INSANITY PLEA THOUGHT TO BE DEPUTY'S HOPE

Doctors' Examination Of Stephenson Seen As Evidence Defense Seeks Last Resort

Chris C. Stephenson, Seminole County deputy sheriff indicted for first degree murder in connection with the slaying of Homer Jenkins, may resort to a plea of insanity in his legal battle to escape the electric chair, it became known here today.

A group of five physicians yesterday afternoon examined Stephenson upon the request of his counsel. Denial was made that the group had been appointed as a sanity commission but it was explained to newspapermen that blood tests were made and that the deputy was subjected to a rigid examination by the doctors. No report was given out as to the results obtained.

Members of the examining group were: Dr. W. H. Spiess of Orlando, Dr. S. T. Colley of Tallahassee, Dr. M. J. Hamann of Gainesville, Dr. E. E. Stevens of Ft. Pierce, Dr. J. N. Tolson, both of Sanford. With Stephenson's trial set for Monday, reports in court house circles at Tallahassee confirmed the belief that counsel for the deputy would rely on a defense built around a contention that Stephenson was not responsible for his acts because of mental deficiencies.

J. W. Hunter, state attorney, had nothing to say today regarding the latest turn in the case and gave no indication as to what the state expected to do to combat the testimony of experts.

The grand jury, which returned an indictment against Stephenson Monday afternoon, recessed yesterday afternoon without bringing in a true bill against either New Homer Jenkins or Miss Bonnie Holland, held since the slaying of the victim and that they were not being detained as material witnesses in the trial of the deputy. Indications were that no action would be taken against the woman if she were not a party to the slaying of the victim.

EX-GERMAN NAVY LEADER ATTACKS DEBT AGREEMENT

Von Tirpitz Declares Treaty Will Spell Nation's Bankruptcy

BERLIN, July 10.—The reparations burden which the Allies have imposed upon Germany is deplorable and resented by former Grand Admiral Alfred von Tirpitz, head of the German Navy in wartime. Von Tirpitz' statement, a German version of other expressions of opinion are timely, now that the Young plan for a payment program has been accepted by the Allies and American experts, although it has not been officially ratified by the interested governments. Another circumstance that makes this opportunity is that an international conference of the interested powers will be held early next month to consider the political aspects of the reparations settlement.

Admiral von Tirpitz' statement follows: "There exists no moral obligation for Germany to pay reparations, because Germany neither prepared the war nor caused its immediate outbreak. But since we were defeated, a Treaty of Versailles obligated us to pay reparations. The Treaty provided, however, only for satisfaction of private property damage within 30 years.

"Nowhere in this Treaty is there any talk of war reparations which we should pay to anyone except the victors. The Treaty of Versailles was a peace treaty, not a reparations treaty. NEW ORLEANS TRAM STRIKE LOOMS BLACK

Sympathy Walkout Is Threatened Following Move To Swear In 250 U.S. Deputies

NEW ORLEANS, July 10.—(INS)—A general walkout affecting tram workers and trackmen in sympathy with the striking New Orleans Street Car Company employees here was threatened today.

The tentative walkout was voted at an executive session late last night by representatives of a majority of trade unions here and will go into effect if the New Orleans Public Service Inc. continues its policy of ignoring the carmen's union, it was announced.

No time limit was given in the public service company, which presumably had flatly refused to deal with the union. Officials of the company, learning of the latest move by the unions, declined to comment.

The threatened general strike involving virtually every trackman in New Orleans, would place almost every activity at a stand still here.

Meanwhile, in the face of the potential wholesale walkout, United States marshals prepared to move in 250 special deputies to quell the strike. The federal injunction to restrict the strike was being interpreted with the operation of three cars. The order was obtained by bondholders of the public service company.

NEW MONEY PUT INTO USE TODAY THROUGHOUT U.S.

Currency Is Smaller And Will Effect Big Saving To Country

WASHINGTON, July 10.—(INS)—The first time since 1861 the U. S. government today will start a complete reorganization of its currency system. Last night there were in the hands of Federal reserve banks and centers by various districts \$2,800,000,000 in U. S. notes from \$1 to \$20.

That amount will satisfy half the country, in the opinion of the Treasury, acting Secretary of the Treasury, Ogden L. Mills, having announced about \$2,000,000,000 of 200,000,000 pieces eventually will be replaced.

Assistant Secretary H. H. Bond said that the department stores in New York, Chicago and Philadelphia had requisitioned large amounts of the new money but that all of the orders would not be filled and banks probably will be required for a few days to process anyone to trade in old for new bills.

"No effort will be made to push redemption of the old money," Bond said. "The worn out currency will be taken in as fast as offered, being replaced with the new money, which is about one third smaller than the old."

PENSACOLA, Fla., July 10.—(INS)—Rep. Thomas Yon of the Third Florida District said here today that a fund of \$5,000,000 will be sought for work at the Pensacola Air Station this year.

The Navy Department is planning to spend that much money here, he said. "I've been cooperating with officials at Washington and have also conferred with officials at the Pensacola Air Station and am sure the money will be appropriated."

Lack Of Fuel Supply Causes Landing Of Pathfinder Headed For Imperial City

SANTANDER, Spain, July 10.—(INS)—The trans-Atlantic monoplane Pathfinder, which was forced by lack of fuel to land here after a flight from Old Orchard, Me., hopped off for Rome at 11:18 A. M. Spanish Time or 5:18 Eastern Standard Time.

The Pathfinder was refueled and overhauled during the morning and found in perfect condition for continuation of the flight. The airman Roger Q. Williams and Lewis Yancey, said they were confident they could finish the flight without a stop, reaching Rome this evening.

"We trust that we could not make the flight in a single hop as we anticipated but the long voyage over the Atlantic through misty weather was an achievement which gave us much satisfaction," said Williams.

A large crowd gathered at the Alberca air field to give the fliers a send off. The airman flew nearly 2,000 miles from Old Orchard to America in about 21 hours and 50 minutes, landing at 9:30 Spanish Time last night.

Williams was at the controls when the Pathfinder took off. He headed the plane northward then veered sharply to the east, following the coast line. He disappeared from sight in three minutes after the plane took the air.

Mounted police patrolled the air field keeping back the crowd. The airman had a good night's rest and was severely refreshed after their long and arduous sea. They left their hotel shortly after 9 o'clock, driving in an automobile to the air field. There they made a careful examination of the Pathfinder's especially the motor.

The motor was examined also by Spanish mechanics. They likewise found everything in good shape except the cover of the gasoline tank which required some slight repairs.

Spanish officials shook hands with the Americans in farewell with the wings and a successful flight to Rome. The plane was covered with inscriptions when it left Alberca. Many persons who got near enough to watch their signatures on the wings and tail were there as "Viva United States."

The crowd at the field kept gathering throughout the morning and there were thousands when Williams made his perfect landing. The crowd cheered and tossed into the air until the plane dwindled to a speck in the sky and disappeared entirely.

News from Santander that the Pathfinder had hopped off at 11:18 A. M. Spanish Time, caused rejoicing throughout Rome. Preparations for the welcome of the brave airman were rushed to completion. If the plane does not arrive before sundown beacons will be lighted in all the air fields around the city and kept burning until the airman are safely on the ground.

The airline distance from Santander is approximately 850 miles, but advice indicated that the Americans were taking a longer course by way of France, which would stretch the distance covered to about 1,000 miles or more.


