County Request For Water Plan Turned Down

The Housing and Home Finance Agency has turned down Seminole County's application for planning funds to start work on a \$9 million county wide water control program.

The county had asked for a planning grant of \$37,000 with the initial phase in the long range program estimated at \$3,620,000. County Engineer Carlton Bliss told the County Commission Tuesday that the agency turned down the request because it felt the county did not have enough funds available to finance the program. The government would have adranced Seminole County planning funds for the project.

The commission agreed to invite representatives of Reynolds, Smith and Hill, Jacksonville engi-

neers, to meet with them on the possibility of appealing the agency's decision.

The Jacksonville firm had been hired to conduct the survey of water control needs. The board will meet with Harold Scott of the firm July 11 to discuss the appeal. The board may send a delegation to Atlanta, the HHFA regional effice.

The first phase of the long range program was to have included solving flooding problems in land-locked lakes in the county while other phases would have included widening existing channel and canals at Howell Creek, the Little Wekiva at the Econlockhatches River. The entire program would have taken five years.

"There is peace in Germany and in Berlin," the President said at his first news conference since May 5.

Anybody familiar with Communist tactics over the long years knows they have made a specialty of trying to out-sit their adversaries at the conference table. In fact, the now discredited Molotov earned the nickname "stony bottom" for his success in wearing town opponents. He and his diplomatic successors de-veloped mastery of the techniques of delay. Consequently, Khrushchav inevitably sounds funny when he says the Western powers have developed a "whole system of delay" which involves "not rejecting negotiations and at the same time not accepting con-crete proposals."
