer explained there were "two deadlines for state funding," on June 30, and sometime in 1980. According to Lauer, no school administrator since June 30 recommended the fixed equipment deletion. He was therefore "surprised" to see the item deleted from the bidding packet.

William Kroll, school board member, asked for the "turned key," total cost of Lake Mary High School. Gutmann said that 11 items, nine of which the school board was responsible for deleting in the base bid, would come to \$1,747,000. Some of these items such as food service equipment, phone system, water and sewer hook-up, were already planned by the administration for added costs.

Superintendent Lauer said it will cost another \$1 million to furnish the school. Hugh Carlton, school director of auxiliary services, estimated the architect fee at \$490,000, of which 75 percent is already paid, Carlton said.

Kroll said he "thought the construction was \$10 million" and wondered about the over \$14 million. Kroll quickly computed the total at about a 40 percent cost overrun.

Gutmann said he "never received a specific number" for construction costs. He said he did hear a \$10.4 million figure discussed in January.

Staffing-Up Causes Schedules Changed

About 400 student schedule changes at Teague Middle School, Forest City, six weeks into the school year has created some controversy among parents and school officials.

A number of parents have called the school and objected to the mass schedule switch, and one mother has insisted that her 12-year old daughter "has wasted the first six weeks of school" because of the shift.

Sal Manfre, principal of Teague Middle School, said school officials had expected 1,025 students but 1,200 reported for classes. Manfre said Teague is in a high growth area and "after the start of just about every year" teaching additions, termed "staffing-up", and schedule changes have to be made.

This year the sixth and seventh grade classes were most affected, according to Manfre, and some eighth graders probably will have to shift after the first of the year. He said before the "staffing-up", sixth and seventh grade classes had between 40 and 44 children, above the 30 average desired by Teague. The classes, therefore, had to be "leveled off", he said.

Manfre stated the leveling is done in a random manner as students from various academic levels are drawn to be assigned to new teachers. Manfre said he usually gets a lot of calls from upset parents concerned about the shifts, but after the reason and fairness of the change is explained "99 percent of the parents are satisfied."

Manfre agreed with the parents that the change is a "tough situation", but it is the only choice the growing school has, he maintains.

This week was chosen by Manfre as the shift date for several reasons. First, he said, it took some time to decide how many teachers were needed. Starting Tuesday and continuing to Oct. 26 the state audits the enrollments and shifts are illegal, Manfre said. He felt after the 26th a shift would be a bigger disadvantage to the children and he would "rather get the change in now before they really settled in."

The parent went to see her daughter's guidance counselor, Francis Dalton, Manfre and Superintendent of Schools William Lauer. The mother, a retired first grade teacher said she felt the officials made her "feel like a nut" and her daughter just "a number in a group." According to the parent, her family has moved frequently to six schools and they have never been treated in such an "uncaring way."

The parent feels the shift has caused her daughter, who had all of her five classes changed and not just a few as some students, to be unreasonably upset. Such a change, the mother believes means the first weeks of school were "wasted", since the student now must adjust to a new teacher with different rules and lessons.

Manfre said Ms. Dalton is usually "happy after a couple weeks" when they adjust.

Superintendent Lauer had no comment about the protest except to say that the issue will be on the school board agenda for its next meeting on Oct. 17.

Seminole Is Still Watching Closely For Encephalitis

Seminole County residents may rest peacefully, at least for today, in the wake of two reported cases of St. Louis encephalitis which have sprung up in two Florida counties.

The latest case — which affected a 58-year-old woman on the border of Hillsborough and Manatee Counties — prompted Tallahassee health officials to issue a warning to 12 counties that mosquitoes carrying the disease are active there.

The first case reported this year occurred a month ago in Palm Beach County — the victim was a 64-year-old woman.

Another possible case has been diagnosed in a Palm Beach woman but has not been confirmed by lab tests.

Seminole is not one of the 12 counties included in the Tallahassee warning, but neighboring Orange County is on the list. The rest are: Brevard, Charlotte, Collier, DeSoto, Hendry, Highlands, Martin, Ocala and Sarasota.

Just recently, the blood of three "mosquito" chickens in Orange County was found to contain evidence proving the existence of St. Louis encephalitis in two of the test chickens, and the existence of Eastern Equine encephalitis in another test chicken.

No cases, however, of human encephalitis have been reported in Orange County to date.

Still, the Seminole County Health Department is taking no chances. According to Dr. Jorge Deju, director of SCCHD, surveillance of test chicken flocks and mosquitoes has been increased since the human encephalitis cases were reported.

"We've increased our surveillance under which chickens are bled twice a month, from once a month, and we've been collecting mosquitoes in traps twice a week from once a week."

"How long it'll last (the danger of encephalitis) really depends on the weather," he said.

Dr. Deju agreed. "In a few weeks" he said, "hopefully we can feel a little bit better about the whole thing."

Precautionary measures include avoiding gardening or other activities at dusk and during the night, use of mosquito repellent, elimination of stagnant water from bird baths, lily ponds and use of screening on doors, windows and porches.

Dr. Betty Vaughn, Assistant Director of Orange County Health Department, stressed that the encephalitis carrying mosquito is "a night flyer" and that people should dress appropriately (no exposed skin) if near mosquito areas.

Dry weather, which central Florida has most recently experienced, and the advent of cold weather will help weaken mosquito concentrations and lessen the possibility of an encephalitis epidemic, Deju and Vaughn indicated.

Deju explained that an official "alert" would mean that 40 percent of the test chickens must be affected by the disease carrying mosquito. He called Orange County's discovery of the three cases in chickens "a lesser degree alert."

Encephalitis cannot be spread from person to person, but only by the bite of a mosquito that has fed on an infected host.

Symptoms are severe headaches, fever, fatigue, irritability, drowsiness.
