Courageous Living

Most of us have known someone at some time or other in our lives who seemed to have more than his full share of troubles, but who nevertheless seemed somehow to rise above them. And most of us have seen people who, though they were apparently getting along well enough, were always complaining about something.

Of the former kind, George Sokolsky writes in the New York Herald Tribune. His name was Frank Scully and he had been hurt in a game. His leg had become tubercular and more than twenty operations had been performed upon it. Years had been spent in hospitals and most of that time it had been a fight just to remain alive. Every waking minute had been steeped in suffering.

"Yet Frank remained gay," Mr. Sokolsky writes, "His laughter brings joy to his less gay friends. His enthusiasm cheers even the pessimist. His faith in life and in man knows no end. When Frank wanted to write a book, he called it 'Fun in Bed' for that was the only place that Frank could have any fun for many years of his life. And 'Fun in Bed' is a book which shows those who suffer how to be cheerful and happy. And Frank knows, for he is ever cheerful and happy."

In spite of his troubles, Frank grew up, earned his living, married, had children, and reared them. And throughout all this time there was never a moment when he was without pain. He married a beautiful girl, who was not afraid to marry a man who would never be without pain. And he had graceful, healthful children, who, though their father suffered continuously, never knew it.

One day Frank and his wife were walking near a lake. A child fell overboard and was drowning. Frank's wife jumped in to try to save it. But she tired and herself began to drown. Frank, now with only one leg, and with tuberculosis still racking him with pain, jumped in and with strong arms, managed to get them both out. But pneumonia set in. For months he lay at the point of death, but finally survived.

"There are lots of Frank Scullys in this world—lots of men and women who smile through suffering and hardships," says Mr. Sokolsky. "There are lots of men and women who cannot be defeated. For real strength is not in one's muscles. It is in the will to conquer oneself first and then to achieve a useful life."

The courageous person cannot be defeated. Ill health, sad luck, depressions, political disturbances—they are food for his courage. He takes them in his stride and goes on. As he goes on, he sings. As he goes on, he is full of good cheer. For he builds his own life with his own materials. And what more can anyone ask than to have the courage to do that?"

Ten Thousand New Jobs

According to Gilbert Seldes in the April Cosmopolitan, the American citizen is on his knees begging for a dictatorship. "The government is doing ten thousand new jobs for the citizen," he declares, "and the citizen has not accepted even the responsibility of knowing what is going on."

"Governments are made up of thousands of men, each one trying to justify his existence by putting a new plan into action, starting a new work and extending his power. That's only natural. But if we let the government carry on, neither knowing nor caring what it does, we are on our knees begging for dictatorship. Unless we understand how and why and in what direction the world is changing, we'll be fatally hornsworded by some politician crafter than ourselves, and finally, we'll be playing a sour trick on our children."

As examples of revolutionary changes of thought and action, Seldes cites the attitude on floods and depressions. "Floods, he points out, are no longer regarded as acts of God, but the result of destruction of forest and grasslands. Their control is a major political issue. The depression was not an act of God," he goes on. "Yet many people thought it was right to succor victims of the flood, but altogether wrong to give food and clothing to the victims of economic disaster."

"Take this fact alone: that the government today protects the victims of economic chaos. Is that going to imply that the government ought to have a pretty 'ree hand hereafter in preventing economic chaos—and does this mean you and your job? How far are you willing to have them controlled by your government? In a way we are all like the inhabitants of the Mississippi Valley, living in the path of a flood. Call the flood War or Fascism or Communism or whatever peril is most imminent. We cannot escape merely by voting once in four years. We can save Democracy only by building flood walls in advance and building them higher, deeper and wider than before."

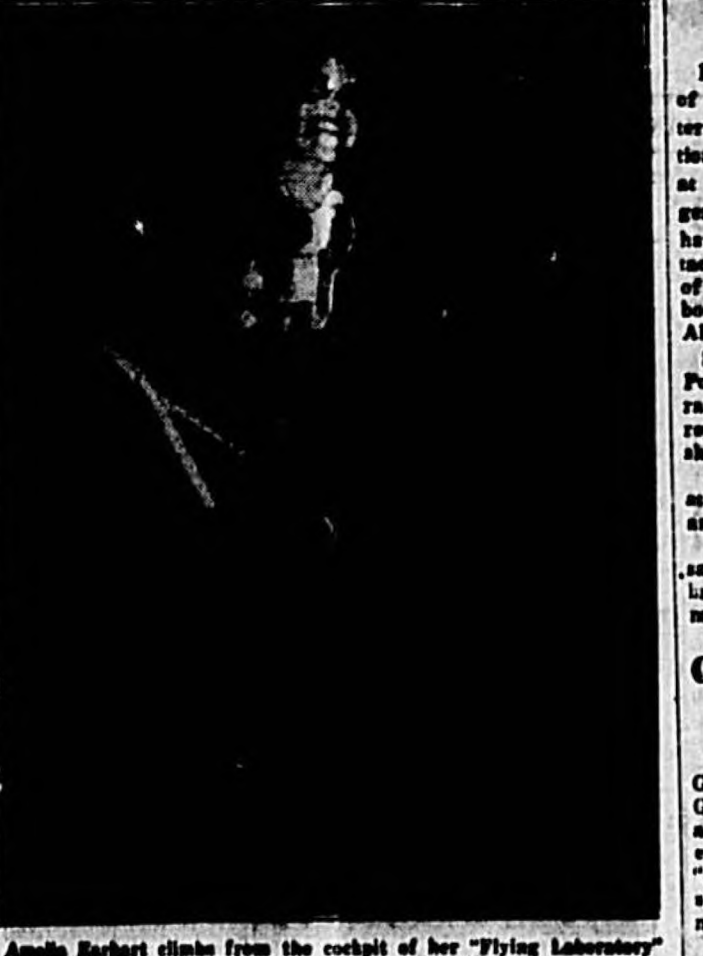

The demand was made under the banner-line: "American Jew Leaders Insult Germany People." In New York, John L. Lewis, General Hugh Johnson and others inveighed against Nazi principles, and it was front-paged by Demagogues.

The general was speaking in commemoration of the second anniversary of Germany's regained "arms equality."
