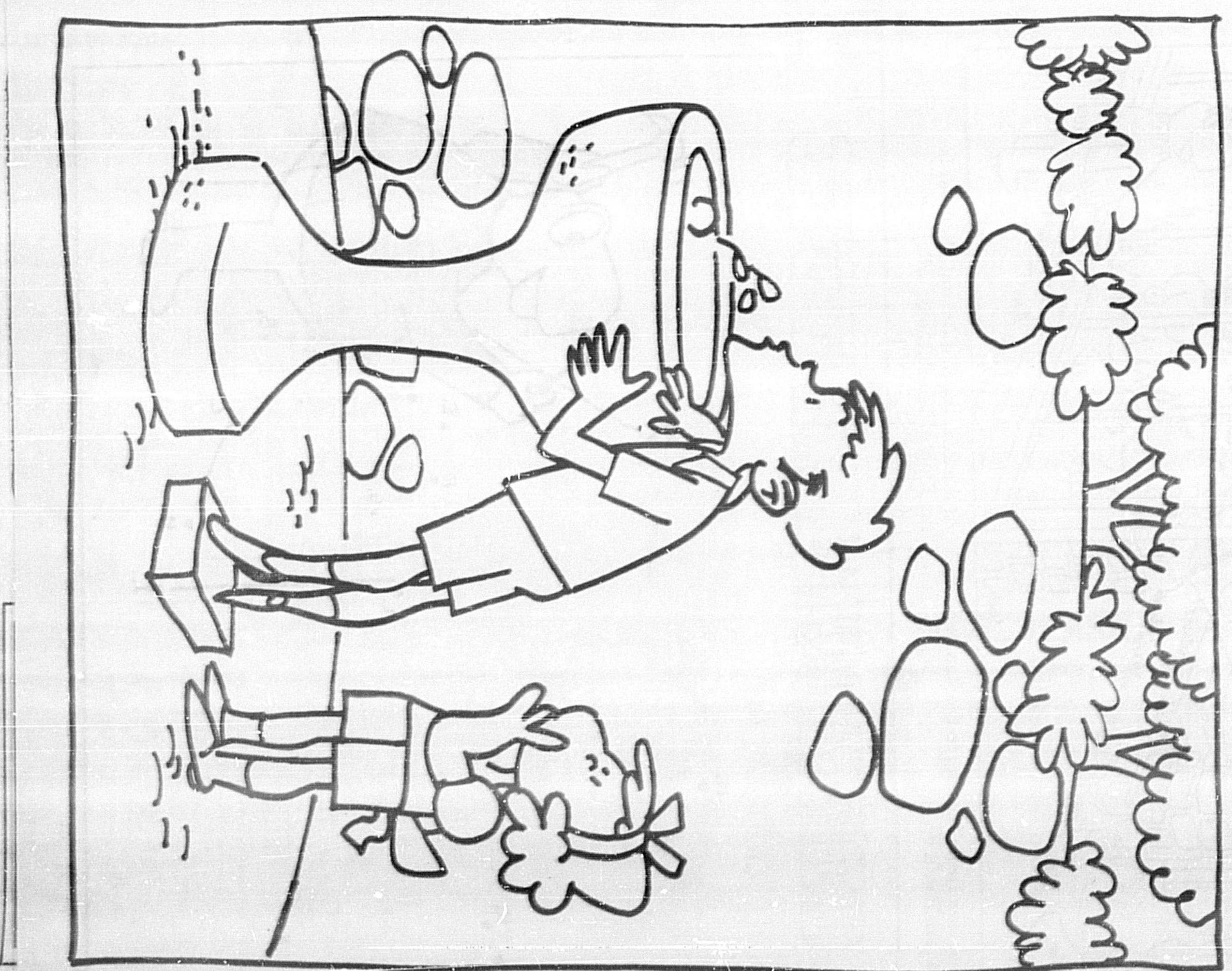

Tax Hike Looms For School Pay

An ad valorem tax increase of 1.5 mills for Seminole County real estate owners because of action taken last week by the State Legislature. The lawmakers took away \$266,500 from the county's road and bridge fund and gave it to the schools for teachers' salary increases.

In setting up the budget for the current fiscal year, the County Commission anticipated \$325,000 in race track receipts for the year (taxes on jai alai, horse tracks and dog tracks). Actually the county received \$326,000 in these taxes. Under a law enacted four years ago \$80,000 went to the Seminole County Port Authority to underwrite outstanding bonds and the balance went into the county's road and bridge fund.

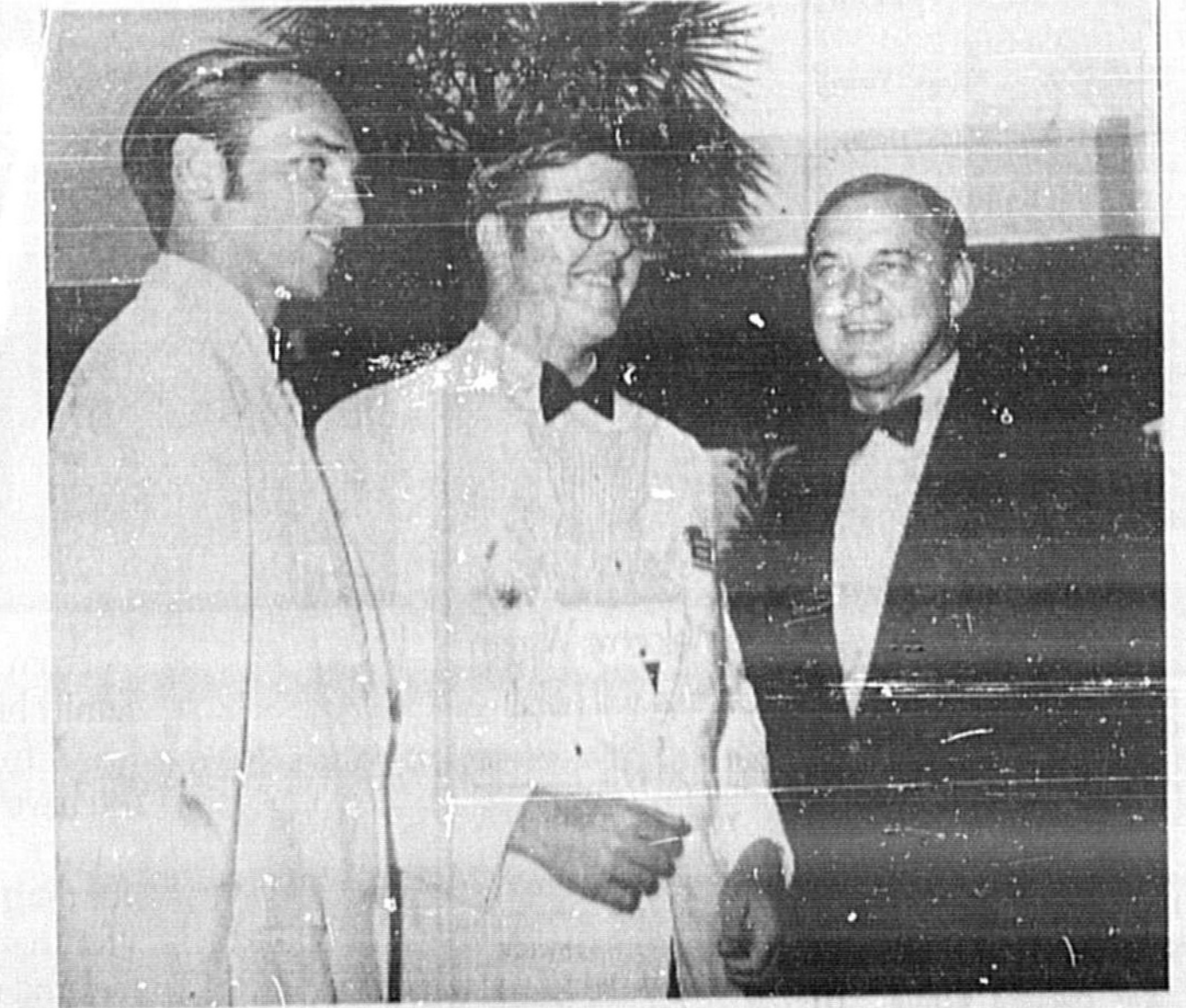

Editorial Comment

Health Of Americans Gets Top Level Rate

Reliable guideposts are always hard to find. Right now they are at a premium. And when the still somewhat mysterious and surely complex field of health care is the terrain to be explored, a good guide is more than welcome. It is essential.

This is the reaction that many honest seekers for help in this matter have felt after looking over the report on "Health of Americans" which came out of a recent session of the American Assembly at Arden House, Harriman, N.Y.

Their wide-ranging discussions could not escape and indeed sought out some answer to the problem produced by the decline and vanishing nature of the old-time family physician.

It is the only experience one has that which is being given considerable publicity in the apparent unavailability of the general practitioner in Seminole County, perhaps this will be helpful.

Role Of Press

One of the recognized leaders in journalism today, and the head of an organization of newspapers bearing the family name, John S. Knight, has redefined the essential role of the press in terms of present-day situations.

His redefinition can be found in his recent remarks at Ohio University at Athens when he received that institution's Cary Van Andra Award for his "enduring contributions to journalism."

"A courageous and responsible press," Knight declared, "should:

- "Audit government at all levels.
- Expose corruption, both in public and private affairs.
- Turn the spotlight on the private world of a man nominated to the Supreme Court.
- Interpret social change — fearlessly and honestly.
- Maintain the sanctity of an accurate news report.
- Uphold the view of Judge Harold Medina that of 'all constitutional rights, the freedoms of speech and assembly are the most perishable, yet the most vital, to the preservation of American democracy.'
- Preserve the right of dissent, remembering that while history has been filled with attacks upon dissenters, there were also moments when dissent led to change, and where speaking out in an unpopular cause has shifted the nation's course by changing the persuasion of its citizens.
- Have the wisdom to differentiate those willful violators of the law who cannot draw the line between dissent and disobedience."

It is time for restating and redefining many phrases and terms, and Newspaperman Knight does this with "freedom of the press" in a wise and perceptive manner. — Wichita Falls (Tex.) Times

Unemployment Count In United States Estimated At 4.1 Million

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's jobless rate rose in May to 3.9 per cent of the work force, the government reported today. The seasonally adjusted unemployment count was estimated at 4.1 million, highest level since January, 1969.

The Labor Department said the unemployment rate rose from 3.8 per cent in April to 3.9 per cent in May, but that the number of jobless workers had fallen to 4.1 million from 4.2 million in April.

The labor force, which includes full-time workers, part-timers, students looking for jobs and seasonally adjusted figures, rose to 4.1 million from 4.0 million in April. The unemployment rate rose from 3.7 per cent to 3.9 per cent, but this was still nearly a full percentage point above the 2.9 per cent rate in March.

The BLS also listed other statistics indicating a continued dip from 8.7 per cent to 8.5 per cent in April. It reported the average work week for men, with about 100,000 of these due to increased strike activity in the contract construction and manufacturing industries.

Since December, the report said, the number of unemployed workers has risen by nearly 1.3 million—800,000 men, 425,000 adult women and 225,000 teenagers.

The jobless rise from 3.5 per cent in December to 3.9 per cent in May was the sharpest increase for a five-month span in more than a decade, the BLS said.

Water Rate Act Outlined To City

By TOM ALEXANDER

On July 1, water rates to residents outside the city limits of Sanford may be reduced from the present 200 per cent or double what city residents are paying to 125 per cent or 25 per cent more than inside city consumers are paying.

The City Commission was put on notice last night that a bill expected to be signed by the Governor would force this reduction. The bill is expected to be effective July 1. The act will force all cities in Florida, with the exception of those city water systems serving a metropolitan county, to reduce water rates to outside city consumers to a 25 per cent over-ride of what inside city consumers are paying.

Commissioner Thomas McDonald advised the commission to ignore the ruling until the new bill can be studied in detail and more information can be supplied to the city.

While discussing the effect of the new bill McDonald also moved that the city reduce water rates at Sanford Airport.

Presently the city is selling water to the Sanford Industrial Commission and the SIC is reselling the water to consumers on the airport at double the city's rate.

The commission then agreed to sell consumers on the base at the same rate it is presently providing water to city residents.

Two boys from each Boys State annually are selected to attend Boys Nation in Washington to also learn of our federal government and see historic places. About one-fifth of the graduates of the service academies are Boys State.

Students will be advised that there'll be plenty of work and little time for play during their seven day stay at Boys State. "Do not bring athletic equipment, as the program does not permit free time as a physical education period. Due to the very tight schedule of events, you will not be permitted to visit on campus, or in the City of Tallahassee, after the instructions issued by Director Robert A. Francis, Sr.

Each day will begin at 6:30 a.m. with roll call and breakfast and the first class two hours later at 8:30, and continue until 5:30 p.m. Breakfast will begin at 7:30 p.m. and a call to quarters at 11 p.m. and all lights out by 11:15 p.m.

One of the main purposes of the Boys State is to teach its session to operate a constitutional government in which liberty is guaranteed by law.
