Hospital Board Power To Levy Taxes Rapped

The County Commission to discuss the budget further with the board of trustees having an attorney other than the county attorney.

County Engineer William Bush recommended that the board look "into present procedures for allowing dredging in Seminole County. I wonder if the time has not come to call for public hearings to determine if dredging will affect adversely adjoining property owners."

On Record
JACKSONVILLE (AP) — The Florida Chamber of Commerce has gone on record as opposing "without qualification" the constitution revision commission's proposal annual legislative session.

High P. Emerson, president of the chamber, said the report was developed by the Chamber's Constitution Revision Committee. Emerson said biennial sessions would be a "real culprit" behind the high food prices in the federal government, not food stores, businessmen and farmers.

T. K. McClane said "The federal government and its 'spend now, pay later' policy has completely emptied the bank."

Soviet Appeal
MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet Communist party chief Leonid I. Brezhnev appealed today for international cooperation for peace. He made only a brief attack on U.S. action in Viet Nam and omitted the usual mention of Communist terms for ending the war.

Westinghouse Struck
PITTSBURGH (AP) — The Westinghouse Electric Corp., one of the nation's largest electrical products manufacturers, was struck today by the 14,000-member AFL-CIO International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers.

Picket lines were reported at a few Westinghouse locations throughout the country at 12:01 a.m. when the IBEW contract expired.

ACCRA, Ghana (AP) — Anti-Americanism is reported mounting in Ghana following the refusal of Ghana's government to release a Guinean delegation held hostage in Accra.

'Keep Chin Up'
CAMP STANLEY, Korea (AP) — "Keep your chin up and your chest out — we are proud of you and I came here to tell you so," President Johnson today told American troops confronting the Communists in Korea.

Viet Buildup?
SAIGON (AP) — U.S. military men say the Communists in Viet Nam are desperately in need of a significant battle victory, and probably are building up in the north for an attempt to achieve one.

Military sources say Gen. William G. Westmoreland, the U.S. commander in Viet Nam, is concerned about the demilitarized zone between North and South Viet Nam, created by the 1954 Geneva conference which divided the nation.

Baker Leads Commission In 'Change Of Heart' Policy For Facility

Ban on alcoholic beverages in the Civic Center may be lifted if city officials follow through on recommendations Monday by Commissioner Joe Baker.

Lack of use of the auditorium, lack of use of the youth wing and future use of the center as a convention site when the lakefront development is completed were some of the reasons cited.

Mutual Concert Association to hold their annual "champagne ball" at the Civic Center.

No action was taken on the request, pending policy changes.

Commissioners Earl Higginbotham, Dr. Vincent Roberts and M. L. Raborn Jr. agreed with Baker that the city should "liberalize" its policy on the matter, in order to allow greater use of the building by civic groups and clubs and be prepared "for the future."

"The youth wing is dead. It's been dead — we have just revived it to recognize it," declared Higginbotham.

"There simply is no other place in this community to hold a large ball, reception or other gathering. With the opening of Holiday Inn and the presence of convention groups here next year, we will need to utilize this \$250,000 facility to its greatest potential," he added.

"If the children were really scared, I would not suggest this change in policy, but most of the time there are less than a dozen kids there, mostly playing pool. We are keeping huge gatherings of adults out on account of a handful of children," Baker said.

Commissioners agreed that changes would have to be made in regulations regarding use of the center in order to protect the city against possible damage or liability, under the broadened use.

W. E. Knowles, city manager and William Hutchison, city attorney were instructed to go over the present regulations, investigate bonding procedures and present commissioners with proposals for necessary changes.

Question of permitting use of alcoholic beverages at the center apparently was triggered by appeal from officials of the

Hunt Escapee From Oviado Road Gang
A 34-year-old Miami man described by police as "extremely dangerous yesterday escaped from an Oviado prison road gang."

The escapee, Albert G. Bryant, was serving 20 years for forgery. Capt. L. L. Cone of the prison farm said he also faced a charge of intent to commit first degree murder.

Cone said Bryant was not tracked by dogs through a heavily wooded area last night but failed to find him.

Officers described Bryant as 5-foot-10, 150 pounds, with dark, receding hair and hazel eyes. He has bullet scars on his ankle, arm and leg.

Sanford City Commissioners stood fast on their previously declared determination not to let school buses use Holly Avenue, despite an appeal by bus drivers' safety committee Monday.

They also objected to the buses using residential streets through Country Club Manor and demanded that the bus routing be changed to use French Avenue.

Mrs. Lottie Broadway, spokeswoman for the bus safety committee told commissioners the group was "not speaking for the school board or for Herbert Muse (transportation director)."

"We are a newly organized group, representing the school bus drivers and we feel that Holly Avenue is the safest route, less hazardous than Country Club Manor or French Avenue," she declared.

She pointed out that the long convoy of buses running between Sanford Junior High School and Seminole High would slow traffic and because

Sanford Ponders Fate Of Trailer Hazards

Definitions of trailer, camper and mobile home is creating problems for City Commissioners and annoyance for home owners, within Sanford city limits.

Wording of the city ordinance appears to permit parking of "trailers" at residences if they are "in an enclosure or padlock."

Attempts by Lincol Hissler, city building inspector to enforce the ordinance brought angry protests from residents with trailers who declared it was "silly" to have to build a carport or shelter over a trailer.

"Have you ever tried to back a trailer between two posts? one protesting woman asked.

Protesting residents also demanded to know "why owners are permitted to park big boats in their yard, but not camper-type vehicles or other types of trailers?"

Commissioners agreed that interpretation of the ordinance needs study and asked Hissler to meet with City Attorney W. G. Hutchison and City Manager W. E. Knowles to see if changes need be made.

Commissioners said the intent of the ordinance was to prevent people from using trailers as living quarters and creating "unsanitary conditions and health problems."

So, What Happened?

Question by city commissioners of "what happened to our new sign ordinance?" went unanswered Monday. In the absence of City Attorney William Hutchison.

Prompted by new requests by local business firms for permission to erect signs, commissioners declared presentation of the new regulations is "taking too long and we ought to get on with it."

Proposals for rewriting the present ordinance have been delayed from meeting to meeting for six months with Hutchison repeatedly saying the new ordinance is "not ready yet."

Decision to change the ordinance originated when Jim Spencer, local restaurateur, erected a new sign on his property after permission had been denied both

Mystery Slayer's 3rd Victim Dies

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Mrs. Robert W. Sims is dead, the third victim of a mystery slayer who invaded her home 10 days ago.

Mrs. Sims died Monday night, a bullet still in her head, without having regained consciousness.

Her husband and their youngest daughter, 12-year-old Joy, had died the night of the shooting. The oldest daughter, Norma, 16, found the three tied in a bedroom. Each had been shot, and the girl had also been stabbed seven times.

Mrs. Sims, a 34-year-old church secretary, had clung to life in a respirator at Memorial Hospital.

Authorities had hoped she would be able to give them a clue to the murderer.

Police said neither sex nor robbery appeared to be the slaying motive. They continued a far-reaching investigation.

A funeral service will be held at 10 a.m. Wednesday for an attractive, dark-haired Mrs. Sims. Burial will be in Meridian, Miss. Her husband and daughter were buried there last week.

No decision had been reached about the future of Norma and her sister, Judith Ann, also 16. Halloween trick or treat activities were curtailed in Tallahassee. Police had warned parents to keep children at home. Some children set out before sunset. There were parties in some schools after classes.

Kirk, High To Debate On TV Sunday

MIAMI (AP) — Democrat Robert King High and Republican Claude Kirk, in the home stretch of their campaign for governor, will have a final face-to-face confrontation on television in Miami Sunday. That is two days before the election.

Their debate will be on station WTVT (Channel 7) at 5:30 p.m. Sunday. They had two TV confrontations in Jacksonville and Miami.

High, who flew to Lake-Land to carry his campaign to voters in the citrus and phosphate regions. He planned stops from Frostproof to Inverness.

Kirk set out for Cape Kennedy and Daytona Beach on a tour to include nearly every population center. He has scheduled visits to Orlando, Tampa, Clearwater, Tallahassee, Miami, Pensacola, Fort Lauderdale and Jacksonville.

Monday, the Republican nominee conferred with his staff in Palm Beach to map the final week's strategy. He also visited two factors and shook hands with more than 1,000 workers.

Kirk got a trendy reception. High addressed a Junior Chamber of Commerce luncheon in Orlando Monday, then made a motorcade stop in Fort Pierce, Port St. Lucie, Jensen Beach and Stuart.

The Miami Mayor told his Orlando audience: "Kirk through his Committee for Integrity in Government is denouncing this state with literature that is explosive and which could ignite the racial issue in this state."

He referred to literature distributed from Jacksonville last week depicting a labor boss occupying the governor's chair and using High as his puppet. It also depicted a Negro saying, "Let a nigger be governor."

High asked the Jaycees to look into Kirk's business background. He ridiculed what he said was a Kirk plan to increase state spending by \$1.5 billion without raising taxes.

High said that if elected he will appoint a committee to scrutinize expenditures. He said this could save the state \$40 million in two years.

After his tour, High returned to Miami, met his wife and their children, and went with them on a neighborhood trick or treat tour.

In Palm Beach, former state Supreme Court Justice Aldo Adams, a Democrat, announced that he is backing Kirk "all the way." Adams said "the liberal ways" of the Johnson administration had influenced his swing to Kirk. He said High is too closely aligned with the administration.

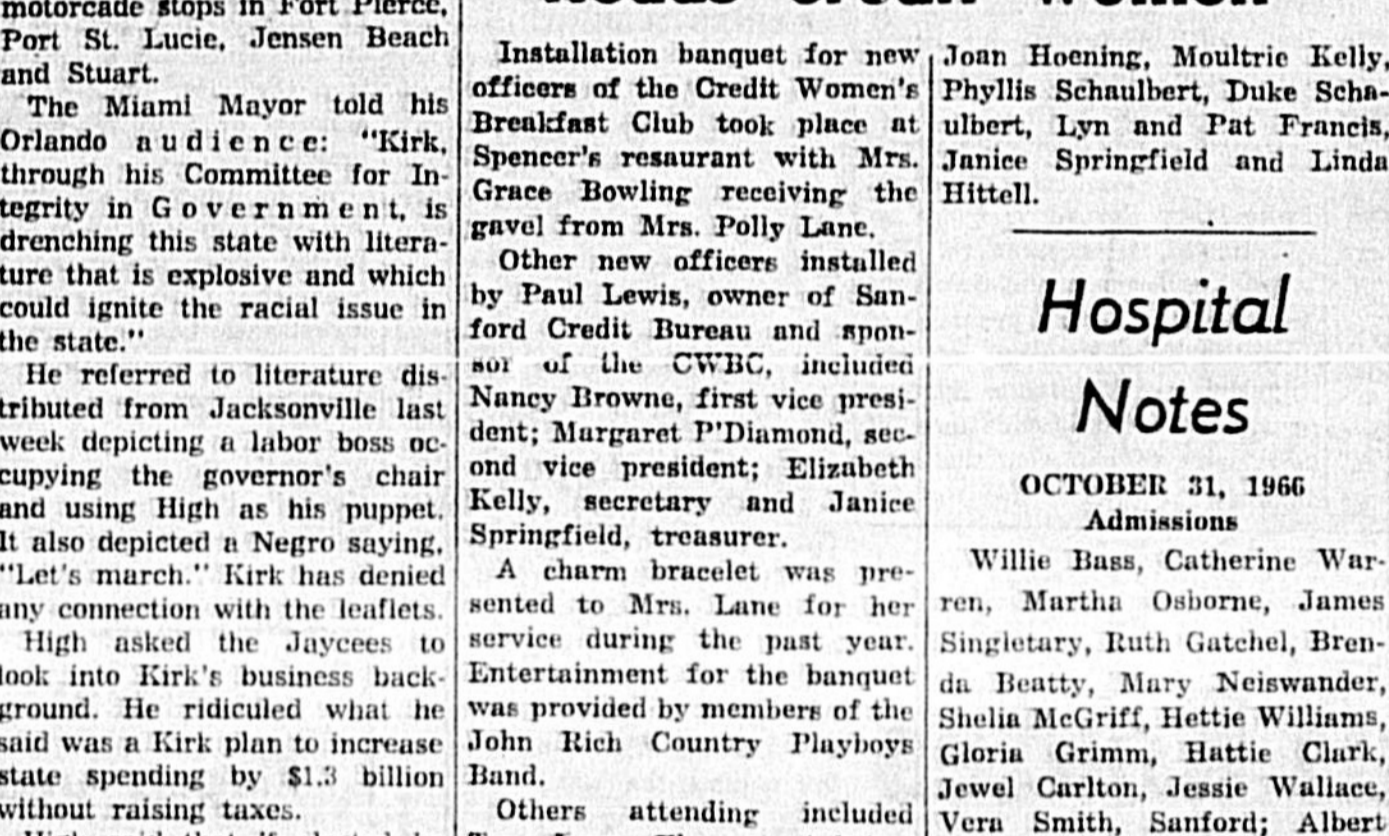

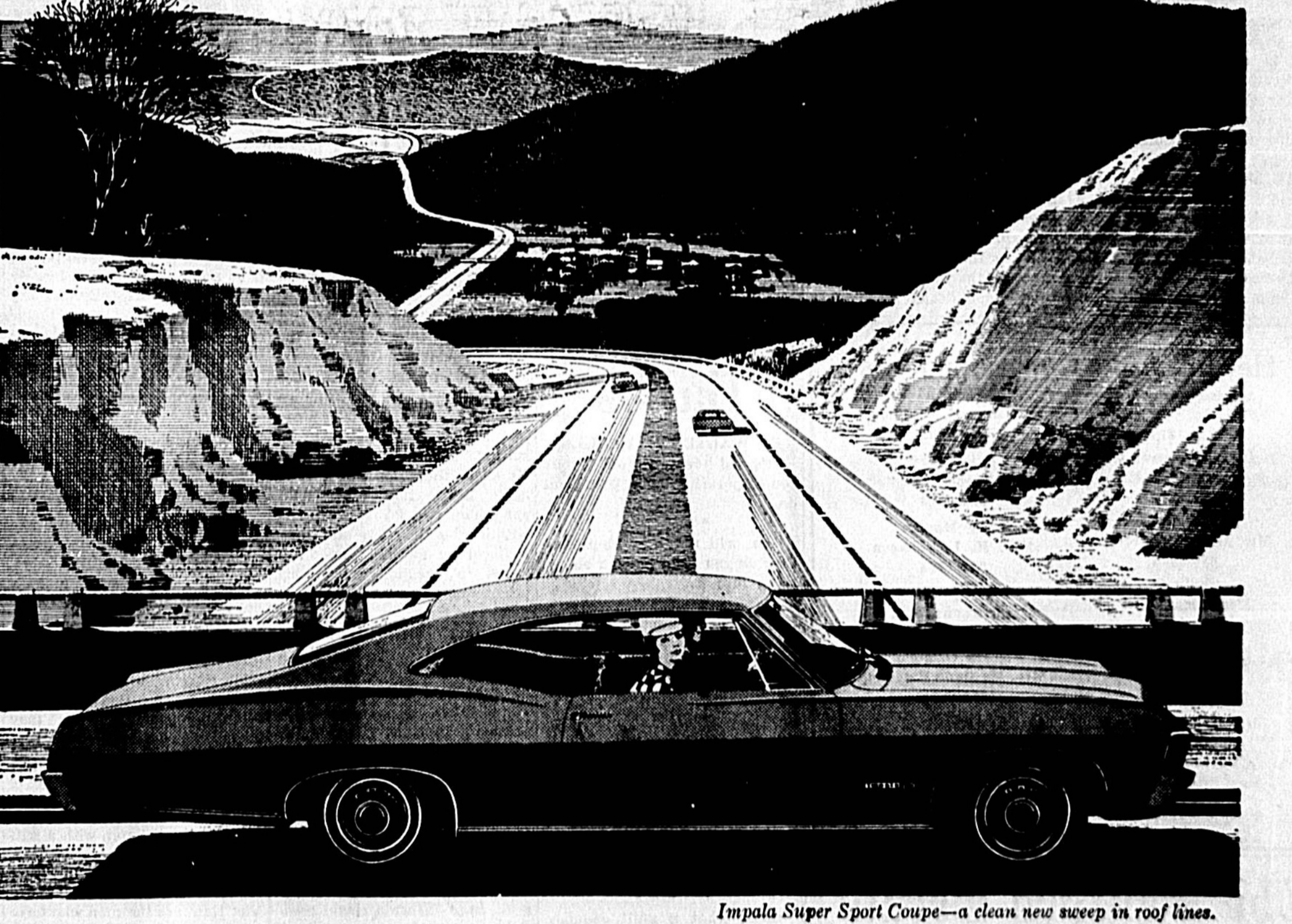

WASHINGTON (NEA) — probably low enough to provide a considerable GOP pickup on Nov. 8.

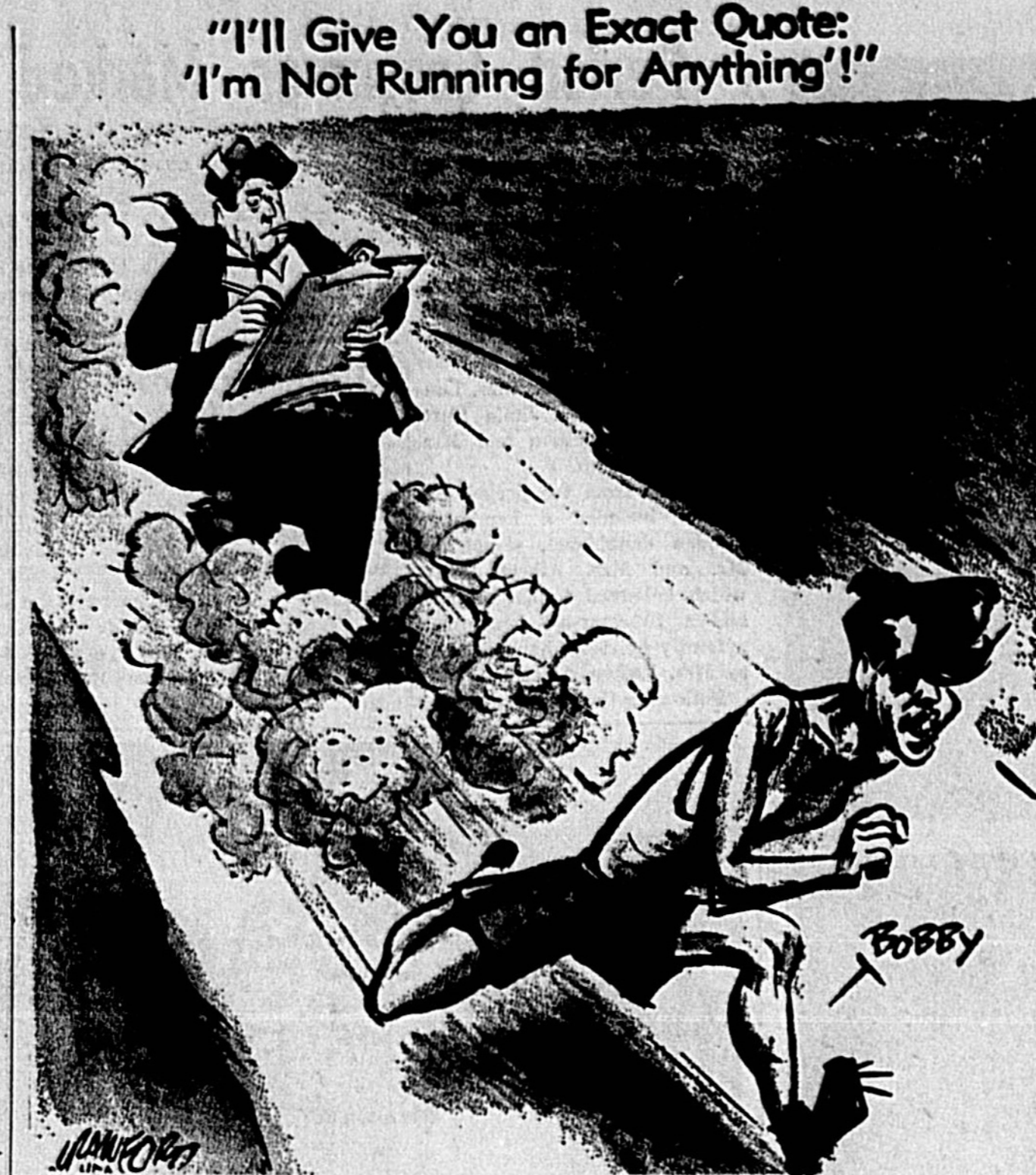

The present tenant of the White House surely finds it vexing to encounter about a pleat of his bitter criticism in the crowd turning out along his Asian route. To see Bobby Kennedy making so much political time at home in his absence must double the President's pain.

It helps not at all for Kennedy candidly to admit that he

unlike Johnson is operating from a privileged sanctuary. "The President," Kennedy frankly explained to one questioner recently, "has the responsibility for difficult decisions that are bound to cost him popularity. As a Senator, I do not have those responsibilities and do not have to make controversial decisions."

Johnson would surely agree that this fact helps explain Kennedy's rising and his own declining standing in the polls. And LBJ would be the last to dissent from Bobby's comment that "My last name is a help."

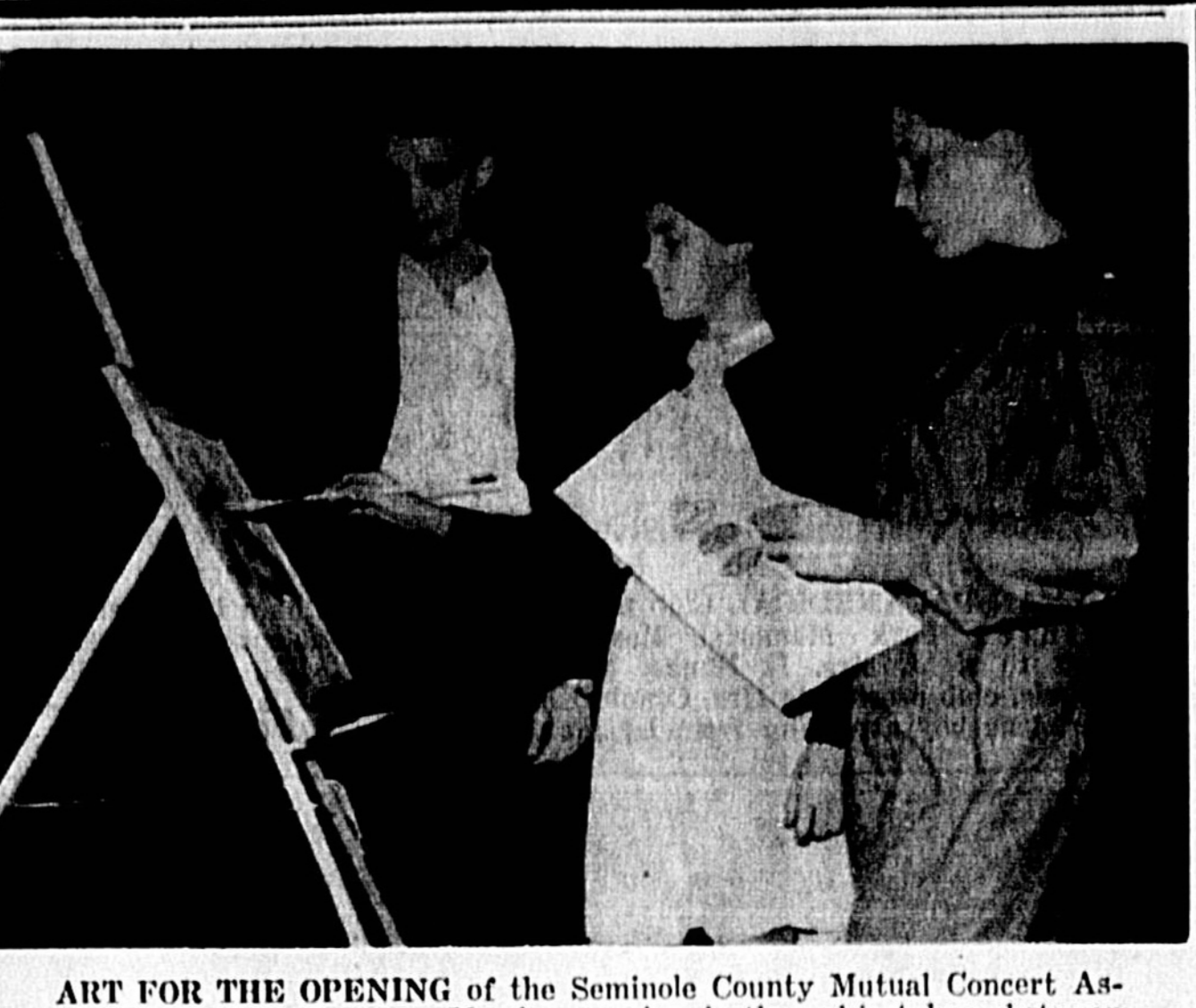

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — The Viet Cong shelled the center of Saigon today in a defiant but unsuccessful attempt to break up the South Vietnamese government's National Day celebration.

Civic Club Meet

Thirteen persons were reported killed — 12 Vietnamese and one U.S. naval officer. Thirty-seven more were reported wounded, including five Americans. The Viet Cong hurled 24 rounds of 75mm calibre rifle fire in and around the parade route. U.S. military headquarters reported mortar shells also struck during the shelling.

The bombardment hit Saigon's Roman Catholic cathedral, a Catholic school, the John F. Kennedy Square, the Saigon central market and the French-built Grail Hospital, the biggest in the capital.

The bombardment, first of its kind by the Viet Cong against Saigon, failed to interrupt the massive parade celebrating the third anniversary of the overthrow of the late President Ngo Dinh Diem.

For two hours and 30 minutes, soldiers of the South Vietnamese armed forces and the six nations allied with them paraded before tens of thousands of leading Vietnamese and foreign dignitaries.

U.S. military headquarters said the shelling came from a point 3 1/2 miles southeast of Saigon near An Khanh Km. Six U.S. gunship helicopters closed in on the area and artillery support planes were aloft. A ground force of allied troops advanced the area but the Viet Cong gunners escaped.

U.S. headquarters announced that three Viet Cong were captured near the parade grounds on Kennedy Square. A spokesman said they were armed with grenades and small arms. A Vietnamese spokesman said four more Viet Cong, armed with grenades and rifles, were seized in the vicinity of the parade route.

Elsewhere, the 63,000-ton U.S. aircraft carrier Coral Sea took up her battle station in the Gulf of Tonkin to launch air strikes against the Communist north. The Coral Sea replaced the carrier Oriskany, which was crippled by fire last Wednesday and went to the Philippines for repairs.

The U.S. psychological warfare section is preparing leaflets to be dropped from the air over both North and South Viet Nam. A spokesman said the leaflets would decry the "murder of the Viet Cong in seeking to revive its flagging fight."

Bishop Sheen, 71, has served as an auxiliary bishop of the New York Archdiocese and since 1950 has been national director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

(Ed. Note. With the threat of a courthouse fight hinted in Seminole County, the Herald sent Reporter Donna Estes to Deland to come up with an in-depth story on the seven year old struggle to relocate the courthouse in Daytona Beach.)

DELAND — Seven years in the courts at a cost to taxpayers here of more than \$250,000 has not resolved the battle to have the Volusia County courthouse relocated. The Herald learned self with past testimony.

In 1939 residents of East Volusia County under the name of the East Volusia Relocation Committee began circulating petitions and filed court action to have the county seat "moved to a more central location than Deland."

Local and county business people told us today that the relocation squabble has "done nothing but cost money, lost and is losing industry for the county, caused bitter disputes between friends, split up the county, and cost more money."
