



### Pollution

When the United States was young, there was virtually no problem of air and water changed to such an extent that pollution has become one if the nation's great physical problems.

This is not hard to understand. Any concentration of people brings some pollution. In our case, the process has been heightened by the unbelicable growth to our industrial complex and the greater concentration in areas one would hardly think could or would expand its population. The combination of sewage and industrial waste has spoiled many once beautiful streams, and the air of many an American city is thick with noxious gartes and other irritating aubstances.

There was a time when little was done about polluton of either air or water; it was simply taken for granted as a necessary evil. Little of this backward attitude aurrives. It is now generally recognized, both by industry and the public generally, that corrective measures can and must be taken.

It has been estimated that American industry spends 100 million dollars or more annually for the abatement of pollution. Government units also expend large sums for this purpose. That is good, but much more remains to be done. There is need for additional research to find ways of abating poilution. It also is apparent that better use could be made of what we now know.

Before that can be done, there will have to be more public understanding and support of measures that can be taken against pollution. There in good reason to believe that this country can keep up with its growing population problem if there is widespread cooperation between industry and govern-



## Social Security Business Rush Office Having

The Central Florida social security office is experiencing the greatest rush of business in the 20 years of its existence Since the first of the year, the number of people making claims for insurance benefit payments has tripled over that of a year age, district manager Colonel Byon R. Patton said today.

The increase in the number of claimants here reflects a condition prevailing in most of the \$56 social security offices throughout the country. In one January week aione, a total of 269 people in this area made claims for old-age, survivors, or disability insurance pay-

Colonel Patton said that his office is doing everything possible to expedite the handling of people making benefit claims. Since the 1956 amendments to the Social Security Act became law last August, the Central Plorida district office has added 5 staff members to help process the increased work-

Due to the increased number of claimants, however, many may have to walt longer for interview when they come to the social security office. Also, he said, the large number of claimants in the office slow up the processing of the claims papers. A new beneficiary must sometimes wait longer before he receives his first monthly insurance benefit check.


