Oviedo voters select councilmen

OVIEDO — Phil Cloninger and Dominic Persampiere were the victors in the City of Oviedo Council races conducted on Tuesday.

Cloninger collected 39.74 percent of the votes to defeat three opponents in Group III. John Benson was second with 30.14 percent.

Persampiere collected 35.74 percent in Group V. His closest competitor in a field of six was Todd S. Russell with 31.89 percent.

Sanford P & Z Meets Thursday

The Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission will hold its regularly scheduled meeting Thursday, Sept. 7. Items on the agenda include rezoning, conditional use, site plan and subdivision plan considerations.

One of the items is consideration of a site plan for R & E Foods, Inc., a proposed 46,020-square-foot office/warehouse, to be located at 801 Cornwall Road. The applicant proposes a cold storage warehouse and distribution facility for pre-package foods.

The proposed building consists of 41,020 square feet of storage area and 5,000 square feet of office space, to be located on approximately four acres.

The subdivision requesting approval of a preliminary plan is for Arbor Lakes Development, a proposed 40-lot, single-family residential subdivision, located at 2200 Oregon Avenue. The subdivision would be located on slightly over 15 acres of land, on the south side and abutting the existing Kaywood Subdivision.

Also on the agenda is consideration of a building addition to Ambassadors for Christ church, at 750 W. Ninth Street in Sanford.

The meeting is open to the public, and will be held in the City Commission Chambers of Sanford City Hall.

West forces runoff with McLain

Van Der Weide, Maloy prevail; Goff loses School Board seat

SANFORD — Many politicians believe it's to their advantage to go into a run-off race after finishing second in the primary. Daryl McLain, for one, said Tuesday night he's very much alive after "a wake up call."

McLain, a two-term commissioner for Seminole County District 5, was nosed out in Tuesday's Republican Primary race by former Christian Coalition state field director Bob West (39.27 percent to 36.84). Unable to capture 50 percent-plus, they'll be pitted in an Oct. 3 runoff.

District 1 commission incumbent Grant Maloy and District 3 two-term incumbent Dick Van Der Weide won the Republican primaries to advance to the November general election. Maloy easily defeated two challengers. Van Der Weide was pressed by former Altamonte Springs Mayor Dudley Bates. School district administrator Dede Schaffner defeated incumbent Bob Goff for the District 3 School Board seat. Larry Furlong, however, was re-elected by beating Sylvia Pond in District 3.

Table with election results for County Commissioner Districts 1, 2, 3, 4 and School Board Member Districts 3 and 4.



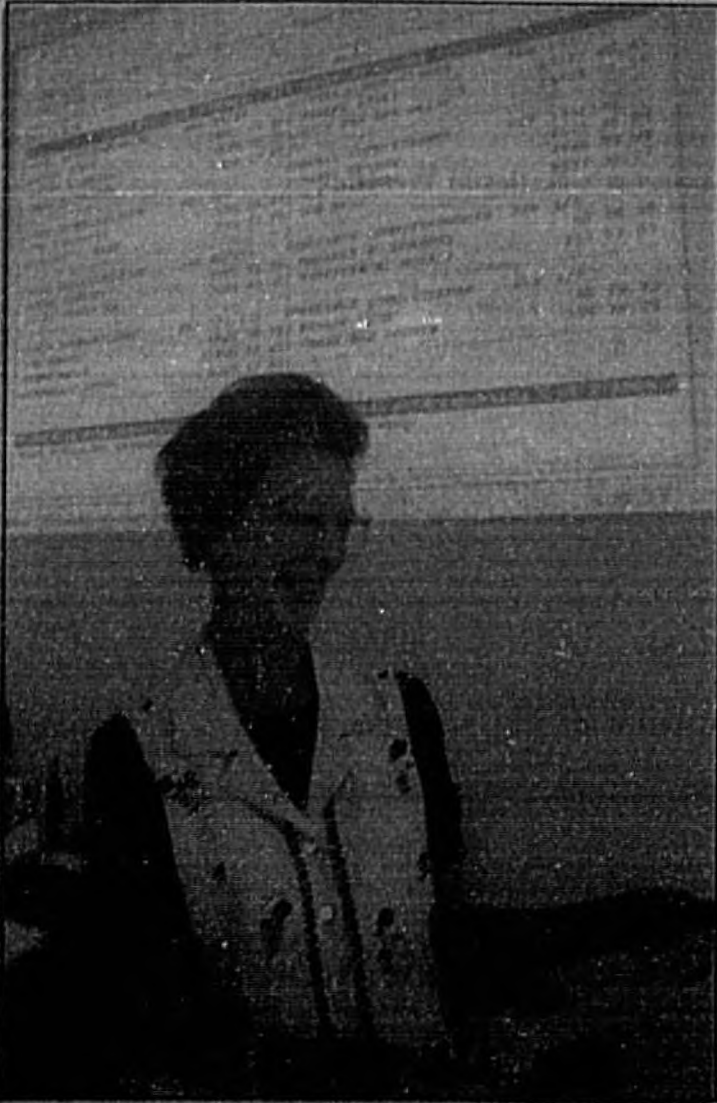
Seminole County Commissioner Daryl McLain hugs his mom, Jean McLain, as the two await the final results from Tuesday's election.

To the final hour, McLain absorbed a number of attacks from his opponents and others wanting him out of office. Unidentified "Anyone But McLain" signs appeared throughout the Sanford area on Tuesday. One was a half block away from the Sanford Police Station.

"I expected there would be a runoff against Bob West," McLain said. "The low turnout (20 percent) made him look stronger than he really is. This is a wake-up call. It's not over. I'm prepared to run against Bob West in October. It'll be a whole new race."

West called the run-off a "pleasant surprise"

Substitute teachers to meet in Altamonte

A Substitute Teacher Conference has been scheduled for October 13, at the Holiday Inn of Altamonte Springs.

The gathering is part of a continuing effort to promote learning, sharing of ideas and giving of support and encouragement to substitute teachers throughout the state.

This will be the first state-wide Substitute Teachers meeting. The day's program will include a welcome from the governor's office, a classroom management workshop, grade level group discussions, a luncheon and planning for the future conference.

Substitute teachers nationwide number about a half million, with Florida close to 15,000 as several of the nation's largest school districts are in Florida.

Each of the 67 counties have different pay scales and different training requirements, but no health benefits or grievance

process for substitute teachers. Millie McBee, a retired Florida public school teacher formed the first association of substitute teachers to share concerns and ideas, for the purpose of better educating themselves for their jobs in the classroom.

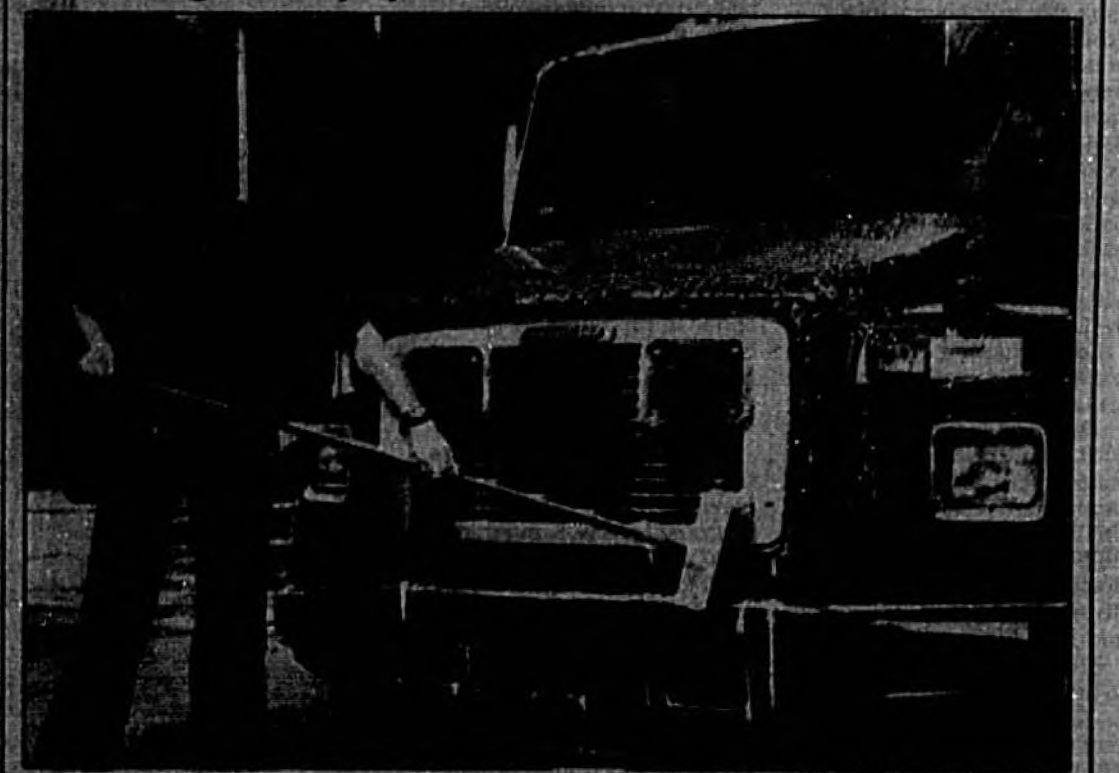
This past July, the first National Conference for Substitute Teachers was held in Washington, D.C. Substitute Teacher representatives from 16 states attended, and adopted a Substitute Teacher Bill of Rights and established a new national organization, National Substitute Teacher Alliance (NSTA).

Recent studies confirm that a student will have a substitute teacher for approximately 10 percent of the school year. Over the course of 12 grades, that amounts to over a year of student class time spent with a substitute.

African delegation visits magnet programs at Seminole

SANFORD — A delegation from Senegal visited Seminole High School Tuesday to tour two of the facility's magnet programs.

Ten high school principals from the Ivory Coast country met with Seminole administrators to discuss curriculum and administration before visiting Seminole High School's Health Academy and International Baccalaureate Program. During the tour, students also had the opportunity to ask the Senegalese men about their country, which is located on the west coast of Africa.

Then add a second set of mooring lines, one size larger than the regular lines.
* Attach chafing gear to each mooring line.

SHUPE'S SCOOP

Boat owners cannot take enough precautions in the event of a hurricane. We have all seen video footage after the passage of a hurricane where valuable boats are stacked up like cordwood.

FISHING FORECAST

Bass action is steady in the river. The water has risen slightly, so anglers may have to follow bass back into creeks and sloughs. Fishing is still great in the stretch from Puzzle Lake south. Bream and catfish are readily hitting worms and mussels. Sebastian Inlet has fair action with snook, flounder, trout, redfish, and a few tarpon.

Large live shrimp or finger mullet are the top baits. Trout are hitting on the grass flats just inside the inlet.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports that cobia and king mackerel are the most dependable species. King mackerel and cobia respond well to slow trolled live baits, such as mullet or pogies (menhaden). A reef and Pelican Flats are two good places for both species. Some king mackerel and triple-tail are also in the buoy line. Sheepshead and flounder are biting in the Port, while trout and redfish are rated as fair in the Banana and Indian rivers.

Live or dead shrimp will not last long at Ponce Inlet. Good numbers of sheepshead, drum, and redfish are ready and waiting. Trout and redfish are rated as good in Mosquito Lagoon.

Protecting boat in a hurricane

Here are some safety measures and suggestions that could help lessen or avoid boat damage in a hurricane:

PREVENTIVE MEASURES

• Check your insurance policy for adequate coverage in event of storm damage in a hurricane.

• If you keep your boat in a marina, read the contract carefully.



Shupe Outdoors

• Many marinas require a boat to be removed when a hurricane watch is announced.

• Inspect your trailer's tires and wheel bearings regularly to make sure it is operable when needed.

• Be sure you have adequate anchors and fenders and extra long lines to secure your boat.

• Assess the ability of boat cleats to carry heavy loads. Make sure all are backed with stainless steel or aluminum plates. On sailboats, winches and keel-stepped masts can be used to secure lines.

• Chafe protectors are essential on all lines while your boat is docked, moored or anchored. Ready-made chafe protectors are available through marine dealers, or can be made using neoprene hose or heavy canvas.

BEFORE THE STORM

• If you take your boat home, leave it, and not your car, in the garage. Most boats are lighter and more vulnerable to high winds.

• If storing a small boat is not possible, put the boat and trailer where they will get the best protection from wind and falling branches.

• Let some air out of the trailer tires and block the wheels.

• Increase the weight of lighter outboard boats by leaving the drain plug in and adding water with a hose. Place wood blocks between the trailer's frame and springs to support added weight.

• Remove the drain plug from inboard boats so the engine won't be damaged by flooding.

• Attach the trailer tongue to something firm in the ground and lash the boat to the trailer.

WHEN LEAVING BOAT AT A MARINA OR DOCK

• Strip all loose gear: Bimini tops, canvas covers, electronics, antennas, outriggers, life rings, etc.

• Position mooring lines to be as long as possible to allow the boat to raise with high water levels. See Outdoors, Page 2B

Eagles fly high behind SAC pair

Siqueiros coaches, Smith hurls Emory University into national fastpitch softball prominence

ATLANTA - Two former Seminole Athletic Conference standouts had a major hand in the Emory University softball team finishing 21-13 in its second season of varsity competition, tripling its win total from the previous year.

The Eagles finished second at the University Athletic Association championship tournament with a 7-3 record.

Head coach Penny Siqueiros, who was a pretty good player in her Seminole County high school days, was the driving force behind turning Emory from a record of 7-14 in 1999 into not only a winner, but a power in 2000.

Three players were named to the all-region team with two making the first team. Six players were named to the all-conference team with four making the first team. As of May 15th, freshman Tamara Boggs was the NCAA Division III leader in triples with 11.

Longwood freshman Sarah Smith, a Lake Mary High School graduate, was named to the University Athletic Association All-Conference Second Team and was selected as the Defensive Player of the Year for the Eagles.

On April 9th, Smith pitched the first perfect game in Emory softball history in an 8-0 win in the opening game of a doubleheader against Judson (Ala.).

For her efforts, she was named conference "Athlete of the Week" and ended the season pitching 151 of the 216 innings Emory played this spring.

Smith, who helped the Rams win the Class 6A State Championship in 1997, won a school-record 12 games in 21 starts and finished the season with a 12-8 record and an earned run average of 2.63.

The righthander struck out 142 batters and walked 73 in 151.2 innings and had 17 complete games and five shutouts. She also limited her opponents to a batting average of .210.

Offensively Smith, who was a super hitter in high school, had a little trouble adapting to the college game, finishing with a .136 average on eight hits in 59 at bats. But she did drive in four runs and score two and only struck out five times while also walking five times.

Also gaining postseason honors were:

• Tamara Boggs, the freshman earned the team's Most Valuable Player award. She recorded 11 triples, the highest total in NCAA Division III and led the team in hits (48), total bases (75), and slugging percentage (.743).

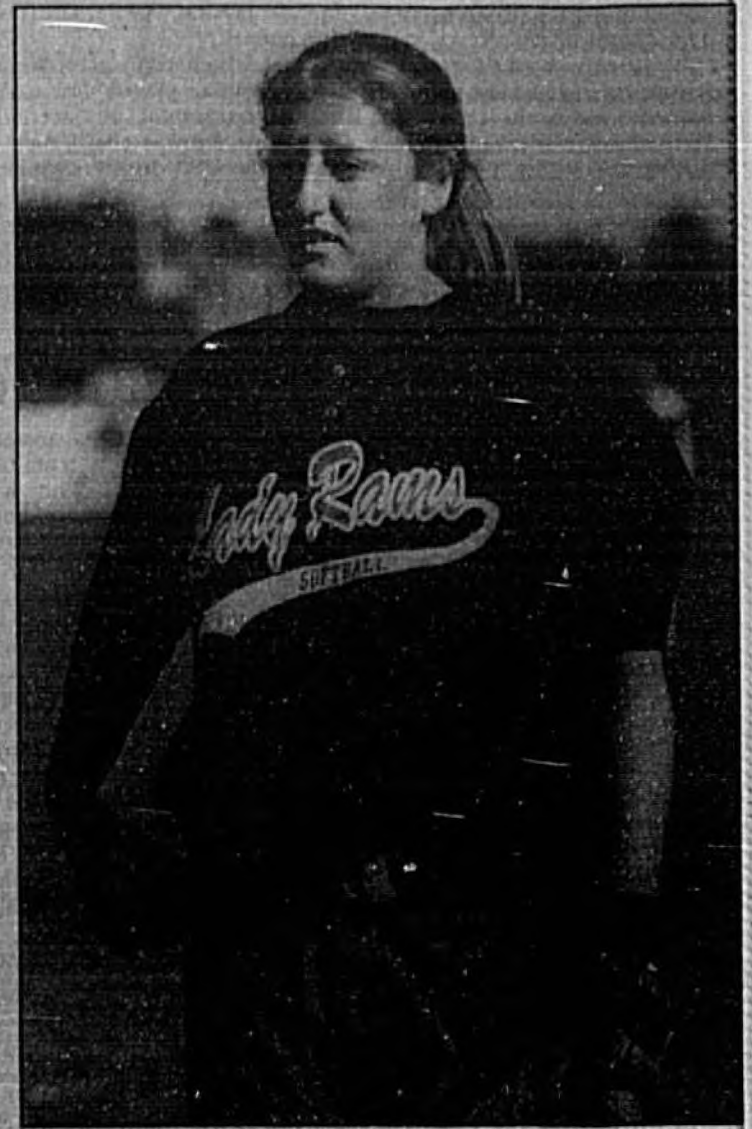
Boggs finished second on the team with a .475 batting average, ranking her 44th in the nation among Division III players. She also scored 34 runs while driving in 32 more. Boggs batted .485 in conference play.

• Elizabeth Cox, as a freshman she led the team in putouts with 172. The catcher finished seventh on the team with a .297 batting average and recorded 30 hits. Cox ranked fourth on the team in runs batted in with 24.

During a two-game stretch against conference opponents Rochester (N.Y.) and Brandeis (Mass.), Cox drove in four runs, keying a pair of Emory victories.

• Lauren Dix, the freshman was named the team's Best Offensive Player.

The leadoff hitter was the catalyst for the Emory offense with a team-high .550 on-base percentage. She led the team in three other offensive categories — batting average (.480), runs scored (25) and RBI (25). See Smith, Page 2B

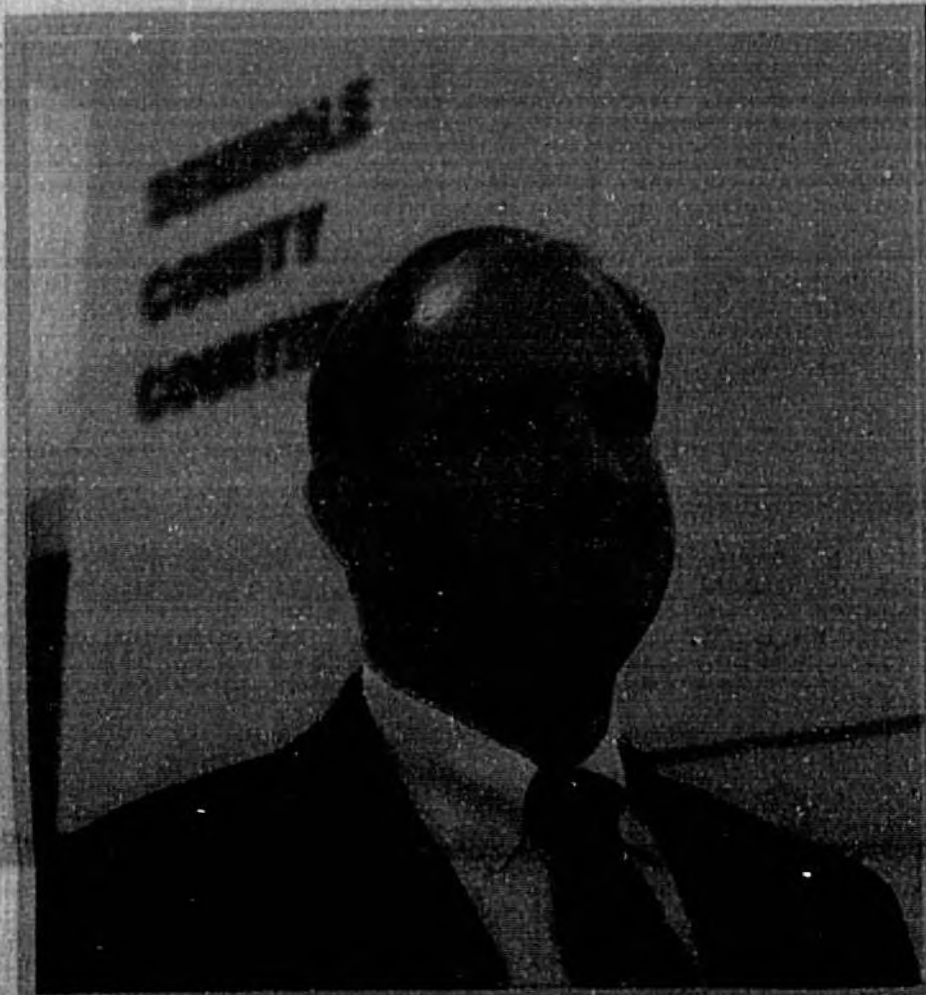
ORLANDO - University of Central Florida men's basketball coach Kirk Speraw announced that Craig Brown has joined the Golden Knights basketball coaching staff.

Allamanda: One of best climbers in Florida

One of the best climbers for central Florida is the yellow Allamanda. A native to Brazil and relative to oleander and confederate jasmine, this vine produces very showy yellow flowers nearly year-round. It is a very popular flowering vine for home gardens but must be protected from frost.

There are three main species cultivated, the common yellow Allamanda with the bright yellow flowers, the bush Allamanda with yellow flowers streaked with orange and the purple Allamanda with its large magenta-violet flowers.

The Plant

The yellow Allamanda is a woody evergreen vine, with a milky sap, often pruned to grow as a shrub, can grow up to 15 feet tall. The leaves are leathery and glossy, lance-shaped or elliptical, opposite or sometimes in whorls of three or four, measuring up to 6 inches long.

The flowers, clustered near the ends of the branches, are yellow, very showy, waxy, trumpet shaped, with 5 flaring petal lobes, measuring 2 to 4 inches across. The main flowering season is summer and fall, but produces flowers throughout the year.

The fruit is a prickly capsule measuring about 2 inches wide. When mature, it splits open releasing winged seeds. The fruit is rarely seen in Florida.

Culture

Allamanda requires full sun to light shade. It must be planted in a protected area because its tenderness to frost. It freezes at about 30 degrees.

It tolerates many soil types with good drainage, can grow well in acid to alkaline pH but grow best with pH values between 5.5 to 6.0.

It has a relatively high drought tolerance once established.

Prune severely before growth

starts in spring, and keep shoots trimmed during the year because it grows very quickly and can cover the fence, trellis or tree where it is growing very rapidly.

Prune to develop a low, upright, spreading shrub that will produce more blooms. It requires very little care. Fertilize lightly in the spring and in fall with a general complete fertilizer. It may show iron or manganese chlorosis in alkaline soils.

Varieties

The "Henderson" and "Brown Bud" are two of the most popular cultivated varieties.

The variety "Golden Butterflies" has yellow tubular flowers with petals that flap in the wind like butterfly wings.

"Halley's Comet" has both double and semi-double yellow flowers. "Caribbean Sunrise" has pink flowers.

"Hendersonii" has smaller yellow flowers than other varieties, and the unopened buds are brown on the outside.

"Nobilis" has large open yellow flowers, buds are brown outside and the flower tubes

are narrower in diameter than other varieties.

"Jamaican Sunset" has smoky pink flowers. "Schottii" has large yellow flowers that have swollen tubes and brown stripes inside.

Uses

The Allamanda vine is commonly used to cover fences or trellises. It can also be used as a hedge or as a freestanding clipped specimen. It grows very well in a hanging basket or can be used as a ground cover.

With a little care, it can become a handsome house-plant.

Indoor Use

As an indoor plant, Allamanda do best in at least four hours of direct sunlight a day, night temperatures of 60-65 degrees and day temperatures of 70 degrees or higher. Keep the soil moist and fertilize every two weeks from April through September.

Apply less water and no fertilizer the rest of the year.

Propagation

Allamanda is best propagated from stem cuttings taken in

the spring.

Toxicity

The plant is considered to be poisonous, but not known to be fatal. All parts of the plant, especially the fruit and seeds, and the sap of the stems and leaves, cause mild to severe stomach upset and vomiting.

Bark is also said to be poisonous. It may cause dermatitis to sensitive persons. It is considered to have emetic and purgative properties.

Toxin is self-limiting and treatment is usually not necessary.

Pest And Diseases

Allamanda can be affected by plant parasitic nematodes. Mites and scales can produce some damage and should be controlled as soon as they are detected using insecticidal oils and soap sprays. Caterpillars can occasionally defoliate the plants severely.

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New antifungal medicine has drawbacks

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have toenail fungus. Last week I heard of a new product that, when painted on the nail, cures the fungus. Is this for real?

DEAR READER: I wish it were. Ciclopirox (Penlac) is an antifungal lotion, approved by the Food and Drug Administration for topical application to cure nail fungus.

The initial publicity releases by the manufacturer reiterated the fact that oral antifungal medications have a much wider array of side effects, so Penlac is safer. This is correct. However, according to the Medical Letter on Drugs and Therapeutics, Penlac is seldom effective. My advice? Save your money and try soaking your feet in the herbal tea called LaPacho twice a day.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have had two strokes from atrial fibrillation, for which I have been prescribed digoxin and Coumadin. I am convinced that I have a pinworm infection, although tests for this have been negative. I'm 77 and would like to take Reese's pinworm medication, but hesitate in the fear that it could cause another stroke. What is your advice?

DEAR READER: You appear to be employing an appropriate therapy to prevent another stroke from atrial fibrillation, an irregular heartbeat. I am more concerned that you believe you have pinworms, despite negative testing.

Pinworms, small parasites that infect the intestine, are usually demonstrated quite easily by using a "Scotch tape preparation." The sticky tape is applied to the anus and then examined under a microscope to identify pinworm eggs. A negative test, although not conclusive, is usually a valid indication that pinworms are not present. Therefore, you may wish to investigate further whatever intestinal symptoms you are experiencing. Perhaps there is something else to blame.

In any case, the use of Reese's pinworm medication, an over-the-counter remedy, will not harm you and will certainly not cause another stroke. I suggest that you review this situation with your doctor and follow his or her advice with respect to further therapy.

DEAR DR. GOTT: For 20 years, I have had a cholesterol of 270, even though I diet. I am now 80 years old and am increasingly concerned that this high level may put me at risk for stroke or heart attack. My doctor recommends a cholesterol level of 200 and urges me to take appropriate medication. Should I be concerned?

DEAR READER: All of us should aim to keep our cholesterol levels below 200 milligrams per deciliter. However, depending on our ages, this may not be realistic.

For example, a 20-year-old athlete with a cholesterol of 270 is in serious trouble because of the very risks you mention. On the other hand, a level of 270 in an otherwise healthy octogenarian is less worrisome; as we age, our cholesterol levels tend to increase.

I defer to your family physician, who knows you, your diet and your predisposition to health problems. Wear your

patient, I'd probably put you on a relatively strict low-cholesterol diet, with additional fiber and — perhaps — niacin, a B vitamin, and see what happens. In addition, I'd encourage regular, relatively strenuous exercise.

If your cholesterol level remained high, I might consider statin drugs, prescription medications to lower your cholesterol. However, these medications have potential side effects and are not, therefore, free of risk. Consequently, I'd feel more comfortable using non-pharmacologic methods as a starter, reserving drugs as a later option.

I advise you to review this problem once again with your physician. If he or she feels that you are at risk and that prescription drugs are appropriate, fine. If not, the approach I outlined might suit your needs. To give you related information, I am sending you a copy of my Health Report "Understanding Cholesterol." "You hope you've reached every registered voter one way or another," said Dudley Bates, who opposes incumbent Dick Van Der Weide in District 3 County Commissioner race. One of the two Republican candidates will advance to the November General Election. The other will be eliminated in the Republican Primary.

Daryl McLain is also a two-term commissioner up for reelection. He is opposed in District 5 by Bob West and Don Nicholas. Since there are three candidates, a run-off in October might occur. To win outright, one of the three will need 50 percent plus one vote.

Incumbent Grant Maloy is challenged by Tom Hagood and Stephanie Smith in the District 1 Commission Republican Primary. As in the District 5 race, it will take 50 percent plus one vote to win.

The commission races will be decided by registered Republican voters. Registered Democrats get their chance in the General Election. These Democrats will, however, vote in three judicial races and two school board races.

The school board choices are incumbents Bob Goff and Larry Furlong. They are opposed by Dede Schaffner and Sylvia

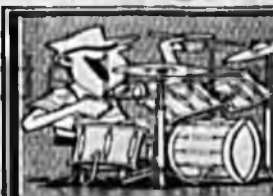


Seminole County election office employee Eleanore Bailey answers questions about the voting process.

Pond. Judge Debra Nelson is opposed by Sylvia A. Grunor in the Circuit Judge Group 10 race. Judge Tom Freeman is opposed by Norman Lewin in Group 11. Jeff Deen goes against Mark Herr in the Group

3 County Judge race. The ground rules for voting are simple: Each registered voter must present photo I.D. to vote at his or her polling place. If anyone fails to produce this photo I.D., you will be required to sign a "Voter

Without Photo I.D." affirmation. The election office staff figures to have the votes counted soon after the 7 p.m. poll closings. That's when the final answers will matter most.



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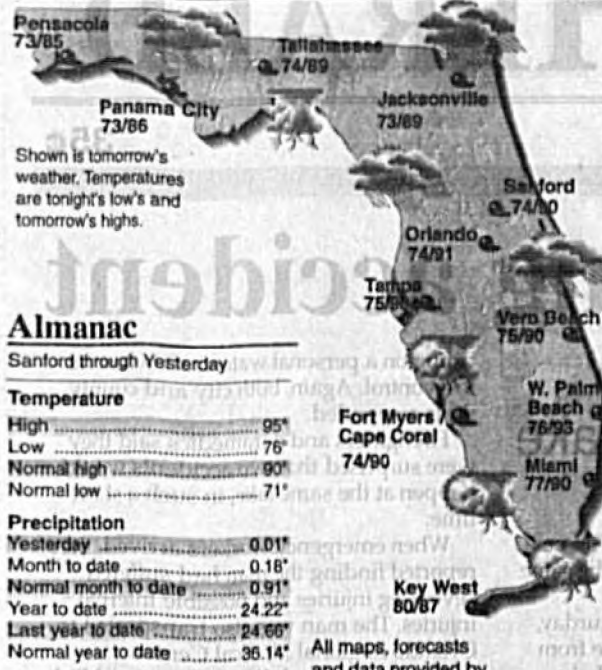
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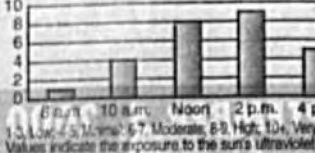

Seminole schools, library to receive \$79,632 from federal E-Rate program
