Nuisance calls subject to fine

SANFORD — Property owners who have more than three non-emergency or nuisance calls to the Sanford Police Department within a 30-day period may soon face fines of \$250 and up when the city starts enforcing a new ordinance.

The User Charge for Excess Public Services Ordinance was approved July 25 by the city commission. The city has determined that three nuisance activity calls are reasonable in a month's time

Three or more visits from police could end in \$250 payment

for homes, multi-family residences, apartments and businesses.

The aim of the ordinance is to reduce the number of nuisance calls to which police have to respond.

Some locations have dozens of calls a month for loud noise or parties or dogs barking. Others have faulty alarm systems that trigger over and over again when no crimes occur.

"It is not our intent to discourage calling 9-1-1," said police Chief Brian Tooley on Thursday. "We really see this as a user fee rather than a fine."

Some locations rent rooms for youth dances, Tooley said. They often rent the building out with no supervision. The police show up and quiet things down, but as soon as the officers leave, the music cranks back up.

"We expect to start enforcing this within a couple of weeks," Tooley estimated.

The first fine is \$250, and the second will be \$500. That totals \$750 and can be added on to if compliance does not take place.

"We wanted the fine to be substantial," Tooley said. There is an appeals process for anyone who receives a fine from the city.

This will not be neighbors retaliating against one another, he added. These

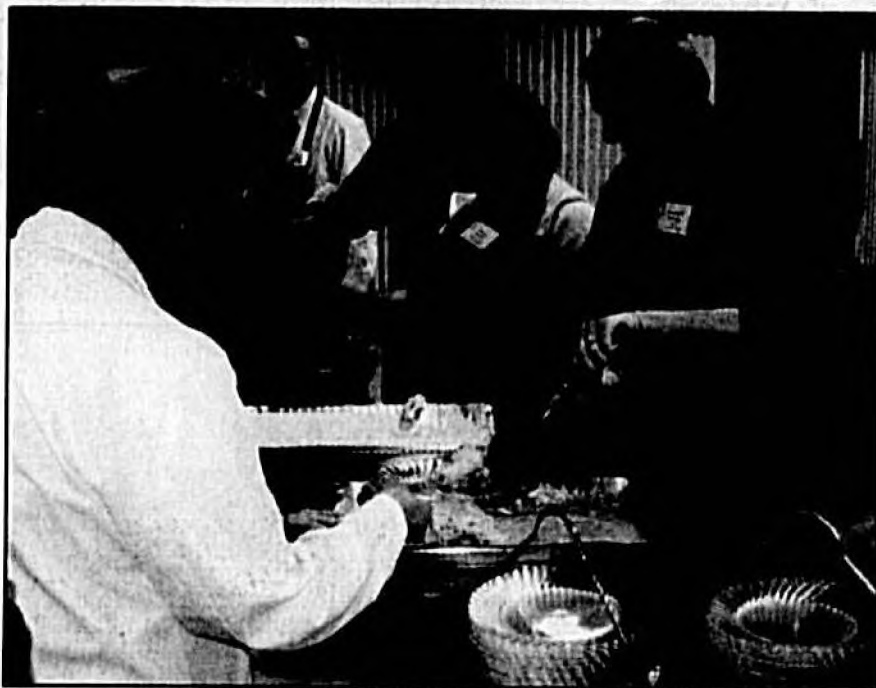

Police bust crack ring

SANFORD — A seven-month investigation of a regional crack-cocaine distribution ring led to seven arrests Tuesday morning in Seminole, Volusia and Orange counties.

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office/City-County Investigative Bureau, the Orange County Sheriff's Office, the Volusia County Sheriff's Office/VBI, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, and the Central Florida HHDTA Intelligence Support Center were all involved in the operation.

The operation got its start in Orange County, a Seminole County Sheriff's Office news release said.

"As that agency began to investigate the violent drug dealing gang, the investigation broadened to include other jurisdictions. Gang members have been known to ram law enforcement vehicles in order to flee authorities. They are also known to be armed. Some held jobs. One worked as chief custodian for the VA clinic in Winter Park. Another was a reservist in the military (Navy) and served as an MP," the release said.

The agencies served search

Man demands sign removal

SANFORD — A local man told Sanford Commissioners Monday night to remove the "no fishing" signs from the marina area of Lake Monroe, but city officials said it's a safety issue for boaters and pedestrians.

"I want the signs removed," Sanford resident Robert Johnson told commissioners during the citizen-input portion of Monday night's meeting.

"If you all won't take them down, I'll be more than happy to go down and take them down and turn them in to your sign shop for you."

Johnson, of East 2nd Street, said he is a lifelong resident of Sanford and has always been able to fish all areas of Lake Monroe. He said Ft. Mellon Park is in his backyard and his children were threatened with

arrest recently for fishing on the RiverWalk.

"When I put my tax dollars in to have the RiverWalk redone, no one told me they're [the children] not going to be able to enjoy the same privileges I had when I was growing up. I've always been able to fish down there," Johnson

said. Mayor Linda Kuhn and District 1 Commissioner Art Woodruff explained that the signs were only in the marina areas because of complaints from boat owners.

"They were put there in

Trail segments open in Winter Springs and on southern border

SANFORD — Seminole County Government has opened two new segments of the Cross Seminole Trail, according to a Thursday announcement.

The Cross Seminole Trail provides recreational trail facilities for pedestrians, bicyclists, equestrians (where permitted), and other non-motorized uses. The new sections increase the length of the trail to almost 10 miles.

One new segment extends 2.9 miles from Gardena Avenue in Winter Springs to Laver Elementary on S.R. 419, and includes a multi-use bridge over State Road 434.

The bridge was constructed with assistance from the city of Winter Springs.

The second new segment extends 2.8 miles from the Seminole County line at the Aloma Avenue (State Road 426)/Hall Road intersection, to about 800 feet south of Mikler Road. This new segment now joins the Cady Way Trail, part of the Orange County Trail System.

Funding for construction of the trail was provided by the Florida Department of Transportation and a local referendum approved by voters in 2000.

The construction cost for the new sections are \$1.66 mil-

Staying at the State House: The race to replace Seminole County Commissioner Randy Morris was shaping up to be an interesting election. Former Lake Mary mayor and current District 34 State Rep. David Meador has filed preliminary paperwork to run for the District 2 seat from which Morris is retiring. So has Mike McLean, a Lake Mary City Commissioner who is not subtle about his aspirations for higher office. McLean's colleague on the city commission, Gary Brender, is pondering whether to jump into the race. Watching two sitting city commissioners and a former mayor run for the same seat would have been interesting, but Meador has decided not to run — at least not for county commission.

"There are a lot of exciting things going on in Tallahassee, and I just can't walk away right now," Meador said Friday. "I think at this time I can do my best public service by focusing on the issues that I deeply care about at the state level."

Specifically, Meador said wants to continue finding ways to match Central Florida's higher education resources with economic development opportunities. "We have tremendous higher education institutions in this region, and I believe I can play a key role in harnessing those resources as an engine for our economy," said Meador, who added that the leadership in the House is supporting his run for a final term in District 2. "I'll be termed out in 2008," Meador said. At least for now, McLean has not earned Meador's endorsement. "At this point in time, I need to focus on convincing the people that I deserve another term as their representative in District 34," Meador said.

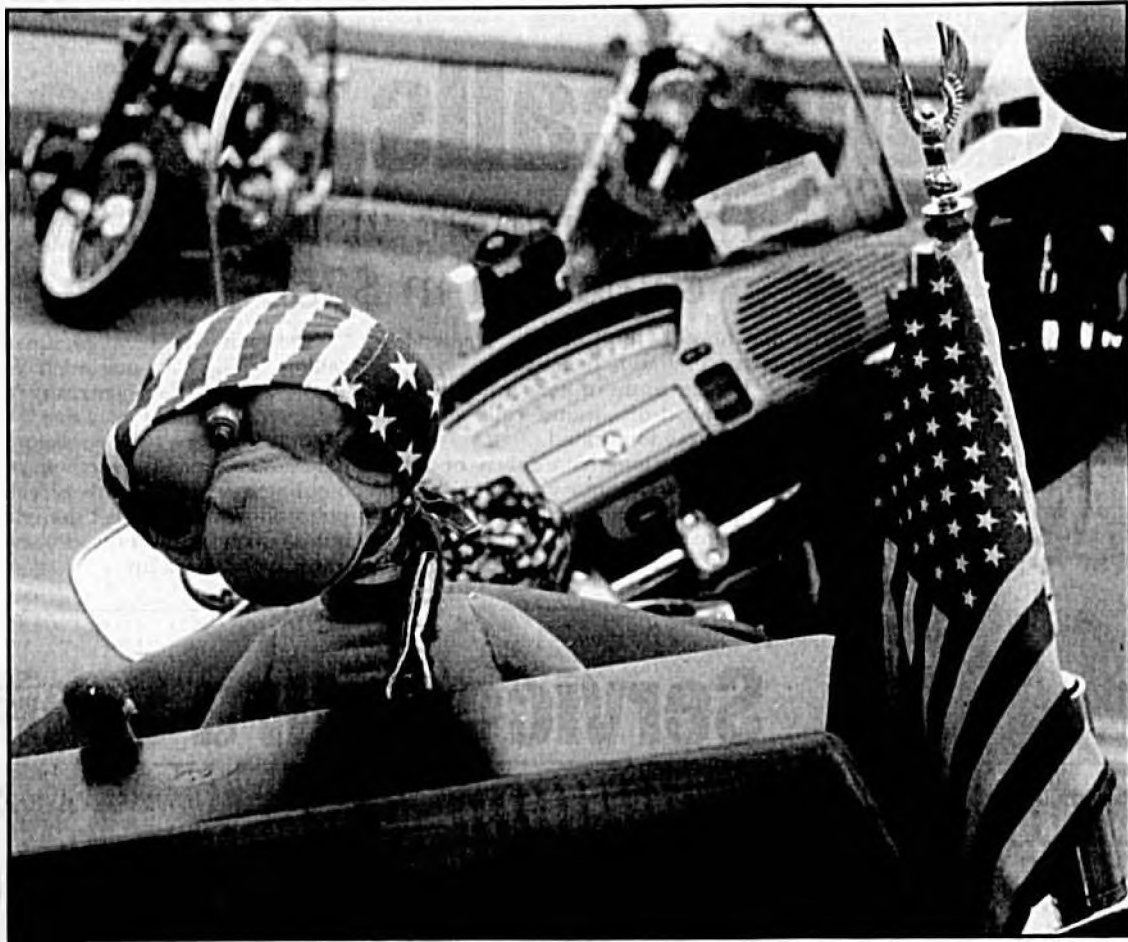
Go Gators!"

response to problems boat owners were having, not with 9-year-olds and 12-year-olds fishing but with other people fishing there," Woodruff responded.

Johnson replied: "Well, I don't know what to tell you, but they've (the signs) never been there before and they need to go."

Johnson also told commissioners that police officers should not tell his children they would be arrested for fishing.

"Threatening to arrest children for fishing is nonsense. These kids aren't out here slinging dope like the ones up the street are. OK? That's the bottom line," Johnson said.

Sanford Police Chief Brian Tooley said that if they have complaints from citizens about people fishing in non-designated areas, their job was to enforce the laws of the city.

"But, no, I don't think our officers are out there looking for 12-year-olds fishing," Tooley said.

Leisure Services Director Mike Kirby said Thursday the signs were put in place around the time of completion of the RiverWalk by former City Manager Al Grieshaber Jr., after the city received complaints from boat owners that people fishing were hitting their boats with their bait.

"We want people to come fish down there," Kirby said.

City Clerk Jan Dougherty said Thursday that she did not think an ordinance was passed to put the signs up, and Kirby agreed. He said he thought he remembered just meeting with Grieshaber about the signs, and then Grieshaber instructed the Public Works department to place the signs.

Kuhn said Friday that fishing hooks were getting caught on the sails of boats and in the propellers. She wanted to emphasize that fishing is allowed in all other areas of the RiverWalk.

"That's a populated area," Kuhn said of the marina area. "I think [Johnson] was a bit upset at the meeting. It's unfortunate, but we also have

to look at all sides of it and protect those boats, also."

Brian Volk, general manager at Monroe Harbour Marina, said this week he didn't know about complaints from boat owners, but with so many pedestrians walking on the RiverWalk and people waiting in line to cruise on the Rivership Romance, he understood the need for having the designated fishing zones.

"It's not safe to have people fishing right there," Volk said.

But, Johnson told commissioners that it wasn't safe for his children to fish outside of the marina breaker walls, in case they fall in the river.

"The kids can't fish in open water over there. They need the breaker wall. If they fall off over there, there's white capping. There's no white capping by the marina," Johnson told commissioners, adding, "[I]f my kids come and tell me they've been threatened with arrest again we're going to have a problem."

must be verifiable nuisances before a warning or fine is implemented.

Often three to five officers go out on one of these calls, Tooley explained. Sgt. Mike Taylor added that at a recent call a brick was thrown through a patrol car window. These dance parties often pack as many people in as possible, some gather outside the building and the calls from neighbors begin.

Taylor said the department has encouraged people renting out buildings to have off-duty police officers there to keep problems contained.

He described a scenario at a business that has live music. A bar with a band might prop the door open and the music wafts into neighborhoods and the calls start.

"You're waking up people six blocks away just by having the door open," Taylor said.

Tooley said the department will use common sense in enforcing the new ordinance.

There is no automated system that will alert the depart-

ment to send out a letter. Officers who notice that they are visiting a site multiple times will let the chain of command know. A letter of warning from the chief will be forthcoming, but is not required before a fine is administered.

Examples of nuisance activities listed in the ordinance include harassment of a neighbor, indecent exposure, keeping a place of prostitution, gambling, trespassing, excessive noise, public drinking, and junk vehicles to name a few.

The city may notify the person that they are, or soon will be, in violation of the ordinance. Notification will list the nuisance activities that have occurred and state what the fee will be, or is being, assessed against the owner of the property.

The owner will have 10 days to file an appeal with the city manager. Once the city manager has responded to the appeal, the owner will have 10 more days to appeal to the city commission.

The ordinance also addresses absentee owners.

Absentee owners of apartments and other rented residential properties must provide the name, address, and contact numbers to "an authorized local designated representative who conducts business within Seminole County...."

No matter how many times officers are called out to any property, Tooley said, the bottom line is the department will respond.

"We can't treat any alarm like it's routine," he said. "I think this is a good tool. It's not going to fix everything, but it's another tool for us to use. We'd rather reduce calls than collect the money."

Tooley noted that the city has grown 18 percent with a slight reduction in crime. He said he doesn't like to live by statistics, but he acknowledged the work of department personnel.

"As the city grows, we want to keep a lid on this kind of problem from growing," he

said.

He also wanted to reassure people that nuisance calls will not affect emergencies at all. Officers will drop any nuisance calls when an emergency occurs, he said.

This could have an impact on routine calls, the chief said. If someone calls about a suspicious person in the neighborhood, for instance, police occupied by a nuisance assignment will have to finish there before getting to the suspicious person.

"We look at it this way," he said. "Officers have 12 hour shifts. That's 720 minutes to gas up the car, write reports, take a break, etc." That leaves two activities for the officer: patrolling the streets and time to answer calls — emergency and nuisance or anything else.

Tooley said he wants to have as much of the proactive patrolling time as possible.

"We don't want this to generate revenue," he explained. "We are trying to not use our valuable city services."

Ghost Stories

Seeing as it's the Halloween season, I thought some ghost stories might be in order for this column.

For folks who have visited Charleston, South Carolina, you may know of the Cooper River Bridge. It's been rebuilt in the past few years, but this story deals with the old bridge, which, in part, is still there and still being used.

On Feb. 24, 1946, a World War II freighter, Nicaragua Victory, was parked in Charleston Harbor with its anchor dropped. Bad weather however, caused the captain to order the 12,000-ton ship moved. They lifted the anchor, but before they could move, the winds from a storm started blowing it upstream. With the engines stopped, the ship could not be maneuvered or stopped. It crashed into the pilings below the Cooper River Bridge causing the peak, at 270 feet maximum, to collapse.

There were two automobiles and an Army mail truck on the bridge at that time. The ship however, caused the middle portion of the bridge to collapse onto it. The first car made it before the bridge collapsed, and the Army truck managed to stop in time. The other car is the mystery.

It was an early 1940's era green Oldsmobile, with a family of five, the husband, Elmer R. Lawson, his wife, Evelyn, seven year old son Robert, two year old daughter Diane, and Lawson's mother Rose. When the top of the bridge collapsed, the Olds and its occupants went right over the top, plunging 150 feet into the river. All in the vehicle perished.

Since that time, there have been several motorists driving over that bridge claiming they saw the old Oldsmobile with its five passengers, which suddenly disappeared as they passed it. Spooky? I would say so.

I have driven over the Cooper River Bridge a number of times, but never saw that Olds, although I look for it every time.

They weren't able to pull the Olds from the water for over a month after it went in, but when they did, all five persons were still in it. Is it their spirits driving over the bridge? I don't know, but there have been other reports of sighting it, so who knows!!!!!!

Of course the bridge may be haunted for another reason. Just days before the Nicaragua Victory struck the bridge, there was a construction accident. Workers were trying to replace a section of the underside of the Cooper River Bridge, and pouring concrete into a new pillar. Marshall Cleveland, 41, working with the construction team, accidentally fell into the wet concrete as it was being poured. He was buried alive with thousands of pounds of wet cement having been poured over his body. Of course his body was never recovered, and is still entombed in the pillar.

As for other ghosts, there have been dozens of people committing suicide by jumping off the bridge, and from time to time, there are reports of seeing these people standing along the edge.

If you visit Charleston, S.C., and are heading toward the city of Mount Pleasant, just outside Charleston, you will drive over this particular bridge. Keep your eyes out for a 1940 green Oldsmobile with five passengers.

Locally - I can't attest to this, but this is what I was told many years ago, when my band was playing at the old Longwood Inn. I was told that the original owner of the building held a grand opening ice cream social, and invited a number of Longwood residents to attend. During the party, someone asked the wife where her husband had gone. She didn't know.

They later found his body under the steps outside the back porch. He had been murdered. While this was years before my musical appearances, the bartender and waitress told me his ghost had been seen coming down the stairs inside the hotel, and they had heard footsteps in the upper floors. Both persons told me they wouldn't stay in the hotel past midnight as they were frightened.

I can't vouch for this but this is the story I was told at that time. Perhaps someone knows what really happened and will let me know. The building has long since ceased to be a hotel, and perhaps it is no longer haunted. I don't know.

Of course many of us have heard of the ghost horse seen occasionally walking along Celery Avenue just east of the Sanford city limits. This is supposed to be the ghost of a horse that had been buried under where the pavement was placed for Celery Avenue. I can't believe this, but Friday, I saw a sign on Celery Avenue near where the sightings have occurred, warning of a horse crossing area. Could it be for the ghost horse? Again, I drive the roadway several times a day and have never seen it, but others have claimed it has been there.

The problem with ghosts, driving on a bridge, walking through an old hotel, or trotting next to Celery Avenue is that most people won't admit to seeing them. They don't want others to say they are hallucinating or losing their mind.

There are, however, many books about the Ghosts of Charleston, Ghosts of the South, Ghosts of Florida, and others, which seem to be selling well. Someone believes in ghosts, whether they will admit it or not.

Robin Chapman, broadcaster, journalist and writer will be the guest speaker at the Thursday, Nov. 15 meeting of the Seminole County Historical Society. The meeting will be held in the Seminole County Ag Center Auditorium, 250 W. County Home Road, at 6:30 p.m.

Chapman will be remembered as a TV reporter and anchor at WESH-TV for several years. She previously worked in Washington, D.C. and San Francisco.

She has written three books; "The Absolutely Essential Guide to Winter Park," the "Absolutely Essential Guide to Orlando," and "Winter Park in Vintage Postcards." She has recently been awarded the Dorothy and Rhea Marsh Smith Winter Park Research Grant. Visitors are always welcome and refreshments will be served.

Charlie Carlson to speak at Sanford Historical Society meeting.

The Sanford Historical Society will meet Thursday, Nov. 17 at the Sanford Museum. Speaker will be Charlie Carlson, long time member of the Society. Following social time at 4:45 p.m., there will be a business meeting at 5 p.m. at which time 2006 officers will be elected.

At approximately 5:30 p.m. Charlie Carlson, author of the book "Weird Florida" will entertain attendees with "The Real and Amazing Story Behind Weird Florida."

For the past several months, he has been on a statewide book tour of Barnes and Noble stores and has appeared in over 100 radio and TV talk shows. He has also presented programs for various organizations throughout the state.

A combination ticket can be purchased for \$35 in advance. Tickets are on sale at the Sanford Museum, Chamber of Commerce and various other downtown locations.

A special tribute should be given to Brandi Wilnot, assistant at the Sanford Museum for researching all of the homes that are on the tour, so this information can be placed in the Trust's tour guide. This has been a tremendous amount of work, taking several weeks. I work at the Museum two days a week and have personally seen what she has done. Curator Alicia Clarke has also been a big help in this event for the Trust.

Located under at tent in front of the Sanford Museum during this event on Dec. 3 and 4, will be local authors Ed L'Heureux and Fredric Hitt who will sell and sign their books. L'Heureux is a prolific author of books on local history while Hitt has recently published "Wekiva Winter", a historical novel featuring the Spanish and Timucuan Indians of the St. Johns River. It is possible that other local authors will be available.

Student Museum's Holiday Open House
On Saturday, Dec. 3, the Student Museum, 301 West 7th Street will hold an open house from 11 a.m. until 3 p.m.

Among the events during the day will be story tellers, a silent auction, scavenger hunt, folk craft demonstrations, local author's book signing, tour of the gardens and a rose sale.

Entertainment will be provided by several choral groups from local schools. This is a good chance for you to visit this excellent museum. While there, be sure to view the wonderful collection of photographs of early Sanford which adorn the walls of the school's halls. This is the best collection on view of any of the area museums.

St. Lucia Festival
St. Lucia Festival, a Celebration of Seminole County's Swedish History, will be held Saturday, Dec. 10 at the Museum of Seminole County History, 300 Bush Blvd. from 1 until 4 p.m.

This will be a traditional Swedish Christmas Celebration and you are invited. There will be Swedish smorgasbord sampling, Swedish descendants performing as St. Lucia, the Lake Mary Elementary School choir singing Swedish carols. On display will be a 28-foot replica of a Viking ship, courtesy of Viking World, Orlando, and a giant Dali home. Charlie Carlson, local Swedish descendant will be the guest speaker. A donation by attendees would be appreciated to defray costs.

The Sanford area has many Swedish descendants as Henry Sanford brought two groups over from Sweden in 1871 to help work in his citrus groves. They soon created a settlement called New Upsala, and began a new life here. Soon, these Swedish immigrants spread across Seminole County, settling in Oviedo, Maitland, Lake Mary and Forest City.

Stetson's Corner Rest in Peace, sort of

Halloween is almost here, so I thought a romp through our Geneva Cemetery would be interesting. Thanks to Mal and Mary Jo Martin and the Geneva Historical Society for providing this timely, or untimely information. <http://www.rootsweb.com/~flsemino/genecemetery.htm> "for better or worse, till death do us part" lists lots of information about the folks who went before us.

There are 724 souls, or thereabouts, buried in our Geneva Cemetery — from babies to the "unknown man delivered in the wagon." The earliest birth date I found was 1811 for Pailence Caroline Powell (mother of Lewis Thornton Powell, a "celebrity of sorts" discussed later), however her exact day of death in 1904 is uncertain.

I am a mess tomorrow, a Confederate soldier in the Civil War, was also born in 1811 and died in 1888. Roughly 100 souls, many of them babies, were buried without an available birth date. Many babies were recorded without first names, like "baby McMahon."

Familiar last names catch our eye as we visit Geneva Cemetery: Prevatt, Samsula, Yarbrough, Tillis, Raulerson, Proctor, McClain, Hart, Geiger, Ballard, to name a few. And less familiar first names: Minerva, Welcome, Cader, Mayme, Dock, Cyril, Sina, Isom, Bliss, Nevada, Gussie, and Dinty.

Wouldn't we love to hear their stories? Susie Wilkinson 1886-1976; John Wicks 1857-1928; Isabel Leota Greer 1892-1984; Andrew J. Holder 1835-1931; and Samuel Levy 1894-1994. Civil and World wars, air and space travel, emancipation of African-Americans and women, communication and computers, lifetimes of amazing events.

Veterans from both sides of the Civil War are buried here. (The ratio is a bit lopsided, however-16 Confederate soldiers and 1 Union soldier.) Did you know the official names of the two sides in the Civil War? Confederate States of America and Grand Army of the Republic (Union)-CSA and GAR for short. Additionally we buried veterans of the Spanish American War, WWI, WWII, Korean and Vietnam.

What would Halloween be without a creepy story that starts out, "he was a quiet boy..." and ends with, "finally, we found his skull..." Lewis

Thornton Powell tread a long and winding road from his birthplace in 1844 Alabama to Washington where he became a key player in planning the assassination of President Lincoln. The original plan was to kidnap President Lincoln in exchange for the release of Confederate soldiers held as prisoners, but when those plans fell through, assassination plans began. Powell's assignment was to kill Secretary of State William H. Seward. Powell gained access to the Seward home by posing as a deliveryman for Seward's medicine. Throughout his life, Seward had posed as a Union soldier and worked in a Union hospital, so he was a convincing choice. William Seward was home, recovering from a carriage accident. Thankfully Powell's gun misfired, and although he beat Seward's son and stabbed the Secretary, he did not succeed in killing Seward, or we might not have those fabulous Alaskan cruises to enjoy today!

Powell was hung in April 1865 and buried in the penitentiary graveyard. His remains were moved several times and it was not until 1992 that his severed head was discovered among Indian remains at the Smithsonian Institute. They were trying to return Indian remains to the proper tribes and ran across Powell's skull which was tagged with his identification. His family was traced to Geneva, Florida where his father had founded the First Baptist Church of Apopka and was the first pastor of the First Baptist Church of Geneva. There is no hard evidence that the rest of his remains were ever found.

Back to the future, don't forget the pumpkins have arrived at the First Methodist Church of Geneva, and the Baptist Church will be holding its Fall Festival October 31st from 6:30pm to 8 pm as an alternative for kids' trick or treating. There will be games, puppets, prizes,

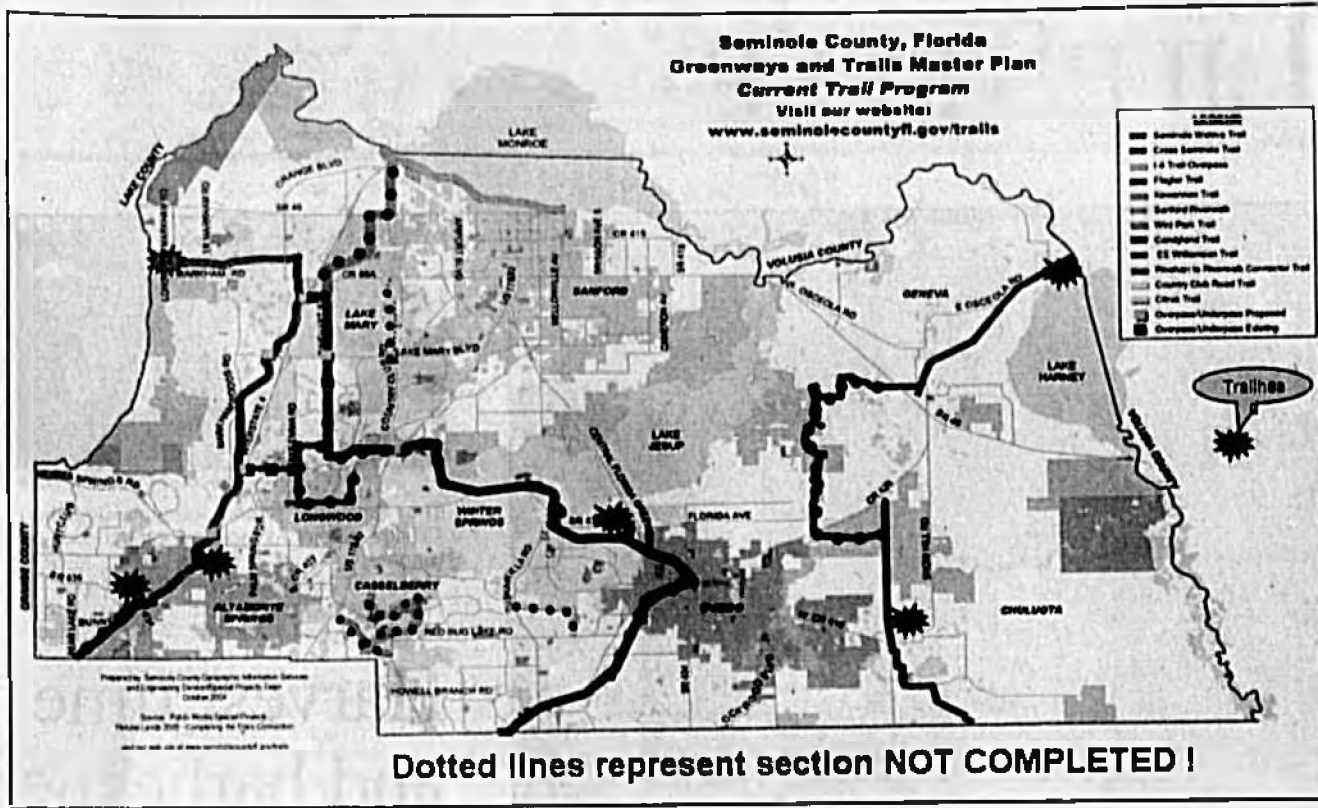

warrants at various locations in the three counties Oct. 25. In Seminole County deputies searched 1445 La Paloma Circle in Winter Springs; 5005 Bayside Loop No. 209 in Oviedo; and 160 Stephens Street in Oviedo. In Volusia County a search warrant was issued at 1411 Pear Avenue in Deltona, and in Orange County a warrant was issued at 1874 Clacton Drive in Orlando.

Seven people were arrested during the operation, and two more are being sought by deputies.

Byron A. Coffie, 29, and Loretta L. Alexander, 29, both of 1445 La Paloma Circle in Winter Springs were arrested for drug possession and trafficking cocaine after deputies executed a search warrant.

When deputies entered the home they found a digital scale, two boxes of plastic baggies and a can of baking soda inside a cabinet above the microwave oven in the kitchen. They also found 83 grams of cocaine, one dose of MDMA, and three grams of marijuana in the bedroom belonging to Alexander and Coffie.

Coffie, who worked for Progress Energy in the field of tree service, was taken to jail and charged with conspiracy to traffic more than 400 grams of cocaine.

Alexander, was taken to jail and charged with trafficking less than 28 grams of cocaine; possession of no more than 20 grams of marijuana; and possession of a controlled substance without a prescription.

A second residence in Seminole County was searched at 5005 Bayside Loop #209 in Oviedo. Dwight L.

Everett, 36, of Oviedo, already had an active warrant for conspiracy to traffic more than 400 grams of cocaine. He was arrested outside of his residence, before deputies initiated the search warrant. Everett was an electrician for Tri City Electric.

Leonard P. Hill, 38, of 160 Stephen Street in Oviedo, was arrested at his place of employment at 5201 Raymond Street in Orlando, and charged with conspiracy to traffic cocaine.

Matthew Wood III, 33, was arrested 1411 Pear Avenue in Deltona, charged with conspiracy to traffic more than 400 grams of cocaine, and taken to the Volusia County Jail.

Michael Mendoza, 25, was arrested at 1874 Clacton Drive in Orlando, charged with conspiracy to traffic more than 200 grams of cocaine, conspiracy to traffic marijuana, and taken to the Orange County Jail.

Danilo Mendoza, 28, was also arrested at 1874 Clacton Drive. Mendoza was charged with conspiracy to traffic marijuana.

Two handguns, about \$5,000, and some crack cocaine were also seized during the search warrants on Oct. 25, 2005, a Seminole County Sheriff's Office press release said.

A few weeks ago, an earlier operation netted nearly 259 grams of cocaine, 122 grams of that find were already converted into crack cocaine. Four men were arrested during that operation.

Dwight E. Tucker; Demetrice Nixon; Carlos D. Hampton, and Danny L. Hampton were all charged with conspiracy to traffic cocaine.

all women who will be pregnant during the flu season; residents of nursing homes and long-term care facilities; healthcare workers; and caregivers of infants under the age of six months.

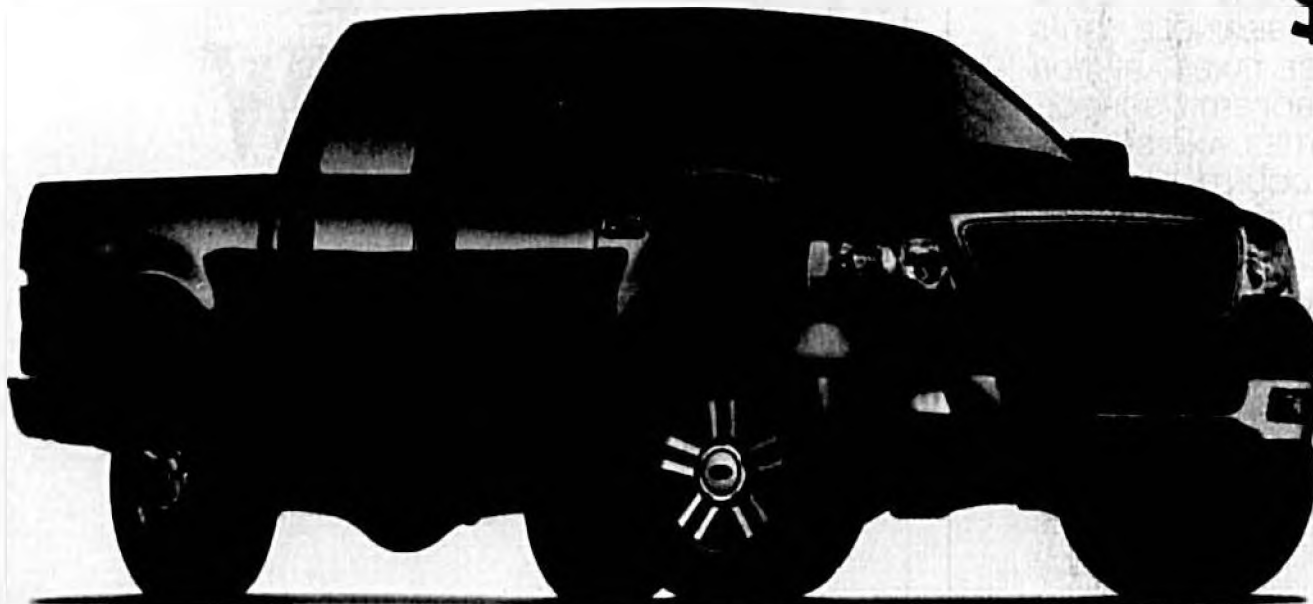

OVIDEO — After the Winter Springs Bears beat the Oviedo Lions 16-8 on Friday night to throw the 6A-District 2 race into a three-way tie, the big question was, "just how long is 72 hours?"

That's how long Winter Springs will have to enjoy its win and Oviedo will have to bounce back before the two teams — along with the Lake Brantley Patriots — will be back at John Courier Field to sort out the final standings.

"We have no choice," said Oviedo coach Greg Register. "We have to put this behind us and be ready to play for the district championship in 72 hours."

The Lions (7-2), Bears (6-3), and Patriots (6-3) each have 3-1 district marks. Oviedo beat Lake Brantley which defeated Winter Springs which completed the circuit by knocking off Oviedo.

Because of its superior regular season record, Oviedo gets a bye Monday as Lake Brantley and Winter Springs square off in a 12-minute quarter. If no winner has been decided after that, the teams will go to the Kansas tiebreaker, alternating four-play series from the 10-yard line.

The winner then plays Oviedo following the same sequence. If Oviedo wins, the Lions claim the 6A-2 crown with the Lake Brantley/Winter Springs victor going into the 6A state playoffs as the runner-up.

Should the Lions lose, however, they will have to play the loser of the Lake Brantley/Winter Springs contest for the No. 2 spot.

"If you had told me at the beginning of the season that after having to replace 18 of 22 starters from last year, we'd be playing for the district champi-

onship, I wouldn't have believed it," said Winter Springs coach Steve Katz. "What that says is we have a great, great bunch of kids and a great coaching staff."

The Bears scratched out an early lead Friday night thanks to an interception by Zach Hillery the led to a 32-yard field goal by David LeBar with 5:21 remaining in the first quarter.

For the next three quarters, the two teams shoved each other back and forth between the 20-yard lines, neither team mounting much of a scoring threat until Winter Springs constructed a 21-play, 64-yard drive the took 9:16 off of the clock.

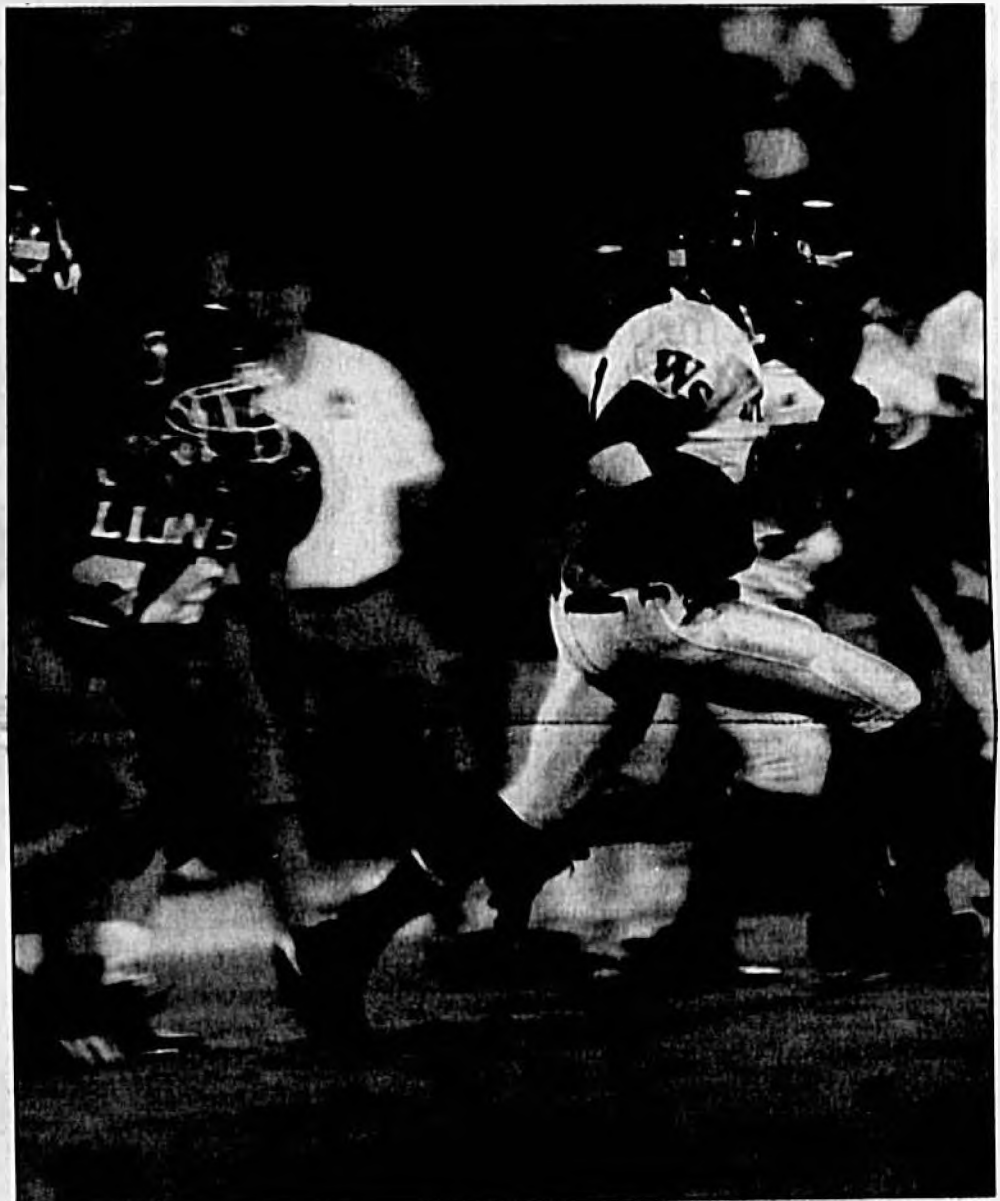
Sophomore quarterback Taylor Salem and junior tight end Lars Anderson capped the drive by hooking up on a nine-yard touchdown pass play with 4:57 remaining in the game.

"They're a great defensive team," said Katz of Oviedo. "We knew we were in for a struggle. Luckily, we were able to make some adjustments at halftime and moved the chain in the second half."

"Our defense played just an outstanding game. Mike Kintz, our defensive coordinator and defensive back coach, Collin Sample, our linebackers coach, and Curtis White, our defensive line coach, put in a great game plan that our kids executed perfectly."

It was fitting, then, that the defense cap the victory with a 65-yard interception return for a touchdown by Cameron Thompkins with 3:07 left to play.

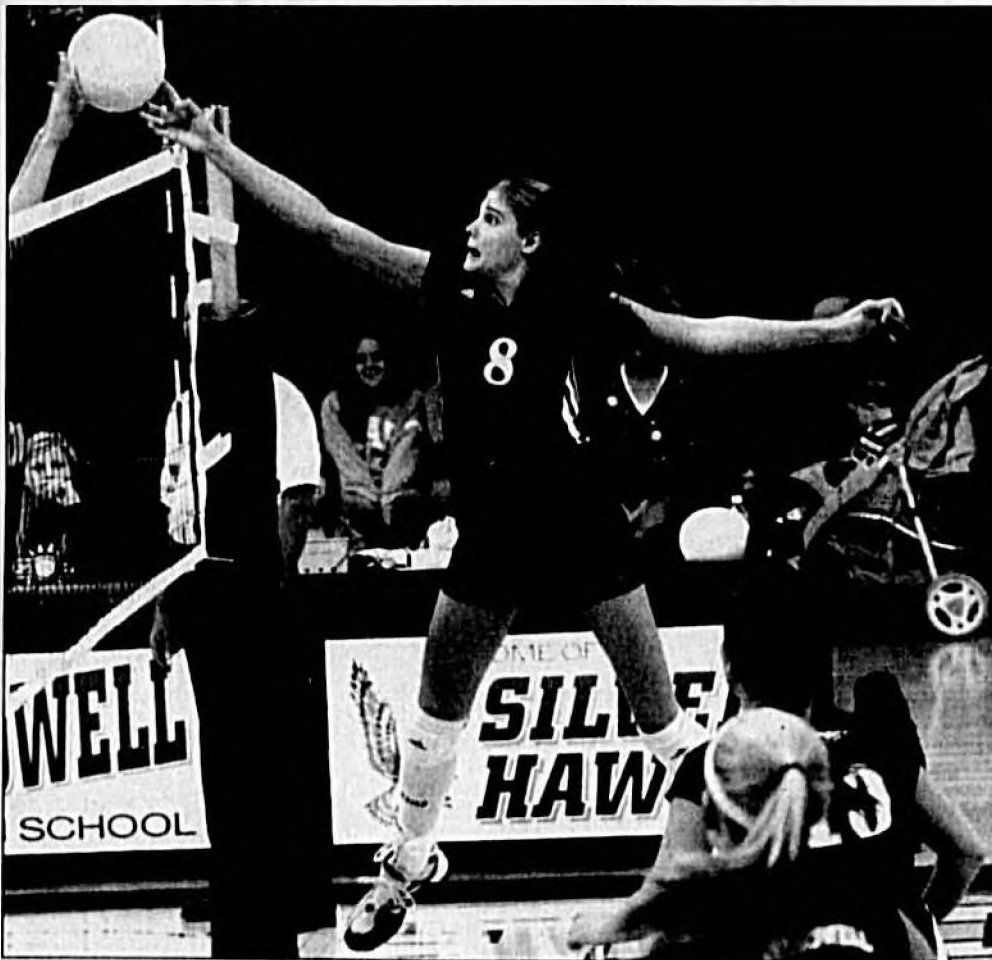

Do the names of Earl Lloyd and Jacques Plante ring a bell to you sports fans?

The anniversary of their achievements is this coming week.

Earl Lloyd became the first black ever to play in a sanctioned NBA game, when he took the floor for the Washington Capitols in Rochester, N.Y. on Oct. 31, 1950.

Lloyd was actually one of three blacks to become an NBA player in the 1950 season. Others were Nat "Sweetwater" Clifton who was signed by the New York Knicks, and Chuck Cooper who was drafted by the Boston Celtics and debuted the night after Lloyd.

Jacques Plante was a goalie for the Montreal Canadiens hockey team. On Nov. 1, 1959, after receiving another facial wound in an attempt to stop a hockey puck, emerged from the locker room with seven stitches, and a plastic mask he had made from fiberglass and resin. Although Cliff Benedict had tried using a leather mask back in the 1920's, the idea didn't catch on. But after Plante began wearing his mask, goalies throughout the NHL began wearing protective plastic face shields.

Born in 1929, Plante was a seven-time winner of the Vezina trophy (outstanding goalie). He died in 1986.

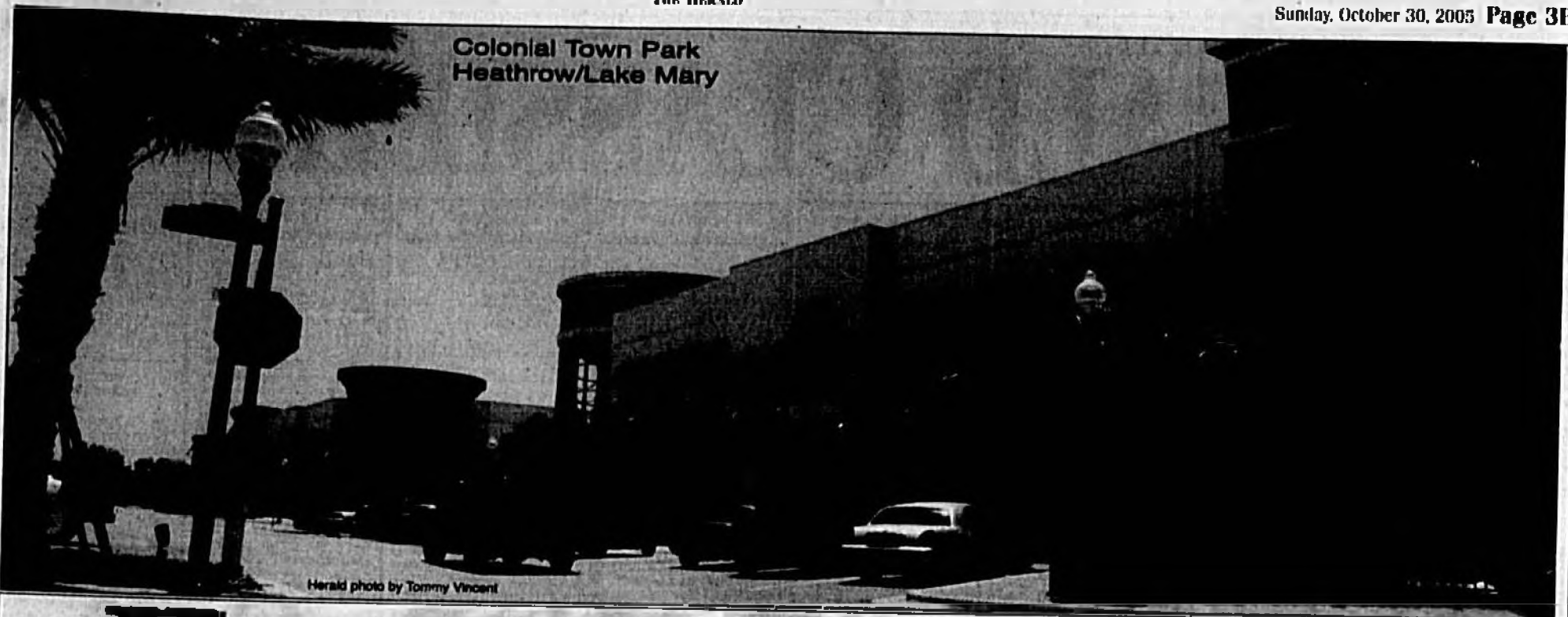
Three other important returnees are shooting guards Sade Allen and Tamara Layton from Miami and small forward Rila Grayson from Metairie, Louisiana.
