**Plane Slams Into Mountains** Near **Picket Lines** 

72 Marines, 12 Airmen Perish; Vreckage Covers 10-Mile Area EL TORO MARINE BASE, Calif. (UPI) - A

KC135 military jet air transport crashed and exploded in light rain and fog today, killing 84 persons-72 Marines and an Air Force crew of 12.

The plane, similar to the Boeing 707 commercial jetliner, slammed into mountainous terrain 41/2 miles north of here only minutes after taking off from this Southern California base at 2:45 a.m. in a drizzle. Officials would give only Ionolulu as the plane's destination, but there was speculation the Marines were ultimately bound for Viet Nam. ### Sound The Alarm

If the common, everyday wor-ries, like air pollution, escalation in Viet Nam and overpopulation are palling on you and such far-out dan-gers as the sun exploding or little green men invading earth as un-satisfactory because nobody can do anything about them anyway, here's a new worry that fits nicely between the two extremes.

An airlines pilot is worried about the current practice of testing giant rockets in an upside-down position with their nozzles pointing out tow-ard space, thus, in effect, making a spaceship out of the earth. In a letter to Aviation Week and

Space Technology magazine, Robert J. Major, flying with Saudi Arabian Airlines, reminds us of Newton's third law of motion: For every ac-tion there is an equal and opposite

No matter how small the rockets compared to the vast bulk of the earth, the accumulated nudging of their blasts could have any number of embarrassing effects, Captain Major points out-such as moving the earth out of its present orbit, so that it either froze or burned up, depending on which way it went; changing the speed of rotation, which would accomplish much the same thing, only more slowly; or, since most rockets are tested in the Northern Hemisphere, making the earth wobble on its axis, which would play hob with the season. This is a good worry. It is sufficiently remote that no one need lose any fingernails over it, yet has just enough plausibility to warrant a moment's forehead wrinkling.
