(Continued From Page One) then the Secretary of Defense's control over the military establishment. Forrestal said the chief objection likely to be raised is that it would concentrate too much power in the Secretary.

Recalling that when the unification act was before Congress in 1947 he had doubts on the same score, Forrestal said that experience has changed his mind. He went on:

"I am now convinced that there are adequate checks and balances inherent in our governmental structure to prevent misuse of the broad authority which I feel must be vested in the Secretary of Defense."

"I am also convinced that a failure to endow this official with sufficient authority to control effectively the conduct of our military affairs will force upon us far greater security risks than will be the case if singleness of control and responsibility are achieved."

Forrestal said the proposed bill would give the Secretary of Defense no powers which the President does not already have.

Although Forrestal is leaving government service, President Truman said last night that he had promised to come back in case of emergency.

**Tallahassee Approves Hooded Groups Ban**

TALLAHASSEE, Mar. 24—(AP)—Tallahassee's anti-Klan ordinance became effective today, less than two weeks before Governor Warren is expected to ask the Legislature for a state-wide ban on hooded organizations.

The Capital City law does not mention the Klan specifically. It prohibits masked or hooded persons from appearing on city streets or other public property. Only children wearing masquerade costumes are exempted.

Enactment of the ordinance stemmed from a southern Klan motor parade past the state Capitol Jan. 27.

ST. PETERSBURG, Mar. 25 (AP)—Piling up 89 1/2 points, Miami Senior High school last night won the annual St. Petersburg relays. Hillsborough of Tampa was second with 81 1-3. It annexed the most first places but was unable to match Miami's all-round strength. Three records were set, all by Hillsborough. Far behind the two leaders came St. Petersburg with 33 1-6 points: Sarasota 31 5/6; Plant (Tampa) 31; Jefferson (Tampa) 24 1/3. ### Cary Middlecoff Puts Hot Record On Tourney Line

GREENSBORO, N. C., Mar. 25 (AP)—One of the hottest streaks big-time golf has seen since Byron Nelson and Ben Hogan were engaged in their personal tug of war goes on the line here today. The setting is the annual \$10,000 Greensboro Open, a 72-hole event crammed into three days over the par 71 Starmount Forest Country Club course, a 6,700 yarder. The star character is tall, freckled Cary Middlecoff, a 28-year old dentist of Memphis, Tenn. He's now in his third year as a touring pro. Middlecoff moved into today's opening round with a record of three victories and two seconds, each by one stroke, in his last five major tests. He began in February with a \$1,250 bankroll for his January winnings in California and Arizona. But in the past month he's picked up \$6,800 for two firsts and two seconds in open tournaments to shoot to the top of the list with a total of \$8,050. He won at Harlingen, Tex., and Jacksonville, and finished second at Houston, Tex., and St. Petersburg. In addition, he and Jim Ferrier retained their Miami Four-Ball international title two weeks ago. This feat gave Cary \$1,250 more not figured in the PGA-titled money list, which includes only major open, includes only major list, which includes only major. In his last four opens Middlecoff has been 54 under par for 288 holes. He's averaged 68.1 per par for 16 trips around Fifteen times he was under par. On 10 occasions he has shot in the 60s. On the long-chall starmount course, he'll have to contend with such worthies as Defending Champion Lloyd Mangrum, Vic Ghezzi, the 1947 winner, South African star Bobby Locke and two-time winner Sammy Snead, who usually plays well here.
