





# First Human To Swim Across Lake Michigan 'Recovering'

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind. (UPI)—A research chemist who became the first person to swim across Lake Michigan recuperated from his ordeal in a hospital here today.

Ted Erikson, 33, Chicago, was pulled from the water Tuesday night when waves threatened to dash him against rocks at the end of a pier here. He had been in the water since Monday when he and five other swimmers entered the lake at Chicago in quest of \$3,575 in prize money, \$100 a mile, posted by Chicago car dealer Jim Erikson's wife, Loretta, and Moran greeted him as he came ashore at 8:30 p. m. after 36 hours and 48 minutes in the water. They accompanied him to the hospital where he was given a physical exam, pronounced in "excellent shape" and put to bed for the night. In a room two doors down the hall was Kathryn Simceel, 18, San Jose, Calif., who dropped out of the race after completing 20 miles of the 84 1/2 mile distance. Her sister, Cynthia, 21, made 25 miles.

Erikson, a rocket fuels expert for Chicago's Armour Research Foundation, was in good spirits and joked with newsmen as he left the water. He said he planned more long distance swims but would grease his body before his next attempt. He was not greased for the Lake Michigan swim and said he suffered somewhat from exposure.

Erikson set two world records during the swim—an endurance mark for open water swimming and an open water distance mark of more than 40 miles. Although the actual distance was 35 1/2 miles, he was forced to swim farther because of delirious and was actually blown back into the lake at one point as he neared his goal.

## Congress Group Probes Aid Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon carried President Kennedy's plea for long-range foreign aid borrowing authority to Congress today and a House-Senate conference committee set to work on the aid bill.

Dillon followed Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara in his trek before the Senate Appropriations Committee on behalf of the request for authority to borrow directly from the Treasury for development loans abroad.

The Treasury secretary took with him the same general idea made Monday by Rusk and Tuesday by McNamara for the full amount that finally is authorized by the Senate and House.

The conference group, meanwhile, was to meet for the first time to work out a compromise between the Senate's \$4 billion foreign aid bill for fiscal 1962 and the House's \$4.5 billion version.

Most difficulty was expected to come over the long-range loan proposal. The House cut this from its bill but the Senate approved \$4 billion for five years. It appeared that compromise might be reached on a three-year program.

## Former Resident Dies In Mt. Dora

Mrs. E. E. Daniels, a former Sanford resident, died in Mt. Dora Monday.

The daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Berner, she was born in Palatka and came here with her parents in 1908 where she attended local schools, graduating from Seminole High School with the class of 1922. In 1924 she moved to Mt. Dora to make her home. She was a member of the Catholic Church of Eustis.

Locally she is survived by a brother, A. M. Berner. Other survivors include four daughters, two step-daughters, another brother, Lee Berner of Tampa, and a sister, Mrs. J. E. Wathen of Ft. Pierce.

Funeral mass will be conducted at 9 a. m. Thursday at the Eustis Catholic Church. Burial will be at All Souls Catholic Cemetery in Sanford.

## British Hunting Missing Goya

LONDON (UPI)—British police closely watched airports and seaports with the eyes of art experts today to prevent a stolen Goya masterpiece from leaving the country.

The painting, taken Monday night from the famed National Gallery here, was valued at \$32,000. It was not insured.

Scotland Yard called Interpol—the international police organization headquarters in Paris—into the case after a public appeal to whoever stole the portrait of the first Duke of Wellington to handle it carefully because of its "delicate condition."

Interpol has had its fill of art thefts recently. Thieves raided galleries and private collections in a series of burglaries in France this summer and escaped with an estimated \$5 million worth of art treasures.

But an Interpol spokesman said the police organization did not believe the rash of art thefts to be the work of a single international gang and that there was no pattern to the crimes. He indicated that the disappearance of Francisco Goya's portrait of the "Iron Duke" was only another odd-shaped piece in an impossible jigsaw puzzle.

The 8-by-24 inch painting was stolen after the gallery closed Monday. Authorities were puzzled over how someone could have taken the portrait without setting off any of the alarms which guard every window and door in the museum.

Some police believe the thief hid in the gallery all night and escaped when his doors were opened to the general public in the morning. But the floors of the gallery are criss-crossed with infra red beams to trap intruders and still no alarm was sounded.

The picture shows the proud Duke—who stopped Napoleon at Waterloo—wearing a red tunic bedecked with medals. It was painted by the Spanish artist from a drawing he made after the battle of Salamanca in 1812.

**Navy Launches Intensive Program Aimed At Colleges**

A campaign directed at college seniors and college graduates to publicize commissioned programs in the Navy has been launched by the Officer Programs Division of the Main Navy Recruiting Station in Jacksonville, it was announced today.

The U. S. Navy's Officer Candidate School is the commissioned program in point. A rough and tumble school which passed its 10-year tryout last March supplies the Navy annually with more than 50 percent of its Junior Officers and boasts an "alumni" of more than 34,000 since its inception in 1901.

OCS draws the bulk of its students from colleges and universities throughout the nation, a four year degree being a requisite and uses a 60 hour course crammed into 16 weeks to place its graduating officers on a par with their counterparts from Annapolis and Naval ROTC units.

However, OCS graduates serve in active duty only for three years but may apply for regular Navy if qualified.

Lt. Fred Eckart, who is responsible for OCS procurement throughout the state of Florida, states his current campaign is intended to afford senior students returning to college this fall and graduates, facility in planning their military obligations as commissioned officers in the Navy.

Applications for the Navy's OCS program are customarily accepted during the academic year at colleges and universities by visiting Navy procurement teams.

However, seniors returning to school this fall may initiate applications prior to commencement of the school year for OCS classes in the spring and summer of next year.

College graduates with baccalaureate degrees may apply for earlier OCS classes commencing in November and January.

Lt. Eckart further states that applications may be initiated through any of the Navy's recruiting stations throughout the state.

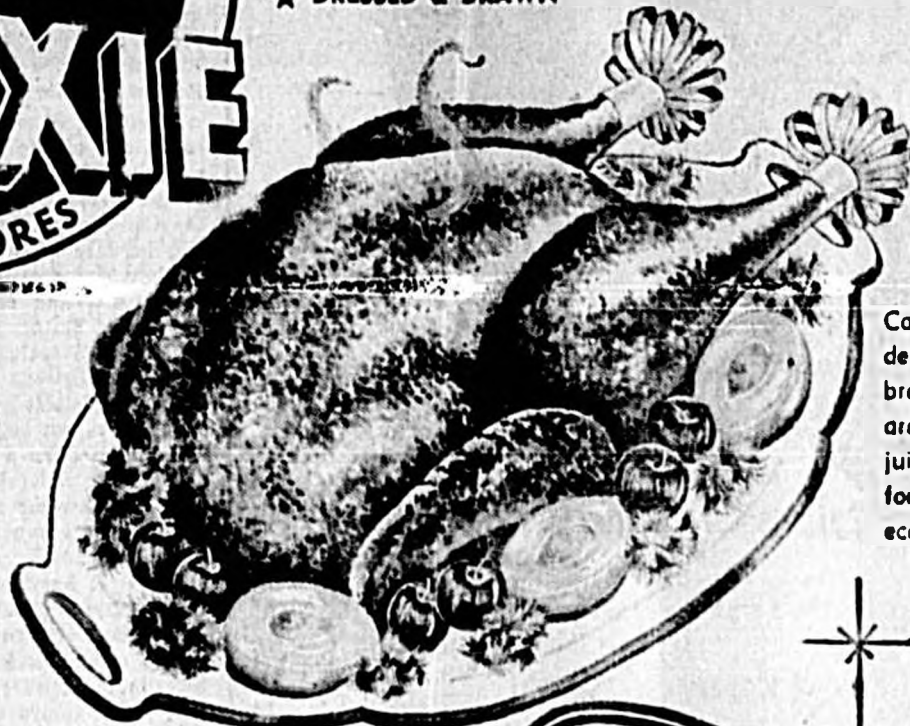

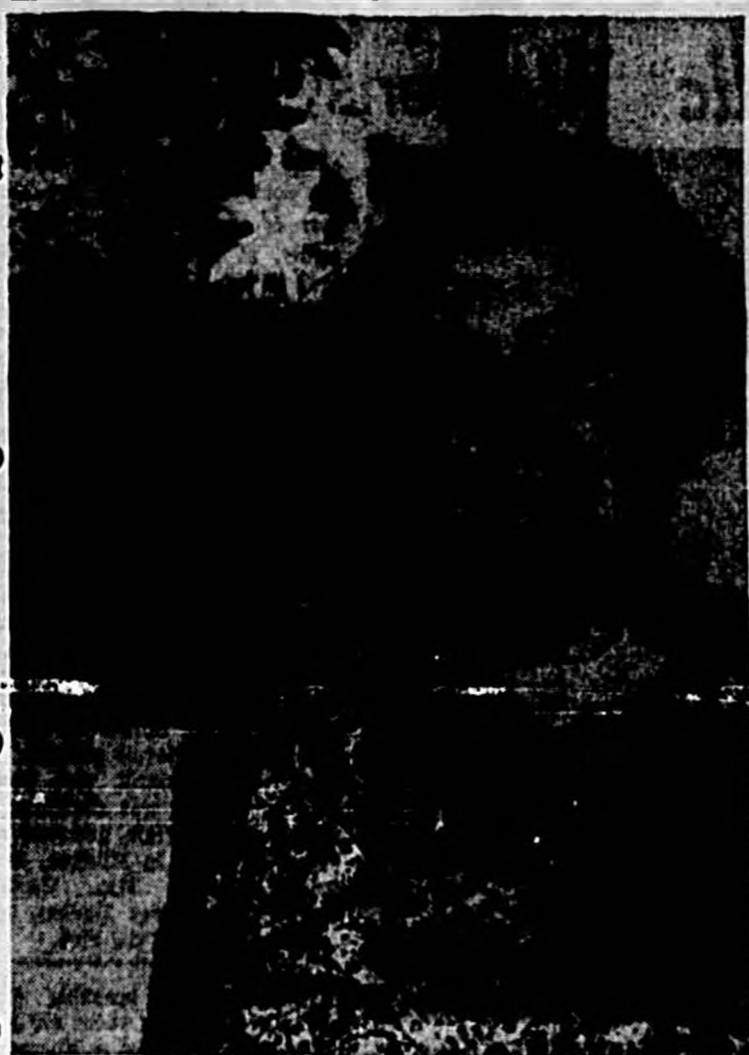

### Florida Nears Telephone Goal

When the Gulf Telephone Company in Perry, Florida, is converted to dial service on Aug. 31, 1961, all telephones in Florida will be dial operated.

This will give Florida the distinction of being the first state in the South and the fourth in the United States to reach this goal of 100 per cent dial operation. The three preceding states are Connecticut, Rhode Island and Delaware.

The first dial central office in Florida was established in 1913 in Tampa by the Peninsular Telephone Company, now a part of the General Telephone System.

The largest company operating in the state, Southern Bell, converted its last manual office to dial service on June 4, 1961. This exchange was located in Lake City, Florida.

In this period of time, there have been numerous advances in telephone technology that have constantly improved the quality of telephone service.

The development of microwave transmission and the co-axial cable vastly improved long distance service. Improved switching equipment has enabled the industry to provide for the growing demands for local service.

Presently in progress is a program of introducing Direct Distance Dialing to Florida. Many telephone subscribers in the state already have this service which enables them to dial long distance calls without the aid of an operator.

Florida telephone numbers themselves are in a process of changing to a system known as ANC or All Number Calling. This system, using 7 digits instead of the familiar 3 letters and 4 digits, will allow for continued expansion of telephone service as well as furnishing a uniform numbering plan. The present numbering plan will run out of available letter-number combinations during the 1960's.

the Railroad and Public Utilities Commission in Jacksonville, for its consideration of a more uniform and up-to-date exchange rate schedule in the territory in which they operate in Florida.

The exchange rate schedule submitted provides for separate groupings depending upon the number of telephone users that can be called by an individual customer. This exchange rate schedule is proposed to replace the statewide schedule established in 1951 in Florida.

Since the statewide exchange rate schedules were established in Florida in 1951, the tremendous growth in certain areas of Florida, the establishment of new exchanges in a number of locations in Florida, and the extension of the calling privileges of many areas, have brought about inequities in exchange rate schedules.

During this ten year period, the total number of telephones in service in the areas served by Southern Bell in Florida increased more than 190 per cent, and some of the individual exchanges have increased in excess of 300 per cent.

This growth and other changes have resulted in customers in exchanges of comparable size in many instances paying different local exchange rates.

This new proposal will re-group exchanges in Florida and will result in rate reductions for many subscribers and slight increases for others while others will experience no change. The proposed schedule provides that, in the main, the new exchanges that have been established in the past ten years as well as the slower growing exchanges will receive decreases while the faster growing exchanges will receive slight increases. In the overall, the new schedule should result in increases amounting to approximately \$183,000 per month.

Mr. C. J. Yates, vice president and general manager of Southern Bell Telephone Company in Florida, stated that "in view of the telephone growth in the past ten years and the extensions that have been made in the calling areas, a more uniform local exchange rate schedule in the territory in which we operate in Florida is appropriate at this time."

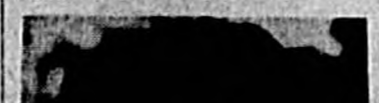

"Credit customers are the best people in town," Lewis said. "They are people who want to use the ready and convenient way of doing business. They have money to spend and will stay with the store where they have an account, if they are treated well."

In closing, Lewis made his often repeated statement.

"Your credit reputation is more valuable than any amount of money you might ever have in the bank."

## Berlin Squeeze Tightens

In the air and on the ground the Communists tightened their squeeze on Berlin today. They hinted they may limit Western air traffic rights into the city and for the first time in the present crisis they blocked U. S. Army vehicles from entering East Berlin.

The Soviet government in notes to the United States, Britain and France accused the West of a "flagrant breach" of the 1945 four-power agreement that set up the air corridors into the beleaguered city.

The notes charged that the West was permitting "all kind of revenge-seekers, extremists, saboteurs and spies" into Berlin from West Germany.

The Red police barred four U. S. Army vehicles from East Berlin and held up an Army sedan with a driver and a captain for 15 minutes by demanding "documentation."

There was some speculation in Washington that the Communists might be planning to cut off access to Berlin for all West German officials.

The Soviet document also was interpreted as a Kremlin attempt to put the West on the defensive on the key question of access rights to Berlin, where the Reds already have hinted they might try to cut rail traffic in retaliation for alleged "sabotage" of the Berlin elevated system.

But seasoned observers said the possible repercussions of such an extreme action made it seem more likely that the main Russian

aim is to prepare its bargaining position for ultimate high-level talks.

The note, however, was termed one of the most disquieting in the recent series of East-West diplomatic exchanges over Berlin.

The Communist moves put President Kennedy squarely on the spot as to where to draw the line against what appears to be a consistent policy of whittling away gradually at Western rights in Berlin. The West Berliners call this the "salami policy"—a slice at a time until all is gone.

In its note to the United States, Moscow said the Western powers

are abusing their position in West Berlin by flying in West German leaders.

Russia has indicated to the West that it is determined to obtain a complete "divorce" of West Berlin from West Germany, an authoritative diplomatic source said in Paris.

### Reds Shoot Water Cannon At Border

BERLIN (UPI) — Communist police shot a stream from a water cannon across the barricaded border into West Berlin today and stopped only when two American soldiers on guard reached for hand grenades.

A U. S. Army spokesman on the spot told newsmen that American soldiers had orders to shoot if the Communists opened fire with either bullets or water cannon.

The incident came as the Berlin crisis deepened, with apparent Communist threats to the Western air and rail lifelines into the city.

London diplomatic sources said the Soviet Union may be planning to limit Western rights in the air corridors to Berlin. This assessment came after a first study of Russia's latest notes to the United States, Britain and France.

Wednesday, the East German regime threatened to cut off rail traffic from West German to West Berlin in retaliation for alleged sabotage of the Communist-run West Berlin elevated lines.

Today, the East Germans sent reinforcements to the sealed-off Berlin border which is being guarded by Allied troops.

A U. S. officer on border patrol reported squads of East German police reinforcements appeared on their side of the border this morning. Eastern soldiers were held in reserve two blocks away.

At Friedrichstrasse, the only one of the remaining seven border crossing points still open to the Allies, two East German armored cars pointed their guns at American soldiers only 60 feet away.

### House Committed To School Aid Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House leaders today were committed to try to pass a fathered remnant of President Kennedy's school aid program this year.

But they still had not figured out how to do it.

Speaker Sam Rayburn and House Democratic officials were to meet again today with house school aid leaders to stamp their approval on a \$2.6 billion school aid package in two bills.

At the same time, they expected to decide how they will try to bring the bills to the House floor.

### Bryant Studying Special Legislative Session

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant said today he had "under private, active study" a proposal for a special legislative session this year to revise Florida's constitution.

Bryant said he wanted to confer with a large number of legislators before taking action on the proposal.

Bryant can call the legislature into session for a given purpose, but the legislators can vote to take up any other subject they can rally enough votes to support.

The governor said he would want to hold the session only for constitutional revision, which failed to make much headway through the 1961 session.

Bryant said he had no plans to add financial matters to the proposed session, but that decision was subject to revision day by day. He said he would go along with work on the financial picture of the state if the work could be limited to "picking up \$5 million or \$10 million for needed projects." But he said when the door was opened in a case like that "the horse won't always come when you call."

"It is (calling of a special session) is done," said the governor, "it ought to be done this year."

Bryant said if the legislature was called into session later than the end of 1961, it would include lame duck lawmakers, many of whom would be in the middle of election campaigns.

He said any revision should be as complete as possible so there would be no charge "we revised without having constitutional revision." He said one item he would like to see included was a lieutenant governor for the state.

Bryant said only about five per cent of the proposed constitution

## Legal Action Threatened On School Defects

The County School board today threatened legal action against the bonding companies of an Orlando Contractor for not living up to its contract agreement regarding repairs to five Seminole Schools.

At the same time, school board architect John Burton said that an inspection will be made next month of Seminole High School of needed repairs by contractors.

Regarding the five schools, Burton said that there has been "various and sundry deficiencies which have occurred at the Lake Mary, Longwood, South Seminole, Rosewald and Midway Schools.

"These plants were constructed by J. Hillbert Sapp of Orlando. We have repeatedly notified the Sapp organization of these defects," which according to Burton concern leakage and runs to 20 pages.

Burton continued "ample time has been allowed for this work to be performed. The only recourse for the board will be to require its attorney to initiate such proceedings as may be necessary against the bonding companies of Sapp to see that the contract terms are complied in this respect."

Burton mentioned that one school principal spends most of his time mopping, up the floor in his school.

The board agreed to have Attorney Douglas Stenstrom write the bonding company on the repairs or that strong measures would be taken.

Burton also reported that certain parties have mentioned that the new Seminole High School is suffering deficiencies which are not being corrected. Burton stressed that this school plant is still under guarantee until Jan. 31, 1962 and that he is currently making a list of the corrective work necessary and have the contractor send in a crew to perform all this work at one time with the least interruption to the operation of the plant.

Burton explained that an inspection will be made next month.

## School Board Accused Of Restrictive Bids

The County School Board today was accused of drawing up "restrictive" specifications in regard to milk bids for the county schools and the board agreed to re-evaluate and open the bids next Tuesday.

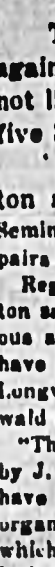
Foremost Dairies, in a strongly worded letter to the board said that the dairy was protesting vigorously specifications that all milk be in plastic coated one-half pint containers.

"It is respectfully submitted that this particular specification is of such nature as to be arbitrary, capricious and completely unreasonable and should be stricken from such specifications."

Supt. of Schools R. T. Milnes said he looked into details of placing these plastic coated containers in the specifications as a means to avoid leakage.

The board agreed to look into the matter and determine on whether all distributors can furnish these containers and if not, rewrite the specifications.

Last week the board rejected all the milk bids and asked that bids be resubmitted and that they conform to state minimum requirements regarding butter fat content and that all include these containers.
