

Russian Science Marches Steadily On With New Claims To Top Inventions

NEW YORK—(AP)—Russian science marches steadily on. There has been nothing like it since Tom Swift, whose real name, by the way, was Swiftski. Tom was actually born on a Siberian steppe, stolen from his peasant parents by gypsies and brought here as a boy and sold by the gypsies to the General Electric Corporation.

Soviet Russia, it turns out, is even more of an inventor's heaven than a worker's paradise. Every few weeks Tass, the official government news agency, discovers a forgotten Russian scientist who really is responsible for some basic invention claimed by the capitalistic western world.

The latest is Comrade Pavel Schilling, who Tass says put together a telephone 44 years before Alexander Graham Bell built his first, amech. Comrade Schilling, who must have hid his light under a carter's bushel, is also credited with making the first submarine cable and inventing the original system for stringing telegraph wires on poles.

Other wonders previously claimed for Soviet scientists are the invention of the radio, the electric light, the airplane, the parachute, the transformer, and structural steel. They also are held to have discovered penicillin and the electrical nature of lightning.

This theory makes Johnny-comelys of Marconi, Thomas Edison, Benjamin Franklin, and the Wright brothers. About all the Western World now can claim at its own are the ice cream cone, the five-cent cigar, nylon, pyramid clubs, the chocolate sundae, and the two-way stretch girls.

Some other well-known Soviet inventions have been overlooked by Tass and Pravda. Russia invented the veto in the field of international diplomacy. It was also the first modern nation to endorse free speech—in a conjoined way.

As time goes on, it 'couldn't' be too difficult to prove that basketball, which some folks think originated in 1891 in Springfield, Mass., actually was first played with goat bladders on the banks of the Volga in the 14th century.

There is also some evidence that Frank Merriwell (real name Merriwell) was hired by Yale from a Moscow high school to be the Princeton with his famous "jump ball." Or was it his son, Dick Merriwell, who invented the "jump ball" pitch? History is getting so fuzzy.

A big question is raised by the fact Russia claims to have invented electric lights, telephones and radios but did so little with them for so many years. Is there a Communist plot behind this? If Russia invented the machine age, why did it come to flower?

(Continued From Page One) develop their East-West economic relations "whether the Western occupation powers permit or not."

Other speakers said in sombre tones that Germany "is in a state of emergency."

Behind all this was a clear effort of Eastern German Communists to undermine the Western powers by sharpshooting at the Western currency reform, the European Recovery Program, the Ruhr control plan and the proposed Western German government.

In another quarter of Germany, high ranking Americans received cordially a French suggestion that the U. S. and France swap parts of their zones to put France in charge of all Baden and the U. S. in charge of all Wurttemberg.

The key provision of the pact is article five, which says: "The parties agree that an armed attack against one or more of them in Europe or North America shall be considered an attack against them all; and consequently they agree that, if such an armed attack occurs, each of them, in exercise of the right of individual or collective self defense recognized by article 51 of the charter of the United Nations, will assist the party or parties so attacked by taking forthwith, individually and in concert with the other parties, such action as it deems necessary, including the use of armed force, to restore and maintain the security of the North Atlantic area."

That is the long-debated section which, although stopping short of an automatic pledge to go to war, is designed to put Russia on notice that an attack on any of the Western Powers would instantly be met by all of them.

(Continued From Page One) advise the legislators. He would not comment on the apparent defeat of his civil rights program, the house "local option" rent control bill or the tabling of his nomination of former Gov. Mon. C. Wallgren of Washington as chairman of the National Security Resources Board.

The President, who said he now tips the scales at 170 pounds, bed-side weight, appeared for his conference in light blue cotton trousers and a blue sports skirt, open at the neck.

SINLE VIBES TODAY

No panic or disease nor misfortune can take your store of wisdom and understanding. You can take it with you, top.—Pr. 8:13: Happy is the man that findeth wisdom and the man that getteth understanding.

President Truman says that the Southern Democrats who defeated his civil rights proposals are not "good Democrats". But the corrupt politicians of Tammany Hall, the Hague and Pendergast machines are, he probably thinks.

The United States paid out \$115,000,000 in jobless benefits during the single month of February alone. This is at the rate of \$1,380,000,000 a year. Yet we do not have money enough to build veterans' hospitals, necessary highways, or adequate sewerage systems.

Up in West Virginia a couple of young bucks got drunk in the club car of Baltimore & Ohio Railroad train, held up the passengers, shot two or three of them, and robbed them of \$1,500. Now the mother of one of them brings suit for \$50,000 damages against the railroad on the grounds that it sold him the liquor. It seems he was only 19 year old and too young to know any better. You can't win in this racket. No matter what you do it's the other fellow's fault.

A Senate committee has approved a bill providing three hundred million dollars as federal aid to education. The government would divide the money among the various states in proportion to their average annual income and the number of their children. Thus the poor states would receive more than the wealthier states, tending to equalize educational opportunities throughout the nation. Three hundred millions dollars is just a drop in the bucket when it comes to education on a national scale, but it would help. And at least it would be money spent for a worthy purpose.

Governor Warren says he has a tax plan which will provide the necessary additional revenue which the State needs if it is to meet its proposed \$40,000,000 additional expenses. But the Legislature in voting more funds for the State should not forget the plight of the cities. Any plan which takes into consideration the need for more funds for highways, schools, and welfare which are the principal state expenses, should also take into consideration the need for more streets, sidewalks, better sewers, sewage disposal, hospitals, parks playgrounds, and recreational facilities which are the primary responsibilities of the cities. But the cities cannot carry out their responsibilities unless the Legislature makes it possible for them to obtain the required funds.

Negroes, misled by rosy promises in President Truman's civil rights bill, should not be disappointed over its defeat in the Senate. There were only four civil rights proposals: 1) to abolish the poll tax (Florida abolished the poll tax year ago); 2) to make lynching a federal offense (There were two lynchings in the South last year, none at all in Florida); 3) to abolish segregation on buses and trains (There may be some inconvenience to those negroes who travel a great deal as a result of this type of segregation, but we doubt if this is a major concern of most of them); and 4) to end racial discrimination in employment (Those negroes who want some white man's job and feel they have been discriminated against in trying to get it on account of their race might be interested in this one). But that is all. Nothing at all here, in all these much talked of civil rights bills to pay them more money, to loosen the work they have to do, to provide better housing or anything for them or their own streets and towns. Only the corrupt politicians need care over the defeat of the civil rights bill.

Predicting Waves

The average fellow is well pleased if he can learn a day ahead, or even in the early morning, what the day's weather is to be like, so that he can make plans accordingly for the job of outdoor carpentering, the fishing trip, or family picnic. He can learn this from the Weather Bureau, which isn't wrong nearly so often as it is reputed to be. But certain workers along the seacoast, such as fishermen, shippers, and harbor engineers, need to know something else. How big will the waves be? It may make quite a difference to a crew putting out for a day's fishing in a small boat, or shepherding a barge across a stretch of open water. Until now there has been no way of accurately forecasting waves, because on a serene and sunny day there may be exceptionally heavy waves from a storm thousands of miles away.

The College of Engineering of the University of California has come up with a formula for forecasting waves, said to be "remarkably accurate". Now the engineers are compiling a record of daily wave conditions along the Pacific Coast and at the island of Guam, from which seasonal charts will be worked out.

Some day engineers planning coastal works may be able to consult a record and find out how much beating of waves the construction must endure. And fishermen, shippers, and the family man planning a day at the shore may be able to call the Weather Bureau and ask: "How big will the waves be tomorrow?"

Thrift

Such sayings as "Waste not, want not", and "Look after the pennies and the dollars will look after themselves", are seldom heard nowadays and not generally heeded in this land of plenty.

The principle back of them still motivates the French people, however, according to observers. The French army uses helmets issued in 1914 and hauls coal in horse-drawn carts. Twenty-year-old taxis are still running, and some patrons of good restaurants bring in their own sandwiches to eat with their orders of coffee. Cigarette butts are retrieved and saved in boxes, and the job of rag-picker is rewarded by very slim pickings. French janitors are willing to work without pay in hotels and other buildings occupied by Americans, claiming they can live on throw-aways.

Some of the French thrift results from present necessity, some of it from long habit. Americans would not by any means agree that there is wisdom in thrift carried to such a degree as the use of horse-drawn carts or the retrieval of cigarette butts. But there is provocation to thought in the report that Frenchmen can live on what Americans cast away. Open-handedness, like thrift, is not an unmixed virtue. It might pay us, in the use of some of our material blessings, to throw less away and become more thrifty.

Study Of Trade

There is a piece of wisdom in the proposal of Senator Walter F. George of Georgia, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, with regard to the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act. He urged that the two-year extension of the act in its original form be promptly enacted, but that in the two-year period Congress do a careful job of exploring the objections which have been made to the act and rewrite it so as to meet the ones which seem to be valid.

A point made by Senator George was that business should be able to know what to expect in the future. This is probably not so much a matter of what the act says as of how it is used, and how carefully business concerns keep track of negotiations being carried on. There have been complaints against the trade agreements by various industries; a patient study of these by Congress might yield interesting information.

The trouble is that the two years probably will not be used to study and rewrite the act. It has long been the habit of Congress, as it has been of many individuals, to let such tasks go until the last minute. If the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act is extended to 1951, it probably will be 1951 before Congress gives it another serious thought.

The University Of Florida

Faculty Salaries and the Budget of the University of Florida. Editor's Note:—This is the fifth in a series of statements explaining the budget needed by the University of Florida to enable it to accommodate its 10,000 students, prepared at the request of the Alumni Association by J. Hillis Miller, President of the University.

By President J. Hillis Miller, University of Florida. GAINESVILLE, Mar. 21 (Special)—The University of Florida is in competition with all other higher institutions in the nation for well trained faculty. A study has been made of the salaries in 23 state and private universities that are similar in size and character to the University of Florida. The average salaries paid to the various faculty ranks in those 23 institutions are as follows:

This salary schedule means not only that we are not in a favorable position to attract outstanding professors to the University of Florida, but also we cannot compete with other universities in holding the good people already on our staff.

The average salary for deans and directors at the University of Florida is now \$7,200. To fill vacancies in these positions the University has had to pay salaries ranging above this amount. Such salaries are required to get men of high calibre and dynamic leadership, who are both sound scholars and good administrators. The University of Florida cannot afford to be without such leadership. The average salary for full professors at the University of Florida is now less than \$6,000 and the top salary is \$7,500. Our competitors pay an average salary of nearly \$7,000 and a top of more than \$9,700. The University of Florida is fortunate in having on its staff some professors with regional and national reputations as scholars and as teachers. One, for example, is recognized as a leading authority on citrus culture. No other single industry is so important to Florida. This professor's contributions to problems of citrus production make his services more valuable than any salary could recognize. We must not let California or Texas entice him away simply because we are not willing to pay salaries above \$7,500. The price of a box of oranges is determined by supply and demand. We have not adjusted the salaries of deans and professors at the University according to their supply and demand. Must our youth be deprived of outstanding and inspirational teaching because of salary and budgetary limitations?

THE WORLD TODAY

Paul G. Hoffman, Economic Administrator, told a dozen Swedish labor leaders in Washington the other day that Russia won't start a war so long as "the free peoples of the world stand together." That likely is true, and it would have been interesting, if Mr. Hoffman had expanded on that idea a bit. Who are the "free peoples" and what makes 'em that way? That and a lot of other questions must be answered if we are to navigate the present troubled waters successfully. It is a problem of education.

In recognition of this fact, America's educational leaders are planning changes in curricula to deal with the questions growing out of a continuing cold war. The Education Council, a commission of the National Educational Association, of which President Dwight Eisenhower of Columbia University is a member, conferred in Washington last week. Dr. John K. Norton of the University of Chicago, chairman of the commission, said: "The prospect that the cold war will continue into the adulthood of children now in school intensifies the responsibilities of teachers in the present international crisis."

But a commission expects to make recommendations in the spring. They will be designed to guide teachers and to implement American foreign policy. A great problem has revolved about the question of whether Communism should be dealt with in the classroom and, if so, just how. Many educators have reached the conclusion that the facts about Communism should be presented but in a wholly objective manner. There are many queries which the inquiring young mind (and the old one, for that matter) would like answered. One of them probably is why it should have fallen to the great Russian empire to become the homeland of Bolshevism. The answer isn't complicated and it explains a lot.

Russia under the Czars was a land of darkness and despotism. There was one privileged class—the aristocracy. The "people" were serfs. Many of them always were ready to revolt against their masters, and it fell to Bolshevism with its direct-action to engineer the successful revolution. Unhappily, however, Bolshevism also came by a minority.

This same thing has happened in other countries which have had despotic rulers. To illustrate: During a trip to a Balkan country before the war I visited the estates of one of the landed gentry. He was having some huge excavations made in muddy terrain in order to create some fish ponds. The terribly heavy labor was done largely by peasant workers working in the mire with shovels. My host laughed as he boasted that he hired these girls for the equivalent of about 15 cents a day plus some soup at noon time. He also sent them home in trucks at night.

Well, the rank and file in a country like that will turn for relief to almost any man which looks promising. The strike struck at an opportune moment. However, here again we have minority rule and not the majority rule which characterizes the democracies. Countries under minority rule are not the "free peoples" of which Mr. Hoffman spoke. So the educational experts more and more seem to be leaning to the idea that all these pertinent facts should be placed before students of an understanding age. The students need to know not only the cause of strikes "free peoples" but what keeps them that way.

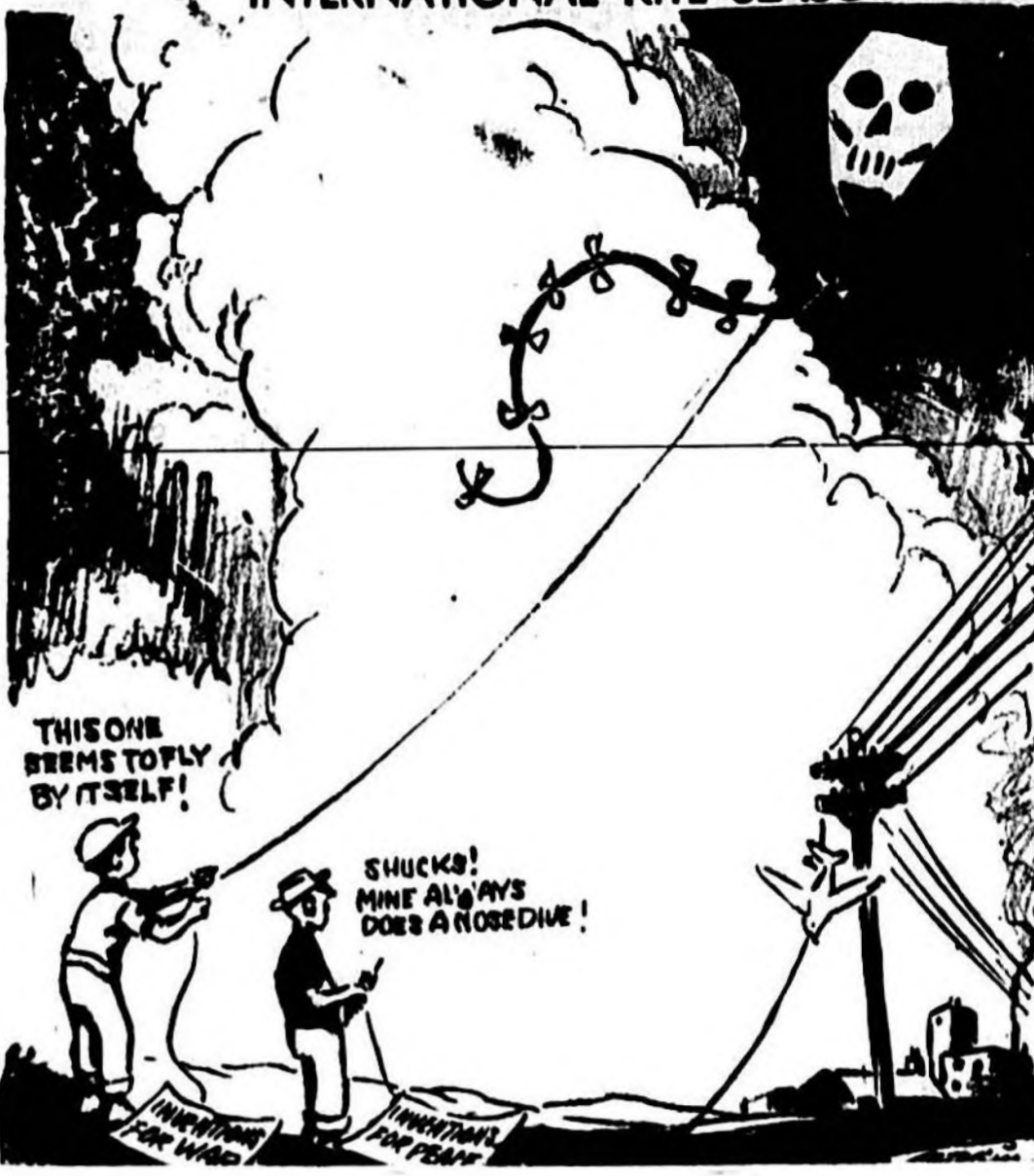

(Continued From Page One) proved the Administration bill by a straight party vote, 8 Democrats for and 5 Republicans against. This is the same bill which now is the subject of House hearings. Those hearings end today. The bill is sponsored in the Senate by Senator Elbert Thomas (D-Utah) and in the House by Rep. Lesinski (D-Mich.).

And group of Southern Democrats quietly sought support for a plan to upset the Administration's minimum wage bill. They were asking House members to pledge votes for a substitute measure which would limit the wage floor from 10 to 25 cents above its present 40 cents an hour. However, it would leave the rest of the federal wage-hour law as it is.

THE GARDEN GATE

By MRS. J. L. INGLEBY

Garden Club Program, Station WTRR, Monday at 7:30 P. M. Fertilization is not the only spring tonic needed by garden shrubs. Judicious pruning is equally important to many of them. Of course, the pruning cannot all be done in early spring, since the time for pruning varies with the type of plant, but as growth starts in spring is the most important single time for garden pruning.

Poinsettias have gone through the winter unharmed in most parts of the state, but are looking very unkempt and scraggly if they are still unpruned. Now that danger of frost is over, they should be cut back to a height of 10 or 12 inches, so that new shoots for next winter's bloom can start low. Evergreen hedges of most kinds should be pruned now also, since the stimulus to growth of buds given by the pruning operation will not result in exposing tender shoots to cold injury. On the other hand, azaleas have already started growth in many areas, and it is better to delay pruning such bushes until early summer, when the current flush of growth has matured. Then the terminal growth can be pinched or cut back to induce many lateral buds to develop
