## STOCK PRICES RALLY DESPITE EARLY LOSSES

Drop Of Five To 14 Points In Morning Business Overcome In Afternoon

Activity Of Bears Seems Disrupted

Trading During First Half Hour Of Day's Session As Enormous

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—(INS)—New York's huge and remarkable selling wave engulfed the stock market near the close of the day, driving out the beneficial effect of the early rally and leaving most of the specialists' favorites worse off than they were at yesterday's close.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—(INS)—The Bearish campaign on New York Stock Exchange was abruptly checked today, not entirely stopped. Stock prices rallied sharply after declining two to 14 points at the opening on the heels of the sharp break yesterday that wiped out gains made by Americans in their buying and selling of stocks.

Early expectation of America's gaining 14 points at the opening was belied yesterday after the opening flurry and shot up to 40 at one o'clock this afternoon, an advance of 8 points from yesterday's close.

"At the hour punctuated by the end of the session, the market was stronger with the bears' power over control of the market. Trading was heavy, the market being half an hour behind in recording sales.

Wm. A. Astor, at 260, was 9 points higher than yesterday's closing at one o'clock U. S. Steel, which opened 8 points above the 260 mark, reached after the opening flurry and shot up to 40 at one o'clock this afternoon, an advance of 8 points from yesterday's close.

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A block of 5,000 shares of Radio opened at 261, down 14 points from Thursday's close and 30 points from yesterday's peak. Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, Vins Talking Machine and other high-priced favorites moved down about 6 points on the average, which was to be expected as the market afternoons on Thursday's break.

## Chicago Suburb Is Stirred Over Slaying Of Chief Of Police By Gangster Group

Officer's Head Is Plowed From Body As He Sat In Home Reading Newspaper; Motive For Act Is Puzzle

THIS ACT OF DEATH (INS)—An officer's head was plowed from his body as he sat in his home reading a newspaper. The motive for the act is a puzzle.

He was found by his wife, Ruth, a widow, in the basement of their home. She was reading her newspaper when she heard a noise which she thought was the parents when the shots were fired. The other children were asleep.

Neighbors in the snow outside started their voices from the front door. When she had heard the back of his chair, she fled through the closed window. The police who took charge of the investigation were puzzled as to the motive for the killing. Through a chief of police, a man named Peter Kudinowski, 36, confessed slayer of 1-year-old Joseph Stettinius of New York, said today. Kudinowski had little "dope" in New York and buried the child in a hole spot in New Jersey where he had a shoot.

The first thing that put the idea in my head was the Hickman case (California), Kudinowski said. "I tried to forget about it but it kept coming back."

"Once I tried to get a little girl to come with me but before I could get hold of her she got scared and ran away."

Then there was a boy. He frightened me. So when they came to me I made up my mind. I would take no chances in letting him loose."

Kudinowski will be checked for his bank in the hope of solving other cases of a like nature and unexplained disappearances of little children. Particularly will he be asked to throw light on the unexplained disappearances of four other children in the past.

New Jersey officers arrived here this morning to take Kudinowski back to the state where he killed the boy.

They planned to spend the entire day questioning the confessed slayer and probably will start the New Jersey with their posse on Friday.

Kudinowski awaited the arrival of the officials with some apprehension. To all appearances he is anxious to start the trip to New Jersey, where death probably awaits him in the electric chair.

"I realize fully what I did," Kudinowski said today. "I am sorry and ready to take the consequences."

Police also are trying to substantiate Kudinowski's claim that he killed Harry Quinn, a fellow laborer in Scranton, Pa., in 1924. Quinn disappeared at that time and has not been seen since.

In response to other questions, Kudinowski said Erwin always had instructed sales managers to "discourage" clients from insuring their bonds but to have them insured if they desired. The insurance feature was to be used in the sale of New Jersey.

### Actress Leaves In Borrowed Boat For Tampa Ending Row

HAVANA, Dec. 7—(INS)—The Jolly Miss Frances Porter, former Atlanta, Ga., newspaper writer and actress, who theoretically solved the "jolly roger" over her borrowed private yacht, the Malvern, was in the high seas today hopeful that her troubles in Cuba are over.

The owner of the yacht, C. T. Whitehead, Atlanta millionaire, who is under a doctor's care suffering from scratches and bruises he claims were inflicted by Miss Porter, was left behind.

When the Malvern sailed late yesterday, after a period of hectic times in this port, Miss Porter, said she expected to make port at Tampa, Fla., some time today. Clearance papers for the Malvern were obtained by the United States Consul. Cuban immigration and police authorities breath a sigh of relief when the Malvern was gone. The departure of Miss Porter solved a problem which was puzzling officials.

Immigration authorities had a deportation warrant for Miss Porter and the police had a warrant charging her with assaulting Whitehead, but both have been quashed. Whitehead was still confined to his hotel room, but was said to be better. It is understood that fears of blood poison may have now been allayed by medical treatment.

Unless he decides to stop over in Mexico he will sail from some Caribbean port (not yet selected) directly for Florida upon the U.S. arrival. Utah.

The Maryland will anchor off Antofagasta tomorrow morning where Mr. Hoover will greet a Bolivian delegation headed by the Bolivian foreign minister. The President-elect will not go ashore. Bolivia has no coast which made it necessary for the Bolivian official to travel for a foreign port.

Reports that the recent Chilean earthquake had interrupted rail

way traffic from Chile across the Andes. Argentine were officially denied in a radiogram received on board today. Should there have been any such interruption Mr. Hoover planned to continue on the Maryland round Cape Horn, to Buenos Aires. Now, however, the original plan will stand.

The Hoover party will leave the Maryland at Valparaiso on Monday morning. They will travel by electric railway to Santiago where they will spend the night. On Tuesday the overland journey for Buenos Ayres will start.

The mess bill of Mr. Hoover and his immediate party, including Ambassador Henry P. Fletcher, has been less than \$4 a day since the warship left San Pedro, Calif., on Nov. 19, it was revealed today when settlements were made up to Dec. 1. The entire bill from Nov. 19 to Dec. 1 was \$50.

### MARKET DROPS AFTER JOLTING OF YESTERDAY

(Continued From Page 1) had increased \$100,000,000. This was a distinct surprise for the bulls, who had counted on an easing of the burden of money borrowing against the carrying of stocks of all grades.

The market closed over in the first hour, with sales above 1,000,000 shares, against 525,000 in the same period yesterday. A block of 20,000 shares of Sinclair Oil was turned over in one transaction at a loss of 2 3/4 points from Thursday's close. Standard Oils were weak, and most of the well-known copper, motor car and steel stocks suffered a shrinkage of a point or two in the early trading.

Call money renewals were at 10 per cent which was 2 per cent less at Thursday's close. Through the highest renewal rate in 8 years: These were many bankers and brokers in Wall Street who were ready to forecast easier money conditions before the end of the month, despite the very heavy requirements for the year ended. Close to a billion dollars will be needed to pay the January interest dividends, together with the settlement of other obligations of the big corporations.


