Response of acute sinusitis is possible, it would be very unusual. Even, many forms of sinusitis — such as fungal and disseminated bacterial — appear to be caused by an allergic response phenomenon, when people become hypersensitive to their own nasal mucus. However, over-enthusiasm over cats may, theoretically, cause disease of the sinusitis by irritating out of hand, because allergic reactions sometimes provide opportunities for bacteria. Perhaps an allergist could resolve the issue.



## Invest on your own with index funds

So there's plenty of ground that needs to be covered before many Americans will feel comfortable investing any portion of their Social Security dollars in the market. But for now, one easy way for novices to get exposure to stocks — which historically have provided investors with the best long-term investment performance — is through index funds.

An index fund is a basket of stocks that mirror the performance of an index, such as the S&P 500.

But it's not that easy — there are lots of choices. There are now nearly 200 equity index funds in Lipper's data bank. Some invest in the S&P 500 Index, others invest in small, mid-cap and foreign indexes. And, while there isn't a NASDAQ Index fund around, new to the market is a Wilshire 5000 Index fund, in which investors get a total

market representation.

Investment objectives range from the most familiar — the S&P 500 type funds — to those with growth, growth and income, gold, utility, science and technology, international, and different market-cap objectives. That means there's much more to selecting an index fund than most investors think.

"What investors need to remember is that not all index funds are created equally," says Stephanie Kendall, a mutual fund analyst at CDA/Wiesenberger. "Some funds are specifically indexed on a one-to-one ratio, so to speak, like the Vanguard 500, but there are lots of others that are highly leveraged. For example, the ProFunds Ultra-OTC is supposed to have a beta of two times the NASDAQ 100. So it's supposed to do twice as well as the NASDAQ 100. But it could also do twice as poorly, too."

A. Michael Lipper, chairman of Lipper Inc., says that investors ought not jump into an S&P 500 Index fund and think that they are going to have a winning investment all the time. "Over the last few years, the bigger the market cap, the better. But there will come a time when the S&P will underperform other funds."

So index fund diversification comes into play.

Because indexing is a low-cost, tax efficient way to get exposure to any

number of different markets, investors ought to spread their investment dollars around, says Bill Klipp, executive vice president of Schwab Funds.

"We encourage investors to have exposure to a number of different asset classes. So they might own an S&P 500 fund or Schwab 1000 fund, but also have international and small-cap representation," he says.




Recently, while surfing the Net, I read the following heartbreaking poem. Please print it. Perhaps it will save some beautiful animal a life of misery and neglect.

"Yes, we have roamed through many, many cemeteries since the early 1890's cataloguing names on tombstones and indexing cemeteries. If we hadn't, much history would have been lost in the destruction of tombstones due to vandalism and weather and cemeteries totally lost due to the building of subdivisions and roads."

"We do other good things too," Powell continued. "Franklin Delano Roosevelt once said: 'We cannot always build a future for our youth, but we can build our youth for the future.' We, the Daughters of the American Revolution, are strongly committed to our youth."

"In 1988, one of our members, Harriet Lathrop, founded the National Society Children of the American Revolution. Today the C.A.R. is the oldest patriotic organization for youth in the United States. Members are proud of their heritage and are providing training in patriotism and leadership at the local, state, and national levels." Salte Harrison Chapter DAR

organized and sponsors the Fort Mellon Society of C.A.R. that has won many state and national awards.

The purpose of the American History Committee is to promote history throughout the year by honoring historically significant people, places, dates and events by presenting American History programs, arranging displays in schools, libraries and public buildings and supporting the study of American History in our schools. Chairman, Libby Boyd, presented winners of the American History Essay Contest with certificates, a medal and two coins, a Susan B. Anthony dollar and a Delaware quarter.

Following the award presentations, members and guests were treated to refreshments by business Maryanna Reilly and Fran Martin. After a brief business meeting the chaplain Mary Williams gave the closing benediction.

The youth of today have many options for leisure activities, and we as adults must provide them with wholesome alternatives. All too often, children of today opt for less desirable activities if their options are limited.

Expect good bass action in the river and local lakes. Steiner will produce most of the larger fish, but plastic worms will afford plenty of action. Look for areas with cover and only access to deeper water for giant bass. River bass from 1-5 pounds can be found in slough areas, such as sloughs, marshes, deep banks, and backwaters.

Crappie and bream are common at Sebastian Inlet. Flounder prefer a finger mullet or small herring slowly bounced across the bottom. Snook will hit one-piece jig, or live shrimp presented with a bare hook.

Captain Jack at Del Conte will have little to report in the way of offshore action due to high seas. Cobia are on the agenda, and dolphin and king mackerel are scattered. Sheepshead and scuppers are biting inside the Del Conte mole and most are noted as fair in the Bahamas and Indian Shores.

Sheepshead, scuppers, bluefish, jack crevalle, redfish and drum round out the action at Del Conte Inlet. Live or dead shrimp are the top baits. Trout and snook are noted as good in Micanulla Lagoon.

Holmes' homer caps Lion comeback; Basketball, soccer playoffs continue

# The way we were: More 1933 biographies

Yes, there are lots more biographies from the April 29, 1933 edition of the Sanford Herald and here are a few more of them!

## B.L. Perkins

B.L. Perkins had been in the clothing business in Sanford since coming here in 1907. He was the owner of B.L. Perkins Mens Wear which was one of the leading shops of its kind in Sanford.

Before taking up his residence here, he had been a farmer and had also been employed with a railroad construction company in Tennessee for several years.

During his boyhood, he lived in Carysbrook, Va. and Jonesboro, Tenn., and later attended Fork Union Military Academy in Virginia.

He and his wife, the former Linda Leffler, lived at 804 Magnolia Avenue with their three children: Braxton L. Jr., 16; Louis, 11; and Martha, 7.

Mr. Perkins was a member of the Sanford Elks Lodge and attended Holy Cross Episcopal Church.

(Braxton L. Perkins, Jr. continued the family business in Sanford until his retirement a few years ago. He was married to the former Jessie Durden and they had five children: Susan, Linda, Patsy, Martha and Braxton III. I taught all four of their daughters.)

## E.D. Price

When the Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company (better known as A & P) opened a grocery store in 1926 in Edgewood, a suburb of Sanford, E.D. Price was appointed manager and continued in that position.

Mr. Price was born in Wrightsville, Ga. where he attended schools and also Worthley College in that city. He then became a farmer near the place of his birth. He also served in the army during the World War.

Mr. Price lived at 2520 Sanford Avenue with his wife, the former Vela Rowland.

He was a member of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and First Baptist Church. He was a baseball fan and was also fond of fishing.

(I assume that this is the same Mr. Price of Price's Grocery that was located on the northwest corner of 25th Street and Sanford Avenue. Was this store formerly an A & P? I remember shopping there with my mother as a child during the 1940's. There was also Moran's Meat Market next to McReynolds Drug Store across the street. Also was this area once called Edgewood?)

## C.E. McKee

Perhaps the most interesting and exciting period of Clarence E. McKee's life was during the two years he served in the navy during the war. He had made 11 trips across the Atlantic to Europe carrying cargo for the troops. He later found employment with the Grace Steamship Lines and made several trips to South America.

Before enlisting in the navy, Mr. McKee had lived in Macon, Georgia where he was a machinist. He was born in Aniston, Ala. where he received his education.

Mr. McKee moved to Sanford in 1921 where he first operated the Palmetto Lunch Room on Palmetto Avenue for several

years. He later bought the controlling interest in the local NeHi Bottling Company which he continued to operate.

He lived with his family at 1517 Magnolia Ave. His wife was the former Lily-bel Davis and they had a son, Clarence Edward, age six. The family attended First Baptist Church.

Mr. McKee was a Mason, Shriner and Modern Woodman.

(I remember Mr. McKee as a very active member and deacon of First Baptist Church. I know that he taught a boys' Sunday School class for many

years and was building committee chairman for the Memorial Educational Building which was completed in 1950. He continued to operate the NeHi Bottling Company. He and his wife had another son, James, who was a year younger than I; he died several years ago. The family later lived on West 17th Street next to the Dr. Charles L. Park Sr. family.)

## Frank S. Lamson

Born in Washington, D.C., Frank S. Lamson was at the time Sanford's city clerk. He had come to this city in 1925 after having served as a buyer for a large department store in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

Mr. Lamson's first job with the city was as a collector of special assessments and later as assistant purchasing agent.

He was a member of the Sanford Kiwanis Club several branches of Masonry, the American Legion and Sigma Phi Epsilon.

After graduating from high school in Washington, D.C., he majored in electrical engineering at George Washington University.

Mr. Lamson's wife was the former Grayce Halloway and they had one son Donald. They lived at 2490 Orange Ave.

His mother's maiden name was Anna Mather; she was a direct descendant of Cotton Mather of New England.

Mr. Lamson was a deacon at First Christian Church. His favorite sport was baseball and he enjoyed playing bridge and working with machinery.

(The Lamsons were close friends of my parents and I remember visiting in their home many times. They later moved to Orlando where Mr. Lamson worked for Mr. Bradshaw in some capacity. After his death, Mrs. Lamson moved back to Sanford where she lived many years at the Town

and Lake Apartments. Their only son, Donald, was killed during World War II. My favorite memories of the Lamsons are of the many Thanksgiving dinners we enjoyed together. For probably about 10 or 15 years during the 1950's and early 1960's Mr. Lamson would select the restaurant and we would dine at such elegant places (for the time) as the Angebilt Hotel, San Juan Hotel, the Skyline, Rowenas, and Ben White Raceway.)

## H.B. Pope

Mr. Pope as born July 25, 1893 in Haddonfield, N.J. and he studied at Cornell University. He came to Sanford in 1932 and resided with his wife, Marguerite at 2101 Sanford Avenue. They had a son, John.

Mr. Pope had been an electrical engineer in New Jersey, but came to Sanford to enter the automotive service business. He had purchased the two Wight Brothers stations at Tenth and Sanford and at Second and Magnolia. The latter was the first drive-in service station to be located in Sanford.

Besides being president of the H.B. Pope Company Inc., he was Seminole County Agent for distribution of Cities Service Company gas and oil products.

He was a member of the Rotary Club, American Society of Civil Engineers, American Association of the advancement of science and the Presbyterian Church.

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

than 150 residences were damaged - many destroyed. It was the worst tornado outbreak in Florida since records were kept in the 1800s.

Hurricanes are violent tropical storms with winds moving 75 or more miles an hour, often

accompanied by torrential rains.

"The best protection we have is to be prepared before the storms start," Schenk said. "Knowing this is going to be an active hurricane season, we strongly advise residents to read up on what they should do. Now's the time to start."

## Are remote campuses a good idea?

DEAR BRUCE: I have heard a good deal about remote campuses. I am distrustful of diploma mills, but due to my employment responsibilities I cannot attend college on even a part-time basis. — R.T., Buffalo, N.Y.

DEAR R.T.: There is no reason not to pursue a college education in today's world — ever, if you are away from home a good deal. There are dozens of colleges throughout the country that are completely accredited and offer off-campus college educations. In addition, I am told that there are worthwhile colleges and universities that offer off-campus instruction on the Internet — allowing for a certain amount of interchange between student and instructor. I share your concern about diploma mills. The thing that you need to look for is who operates the schools — many colleges are operated by a state agency and are accredited. The fact that you are not in one spot all the time should not keep you from your goal of college education.

DEAR BRUCE: We have suddenly become aware that, over the years, Christmases, birthdays and special occasions have increased my wife's jewelry collection to a substantial value. We had it appraised at something under \$50,000 for replacement value. The bulk of the amount is from two diamond rings. In looking over our homeowner's policy, we find that there is very little coverage. We would like to have these pieces covered. How do we go about it? — C.T., Waterloo, Iowa

DEAR C.T.: The way to handle this is to contact your insurance agent and ask about a jewelry floater on the excess not covered by your homeowner's policy. You also might wish to consider having your wife go through the jewelry. Those things that she uses infrequently can be kept in a safe deposit box, therefore reducing the amount of coverage you will need and giving you a lower premium. By all means, get it done now — for the most part, your precious things are without coverage.

## Local students learn about natural resources

### 23 teams from Seminole compete in regional Envirothon

ORLANDO - What is a Secchi disk and how does it work? That is an example of one the questions 115 Seminole County students had to answer last Thursday as they participated in the Fifth Annual Regional Envirothon.

Twenty-three teams from Lyman, Oviedo and Winter Springs high schools, Seminole Trinity Christian School and a 4-H team of homeschooled students joined others from

Orange and Ocoola counties in an event sponsored by the tri-county Soil and Water Conservation Districts and other agencies such as the Division of Forestry Orange County, OUC and the Orange County Cooperative Extension Service.

The Envirothon is a unique one-day outdoor competition in which teams of five solve written questions and conduct hands-on investigations about environmental issues in categories such as aquatics, forestry, soils, wildlife and current environmental issues.

The focus of the competition is to increase the student's knowledge of natural resources through the use of critical thinking and problem-solving skills, said Ken Morgan, chairman of the Seminole Soil and Water Conservation District. "Because the Envirothon strives to promote good stewardship of the land, students who take part in it more fully appreciate the contribution they make to

the preservation of our natural resources."

The competition was held at Harry F. Lou Botanical Gardens in Orlando.

The winning team from Oviedo, comprised of Brent Van Camp, Brooke Aubly, Brian Morgan, Lawson Thompson and Andrew Warren, with their teacher, Jay Getty, will travel to Paynes Prairie, in Gainesville, in April to compete in the state level event.

The 4-H "Green Team," comprised of Laura Hinley, Mark Hinley, Leetra Robertson, Daniel Gable and All Linduff, took second place.

The Envirothon originated in Pennsylvania in 1979. It was held for the first time in Florida in the 1991-1992 school year, in Palm Beach. The Volusia County 4-H team won the state competition last year and went on to compete in the National Envirothon, held at Michigan State University. ## Experts predict active hurricane season for state

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Forecasters are advising Floridians to be prepared for an above-average hurricane season in 1999. As many as 14 name storms could produce 9 hurricanes, 4 of which could be intense.

George and Mitch were the cruelest hurricanes of 1998, causing death and destruction in the Caribbean, Honduras and Central America. Hurricane Earl hit hard along the Florida panhandle. Mitch came unusually late - in October.

"We should prepare for an active hurricane season - beginning in June," said Terry Schenk, the Seminole County Fire Chief and meteorologist. "We have information booklets at the public safety office. The Orlando TV stations have booklets, also."

Schenk said that the No. 1

source for hurricane date is Dr. Bill Gray at Colorado State University in Boulder. Gray made his initial forecast late in November and will be updating it on April 1 and again on June 1. "He's extremely accurate," Schenk said.

The normal hurricane season for the Atlantic basin calls for 11 name storms, 6 hurricanes and 2 intense hurricanes. "The numbers are 14-9-4 this year and that means everyone should be aware of what may happen," Schenk said.

An intense hurricane is one that grades 3 or above on what is known as the Saffir-Simpson scale - 5 is as high as the scale goes.

The hurricane activity in 1999 is the result of a weather condition known as La Nina. It follows last year's El Nino that caused the killer tornado that swept into Central Florida on Feb. 23. Twelve lives were lost in Seminole County and more

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## Police will enforce parking rules

SANFORD - The Sanford Police Department will begin issuing parking tickets in the downtown area in March.

Sanford Police will begin enforcing the 2-hour minimum parking for spaces in the downtown area on Monday.

The fines will start at \$10 during the first five working days of enforcement. After five working days, the fines will increase to \$15. After 14 working days, the fines will be \$25.

Since there are no downtown parking meters, officers will periodically mark tires of parked cars with chalk. Officers will then check the cars two hours later. Police will begin marking tires with chalk Monday at 9 a.m., Acting Police Chief Ray Bronson said.

The Sanford Police will rotate non-sworn community service officers. The Police Department carries three community service

officers on staff. There are currently two on staff, and a third will soon be hired, Bronson said.

"Part of their function is parking enforcement," Bronson said. "If we're in a situation where a community service officer is sick or whatever, then we can use a Community Oriented Police Officer assigned to the district."

Bronson said enforcing parking limits in the downtown area is not likely to take up the time of sworn officers.

The downtown merchants, in meetings held Oct. 28 and Dec. 28, 1998, recommended posting a two hour parking limit on certain sites.

The sites include First Street from Oak Ave. to Sanford Ave., Park Ave. from Seminole Blvd. to Second Street, Magnolia Ave. from Magnolia Square to Second Street, Hood Ave. from Seminole Blvd. to Commercial Street, Palmetto Ave. from Commercial
