



## Scalp Of Card's Manager Is In Danger As His Team Continues To Fall Down

NEW YORK, July 9.—(INS)—Having within the last three years communicated one manager who was a world's champion, another who was a runner-up in the league race and a third who was utterly unable to do better than win the pennant, it might be interesting to know what Mr. Sam Breadon, of St. Louis, intends to do about Bill Southworth, who today has managed the Cardinals right down the 500 mark.

## HEAT WAVE HAS EASTERN STATES IN TORRID GRASP

### Many Prostrations In Atlantic Seaboard Cities Are Reported

NEW YORK, July 9.—(INS)—Southern heat enveloping New York City and the entire Atlantic seaboard today, causing numerous prostrations and even deaths. Thunder showers here this morning had no effect in alleviating suffering among the residents of crowded apartment buildings and tenement houses.

At ten o'clock this morning the weather bureau's thermometer on top of the Whitehall building was at 86, and indications were that the oppressive conditions would prevail for some time. In fact, there was no prospect of substantial relief in the weather forecast for tomorrow, even though thunder showers are forecast for tonight.

The heat wave was general throughout the East and over a wide section of the South. Many prostrations were reported in New York and other large cities. Great throngs flocked to the bathing beaches for relief. Many slept outdoors last night.

Seven deaths here were attributed indirectly to the heat in the last 24 hours. Six of these were by drowning. The seventh occurred last night when John Flanagan, a young man of 21, was found dead on a window of his furnished room on a third floor and plunged into the street.

Since tendering his resignation, Dr. King and Mrs. King have been besieged with friends and acquaintances calling to express their regrets and to wish them success in their new charge.

## No Word Received From Rome Fliers; Weather Is Perfect

Thus the Pathfinder, the flier which had been instructed to report immediately if the Pathfinder was located, no word was received last night to state that the great grey plane had been seen winging through the clouds. There was no apprehension on this account, however, as Williams and Yancy planned to fly at an altitude of 6,000 feet, far above the clouds.

They were emphatic in declaring that they would not take the risk of possible descent to lower altitudes in the event a ship was sighted; preferring the world to go without news of their progress to taking a chance of not being able to climb their altitude again.

If Williams and Yancy follow the course they mapped out before the take-off, they will pass several hundred miles north of the Azores about noon, New York time. The steamer lane, in the vicinity of the Azores are dotted with passenger and freight vessels, and if the sky is not too heavily clouded, the Pathfinder should be visible from their decks even at the high altitude the aviators determined upon.

It is quite possible, therefore, that definite news of their progress over the sea may be received early this afternoon. Other side nothing will be heard until they touch the Spanish mainland early in the evening.

The total distance of the proposed flight is 4,700 miles. The greatest distance any flier has attempted to span without a stop is 3,000 miles, when the flier, Williams and Yancy, crossed the Atlantic without refueling and lost of blazing the first aerial trail between America and the British Isles.

## Daughter, Left In Pawn, Is Ordered To Be Returned Home

SAN FRANCISCO, July 9.—(INS)—Three-year-old Virginia Coleman who was left in pawn for a railroad ticket to Chicago, has been ordered returned to her mother, Mrs. Verne Coleman, of Bellewood, a suburb of Chicago.

Frank E. Clayton, in whose custody the child was left, claimed that the mother had signed away all her rights. Superior Judge Walter Perry Johnson, however, upheld the mother's inherent claim on her daughter.

The child was boarded with the Claytons last January by Mrs. Coleman who came here after separating from her husband in Los Angeles. Coleman returned to Bellewood. After correspondence, Mrs. Coleman decided a month later to rejoin her husband but had no money. It was then the Claytons said they ad-

vanced her money for her and fare in return for custody of the child.

Plot Is Discovered In Roumania Is Report  
BERLIN, July 9.—(INS)—A Roumanian military plot against the government of Premier Maniu has been discovered, according to reports received in Vienna from Bucharest and telegraphed here. More than 200 Roumanian army officers have been arrested. Among the prisoners are General Brojesanu and General Angelescu. The Roumanian press is forbidden to publish details of the plot.

It is believed here that the possibility of former Crown Prince Carol's return to Roumania may be involved in the conspiracy. Julius Maniu, who succeeded M. Bratianu as head of the Roumanian government, is leader of the Roumanian peasant party. He took office with his cabinet on Nov. 11, 1928. Before his succession to power Maniu was credited with favoring the return of Carol to his native land. After he became premier, however, Maniu came to advocate Carol's return.
