

Mills Of Soviet Russia Are Unable To Supply Peasants With Needed Cotton Goods

MOSCOW, July 15.—The shortage of cotton goods in Russia never has been felt so acutely as this year. With the coming of the summer Moscow textile shops are literally besieged by all classes of the town population and numerous peasants, who come great distances to buy a few yards of gingham or cotton dress goods. Foreigners are much surprised by the sight of long queues of women shoppers who stand patiently all day long outside every state textile shop, obstructing traffic and necessitating the regulation of the crowd by militiamen.

The high cost of woolsens and silks compels even the better class of people to resort to ordinary cotton fabrics for their dresses, while the peasantry as a rule never was accustomed to wear anything but cotton. The Soviet textile industry is unable to supply the demand for cotton, which since the revolution has greatly increased, while production of cotton goods has decreased by nearly 70 per cent in

comparison with the pre-war time. In 1913 the Russian factories produced 2,275,000,000 meters of cotton goods, which equals 17 meters per head of population, while the last year the total production amounted only to 809,000,000 meters, which is only six meters for every inhabitant.

In order to meet the demand for cotton goods among the peasantry, the government was compelled last year to buy abroad 20,000,000 rubles' worth of ready cotton fabrics. With the realization of the coming harvest, which is expected this year to be satisfactory, the demand for cotton goods by the peasantry undoubtedly will increase. The government now is confronted with the problem of further increasing the important of cotton goods, as the increase in the production of the Russian textile factories would require. A big outlay of capital for reconstruction work and for the installation of new machinery, which the government cannot at present afford, would be involved.

ing the matter with the spirit of Sanford except that the people need more of it so that they may do things on a bigger scale in the future. If Sanford would be a successful city and make a bid for tourists and future residents, he stated, playgrounds and community buildings to a sufficient extent must be provided by the local people.

universal fact that the development of any country, and especially the United States, goes from the west and thence to the south, thus throwing a vast number of prospectors toward Florida; men by nature is a lover of sunshine and warmth and the delightful climate of Florida will claim many home seekers; great wars have been fought by nations to get to the sea and there is still that unutterable and unconquerable desire among men to settle on seacoasts or lakes or river, and Florida with her 1,500 miles of seacoast, over 30,000 lakes and numerous rivers will give millions of people an opportunity to make their homes near the water; and men is by nature a creator, developer, an explorer and a discoverer and this state will give vent to the greatest ideas of development and building that can be conceived. These are some of the reasons, declared Dr. Karr why the people of Sanford must awake to the necessity of putting over in great style the movement for a greater and better city through the funds which will be raised for advertising purposes and which will assure this city's success.

What to Expect of Electricity; Tips About Home Appliances



An Ironer Will Save More Time Than Any Other Electrical Appliance.

When you are contemplating buying any electrical appliance you are not interested in generalities—you want to know just how and why it will be an asset for you.

To get the very most out of your Clothes Washer with the least annoyance check these points: Never fill the washer by lugging pails of water; a length of common garden hose attached to the faucet will do the trick. Always make some arrangement for easy draining. Permanent attachment to the drain—length of hose running to a floor drain, an ejector, or even a small washer pump with an electric motor. The latter adds a bit to the cost of the Washer, but it's well worth the price. And just remember at an "off" position before turning on the current. This eliminates the chance of blowing a fuse, especially if you have to attach the cord to a light socket. A two-way plug is almost a necessity where there is only one socket. This enables you to have light and power at the same time.

The Electric Ironer is practically uncharted ground. Most of us know there is such a thing, but we dismiss it with a "Oh, yes, I know, a mangle for flat pieces and large families." No such thing. The ironer is a small ironer useful for a family of two as well as a Rooseveltian family. It's designed to iron everything a larger ironer can

iron. And because of its small size, more reasonable in price and more adaptable to small homes. An ironer will save more time than any other electrical appliance. The electrically-driven gas-heated ironer is within the means of the average family and the operating costs are negligible. You can iron practically everything on it. It's absurd to ignore an ironer simply because it won't do the most intricate pieces. Check up on your own wash and see what per cent is really in the intricate class. When you see a tablecloth that takes from twenty to twenty-five minutes to iron by hand come through an ironer perfectly ironed in five minutes, you'll be convinced that you're overlooking an exceptional labor-saver.

Not much need be said about the Electric Hand Iron. Practically every family has one. It's a recognized necessity. The convenience of steady, constant heat when and where you need it, the saving of steps, and the joy of being able to iron where it's cool have overbalanced the question of "How much current does it take?" It's a good idea to have two electric irons, one upstairs and one down. Ask the user of the iron in your home how she disconnects it. The proper way is to connect or disconnect at the iron rather than at the socket. Again, you minimize the chance of blowing a fuse. Another thing, if your iron becomes discolored from overheating, try cleaning it while the iron is hot, as hot as you can handle it.

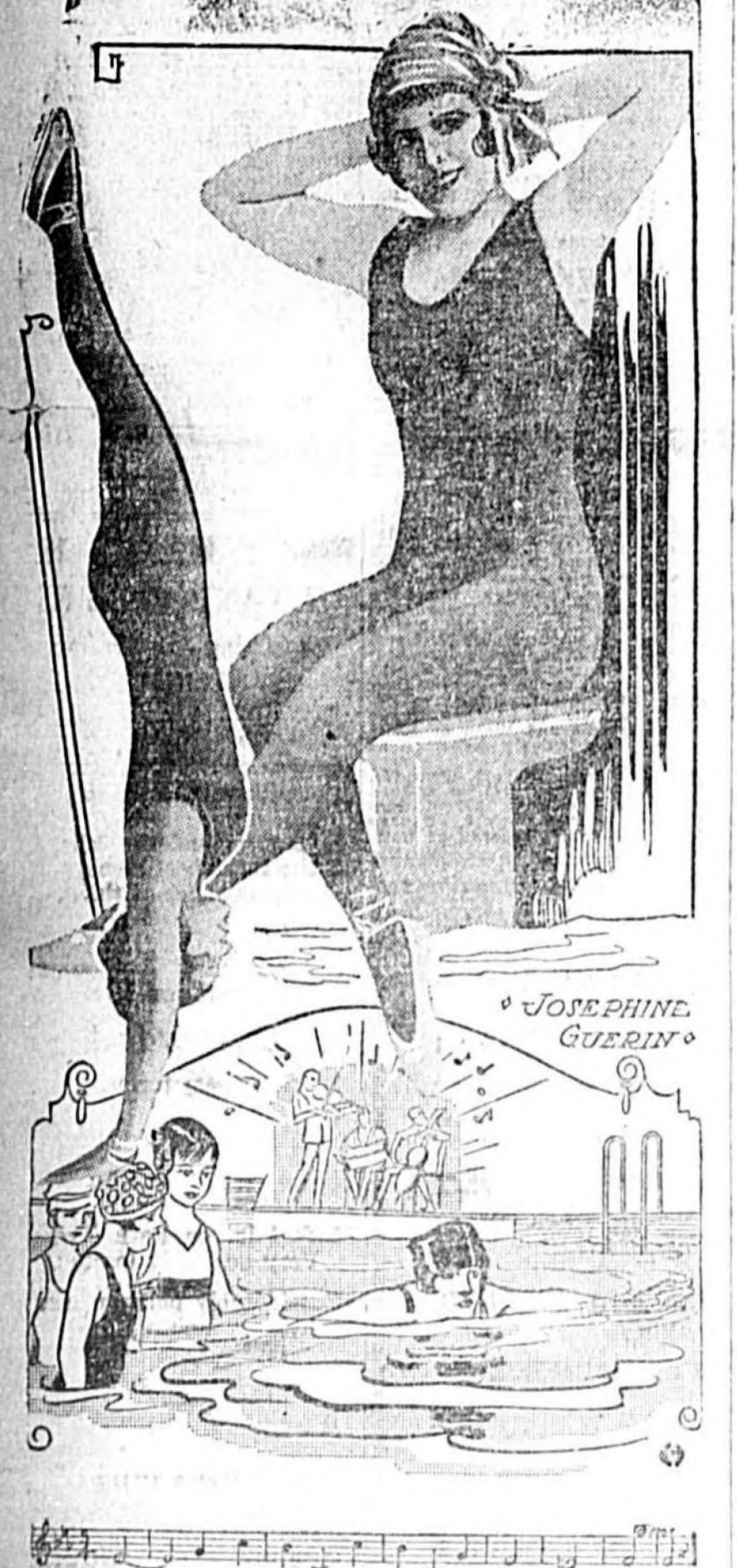

New York City.—Striking to the strum of a banjo has become so popular here that swimming classes have small orchestras as a matter-of-course part of their equipment, declares Josephine Guerin, famous professional swimmer and high diver.

"The orchestras," explains Miss Guerin, "are non-professional and take their turn at swimming before the class is over just as the swimmers take their turn at orchestra-ing."

Violin and Cello

"I tried the experiment one day of asking two friends to play 'Midnight Waltz' on the violin and cello when I was trying to teach the breast-stroke. They sat on the pool's edge in their bathing suits and the pupils never dreamed at first that the music had any serious angle.

"The result was so good that I explained to them what I was trying to do and after that, those who had any musical turn, insisted upon continuing the concert. You see, the music takes the mind off the breathing, which is the stumbling block to most beginners. At the same time that it distracts the mind, it produces rhythm, and instinctively the legs and arms follow the beat."

Directions

Miss Guerin's directions for the breast stroke follow:

Position: Hands clear in front, palms down, both legs together, straight behind you.

FIRST STROKE: Turn palms, pull to sides with both arms, keeping arms on a level with shoulders.

SECOND STROKE: Palms facing each other with elbows back, pulling in to the side of the body.

THIRD STROKE: Palms extending forward, arms straight, body flexible, using frog kick, two complete circles.

Breathing for the breast stroke is inhaled at first stroke, exhaled at third.

City Of Philadelphia Seeks New Music For Exposition To Be Held There Next Year

PHILADELPHIA, July 30.—Prizes amounting to \$7,500 for original musical compositions to have their premier performances at the Sesquicentennial International Exposition here next year have been announced by the exposition committee, together with an invitation for composers to enter the contest. The competition is to be open to persons of all nationalities in this and in foreign countries.

An opera, a symphony, a choral work and a ballet, pageant or masque are desired by the exposition officials who announced that all expenses in connection with the production of the winning pieces will be borne by the exposition.

A prize of \$3,000 is offered for the opera, one of \$2,000 for the symphony, or a large orchestral work of symphonic character; a prize of \$2,000 for a ballet, pageant or masque, with full orchestral accompaniment, not excluding choral episodes, and a prize of \$500 for an acapella choral suite of three or four members to be written for six or eight voices. The text of the suite is to be left to the composer.

All compositions are to be submitted with a full orchestral score written in ink with a nom de plume, accompanied by an envelope containing the full name and address of the composer. No work will be eligible that has been published or previously performed. The winning composer will retain all rights of performance, except the premier and extra performances as may be determined by the committee. In case the winning work is performed, the committee will assume all the expenses of the copying of parts, rehearsing and of producing. A special jury will adjudge each prize.

Manuscripts of the opera must be submitted by March 1, 1926, with a full orchestral score, accompanied by a full pianoforte score for rehearsal purposes. The prize will be adjudged by May 1. No conditions are fixed for the length or for the number of acts, the only other stipulations being that it must be of a serious musical character and the text in English.

The symphony, or symphonic work, the choral work and the ballet, pageant or masque, must be submitted by April 1, 1926. The winners will be announced by May 15.

The choral work must require not less than 30, and not more than 60 minutes for performance. The text must be in English and the work must be scored for the normal symphony orchestra. The choral writing should be mainly four-part, with occasional doubling. The ballet, pageant or masque accompaniment must be orchestral and the texts, if any, must be in English.

James Francis Cooke, editor of The Etude, is chairman of the competition committee, and Henry S. Fry, organist of St. Clement's Protestant Episcopal Church, Philadelphia, is executive secretary. Other members are Dr. Philip H. Goepff, Alexander Smallens, N. Lindsay Norden, Nicola Montani and Dr. Thaddeus Rich.

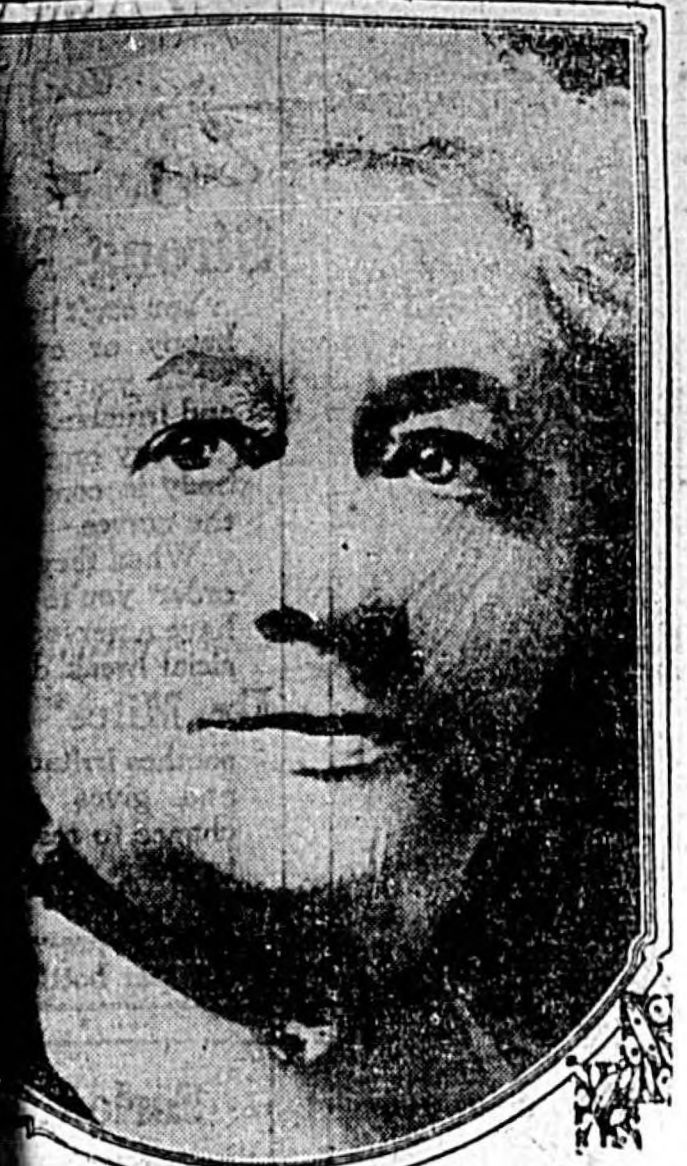

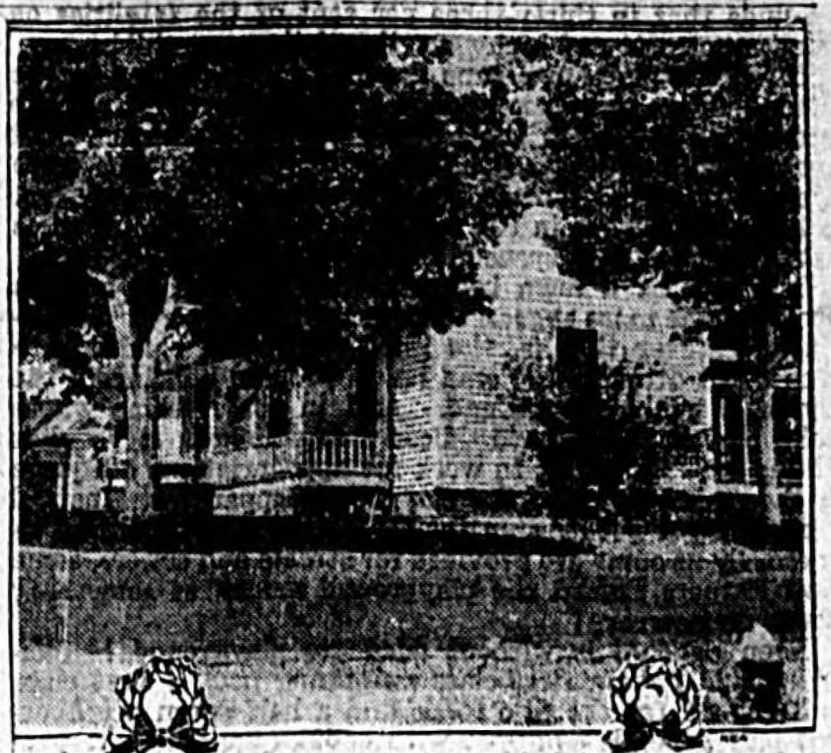
BRYAN'S WIDOW, HIS LAST PHOTOGRAPH AND HOUSE WHERE HE DIED

Want Chincoteague Have Annual Round And Garbed Festivities

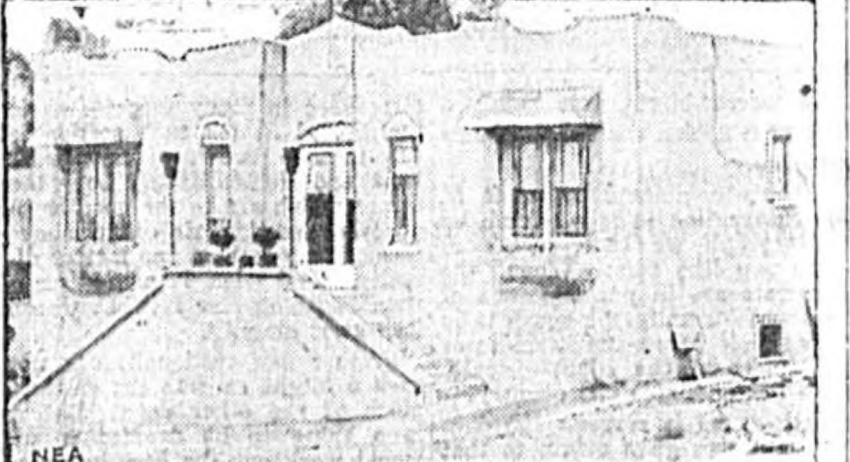
CHINCOTEAGUE ISLAND Va., July 30.—The annual round-up of wild ponies on Chincoteague Island is under way. The ponies, which are a distinct breed, have a long, flowing tail and mane and were highly prized during the era of carriages and carts. The fleet ponies are rounded up by horsemen who drive them into large pens where they are caught and haltered. It sometimes requires several hours to guide the drove into the pens. The islanders gain their sustenance largely from the sea. They have built up an extensive fish and oyster industry. It was necessary, however, to till small patches of ground for bread and vegetables. The wild pony had to be restricted. So he was fenced off from the settlements and the fields and allowed to continue his roaming at will in the lower sections of the island. There the ponies are to be found in much the same state as when the first white men came. By the marsh grass and myrtle bushes on Chincoteague grow sparse at seasons, the ponies will swim the strait to Assateague, another island nearby. Water seems to hold no dread for them. Neither the ponies nor the wild cattle require any attention or feeding. When the islander wants beef he kills a cow from the herd. They are never rounded up. "Broncho busting" is certain to be a feature of the "pony penning" tomorrow. The majority of the islanders are good horsemen and delight in giving exhibitions of their riding skill.

FLORIDA FACTS

Over thirty-six per cent of the population of Florida was born outside the state. The soils of Florida come under more than one hundred classifications by the United States soil survey. Leading bean producing counties of the state are Alachua, Broward, Hardee, Hillsborough, Marion, Palm Beach, and Sumter. Not more than one tenth of the available wealth of Florida has yet been developed, according to L. M. Rhodes, State Marketing Commissioner.

FLORIDA FACTS

Crystal river rises in the western part of the state and flows in a westerly direction and empties into the Gulf of Mexico about 90 miles north of the entrance to Tampa Bay. Its total length is seven miles and is a tidal estuary varying in width from 300 to 700 feet. Florida green beans are shipped every month in the year. The principal varieties grown for commercial purposes are the Giant Stringless, Kentucky Wonder, Refugee, Valentine, Tennessee Flat Pod, Waddell-Kidney Wax, and New Davis White Wax. During the past ten years Florida has quadrupled her output of grapefruit, Irish potatoes, celery, and cabbage; has tripled her output of tomatoes and hay; has more than doubled her output of cucumbers, oats, cow peas, lettuce, watermelons, peppers and oranges.

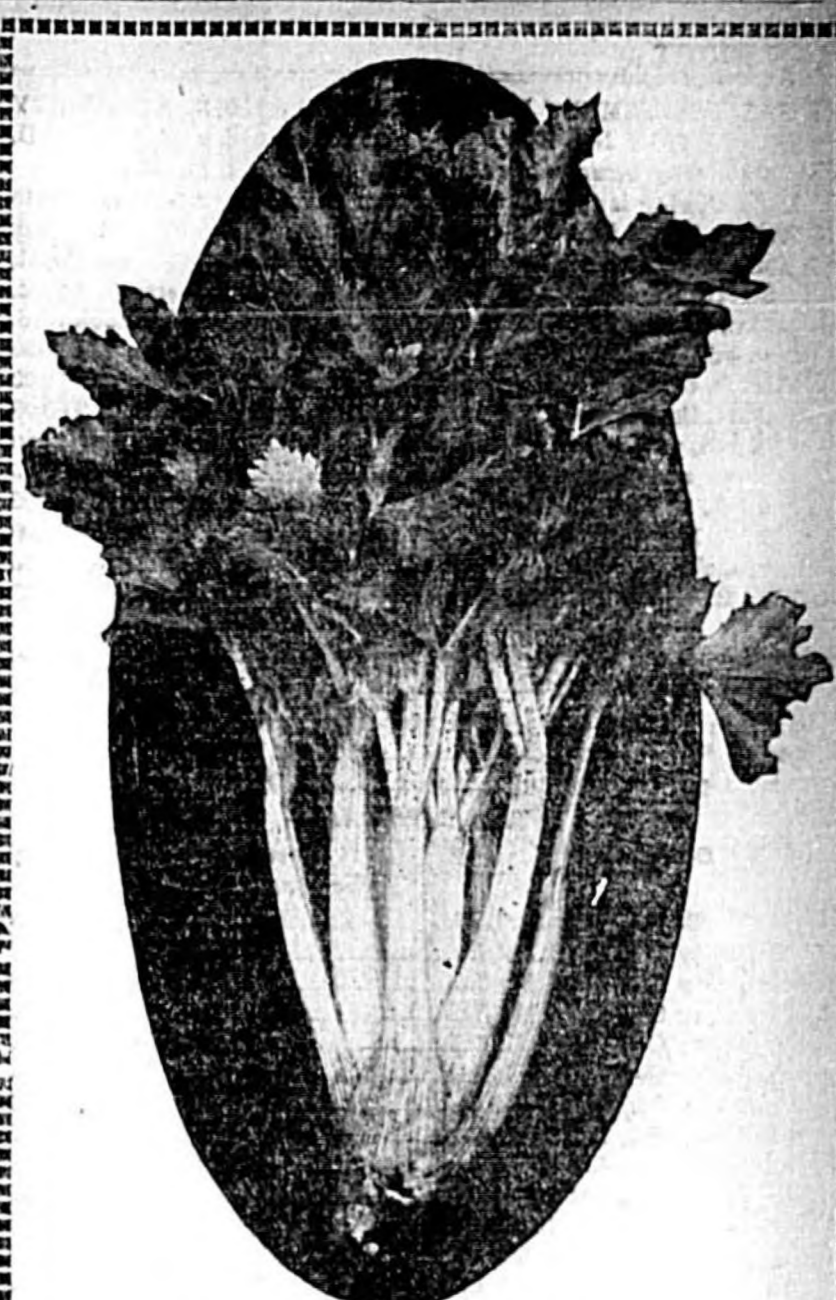

Florida's 1925 Auto License Tags To Be Made By Convicts

TALLAHASSEE, July 30.—Florida's auto license tags will have a black background with yellow figures; they will retain the outline map of the state and will measure 6 by 16 instead of 7 by 17 inches, as at present.

A contract for such tags has been awarded to the Maryland State Penitentiary at Baltimore which calls for approximately 400,000 tags. They will be delivered at Tallahassee for 7 and 3-4 cents each as compared with 8 1-2 cents for 1925. The manufacturers will furnish an envelope for each tag. The tags will be shipped to Tallahassee in carload lots and distributed from the capital to the local agencies throughout the state from they will be supplied to motor vehicle owners. At least one agency will be established in each county, under provision of the motor vehicle act passed by the 1925 legislature. Two or three such agencies will probably be kept open in the larger cities for the convenience of applicants.

The Controller also has awarded a contract for 10,000 "for hire" containers at a cost of 8 cents each. They will be attractively constructed with mica fronts, 5,000 chauffeur badges also have been contracted for at 6 and 3-4 cents each.
