### Authorities searching for missing teen-ager

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is seeking information regarding the whereabouts of a missing Geneva teen-ager.

Fourteen-year-old Joshua Brandyn Chesser of 1475 Devany Court was last seen May 1 before school. Chesser did not attend school that day. He is on medication for mood swings and from conversations with other juveniles, may intend to harm himself, according to authorities. Chesser reportedly took an unloaded handgun before leaving his home.

"His medical issue and handgun are reason for concern," said sheriff's office spokesman Steve Olson. "We don't believe he is a danger to others, just to himself."

Chesser did leave a note stating he would travel to Canada by bus, but no evidence substantiates that claim. Anyone with information regarding Chesser's location is asked to call the sheriff's office at 407-665-6650.

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## Unfiled claims equal lost dollars for SHA

**SANFORD** — The cash-strapped Sanford Housing Authority appears to have let several thousand dollars in insurance claims slip away.

Housing Authority Commissioner Ross Bieling said several small fires in 1999 and 2000 damaged agency property. Former housing director Tim Hudson, who was

ousted in April 2001, made no insurance claims for the damage, Bieling said. He also contends officials with the Department of Housing and Urban Development, who took over after Hudson's departure failed to file the claims.

Bieling notified Director Audris Billberry of the situation at the April 18 board meeting. The "debacle up there in management" in recent years could cause the organization to lose between \$200,000 to \$300,000, said Bieling.

"When I asked did we have ever get paid on those claims, at the meeting a week and a half ago, you could have heard a pin drop in the room," he said. "Why the hell should it take me to raise that question?"

Although his estimates have been considered steep by several housing authority and city officials, the search is on for the addresses and dates of every SHA fire

## Florida Power changes stance in battle over franchise agreements

**LONGWOOD** — City commissioners sat up and paid attention Tuesday when fellow Commissioner Steve Miller informed them Florida Power may back-pedal in their lawsuits with six Central Florida cities.

Longwood is currently engaged in a legal battle with Florida Power after the electricity provider refused to include a buyout clause in a new franchise agreement and honor the clause in the old contract. The cities of Casselberry, Winter Park, Oviedo, Apopka and Edgewood are in similar a fight with Florida Power.

"I know the sticking point for a lot of the commissioners was the buyout clause in the franchise agreement," Miller said.

Franchise agreements establish compensation to cities for the use of their right-of-ways. Florida Power collects franchise fees from their customers and pays the col-

lected money to the respective city.

"We should definitely look into that to see what it is," Commissioner Dan Anderson said. Winter Park assistant city manager Randy Knight confirmed Tuesday that Florida Power had offered them a buyout clause in a new contract.

"What they've offered is a purchase option with strings," Knight said. "They still haven't offered one that is acceptable to the commission."

Orlando attorney Tom Cloud also confirmed Florida Power's newest offer. He represents all the Central Florida cities, which are fighting the electricity provider. The buyout clause would disappear if Florida Power reaches their self-imposed reliability goals, he said.

"Whether or not that would be enough for all the cities right now, I don't know," he said. "Casselberry and Winter Park

## County opts to super-size proposed conference center

**SANFORD** — Bigger is better. That's the consensus of at least three of the county commissioners after hearing three different size scenarios for the proposed Sanford convention center.

The three scenarios offered a range of capacity between 600 and 1,000 people and price tag between \$7 and \$18 million. Commissioners opted to explore the third choice at Tuesday's workshop meeting, which also offers more amenities such as a theater/lecture hall, boardroom and flexible meeting space.

The third size option is "competitive with others in the marketplace," said county tourism director Jack Wert. The other two

options were less ambitious as the first option was only a 1,000 square feet larger than area hotels.

"In my opinion, you can take scenario one out of the picture," Commissioner Dick Van der Weide said. "I think I said it before, we need to do this thing right. We don't need to pull up here and build something that's not adequate."

Commissioners Carlton Henley and Grant Maloy continued to express concerns about the project and had plenty of questions for county and Sanford staff including parking problems and blind mosquitoes.

According to the initial study performed by the city, about 400 parking spaces would be needed

## Airport Authority presents Dale with performance-based bonus plan

**SANFORD** — Airport Authority board members approved a performance-based bonus plan that could pay Airport President Larry Dale up to an additional 15 percent of his salary.

Dale's contract, approved in June 2001, called for a bonus plan, but no details were formalized. Board member Geoffrey Longstaff

was assigned to create a plan in April and presented his recommendations to the board Tuesday.

To achieve the bonus, Dale must exceed standards by 5 percent in five revenue areas: income generated from commerce park, residential and other leases (bonus equal to 3 percent of Dale's base salary of \$125,000); aviation revenue (3 percent); domestic and international terminal revenue (1.5 percent); airfield revenue (1.5 per-

cent); and revenue in excess of expenditures (3 percent).

The standard for each area will be based on the previous year's actual performance or the current year's budget. Longstaff originally recommended choosing one or the other, but Dale asked the board to provide flexibility in the plan.

"I'd like some subjectivity to it," Dale said, noting that a bonus plan based entirely on the previous year's numbers or the current

year's budget had drawbacks.

Board member Ken Wright agreed. He said the Airport Authority expected Dale to set an aggressive budget and failure to achieve some goals should not disqualify Dale from receiving a bonus.

"You've got to have somebody pushing the goal posts back," Wright said.

Longstaff proposed the authority, "leave both standards in there

and let (Dale) make his case" as to how he should be judged.

As part of his original recommendation, Longstaff created a sixth area of performance evaluation on intangibles, such as success in procuring grants, and advances in operations or security. The standard of performance would be at the discretion of the Airport Authority, and Longstaff had sug-

## Ground breaking begins on museum's new building

**SANFORD** — As renovations continue on the inside of the Museum of Seminole County History, a new building is starting to get under way outside the facility.

Ground breaking recently began on the museum's new agriculture exhibit building, which will house old and new exhibits showcasing Seminole's agricultural past, said Museum Specialist Karen Jacobs. Traveling exhibits highlighting state and national history will also be displayed in the new building once it is complete.

"With an influx of so many new people moving to this area and so many of the old time residents passing away, it is so important to preserve the history of Seminole County through this museum complex," Jacobs said. "That's why it is so exciting to see the renovations and construction evolve and come together."

The 2,400 square-foot building will include the museum's current agricultural exhibits, including displays on Seminole's celery, fern, turpentine and citrus industries. With the additional space, Jacobs also plans to include displays on the county's fishing and cattle industry in the exhibit.

Jacobs is currently researching options for traveling exhibits, including "Florida Breezes," a showcase on the history of hand fans in Florida. Before the new building, hosting such exhibits was not a possibility.

"Traveling exhibits can be expensive, and we had to get to the point that we could build them into our budget," Jacobs said. "We also never had a place with security and insurance that would allow for us to host them."

Other features of the new agriculture exhibit building include a climate-

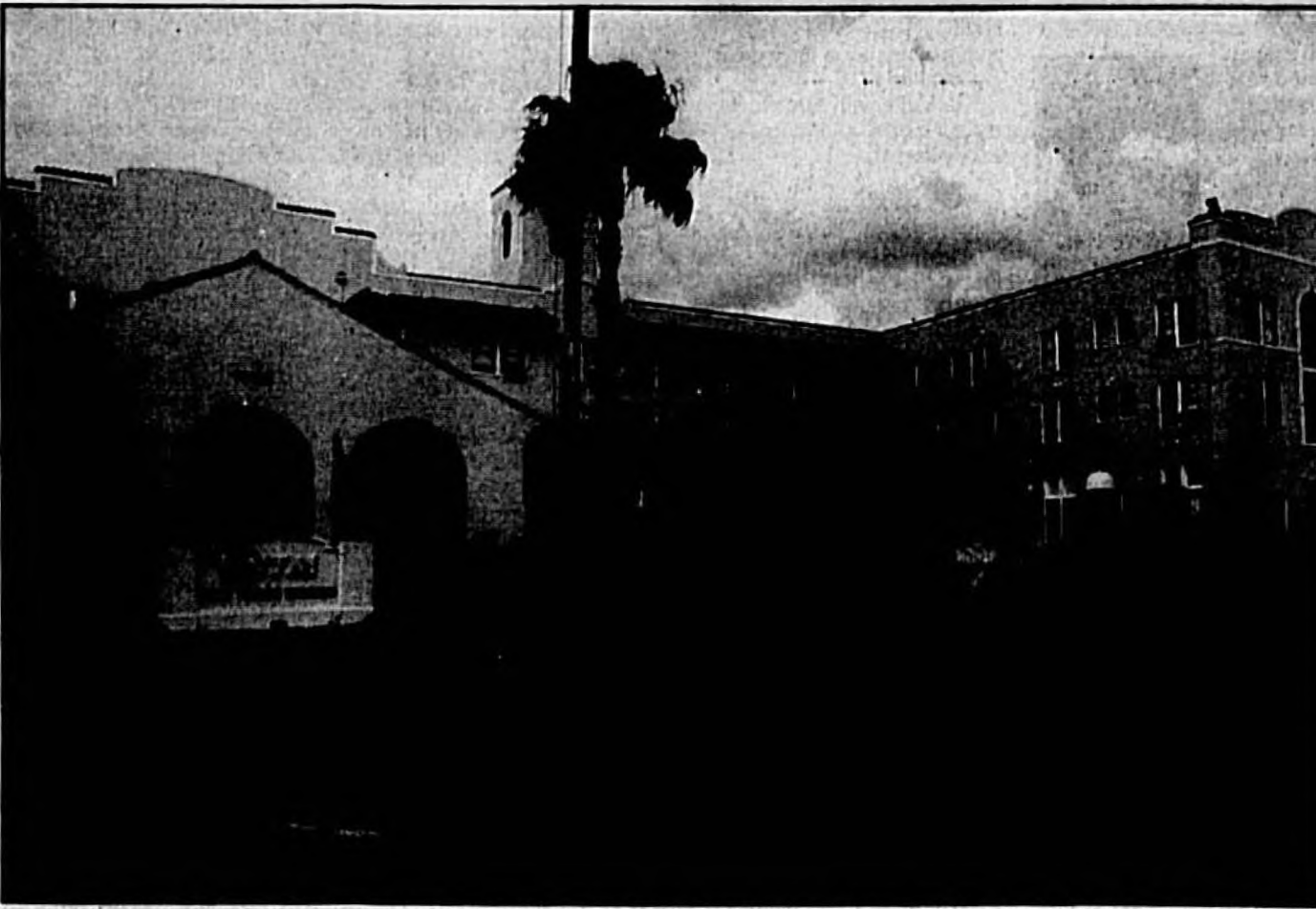

# Seminole Clips: Seagrave shoots 10-pound trout swimming in river

The Museum of Seminole County History collects and stores wonderful artifacts concerning the history of Seminole County. One of our recent ongoing projects is collecting articles from old newspapers, wherever we can find them.

We have stumbled across some wonderful and enlightening articles that pertain to different areas in our county, and we would like to share them with our readers. These articles have been copied from micro-film, then typed and stored in a notebook and open for the public to view. When this project is completed we should have a daily record of what was happening in our little settlements throughout the county in the 1880s. This project is expected to be completed in three to four years.

Most of the information has been taken from the 1800's Times Union Newspaper from Jacksonville. This was the state newspaper for Florida established in 1865. It started off printing once a month and then once a week, and then daily etc. The paper is still in existence today.

We feel that by recreating these bits and pieces of history in the Herald today, the information would inform, clear up mysteries, entertain and help everyone — from the Florida crackers to newcomers — to better understand our humble beginnings. We hope that you enjoy this new column, please write and let us know.

Sanford:

April 16, 1887  
Mrs. G.S. Tarver and Miss J. Glass, who will on Monday

next, open a private school in Sanford for a session of six weeks.

Mrs. John Flak, of Sanford, has in her flower garden not less than one hundred varieties of roses, a large number of which are now in bloom.

April 26, 1887

The Catholic fair at Sanford last week cleared seven hundred dollars.

Mr. Seagrave of Sanford, shot a 10-pound trout in the river with a shot-gun recently.

Mr. Arthur T. Feaster has received the appointment as postal clerk from Sanford to Jacksonville.

April 29, 1887

Mayor Lillenthal of Sanford has presented the Gate City Band with a handsome gold watch to be raffled for the purpose of buying uniforms with the proceeds arising therefrom.

A postal note for one cent, payable to the New York Gazette, was drawn by the postmaster at Sanford on Saturday evening. The party for whom the postal note was drawn registered the letter containing it, making the cost of sending one cent amount to fifteen cents.

Dr. H. J. Long, of Enterprise, who has scored signal success in raising early vegetables, is still receiving large returns from his crops. Of nine barrels of potatoes shipped to New York on Saturday last, four were sold at \$7 and the remainder at \$7.50 per barrel. Two of the barrels sold at \$7 were "culls"

April 30, 1887

The game of ball between the Sanford and Enterprise clubs came off at the Sanford Base ball-park Tuesday afternoon, the game being called at 3 o'clock. The score stood, Enterprise 13, Sanford 9. Umpire Max Meyerson.

May 18, 1887

Judge E.K. Foster, of Sanford

and Mr. E.R. Gunby, of Orlando have formed a partnership for the practices of law, the firm will have two offices, one in Sanford and the other in Orlando.

Sanford Journal:

Charley Thrasher exhibited to us today a savage pet. It was none other than a live rattlesnake, five or six feet in length, of astonishing circumstances, and possessing the usual accompaniments of fangs, rattles, etc. Charley is very much attached to his venomous pet, but might be persuaded to turn it over to some other individual for a valuable consideration.

May 19, 1887

Mr. Slater has an orange tree on his place near Sanford four years old from the seed, that measures 15 inches in circumference, and has a fine crop of oranges on it, probably 500. He has a three year old peach tree which has more than a bushel of peaches on it, they are turning ripe.

The Sanford Argus proposed to send 10,000 copies of a special edition to London by Mr. Arthur C. Jackson, who has been employed by the South Florida Railroad to deliver three lectures there. This special edition will contain notice and accounts of the towns along the line of the South Florida Railroad according to the proportion in which they contribute to the expense.

May 24, 1887

The Sanford Light and Fuel Company has just completed and started into at the gas works, a new set of gas apparatus.

In a swimming match at Sanford recently between Arthur Schleman and Geroge Davies between the Debrary and city docks, the former won by a very few inches. It was closely contested and was witnessed by a large number of people.

controlled room that will house fragile documents and photographs.

Funding, which is under \$250,000, for the museum's expansion was budgeted by the county last year, Jacobs said. Several area companies donated services, including Stillwater Technologies, Glattig Jackson Kercher Anglin Lopez Rinehart Inc., Harter-Adams, P.A., and MacGregor-Smith Blueprinter Inc. The addition coincides with renovations to the inside of the building, which includes refurbishing the facility's walls, windows and floors, funded by a state grant.

Almost 80 years old, the build-

ing that houses the museum is in dire need of a facelift. Built in 1924, it was the first structure in the county's Five-Points complex, which also included a convict camp. According to Jacobs, the museum was originally Seminole's Old Folks Home.

The Old Folks Home closed in 1964, and the facility became the offices of the county's Agricultural Extension. When the group moved to a new location, the building became the Seminole museum in 1982.

Once the agriculture facility is finished, future expansion plans for the museum include a third building that will include farm machinery. When the three buildings are complete, the com-

plex will surround a courtyard with brick pavers and a garden of native plants and trees. Everything will be encompassed by a pebbled-dash and iron fencing.

"The final phase is pending next year's county budget," Jacobs said. "When finished, it's going to be gorgeous. I'm just so excited."

The museum will remain open throughout the renovations except during August. Both projects are scheduled to be complete within six to nine months.

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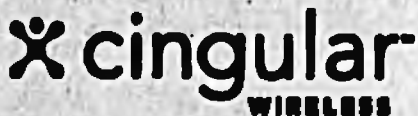

have gone through a lot of expenses. Longwood too, to some extent.

According to Knight, the original purchase option is not enough since Winter Park is "beyond that point." Two years ago it may have been different, Knight said, but the city has completed a feasibility study on the possibilities of buying

the city electrical system.

Buying the system would allow the city "to do some things the way we want them done," Knight said. Casselberry is the farthest along in the process with a scheduled arbitration hearing Aug. 19. The price of the electrical system within the city will be determined at the hearing. Winter Park could be the next city to go to arbitration

with a hearing anticipated in October, Cloud said.

The change of heart for Florida Power is attributed to a new "commitment to excellence and recent rate decreases," said spokeswoman Gail Simpson.

"The litigation is not productive and very costly for both parties, she said. "The change in position, is Florida Power wanting to

resolve these issues with the cities. We don't believe many of the cities want to purchase the systems anyway."

Miller, speaking before the commission, said he overheard a different reason for the change.

"The vice president who had the hard line with the buyout clause has been relieved of his duties," he said.

## Lovestrand elected to another term as mayor

LONGWOOD — City commissioners on Tuesday re-elected Mayor Paul Lovestrand to another term as the city's leader.

Commissioner John Maingot first nominated Commissioner Buich Bundy as the next mayor, but that motion failed by a 2-3 vote with Bundy and Maingot as the only supporters. A vote for Lovestrand passed with a 3-2 margin with Bundy and Maingot voting against the measure. An unusual process for obtaining a city leader, Lovestrand said he likes to tell citizens the mayor of Longwood is selected rather than elected although the charter says otherwise.

"I would like to thank the commission for trusting me with one more year," he said after the victorious commission vote.

In other business, commissioners passed the new Longwood Development Code on its second reading. Discussions took more than an hour on the agenda item as

commissioners lobbied for last-minute changes such as parking space widths and fence heights.

The code book outlines development design standards for the city and creates an Historic Overlay District. The new district will ensure that all developments in the historic downtown will conform to previously adopted plans.

Commissioners also approved the first reading of a new ordinance that establishes regulations for special events held on city property. The ordinance was drafted in part because of several complaints concerning the annual Longwood Arts and Craft Festival.

"I'm in favor of this ordinance, and I want to thank Commissioner Miller for bringing it forward," said Judy Putz owner of Judy's Dolls on Warren Avenue.

Putz, along with other concerned residents, has complained in the past about city festivals and the lack of regulations. The new ordinance will not only regulate the events, but also require fees for the use of city services.

for the hotel and conference center complex. A quick two or three year fix would be surface parking, but, according to City Manager Tony VanDerworp, the city is working diligently on a parking garage for the downtown.

"If Sanford is going to continue to grow and prosper they're going to have to face the problem with parking sooner or later," Commissioner Randy Morris said.

Maloy noted that before the meeting an audience member gave him a jar of midges. He asked Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard how the city intends to control the blind mosquitoes.

Lessard said a recent rise in the midge population could be attributed to a couple of factors, including Volusia County being short on manpower. He said while the city

will have flare ups with the midge problem occasionally, he assured county commissioners the problem was not insurmountable.

Defining the scope of conference center should help the city in procuring a hotelier to accompany the conference center, said Commissioner Daryl McLain.

According to VanDerworp the city continues to get inquiries and has met with 11 hoteliers.

Commissioners also discussed possible funding plans for the center. The proposed route is to use a combination of funding sources including a new penny of tourist tax expected to raise about

\$700,000 a year.

Commissioners also emphasized they expect county staff to "fast-track" the project and get the necessary interlocal agreements in place with the city of Sanford.

"We're waiting on you," Van der Weide told County Manager Kevin Grace.

gested a bonus in this area of 3 percent of the base salary.

Other board members suggested more weight be placed on the intangibles area. Lon Howell said a slow economy could negatively impact the airport's revenues.

"That's out of Larry's control," Howell said.

Board members agreed the intangibles performance area could be adjusted up to 15 percent of the base salary, as long as the overall bonus did not exceed 15 percent. For example, if Dale exceeded standards in aviation revenue (3 percent bonus) and failed in the other four revenue areas, the Airport Authority could still grant him a 15 percent bonus by adjusting the intangibles area to 12 percent.

between 1999 and 2000. The extra money would help with the negative budget the bankrupt agency approved a couple weeks ago, Bieling said.

"It's another opportunity to turn things around and put this thing back on track," he said.

"I am investigating the manner," said Billberry who has been with SHA for about two months. "I hopefully will have something to say to the board at the next meeting."

Sanford City Manager Tony VanDerworp said the city is assisting in the investigation. The process of locating the past fire incidents is complicated. Fire department offi-

cial are hopeful the incidents are in a stack files from the fire investigator. If they're not there, officials will have to turn to Seminole County dispatch for the records.

Without addresses or dates, searching the large databases from county dispatch could be a long process.

Time, however, is not a luxury for the housing authority board. It may already be too late to claim the fires to the insurance company, Bieling said.

"Not to file insurance claims is outright criminal," he said.

The next SHA board meeting is April 16 at 6 p.m. at the Redding Gardens complex.

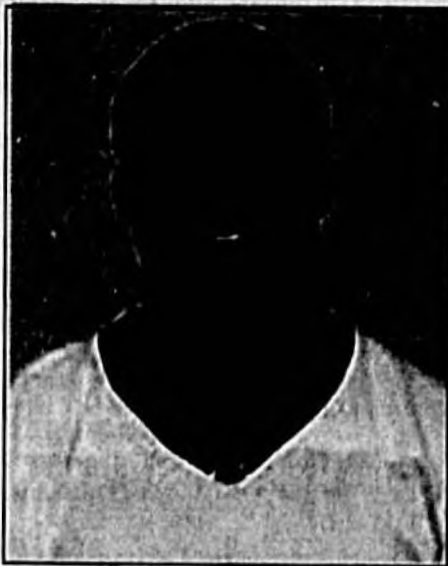

**BALTIMORE, MD.** — Former Seminole High School star Jeff Blake has decided to join the Baltimore Ravens for the 2002-03 season.

### Oviedo outlasts Cypress Creek

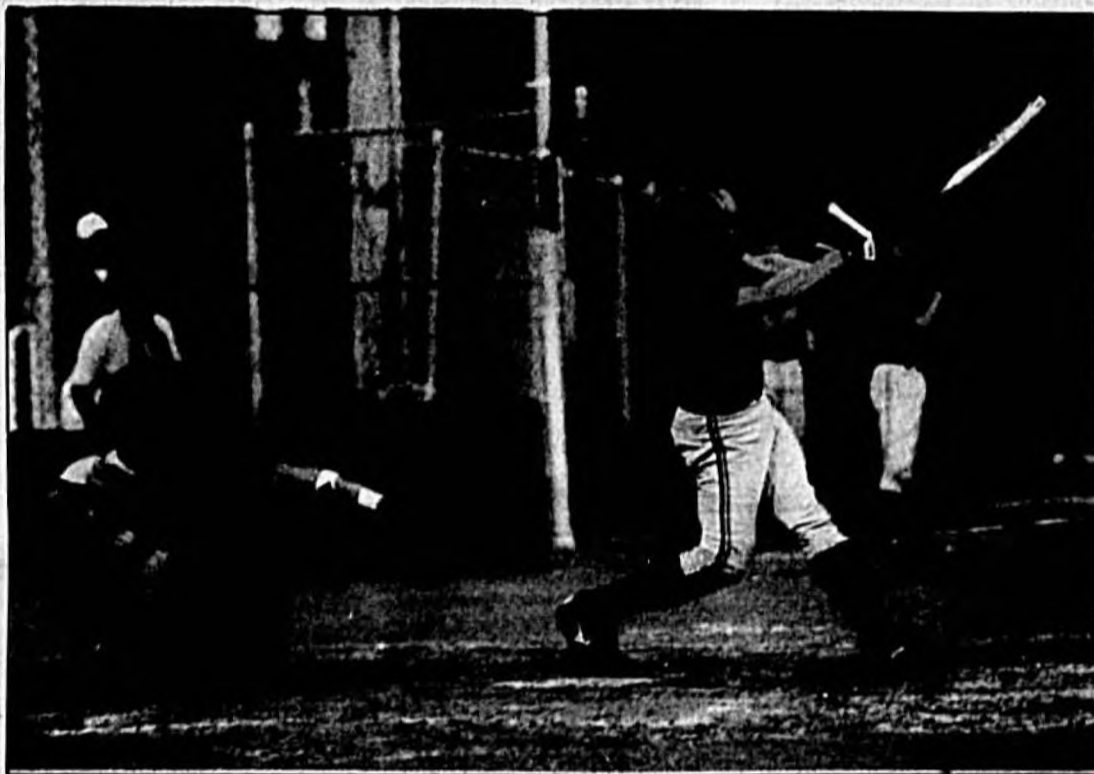

# Alligators are on the move right now

OCALA — Imagine the surprise of one Osceola County homeowner as she walked into her garage and practically stepped on a 10-foot alligator lounging on the concrete floor. Or how about the Orange County resident whose morning swim was cut short because a 5-foot gator beat her to the pool. You can be sure the Brevard County resident whose dog wouldn't stop barking was appalled when he stepped outside and found an 8-footer in his fenced-in back yard.

As shocking as it may be to encounter an alligator at such close quarters, it shouldn't be surprising for anyone living in central Florida — particularly those living in developed areas surrounded by lakes, rivers or wetlands.

As spring comes to central Florida alligators again become active, showing up in pools, backyards, busy highways, carpools and mall parking lots. In fact they end up just about anywhere you can imagine and many people wonder why.

"The reason is that as the days grow longer and warmer, the alligators emerge from their winter torpor and wander about in search of food and mates," said Joy M. Hill, public information coordinator for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's (FWC) Northeast Region. "During the course of this wandering they sometimes end up in the wrong places."

In most parts of central Florida this increased activity starts happening toward the end of March and continues for the next several months. Although alligators don't actually hibernate, they do go into a dormant period during the cold winter months. When they emerge from this period of relative inactivity, they are hungry and go about in search of food and feeding territories.

"That's when we begin receiving calls from folks who have unwanted visitors in and around their homes and businesses," said Hill. "During all this moving about alligators will often end up in garages, backyards, driveways or swimming pools."

So what should you do if an alligator comes through your property?

"If there's no immediate danger, the best thing to do is leave it alone. More than likely it will leave the area on its own in search of a more suitable location. However, if humans, pets or live-

stock are being threatened by the alligators' presence, you should call the FWC and file a nuisance alligator complaint," said Hill.

For the next several months the FWC's Ocala regional office will probably receive 40 to 60 nuisance complaints a day. They will range from valid reports of an aggressive alligator threatening the safety of children at play, to unnecessary reports of an alligator swimming around in a lake, or sunning itself on a bank.

Alligators have a natural fear of humans, but when they lose their fear they can become aggressive to people, pets and livestock, and are then considered nuisance alligators. Once they're classified as a nuisance, they are harvested by permitted nuisance alligator trappers for the meat and hide, provided they are 4 feet or longer in length. Generally alligators under 4 feet long don't pose a danger to humans or pets, and are rarely considered nuisance alligators. In extreme conditions, the FWC will relocate these smaller alligators to areas as far from human activity as possible.

How can you tell when an alligator has lost its fear or is being aggressive, and is considered a nuisance?

"Most alligators will quickly retreat at the approach of a human. If they don't, they're likely lost their natural fear and could become a problem," said Hill.

In 2001 the FWC's Ocala regional office, which serves 14 counties in central and northeast Florida, received 4,884 complaints of nuisance alligators. Of that number, 2,442 alligators were harvested by permitted nuisance trappers. So far this year the Ocala office has received 1,030 complaints — nearly 600 in April alone.

Statewide in 2001, there were 16,749 nuisance complaints filed which resulted in 17,279 nuisance alligators being harvested. Since the nuisance alligator program began more than 20 years ago, the FWC has received 240,411 complaints resulting in 90,895 alligators being harvested statewide by permitted nuisance alligator trappers.

"Some of the complaints are valid and some aren't," said Lt. Gregg Eason, FWC's nuisance alligator program coordinator for the Northeast Region. "People should only report alligators that are causing problems or posing a threat to public safety. They should not, for example, report an alligator that is simply sunning itself on a bank or

the fact that it is present in a lake near a house. Those alligators are just doing what alligators do.

"Emergency complaints — those where an alligator is an immediate threat to public safety — will be given priority. But all valid complaints, emergency in nature or not, will be evaluated and if necessary a nuisance trapper will be sent to harvest the gator."

By nature, alligators are not aggressive and will avoid humans whenever possible. However, as the human population in Florida continues to grow, development occurs around traditional alligator habitats, and the probability of contact between the two increases.

Since 1948 there have been about 300 alligator attacks documented by the FWC. Of those, 12 have been fatal.

"Although most people have a natural respect for and fear of alligators, some residents and visitors seem to forget that alligators are very real and can be dangerous. Some people think there is no harm in throwing them an occasional sandwich or piece of chicken, but that practice is dangerous, unlawful and can contribute to attacks," said Hill.

Alligators six feet and larger present the greatest hazard to humans and pets. Smaller gators —

four feet long or less — pose little threat to people but can deliver a nasty bite that should be treated by a physician since alligator bites can become easily infected.

Alligators are an important part of Florida's heritage and play a vital role in the ecology of the state's wetlands. Humans and alligators can peacefully co-exist. All it takes is a little understanding of what alligators need and why they do the things they do.

Here are a few tips that will help you live with alligators:

**DON'T feed or entice alligators.** Instead inform others that feeding alligators is against state law and by feeding them people create problems for the next person who comes along, and for the alligators.

**DON'T throw fish scraps into the water or leave them along the shoreline.** Although you are not intentionally feeding alligators, they don't know that. Dispose of fish scraps or other potential alligator foodstuffs in garbage cans situated at most boat ramps and fish camps.

**DON'T let pets swim or run along the shoreline of waters that large alligators are known to inhabit.** Alligators are attracted to dogs probably

stock are being threatened by the alligators' presence, you should call the FWC and file a nuisance alligator complaint," said Hill.

For the next several months the FWC's Ocala regional office will probably receive 40 to 60 nuisance complaints a day. They will range from valid reports of an aggressive alligator threatening the safety of children at play, to unnecessary reports of an alligator swimming around in a lake, or sunning itself on a bank.

Alligators have a natural fear of humans, but when they lose their fear they can become aggressive to people, pets and livestock, and are then considered nuisance alligators. Once they're classified as a nuisance, they are harvested by permitted nuisance alligator trappers for the meat and hide, provided they are 4 feet or longer in length. Generally alligators under 4 feet long don't pose a danger to humans or pets, and are rarely considered nuisance alligators. In extreme conditions, the FWC will relocate these smaller alligators to areas as far from human activity as possible.

How can you tell when an alligator has lost its fear or is being aggressive, and is considered a nuisance?

"Most alligators will quickly retreat at the approach of a human. If they don't, they're likely lost their natural fear and could become a problem," said Hill.

because they are an easy meal and about the same size as an alligator's natural prey.

**DON'T** swim or allow pets to swim in areas of emergent vegetation - plants that grow up out of the water. This is the type of habitat favored by alligators. Swim in designated swim areas only.

**DON'T** swim, walk dogs or small children along shorelines at night or dusk, of waters known to contain large alligators - that's when they feed most actively.

**DON'T** remove alligators from their natural habitat or try to keep one as a pet. It is against the law to do so. Alligators do not become tame in captivity and handling even small ones may result in bites. Instead, enjoy watching and photographing alligators from a distance.

It is against the law in Florida to feed, harass, molest, attempt to molest or kill alligators, and violators should be reported by calling the FWC's 24-hour, toll-free Wildlife Alert Hotline at 1-888-404-FWCC (3922). Callers may remain anonymous and could be eligible for a reward if their information leads to an arrest.

### IS THAT A BEAR IN MY YARD??

Lions and tigers and bears, oh my! Well, maybe not lions and tigers, but bears are certainly actively roaming about in central Florida right now. Female bears have left their dens with the cubs they bore this winter, sub-adult males are on their walk-about looking for places to call home, and all bears are out looking for the best grub they can find.

What does all this mean to the average central Florida resident?

"If you live in bear country it means you just may come across a bear wandering through your neighborhood," said Mark Asleson, a Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) biologist and nuisance bear expert based in Ocala.

Yes indeed, there are bears in central Florida! Living in this part of the state means, for more and more people, living in bear country. People who are new to the state, and even some long time residents, are often surprised to learn there are bears roaming around the woods, often right behind their homes; sometimes right in their yards!

What causes these bears to wander into "people country"?

"The truth is people have built homes, businesses and highways through areas that have historically been home to bears. Now when the bears roam around looking for food and trying to establish territories, they run into people at just about every turn," said Asleson.

Bear/human encounters are increasing every year. In 2001 the FWC received more than 800 calls regarding bears - roughly 500 of those calls came from residents in this part of the state. In 2000, the FWC handled a record 1,136 bear calls throughout the state. The vast majority of those calls - about 800 - came from right here in central Florida.

Despite the increasing number of calls, these encounters are generally peaceful, since bears are not typically aggressive towards people. In fact, there has never been a documented black bear attack on a human in Florida.

However, as peaceful as they may be, these encounters are rarely uneventful as most people get pretty excited when they arrive home to find a large black bear pawing through their garbage can. The neighborhood soon becomes alerted, dogs start barking, local television and newspapers arrive, and local law enforcement is summoned to rid the neighborhood of the nuisance.

Meanwhile, the "nuisance" runs to the nearest tree and climbs as high as it can to avoid all the confusion below. And there it will stay until everything calms down and it feels safe and secure enough to come down and lumber away. In urban situations an FWC biologist is usually

called to the scene to basically "bear-sit" until it does.

One central Florida bear stayed camped out in a tree in Altamonte Springs for three days!

Many times a bear wandering through a yard or neighborhood is just passing through looking for a more appropriate place to call its own. But sometimes a bear chooses to hang around and that's when problems arise.

Why in the world would a bear choose to hang around a neighborhood? Sometimes it tries to leave but continues to run into more civilization and the whole scenario described above starts all over again until the bear can find its way back to the woods.

But in many cases there's one very good reason it stays around - food!

"Bears are opportunistic feeders meaning that if food is easily available, they will be glad to partake of it. And they aren't fussy eaters. As long as the food is available and easy to get, the bears will hang around and eat it. And let's face it, it's a lot easier to scrounge around in a garbage can or dumpster, or raid a bird feeder or pet food bowl, than it is to forage around the forest competing with other wildlife for nuts and berries and insects," said Asleson.

Easily accessible human-provided food comes in many forms - garbage cans, barbecue grills, pet food, bird feeders, livestock food, beehives, compost piles and natural sources such as trees that produce nuts and berries. Oftentimes people provide this easy food source to bears without even realizing it. Even worse, some people actually feed bears intentionally because they enjoy seeing them - until the bears begin tearing into screen rooms and destroying personal property. In fact, feeding bears has become such an issue that the FWC recently ruled that feeding bears, as well as raccoons, foxes and sandhill cranes, is a second-degree misdemeanor.

"Bears are just like big raccoons. It is a very bad idea to feed them or leave anything outside that may attract them because once they get used to an easy meal, it is extremely difficult to break them of the habit," said Asleson.

Once a bear begins to make a nuisance of itself, people call the FWC and want the offender caught and relocated to a "wilderness area".

"Relocation is not a solution. There are few vast areas of uninhabited wilderness left in Florida, and most of these already have established bear populations. So these relocated bears placed in another's territory, are often chased out by the dominant bears, and end up in another neighborhood to become someone else's problem," said Asleson. "Also, relocated bears will often try to return to their home range and end up as roadkill. Last year we documented 105 bears killed on roads statewide, 59 of which were right here in central Florida."

So what's the solution?

"People and black bears can live together in harmony," said Asleson. "The trick is to convince people who live in bear country that they must modify their behavior in order to reduce the chance of attracting bears, which ultimately results in problems for everyone - humans and bears alike."

The stakes are very high. When humans and bears cannot coexist, the bears pay the ultimate price - they must be destroyed because of the threat they pose to public safety.

"In many situations, people can make the difference in whether or not a bear lives or dies. Those who feed bears intentionally or unintentionally could ultimately be signing the bear's death warrant because we simply can't take public safety for granted," said Asleson. "Even though we've never had an attack in Florida, bears are large, powerful wild animals that need to be respected. It's everyone's responsibility to help ensure the future of the Florida black bear."

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**Resident feuds with county over 'junk'**

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — From prime time to jail time.

That about sums up Seminole County resident Alan Davis' week. On April 29, he was featured on CBS' 48 Hours. Eight days later Seminole County deputies arrested him for resisting an officer and disorderly conduct.

Davis' popularity stems not from his welding expertise, but rather the mounds of scrap metal and airplane parts stacked in his

front yard at 349 Alpine St. near the city of Altamonte Springs. The news magazine program used Davis' front yard as a centerpiece for an exposé on problem neighbors.

Since Dec. 7 2000, Davis, 46, has accrued more than \$250,000 in code enforcement fines. County officials contend that Davis' property is littered with "junk." Davis says its his property and he can store whatever he

wants. The county is now trying to foreclose on his property. None of this phases Davis as he continues to fight for what he believes is his right.

Deputies responded to Davis' home on May 7 because a neighbor two doors down complained about a statue sitting in Davis' driveway. The statute is that of a partial person bending over bearing a naked butt.

Davis said the statue signifies his opinion on what he believes is government intrusion.

"It's the best possible thing that could have happened to me," Davis said after posting bond Wednesday morning. "This is the tactic they've been using all along. They're trying to get me to buckle under, but it's not going to happen."

Davis said Friday he's not giving up. He filed suit against the three deputies who arrested him. The sheriff's office maintains nothing went wrong at the incident, except

**Agency approves five-year budget plan**

SANFORD — The Downtown Community Redevelopment Agency approved Wednesday a five-year budget that sets aside \$375,000 for improvement projects.

While board members established a list of 18 projects that could be funded by CRA money, no final determination was made. The list includes 1st

Street redevelopment, linkages to the lakefront and improvements at Fort Mellon Park.

Board members expect to identify a priority list in the coming months, after consulting with the Sanford City Commission. A joint work session with the commission is scheduled for 4 p.m. Monday. While the CRA has final jurisdiction over how ad valorem taxes generated in downtown are spent, board member Larry Strickler emphasized that the CRA should work in conjunction with the city.

"This is not an arm's length relationship. It's closer than that," Strickler said.

City Manager Tony VanDerworp is developing cost estimates for the projects and determining how much funding is available from the city. For instance, VanDerworp estimates that 1st Street redevelopment will cost about \$845,000. That's more than both the CRA and the city could fund without eliminating funding for other projects or delaying them.

VanDerworp suggested the CRA could contribute a portion of the money for 1st Street improvements once city dollars are identified.

**Sanford police in charge of airport security**

SANFORD — Nearly seven months after taking post at Orlando Sanford International Airport, the National Guard pulled out Friday.

By month's end, troops who scrambled to protect airports nationwide because of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks will all but disappear. More than 80,000 National Guardsman and reservists have been activated since the terrorist attack and most were assigned to local airports.

Replacing them at many airports, including OSIA, will be area law enforcement officers. Eventually by the end of the year, airports will see federalized security when the newly created federal Transportation Security Administration introduces its own passenger screeners and agents.

"We're taking over with detail officers working security checkpoints," said

Sanford police will step in to fill the void with additional off-duty officers. Offices are lining up for the
