The Raid on France

With the news of the first large-scale raid on the French coast, there is bound to be a lift to the spirits of Americans and exclamations of "this is it." There are also bound to be all kinds of rumors, most of them fantastic...

It is only natural that people should speculate about the meaning and purpose of the present operations, but it is harmful to morale, we believe, to allow one's imagination to run wild and make statements which have all the earmarks of plain, unadulterated street gossip.

If the opinion is widely held that a second front has at last been opened in Western Europe, what a let-down to the spirits of the people if and when the thing turns out to be quite something else. Disappointment over the course of the war already has had its effect and there is no use now to let ourselves get all built up for "another let-down."

There will be ample time to exult and cheer when the tide of war comes our way, but until such a time, it is better to treat with conservative appraisal our activities on the various fronts. We have a feeling that the public is so keen for a turn of events that it may grasp at the first ray of hope prematurely with the result that a good many people will receive a psychological set-back.

Florida's Gasoline Supply

Definite justification for exemption of all Florida from the gasoline rationing program is found in the recent survey of gasoline stocks.

Conducted by State Petroleum Coordinator Thomas A. Johnson with the co-operation of oil companies, the survey disclosed that, as of Aug. 1, a total of 83,908,112 gallons of gasoline was available throughout the state.

It can be argued, of course, that this quantity—roughly about equal to the average monthly consumption—does not give Florida a sufficient safety margin. But, as we have pointed out consistently in recent months, Florida is convenient to the Gulf oil fields and could be provided with a steady supply through use of wooden barges equipped with steel tanks.

This information is to be presented to Dr. John W. Frey, special assistant in the Office of Petroleum Coordination, when he comes to Florida to discuss the possibilities of easing restrictions in this state.

TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY

You may never have thought of it, but when you take your pen in hand to write a letter to that soldier boy in Iceland or Egypt or New Caledonia or anywhere else, you are handling an instrument as dangerous and deadly as a Japanese bayonet or Nazi tom-bomb.

One seemingly innocent statement made in your letter may cause that boy to lose his life and might turn the tide of battle. I'm not thinking about the military information, the censor will catch that.

What I'm talking about is that bit of personal mention you thoughtlessly include, such as: "Your girl was at the church social last night. Bill brought her. He's working at the shipyard now, you know, and they say he makes over \$100 a week. He's got a new car and dresses like a millionaire."

Or you might do just as much damage with something like this: "Things are getting terrible at home. They have had to close a lot of defense factories for lack of material. Strikes are increasing. Three ships were torpedoed off our coast yesterday. Your dog Rover was hit by a car and killed last week. Dad had a heart attack and the doctor told Aunt Minnie considerably he might die any time. A man on the radio said we might lose the war. It's certainly terrible. I try every time I think of you over there with those snakes and head hunters and don't see why you had to go when Johnny Smith is still here and struts around as big as life, going to parties and having a good time."

What harm could that do? You ask. Well, I'll tell you. The boy it's written to has probably waited months for a letter from home. He is in a strange new world. It doesn't know what tomorrow holds for him. He has given up everything—home, friends, a good job—and has been through the toughest, hardest training in the world. His government has done everything it can to make him physically fit and mentally alert. His equipment is the best. He's ready for ACTION.

Then the long-awaited letter from "home" arrives. He reads it over and over and over again. Before it seems he was less than him courage and hope, but instead it only served to depress him. "We've already lost the war. Dad is going to die. Another guy is going with his best girl. She's doing great. Other guys get all the boys." Then the order comes: "Man your battle stations." He's ready to go.

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Official States Shipping Program Is Ahead Of Time

By BILL CLOVER NEW YORK, Aug. 19, (WV)—Let's check up with the biggest builder of 'em all on how America is coming along with that superhuman 1942-43 ship construction program.

He's sharp-eyed, soft-spoken and athletic looking for all his 55 years and wispy grey hair. He fidgets with horn-rimmed glasses and his favorite word is "know-how." His name is Eugene Clifford Grace. From behind a huge, worn desk in a 15th floor corner of a downtown skyscraper he talks about the colossal that is Bethlehem Steel corporation, second biggest steel producer in the U. S., biggest shipbuilding firm in the world.

"Our whole shipping program is ahead of time," he reports. "Light and heavy cruisers are months ahead, and we've cut in half from World War I the delivery time on destroyers. We'll deliver more than 120 'Liberty' cargo ships this year."

Then Grace hitches around in his swivel chair and tells as much as censorship will permit about how it's being done. Bethlehem, oldest of the big-time shipbuilders, is still unique among them as the only outfit that starts with the iron ore, makes the steel, designs the ships, builds the big guns and

WASHINGTON By JACK STINNETT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19, (WV)—Those Washington parasites have been found—hundreds of them. They are not the ones that the President was talking about, however, when he suggested some months ago that the capital parasites should get out of town to relieve congestion.

They are not ones that many government officials would talk about, if you can take the word of a young lady employed here. And incidentally the young lady upsets the oft-repeated plaint that ALL federal war workers are overworked.

When Jerry Klutz, The Washington Post authority on federal employees and their activities, went on vacation, he asked some of the persons he writes for and about to fill in for him. An employee right in the Civil Service Commission (and it was only the best of a score of similar articles submitted) wrote, in part, the following:

"I am one of the parasites. I draw \$1,620 a year. If I didn't exist, 1,620 American dollars could be directed into war channels instead of into my salary; 160 Americans could have \$10 a year lopped off their income taxes; 16 of the little fellows might have to pay no income tax at all.

"Do I like being a parasite? You bet your life I don't. I do NOT feel honored or even lucky that I am one of the huge number of government workers who spend their days killing time—whose hardest task is standing in line to cash their checks on pay day.

"We are a great army, we parasites. And almost unanimously we don't like it. But someone must like it—for we are retained in easy, effortless, and valueless positions despite the fact that the nation is supposed to be mobilized for war.

"This is my apology for being a parasite. Resigning is useless any place would be immediately filled by another parasite."

The causes that breed parasites, she charges, are "the rank stupidity of persons in supervisory positions in the offices concerned" and the inefficiency of government methods and personnel offices.

U. S. People, Not Nazis, Are Dominant In Mexico

By SAM JACKSON
MEXICO CITY, Aug. 19. (W. P. A.)—Suspected Germans and Japanese are being arrested in Mexico almost daily, but to a person on the spot the idea that the Axis ever got any substantial foothold here is ridiculous. I get rich. Another ship, carloads of "Nazi Americans," as they call us, dominate the life of this country.

The Nazis are schoolboys in the set of penetration as compared with Americans in Mexico. Axis propaganda is about the same in Mexico as it is in Hartford, Conn., or Phoenix, Ariz. Statistics on the Germans here are unreliable, but 6,000 is a good guess at any time. These people mostly want to earn a living and keep out of trouble—but until Mexico actually went to war the German ambassador was able to control them through threats to relatives in the old country.

They seem to have got just about as far as the German colonies in Chicago or Milwaukee. The United States consular and journalistic is the big shot down here to a degree few Americans realize. For instance—

On the train coming to Mexico

were a couple of American vegetable shippers. One had just landed 10 tons of produce and put Mexican cans to work raising tomatoes. There's going to be a shortage of labor in the United States during the war years and he expects to get rich. Another ship, carloads of tomatoes as far as Montreal, and in the off season, he ships bananas from Vera Cruz.

In between stories of their own profits, these gentlemen told me with Americans in Mexico.

Monkey Turns Out To Be Good Plane Spotter

CAIRO, Aug. 19. (W. P. A.)—I was walking down a Cairo street when I saw a monkey.

The larger object which approached looked like a South African private. The smaller looked so much like a monkey that it was a monkey. A little grey one, with a black face.

There must have been some one behind me for the soldier smiled, and all he did to the monkey dived down from the neck of his shirt into the open pocket of his shirt.

"Stop," I said. "This has gone far enough. Let's the three of us, have a drink."

The South African's name was Martinus. He told me the story of his monkey pal, whose name was Kaffir. "You do Kaffir. Have a sip of my beer, Martinus. I don't care if I do."

Martinus, talking with that fascinating lilt which is common to Africans speaking South African when using English, told me he owed his life to Kaffir, and Kaffir owed his life to him.

Martinus found Kaffir when he was a tiny baby, abandoned by his frightened mother, on the Pelsers farm near Wurban. That was three years ago.

Now Kaffir has grown to be quite a big chap and when his master decided that he would be away in the wars, the monkey followed him. They went through Ethiopia together and took part in the battle of Sidi Rezegh, in November 1941. They are fighting in the current action too.

Martinus, who is a truck driver, was down in Cairo on a job when I met him.

"Kaffir saved my life three times," said Martinus. "On all wars with airplanes. Kaffir can hear them long before any of us, and I believe he sees them, too. The only thing is that he doesn't know whether the planes he hears are our own or the enemy, so he tells me about it when he gets the first indications, and I tell the boys and we all watch out."

"Once I thought I had lost him, and was worried about it when suddenly he came leaping from somewhere and dived into my shirt, which is his way of letting me know something's up. I turned to my officer and said 'A plane's coming at us, Sir.' At first he didn't believe me, but I showed him under a rock and he followed. Sure enough, a few seconds later a Stuka zoomed down, like a rocket and let loose. The bomb exploded right where we would have got it nicely a moment earlier. The Jerry had come down out of the sun, so I didn't think Kaffir saw him. He must have heard him."

Kaffir's favorite position is the neck of his shirt, hanging round the rim and bangs on round the top.
