 Lake Mary Police Chief Harry Benson knew it was Kristin Shepard, a woman scorned, who plugged black-hearted J.R. Ewing because he done her wrong. In a Herald poll of local law enforcement officials Wednesday, Benson said he was "absolutely certain" it was Kristin. J.R. had promised to marry her but instead ran her out of town.

The prolonged mystery of who shot dastardly J.R. was unraveled Friday night on the third episode of this season's "Dallas" series. It was revealed Kristin was played by Mary Crosby, shot the evil J.R. Ewing in the heat of a passion.

Kristin, after all, had been his mistress—despite the fact she also was his sister-in-law. Just before the shooting, J.R. threatened to expose Kristin as a prostitute and ruin her reputation in Dallas.

This ended the saga that had fired the interest of TV viewers around the world, enriched bookmakers who took bets on two continents and launched a parade of T-shirts, buttons and other gimmicks speculating on the identity of J.R.'s assailant.

The cast of Dallas, including J.R. himself, watched the show at a special dining room "Chase's" restaurant. An estimated 80 million other Texans also tuned in.

Word of the true assailant was flashed from Eastern time zones a full three hours before the show was aired in Los Angeles.

An excited Mary Crosby, daughter of the late crooner Bing Crosby, said she was delighted Kristin had done it the evil J.R.

"I am leaving the show," Miss Crosby said, adding, "It's nice to leave with a bang."

"Next week will be my last show until next spring. But I don't go to jail. I go to California."

"J.R. had it coming. I have no remorse or regrets," she said after Miss Crosby admitted Kristin's guilt.

Larry Hagman, who plays the meanest Texan of them all, bounded into the restaurant to plant a kiss on her cheek.

Hagman said, "I didn't know until tonight that it was Kristin who shot me down. And I won't believe it until I see it on the tube. They could change it for the West Coast."

Asked if he thought there was a possibility one or another of J.R.'s other enemies would shoot him again in the near future, Hagman replied, "I certainly hope not."

Actress Linda Gray seemed disappointed that her character, Sue Ellen Ewing, J.R.'s wife, had not been the guilty party.

But smiling brightly she said, "There's always next week."

Keep Boys With Dad, Girls With Mom?

 When parents are divorced, boys who live with their fathers and girls who live with their mothers seem to be better off.

According to a study done at the University of Texas at Dallas, such children are warmer, less demanding, more mature, more sociable, more independent and have higher self-esteem than children living with a parent of the opposite sex.

The researchers were John W. Santrock and Richard A. Warshaw, both psychologists. Their study included 60 white, middle-class families with children ranging in age from 6 to 11; 33 boys and 27 girls. One-third lived with their fathers, one-third with their mothers, and one-third with both parents in an intact family.

The researchers planned an activity together and discussing the family's principal problems. They then had advanced graduate students who did not know the family situations rate the videotaped children on scales of personality characteristics and behavior.

Children in each type of family were compared with children in the other types who were the same age, had the same number of brothers and sisters, and whose parents had roughly the same income level.

Some sex equality may produce positive results, the researchers say, because it can avoid the tangles that sometimes arise when a child becomes an emotional substitute for a spouse. Living with a parent of the same sex can also give children the adult models with whom they most readily identify.

Chemical Security Ordered

A temporary injunction against City Chemical Co. Inc. of Orlando was issued by Circuit Judge S. Joseph Davis Jr. Friday afternoon as requested by the Florida Department of Environmental Regulation (DER) and the city of Sanford.

Judge Davis ordered City Chemical Co. Inc. to halt the placement of any further drums of chemical waste at a one-acre site in west Sanford, to immediately remove 24-hour security at the site; to remove all leaking and damaged drums of chemical waste from the site within five days; to construct a 100-foot fire break on the property and to segregate certain drums to reduce the possibility of fires and environmental damage.

Any activity at the waste chemical storage facility, according to the court order, must be done under the supervision of Alex Senkevich, DER district manager.

The city discovered 10 days ago that City Chemical Co. Inc. was operating a waste chemical storage site containing more than 130 drums of chemicals on property leased from the Seminole Employment, Economic Development Corp. (SEEDCO) off Airport Boulevard and Jewett Lane. SEEDCO officials have notified City Chemical of its intent to terminate the lease.

With assistance from State Rep. Robert Hattaway, D-Maitland Springs, and State Sen. John Vigil, D-Cocoa Beach, DER, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and city officials met Thursday to map a course of action to have the waste chemicals, deemed hazardous, by the state fire marshal's office, moved from Sanford

Sanford Patrolman Injured

 A Sanford motorcycle patrolman was in serious condition Saturday with major chest injuries following a collision Friday with a car in a funeral procession he was escorting.

Officer Anardi Colazzo, a Sanford motorcycle patrolman since January 1979, was injured just before noon when a car driven by Homer Gleason, Country Club Road, Lake Mary, turned out of the procession, striking Colazzo as he rode alongside the line of cars heading for Oaklawn Cemetery.

The motorcycle was thrown through the intersection of Country Club Road and Country Club Boulevard, striking a truck which was stopped, waiting for the procession to pass, witnesses say.

When the bike hit the truck, Colazzo was thrown down the road.

The accident occurred just over a year after Colazzo suffered a broken leg when he lost control of his bike while turning a corner while on patrol.

The procession for Edith Brooks' funeral had left Brisson Funeral Home and almost reached the cemetery when Gleason decided to head for home rather than join a crowd at the cemetery, his wife Lena said.

Gleason tried to make a left turn from

Country Club Boulevard onto Country Club Road when he struck the motorcycle, he said.

Colazzo was taken to Seminole Memorial Hospital and then transferred to Orlando Regional Medical Center's Intensive Care Unit, suffering a broken left shoulder, collar bone, collapsed lung and seven broken ribs.

An investigation to determine who was at fault in the accident will be made by Florida Highway Patrol investigators.

Colazzo is unmarried and moved to Sanford from Pennsylvania to take a job on the police department, a spokesman said.

Electrical Malfunction Fire Cause?

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—Search teams returned to the blackened MGM Grand Hotel Saturday to hunt for victims of the smoky flash fire that killed more than 80 people and investigators tried to determine the cause of the tragedy.

Authorities said an electrical malfunction in a gambling machine may have sparked the blaze, which sent dense smoke pouring through the luxury high-rise, injuring more than 300 people and forcing more than 100 guests to flee to the roof, where they were trapped to safety by a fleet of helicopters.

An investigation to determine who was at fault in the accident will be made by Florida Highway Patrol investigators.

Suspended Sanford Police Officer Says He Was Set Up

 A Sanford police officer has been suspended with pay after being charged with neglect of duty for not arresting a man who offered to sell him drugs.

Melvin Owens, 22, 1117 W. 13th St. Sanford, was officially notified of his suspension Tuesday. He has been a member of the police department since Jan. 11, and has been one of two foot patrol officers assigned to the 11th Street beat.

Owens said he feels he has been discriminated against and was set up by fellow officers. He said he is hiring an attorney and will be filing a complaint with the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission through Equal Opportunity Officer Louise Crawford of Sanford.

A hearing before a police complaint review board has been requested by Owens. The board to be composed of a representative named by Owens, a representative of Police Chief Ben Butler, and a third member satisfactory to the first two will hear Owens' complaint at 9 a.m. Wednesday at the Sanford Police Department.

Owens received a letter from Butler Friday morning notifying him that Butler intends to dismiss him from the department.

The letter said on two occasions, Owens was confronted by an individual who openly displayed several packages containing 16 grams of marijuana and on one occasion the person openly rolled and smoked a marijuana cigarette in front of Owens. On neither occasion did Owens arrest the man.

According to Owens, the incident occurred as follows:

On Nov. 4 a fellow officer told Owens he was being investigated by the Sanford Police Department for drug use. Owens was walking a patrol on the 11th Street beat. A fellow officer had the week before been transferred back to regular patrol.

On Nov. 6 while walking patrol, a young black person stopped him as he was walking on the east side of the street. The man, according to Owens, said "Hey, man, everyone on the street says you're cool. I want to get to New York quick. I have five pounds of marijuana I need to get rid of."

Owens said he told the man he was not into drugs and to go elsewhere to get rid of his drugs. "He said OK and left. Told him to be careful."

Owens said the man did not display any marijuana.

Owens said he went to a relative's home nearby and called a friend on the police department, who had warned he was being investigated.

"No one in his right mind stops a policeman in uniform and tries to sell him dope," Owens said. "I know this whole thing was set up by the department."

"I was trying to protect myself from a setup," Owens said.

"My friend told me to be careful." I got off duty at 10:45, checked in at the department and checked out.

"On Nov. 7 while on patrol, I was called over my portable police radio that someone wanted to meet me at 12th and French on the railroad tracks at about 9 p.m. It was the same guy. "I told him he could be arrested for doing something like this and left off walking."

Owens said he got into his patrol car and circled the block before going to the police station. He said he went into the office where there was a dispatcher, two complaint clerks and Sgt. William Dabe and told them the department was trying to set him up. "The sergeant said this happens all the time and if you aren't doing anything wrong, you have nothing to be worried about." Dabe told him to return to his beat, Owens said.

Owens said he went to a relative's home and again called his police officer friend to tell him what had happened. He went to patrol on the 11th Street beat on Saturday morning when he reported for work, Owens said. Lt. Richard Nooney told him to go back home. He had Sunday and Monday off and reported for duty Tuesday. "I worked until 1 p.m. when Sgt. Bill Bernosky called me in. He and Det. Tom Brooks took me into the conference room, advised me of my rights and tape recorded the conversation. They said the man, calling him, by the same name as he had given me, was buggy and there was

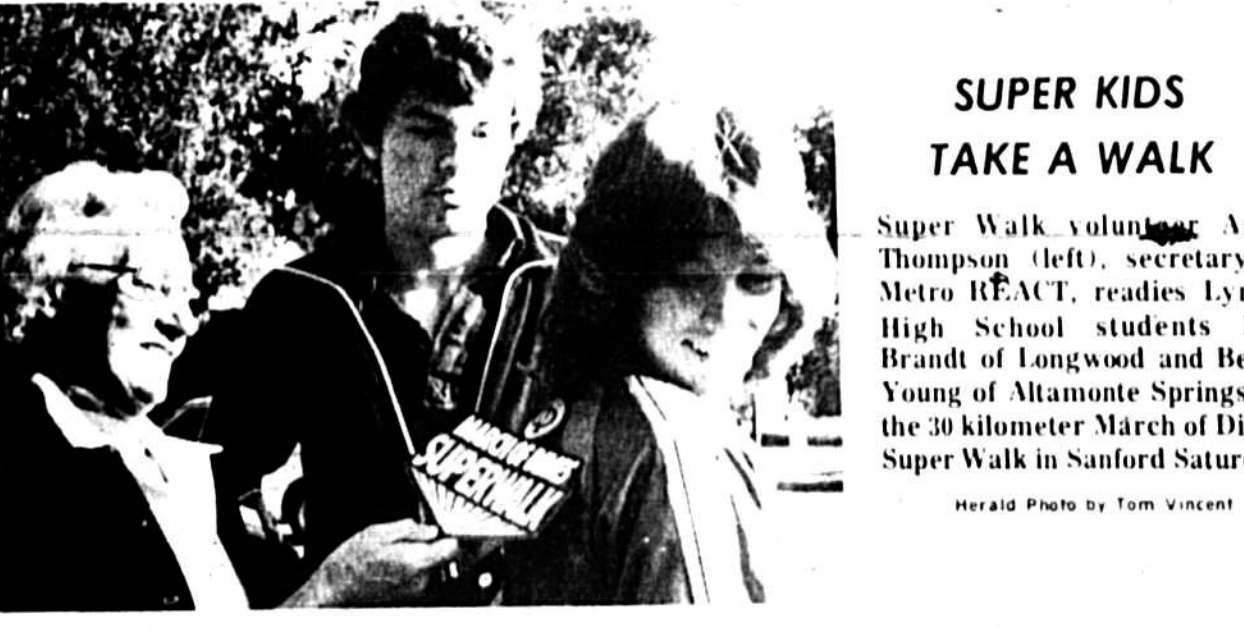

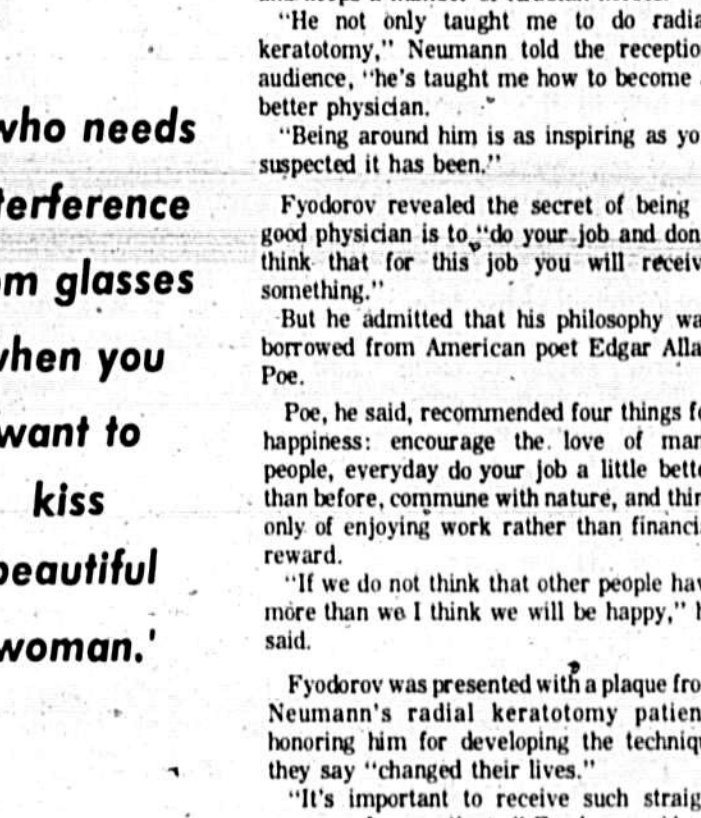

The Famous Use His Quill Pens

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (UPI) — Lewis Glaser recedes as a small piece of history with each stroke of his penknife, carving a product presented to nobles ranging from Supreme Court Justices to Leonard Brebner.

Although he usually maintains his work has no relation to art, Glaser makes something once considered essential to the nobles and the Beethovens of the world — quill pens.

"The hell with the money," said the 82-year-old craftsman. "I work seven days a week. When you have time to worry about things and have nothing to do, you start getting aches and pains."

Since a chance encounter with Mamie Eisenhower in the 1950s, Glaser has parlayed what was a hobby into a thriving enterprise. She heard through mutual friends that Glaser carved quill pens and mentioned it to her husband.

Eisenhower's aides promptly summoned Glaser to the White House to present the president with a set. The ceremony was covered by reporters and the resulting publicity launched Glaser, a former advertising executive, into a second career.

"I've gotten orders from all over the world," he said. "I don't have to advertise because word gets around."

Glaser's business received an additional boost when the U.S. Supreme Court commissioned him in 1984 to carry on a tradition dating back two centuries — presentation of quill pens to lawyers who argue before the high court.

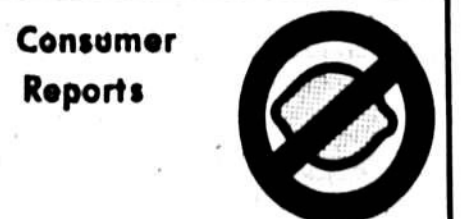

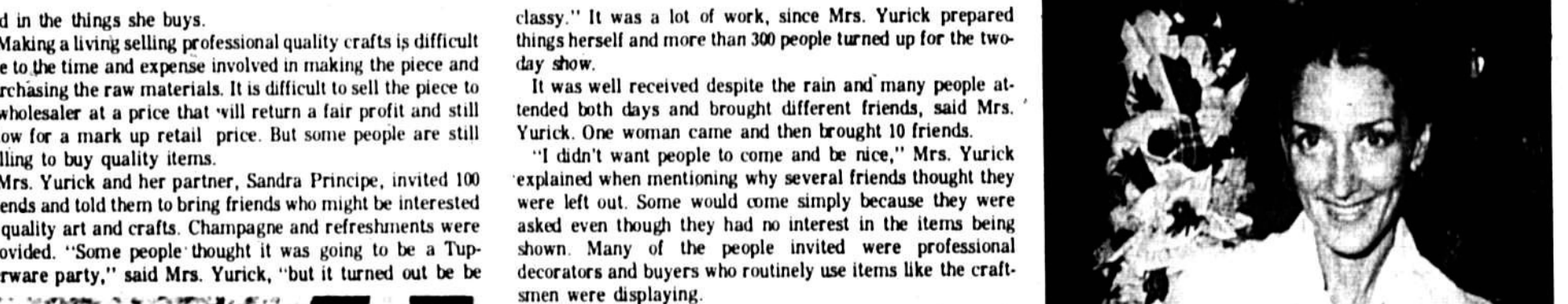

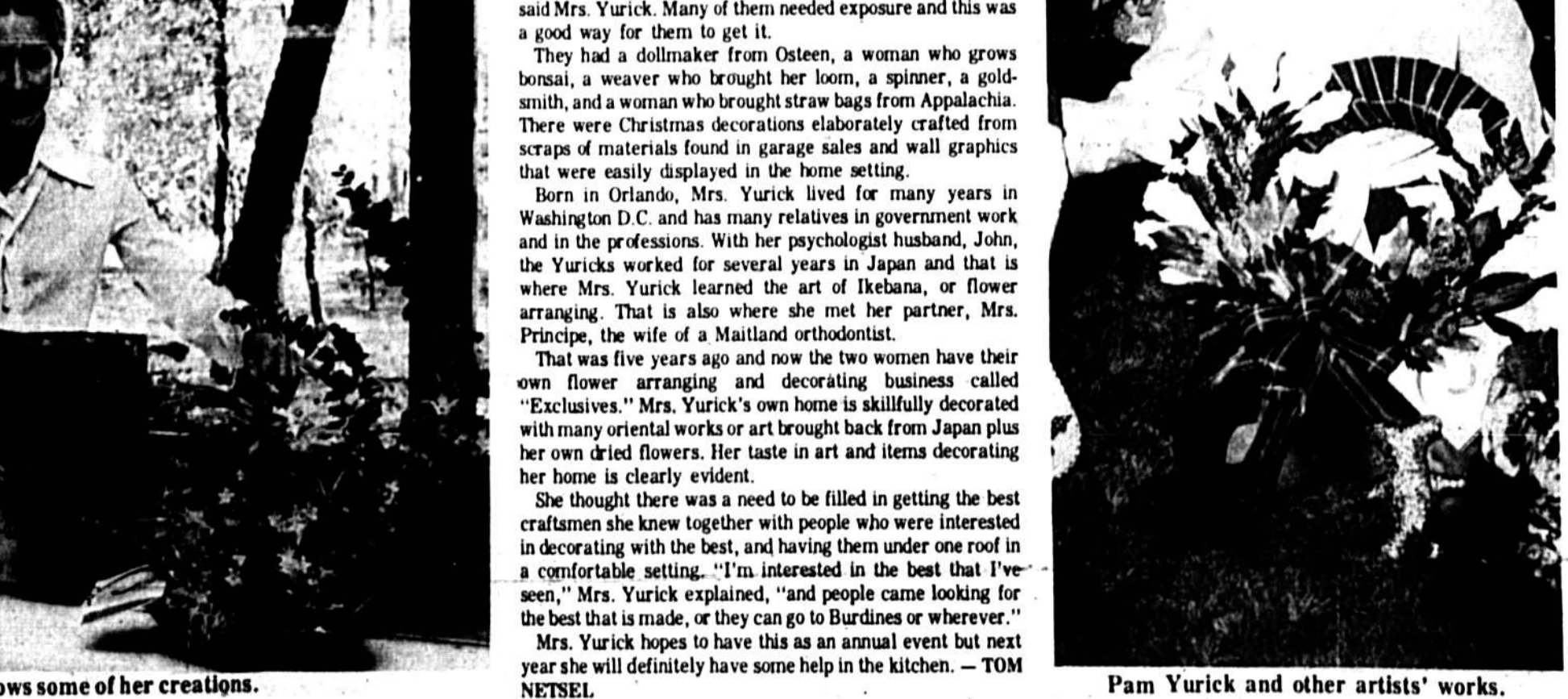

"How could I forget that day? I had gone to the grocery store, where I heard the shocking news. I rushed home immediately to find my dear husband slumped in his chair — dead of a massive heart attack! The radio beside him was still blasting." — LILLIAN MILLER, PHOENIX, ARIZ.
"I was on the operating table in the middle of a hemorrhoidectomy when a nurse rushed in and shouted, 'Doctor, I just heard that President Kennedy was shot in Dallas!' The doctor dropped the instrument he was holding and gasped, 'Oh my God!' I was left in a bedkin position until he regained his composure, after which he completed the surgery with somewhat unsteady hands. Later, the instructor stuck her head in the room and said, 'Sorry, Doctor, I guess that news could have waited.' To which she replied, 'I sure as hell could have!' — PETER J. SMALL, L.A., CALIF.
"I was working as a pharmacist in a drugstore when I heard the terrible news. A few minutes later two women came in. I asked if they had heard President Kennedy had been shot. One said, 'Yeah, but I don't mean nothing to us because my wife's a Republican.' I couldn't believe my ears." — EVA INANAHIM
"President Kennedy's assassination was announced as I entered USC's dental clinic, where 20 students were working on patients. Twenty-four dental instruments were held skyward and 40 mouths opened simultaneously — 49 including my own." — LONG HEATH, MEMPHIS
"I was in the waiting room of my psychiatrist's office, slightly early for my appointment. I had a transistor radio in my bag and a silent attachment plugged into my ear. "I was in London attending a ballet starring Dame Margot Fonteyn and Rudolf Nureyev when the manager interrupted the performance to say, 'England has lost one of her greatest friends. President Kennedy was assassinated.' We were stunned. Flaps were flown at half mast, and for days afterward, strangers topped me on the street to express sympathy." — EDWARD G. BEST, SAN FRANCISCO
"On Nov. 22, 1963, I was in my mother's lap, crying. Why? Because she was." — SUSAN S., STILLWATER, OKLA.
"DEAR ABBY: I am 23. I began smoking pot at 12. By 17, I had taken LSD and shot heroin. I have been addicted to opiates for two years. I am on the methadone program now. (It's a government-approved substitute for heroin, but I have to get a fix every day.) If just one young person reads this and takes heed, I will feel that I have accomplished something. Too bad you'll never know how many lives you may have saved by writing me a letter.

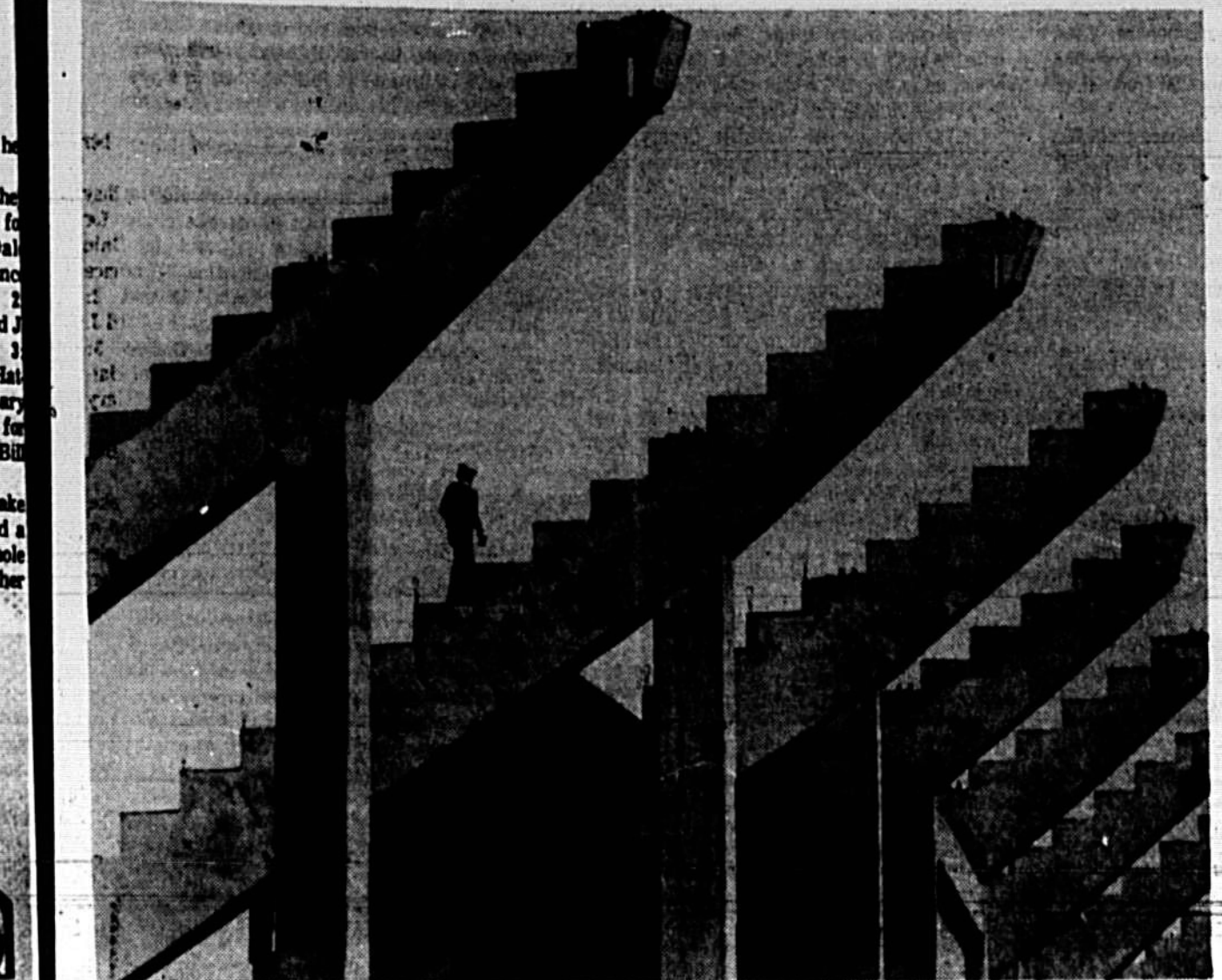

Holiday Drivers Warned

The National Safety Council estimates between 500 and 600 people may be killed and up to 36,000 people seriously injured on the nation's highways during the four-day Thanksgiving holiday weekend.

The holiday begins at 6 p.m. local time Wednesday and extends to midnight Sunday. During last year's holiday, 475 people were killed and 30,700 seriously injured.

The Safety Council warned drivers of compact cars Monday to be especially careful, noting the risk of serious injury or death is three times greater for occupants in small cars.

The council also advised motorists to wear seat belts, to observe posted speed limits, and to avoid tailgating by maintaining at least one vehicle length for every 10 mph the car is traveling.
