More Withholding Taxes

There are proposals in Congress that the withholding system of income tax eclection be extended to other forms of income. Wages and salaries now are broadly covered. Specifically it is suggested that withholding taxes be levied against corporation dividends.

It would not be surprising to find strong support for this proposal in Congress, and among tax-collecting officials. The withholding system is popular with them because it is an efficient means of collection and because the taxpayers find it much less painful than lump sum payment.
One of the strong arguments in favor of a withholding tax
on dividends is that it would make sure that all dividend income is reported and that the proper tax is paid on it.

No case can be made against the desirability of doing that. The wisdom of making taxes painless for the taxpayer is something else. The effect of the withholding tax on the civic consciousness of the wage earner has been little short of vicious. Throughout the year he is utterly forgetful of the tax taken from his pay, because he never handles those few dollars a week. In the spring he perhaps gets a small refund, and his attention may be seized by the illusion that he has gotten something from the government instead of by the fact that he has paid a substantial income tax. The withholding tax lulis the taxpayer into insensibility to the coat of government, and in this effect it borders on immorality.
