Europe, we read, has been divided into two blocs — blocs and blockheads.

America would make a mistake, it seems to us, to mist upon feeling the Soviet satellites in Europe. Why not let the Russians take care of them?

Pineapple pickers in Hawaii, who are among the world's poorest paid workers, are striking for higher wages at the very peak of the harvest season.

Federal statisticians have just figured it out that it costs \$695.33 a year to buy clothes for a family of five. And the community cynic says the sum on the right of the decimal is owed for labor.

Remember a few years ago during the presidential campaign when Roosevelt paid his respects in no uncertain terms to "Martin, Barton and Fish." Well, that same Joe Martin is the man who has now been designated as his successor to the presidency in case anything should happen to Harry Truman.

There may be a recession getting under way in some parts of the United States, but so far there has been no sign of it in Florida or the Southeast. Georgia, Florida, South Carolina and Alabama all report substantial gains in retail sales in May, and for the first five months of this year.

The old American habit of thrift has all but been destroyed by the vicissitudes of the past decade. There are today 60,000,000 jobs in the newspapers are proud to boast. The wages earned by labor are the highest in the nation's history. Everything that makes for prosperity is evident on every hand.

The growing power of the federal government is shown by a comparison of federal expenditures with those of cities and states during the past 35 or 40 years. In 1913 the federal government spent \$697,060,000, compared with \$359,000,000 for all the cities in the United States...

Europe Chooses

When Molotov said that the Marshall plan for the rehabilitation of Europe would lead to American interference in internal European affairs, what he undoubtedly meant was that it would lead to interference with Russia's aim of gathering all Europe within the net of Communism.

The ghost of Hitler must be laughing a sinister laugh. For the break between Russia and the other allies means, after all, a German victory. Reports from Germany show that this old technique of the Nazis, to divide and rule, is still the dream of countless Germans.

But the die-hard spirit of Nazism and the non-cooperative Soviets have reckoned as yet too soon. American aid, forced to defend the idea of democracy in war, was powerful. It must look pretty real still to countless Europeans who know now that Russian Communism means merely another form of the despotism they have learned to hate.

The withdrawal of Russia from the proposed co-operative plan to restore Europe may split that unhappy area, may mean the beginning of a new, as yet unforeseeable era on the continent. But America, Britain and France are going ahead anyway. Europeans must make a choice.

Some of the nations which have chosen to go with Russia have done so willingly. Some have made their choice under duress. Most Czechoslovaks are not very happy right now. But, they say, "What could we do?" The Russian Politburo will have something else to answer for, one of these days.

The Next Atomic Stage

A division of medical research has been set up by the United States Atomic Energy Commission to study health safeguards against atomic energy and its possible benefits as well. The board emphasizes the importance of recruiting young doctors and researchers and providing them with grants for life-time careers to develop and perpetuate this country's lead in atomic knowledge.

Here is the sobering realization on the part of the men entrusted with management of atomic energy that the great complex body of knowledge on this subject must be kept up to date, must be worked on continually. There is evidence, too, of our great interest in all this from the point of view of civilian safeguards and civilian health benefits as from any purely military aspect.

The discoverers have played their role. The time has come when the younger generation, those whom the war has left alive, must carry on the work begun when those tremendous forces were loosed at Hiroshima.

Saving The Teeth

A group of dental school experts discussing the cause and cure of tooth decay agrees that though the specific agent causing dental caries is yet to be isolated, the general cause is bacteria in the mouth.

One speaker declared that with proper instruction as to prevention visits to the dentist every six months might be unnecessary, while another authority insisted that the taste of Americans for sweets is the root of most of their dental trouble.

Most of us, however, will be unable to remember that long word and its application to our teeth. We shall merely continue to brush the teeth two or three times a day and see our dentist twice a year — if we are well-taught and conscientious.

If we are not we'll keep on having tooth trouble. Some of us will have it anyhow, for there are many things the best research dentists have been unable to find out. But the dentists who remember dentistry then and compare it with dentistry now, are thankful from the heart for the improvements in method already made.

mission agrees that the rebellion is being fostered by these countries.

In short, we have a situation which in any man's language amounts to war between Greece and her equally fiery neighbors. Yet the quarrel hasn't been labeled "war"—and we hope it won't be, because that would almost inevitably accentuate the difficulties already existing between Russia and the Western democracies.

Some of the little fellows are getting outspoken. For example, Albania has spat against the wind and had its say. General Dvornik, Albania's Communist premier, declared that the Greco-Albanian border incidents "are part of a general anti-democratic plan of Anglo-American reactionaries whose aim is to bring about a new war, recommended by Truman's Doctrine."

Well, of course, that's only Albania sounding off, but one can't overlook that Tirana's wagon is hitched to the Russian star. It would be interesting to know who thinks up such speeches for the hardy Albanian mountaineers.

In an event, one wonders whether for once Russia and the Western Allies might not agree to let the Security Council of the United Nations put the clamps on this whole Balkan show a wee bit.

Apropos of this though, London official sources yesterday said Britain was concerned over the wholesale arrests of Communists, trade unionists and leftwing liberals in Greece. Those sources also said the cabinet has received over signs that the Greek offensive against the guerrillas was failing, and that high-level Anglo-American talks might be initiated to consider possible future steps in Greece if the situation doesn't improve.

Another source, asked whether intervention by British or American troops in Greece was possible, gave this reply (our Uncle Sam please note):

"Britain has only 5,000 troops left in Greece. We certainly will not send more, x x x Greece is more a United States than a Brit-

ish responsibility, anyway."

America recognizes the responsibilities she has undertaken. Dwight Griswold, chief of the American Economic Aid Mission to Greece, announced last Friday in Washington that the United States was speeding an initial shipment of artillery, ammunition and other military equipment to Greek armed forces.

Ross, in discussing plans for the veto message, told reporters that the bill is expected to reach the White House some time during the day.

The House passed and sent to the Senate a compromise bill giving the Navy \$3,443,046,100 in cash appropriations for the current fiscal year. In addition, the bill carries \$248,000,000 in contract authority for the purchase of aircraft. It provides for a projected program supporting an average Navy strength of 395,000 enlisted and 42,000 officer personnel.

The total in the bill, as worked out by a Senate-House conference committee, is \$133,285,000 more than the amount originally voted by the House and approximately \$44,000,000 below the original Senate recommendations. It falls approximately \$234,000,000 short of the President's budget requests for cash appropriations.

Later, the House also accepted and sent to the Senate a joint conference committee's compromise of the \$55,000,000 legislative appropriations measure, the one which pays Congress' bill.

The House Armed Services Committee approved legislation overhauling the Army's court martial system.

The bill, drafted by a subcommittee headed by Rep. Elsdon (R-Ohio), provides:

- 1. For an independent judge advocate general's corp. he judge advocate general is given clemency and review authority not now vested in him.
2. Gives enlisted men the right to demand appointment of enlisted personnel to courts.
3. Prohibits commanders from exerting influence on members of military courts.
4. Makes it mandatory for the judge advocate general to review all court sentences whether or not they are suspended.

for their motion to quash the count.

Defense lawyers said the indictment count, charging Papy of \$500 and a case of Scotch whiskey if he would not vote on the bookie bill actually did not allege a crime under the Florida law.

They contended the Florida bribery law relates only to "bribery for acts of commission and not acts of omission."

There was no motion attacking two other counts in the indictment which charged Papy had first offered Odham \$100 to vote against the bill and had offered Rep. Clarence M. Camp II of Ocala \$100 to vote to send the measure to a committee which had previously rejected a similar bill.

Rep. Smith, one of the defense witnesses for whom subpoenas were issued today, is Rep. Odham's colleague from Seminole county and sits next to him in the House chamber.

In accusing Papy from the House floor, Odham said he had voted to send the bookie bill to the hostile committee on the advice of "my colleague" when he entered the chamber just as the roll call was being taken after Papy had made his first alleged bribery offer.

He said Papy approached him with his second offer the next day "as Mr. Cobb of Volusia and I were standing near the door discussing the cattle bill." Cobb also was on the list of defense witness subpoenas.

tion authorities should continue to promote self government in Germany and shift responsibility to German government agencies as far as military security will permit.

Government officials familiar with the document told reporters it is the product of many months of intensive study and review by the State, War and Navy departments.

The new directive, they said, takes cognizance of the new developments of the past 26 months and incorporates the views expressed by former Secretary of State Byrnes in his speech at Stuttgart last year and Secretary Marshall's statements toward Germany during the Moscow conference this Spring.

These officials said the directive represents a codification of policy developed since April, 1941. The new order reflects United States acceptance of the necessity of dealing with Germany in at least two parts, Western Germany and the Soviet Zone, but reiterates American desire for unification of the whole country.

The directive told Clay that the United States, while not wishing to impose its own "historically developed forms of democracy and social organization on Germany," nevertheless believes "equally that no other external forms should be imposed." This is presumed to be an order to Clay to oppose establishment of a Communistic or Socialistic form of government if forced on the Germans from the outside.

The directive continued: "Your government believes the ultimate constitutional form of German political life should be left to the decision of the German people made freely in accordance with democratic processes."

The United States reiterates its acceptance of the Potsdam formula for reparations but adds that the present low level of German industry "should not permanently limit Germany's industrial capacity."

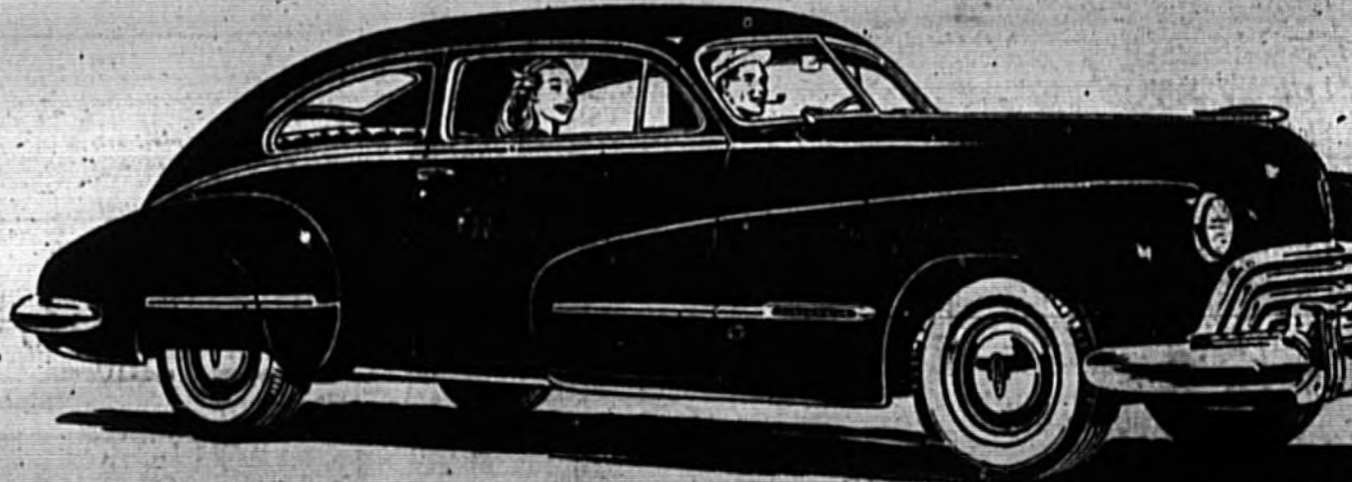

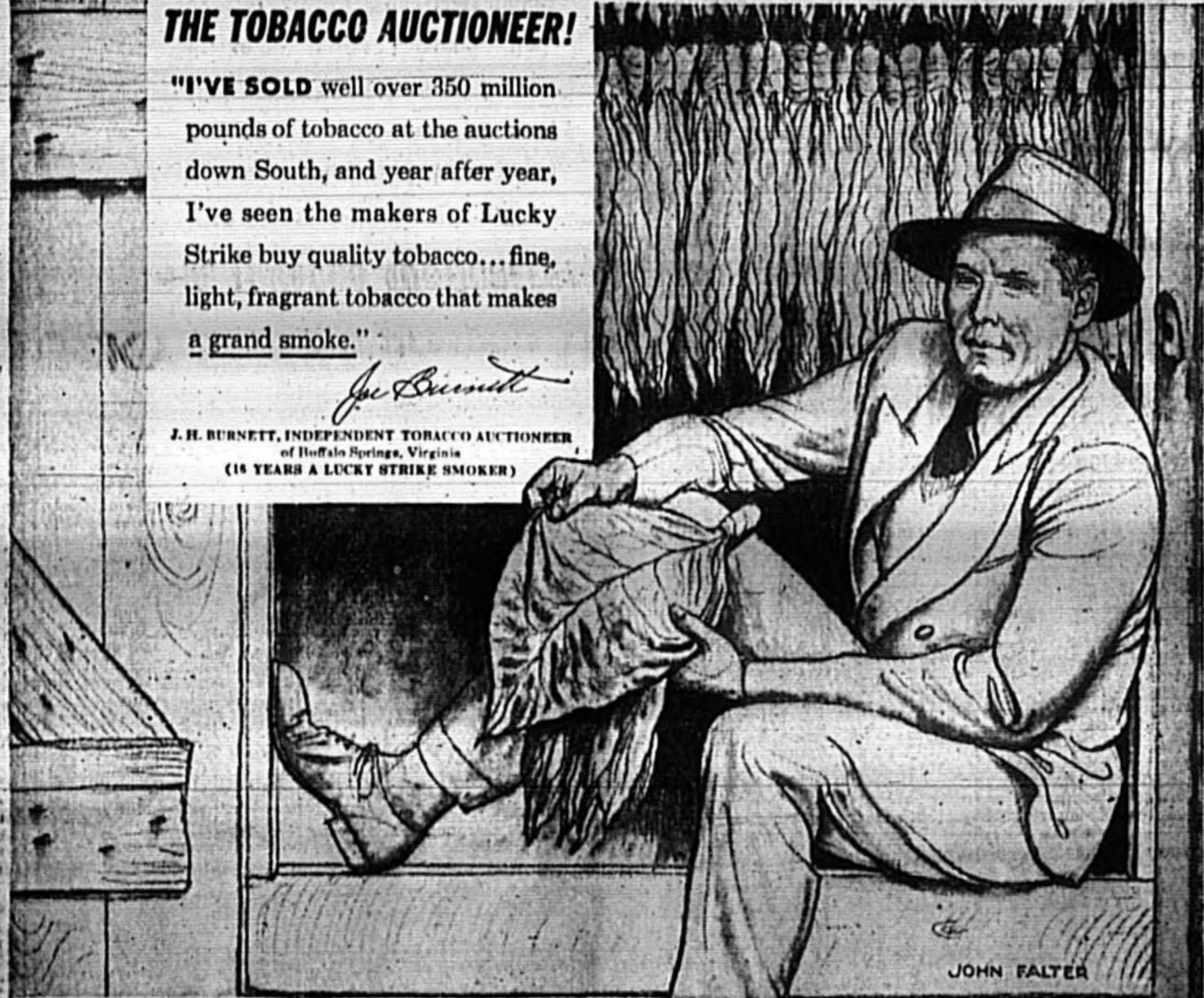
