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## Canaveral O.K. Is Postponed By Trade Body

### Indian River Harbor Endorsement Withheld Until After Study Of Project

## Canal And Road To Coast Desired

### Effort Will Be Made To Get Highway 44 Improved By State

Action on a request from the Cape Canaveral harbor project directors that the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce endorse the proposed building of a port at that point on the Indian River was deferred at last night's meeting until the February session. In the meantime the proposed harbor is to be made a matter of study by directors of the Chamber of Commerce and information will be sought to show wherein another port on the east coast will be beneficial to this section of the state.

President G. M. Papworth of the trade body stated that there is no doubt but that the proposed harbor at Titusville, Fla., connecting the St. Johns River with the Atlantic Ocean, would be of much greater benefit to this county. This opinion he expressed at a recent meeting in Orlando called to consider the proposed project, but he not only expressed that opinion at the Orlando meeting, he said, but he also the sentiment that Seminole County will oppose the acquisition of federal funds in building a port on the Indian River.

Since the Orlando meeting the Chamber of Commerce has been "latched" their project onto the proposed canal from this city to the coast. Mr. Papworth stated, and this was shown in the communication from Cape Canaveral sent at the Chamber of Commerce meeting. Among other benefits to be derived from the canal, this communication stated, would be cheaper water transportation from the Canaveral port through the Sanford-to-Titusville canal, than via the St. Johns from Jacksonville.

Mr. Papworth announced his intention of attending the State Highway board meeting in Tallahassee on Jan. 27 where he plans to make a strenuous effort to get an improved highway between Sanford and the Atlantic seaboard. He called attention to the fact that Sanford and Titusville are the only county seat towns in Florida not connected by an improved highway. He hopes that Senator J. J. Bagwell had other Titusville men of prominence will attend the board meeting and help convince the highway officials of the desirability of putting No. 44 in the class condition.

It was reported that petitions improving the highway have been already signed by Gov. Nathan, Duggan, and Mims, and that the petitioners were also about to sign the petitions.

## Future Farmers Earn \$3,751 In Projects Carried On At Home While Going To School

Three thousand, seven hundred and fifty-one dollars were earned last year by 32 High School boys in home project work carried on in conjunction with their school work, according to the yearly report forwarded to Tallahassee today by Alex R. Johnson, instructor in agricultural subjects at the Seminole High School. The boys belong to Seminole Chapter of the Future Farmers of America and the net profits of \$3,751.41 came from farming operations they carried on at home during the year. At the same time, however, the boys all went to school, carrying full courses there and getting as high marks (higher in some instances, it was said) as others who had no work to perform out of school hours.

## Japanese Quit Naval Confab; Demand Parity

### U. S. Is Opposed To Naval Equality; London Conference Is Without Result

LONDON, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Japanese delegates announced tonight their withdrawal from the International Naval Conference. Their decision, signifying the ending of the five-power discussions seeking to effect an agreement on naval limitations to replace the expired Washington and London treaties, was announced following a "shut-down" session of the conference. Discussions had been deadlocked by the Japanese demand for fleet equality and "common upper limit" tonnage.

Norman Davis, American delegate, read to the conference the flat refusal of the United States to discuss Japanese equality demands.

The conference's breakdown, a Japanese spokesman said, is due "not to the adamant opposition of the Japanese but to the adamant opposition of other delegations to the Japanese proposition."

"We would be quite willing to leave observers, behind depending upon the nature of the invitation given them."

"It is our earnest desire not to make international feeling any worse. We do not think our withdrawal will mean a building race, unless the atmosphere of naval competition is created by others. We do not intend to start one."

Delegates of other nations tentatively agreed to continue the talks on a four power basis—Great Britain, the United States, France and Italy participating.

## Final Presentment Of Grand Jury Is Given To Court

### County Home, Jail, Convict Camp Improvements Needed

Recommending certain improvements at the County Jail, the County Home and the Convict Camp, and suggesting that the sheriff's department devote more time to the solving of major crimes, the County Grand Jury made its final presentment to Judge Millard B. Smith of the Ninth Judicial Circuit today. Recommendations included painting the interior of the County Jail, improvement of the heating plant in the County Home and purchase of new mattresses and bedding for the white cells at the Convict Camp. The Grand Jury also called attention to the large number of capital crimes occurring in this County.

The presentment reads as follows:

"We, the Grand Jurors, respectfully present that we have carefully investigated all such matters as have been brought to our attention, or by us deemed proper to be investigated, and in such cases where evidence would, in our opinion, warrant, we have found 'True Bills,' in those cases where, in our opinion, the evidence would not so warrant, we have found 'No True Bill.'

**COUNTY PROPERTY**

"The County Jail was inspected by the Grand Jury and in general found to be in good condition. The interior of the jail is in need of a fresh coat of paint, and in a number of places the concrete floors are in need of repair. We recommend that these things be done as soon as possible. Other minor recommendations with respect to the upkeep of the jail were made by the Grand Jury to the Sheriff's office.

"The County Home for the most part was found to be neat, clean and efficiently operated, and there were very few complaints from any of the inmates. We found what appears to be inadequate heating facilities and we recommend that additional stoves be provided so that aged residents, some of whom are ill health, may be more comfortable on cold days and nights. We also recommend that leaks in the roof, breaks in the plaster, and the porch of the post house be repaired at once.

"We particularly wish to commend the cleanliness with which the kitchens of both the County Home and the Convict Camp are kept, but we would call attention to the poor condition of the bedding and cots in the white cells of the latter institution. It is a regrettable fact that the sleeping quarters of the white prisoners are less sanitary than those of the negroes."

## Liberty Leaguer Says New Deal Is 'Intolerant'

CHICAGO, Jan. 15.—(AP)—R. E. Desvernine, chairman of the American Liberty League lawyers committee, addressing the Hamilton Republican Club here today, described the New Deal Administration as "intolerant of all criticism." He asserted that the "sacred principle of Democratic government is denied by anyone who uses the power of his office to stir up conflict."

President Roosevelt, he said, "will easily attain the record of being the President of the United States who violated the Constitution more times in a single term of office than any other."

## Former Executive Of Sanford Bank Heads Orlando Institution

Linco, E. Allen, formerly president of the Sanford Atlantic National Bank, was elected president of the First National Bank of Orlando at the annual meeting of the stockholders of that institution yesterday. He had been vice-president and cashier of the Orlando bank.

The directors declared a \$30,000 dividend, payable in common stock, and a 3 percent annual cash dividend, all payable Feb. 1. They also voted to retire \$30,000 of preferred stock now held by the RFD and to issue common stock on the basis of one share of new stock for each five shares of stock now held by investors in the bank.

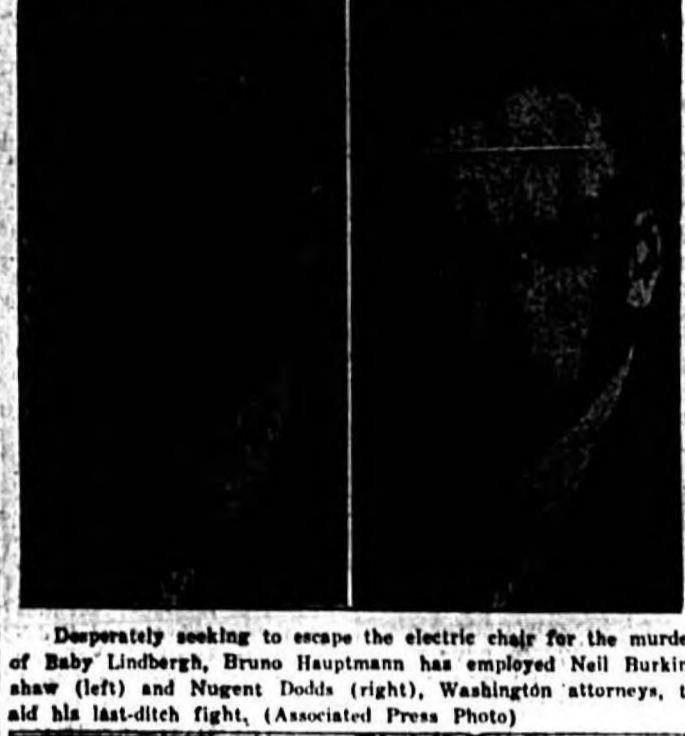

## Nye Says Wilson Falsified About U.S. Entry In War

### Charges That Former President Knew Of Secret Treaties

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Chairman Nye, Republican, North Dakota, of the Senate munitions committee asserted today that Woodrow Wilson "falsified" in chronicling some of the circumstances surrounding American entrance into the World War. He attacked Wilson's post-war story that he did not know at the time this country went into the struggle of secret treaties between the Allies for redistribution of Europe.

Nye and Senator Clark, Democrat, Missouri, joined in the assertion that they had read in State Department files and elsewhere documents which could not be published but which proved Wilson and Secretary State Lansing knew of the treaties.

Chairman Nye interpreted facts found in the diplomatic documents as showing a constant easing of neutrality restrictions to accommodate America's vast and growing sales of war supplies to the Allies.

"The documents show," he said, "that neutrality was made to step aside whenever it conflicted with commercial interest."

From a long series of documents, the committee revealed:

That the State Department under Robert Lansing never "seriously pressed" its protests at British interference with American commerce, and that "with deliberate purpose" they were "submerged in verbiage."

That as early as Oct. 4, 1915, Wilson, despite the pressing problems of neutrality, was discussing a "main issue for the campaign next year" with Colonel House.

That with the submarine negotiations proceedings Lansing informed British officials that the Administration was not behind a pending resolution to warn Americans against traveling on the vessels of belligerents.

## 17 Persons Killed In Crash Of Giant Plane In Arkansas

### Hauptmann's Wife Tells Him Court Denied Last Plea

### Reprieve By Hoffman Now Only Chance Of Escaping Chair

TRENTON, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Mrs. Bruno Richard Hauptmann told her husband today his desperate plea to the Federal Circuit Court had failed and that a reprieve remained the best hope of escaping the electric chair Friday night.

Defense lawyers went ahead with plans to ask Governor Harold G. Hoffman for a reprieve. Meanwhile the governor announced through his press aide that he had "reached no decision." It was said he was continuing his private investigation of the case and seeking legal advice upon his power to reprieve at this late date. What, if any, comment Hauptmann made on the turn of events was not disclosed.

Rejecting all of the arguments of defense counsel that Hauptmann's trial at Flemington was surrounded by prejudicial influences, U. S. Circuit Court Judge J. Warren Davis said yesterday that to grant the writ he would have to overrule both the New Jersey Court of Errors and Appeals and the United States Supreme Court.

Despair was written on the faces of the defense lawyers as they left the court room.

"That is the end," said one of the five attorneys who would not be quoted by name.

## Central Florida Council Meeting Attended By Many

This morning's meeting in Howey-in-the-Hills of the Central Florida Council of Chambers of Commerce was the most largely attended of any such meetings since the council was formed, it was reported by Karl Lehmann, former secretary of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and now acting in a similar capacity for the organization. He said that every city between Melbourne and St. Augustine and from Ocala to Kissimmee was represented with the exception of Sanford and Winter Park. Altamonte Springs in this County was represented by Mr. and Mrs. Benj. F. Haines.

Frank D. Waterman, New York, of fountain pen fame, was the principal speaker, and told about the advertising in New York papers of Florida citrus fruits. Representatives of the Florida Citrus Commission were also present and exhibited copies of advertisements now running in northern newspapers and demonstrated the program being given over 22 radio broadcasting stations.

## Giant Plane Is Upset In Gale; None On Board

PENSACOLA, Jan. 15.—(AP)—A 47-mile per hour wind blowing up suddenly upset the trans-Atlantic seaplane "Leviathan" of the Valiseau of Paris on the bay here today. None was aboard. Divers immediately began an investigation to determine the damage.

The giant plane apparently took off when hit by the gale, officers said, although no one was aboard, and nose dived into the bay. The engine air intake in mud and divers expressed the belief they will have to take the ship apart to get them out. The plane, one of the world's largest, had six motors and 75 passenger capacity.

The giant French seaplane "Leviathan" of Valiseau of Paris, arrived at Pensacola Tuesday, completing a trans-Atlantic trip which began at Biscarosse, France, Dec. 2. The plane came here from Martinique, a 2,000 mile flight, in slightly under 20 hours. It will go to Miami Friday. Captain Germain Bonnot and crew of eight were aboard. The plane flew from France via Senegal and Brazil.

The organization embraces merchants and business men from all sections of the state.
