Industrial Board Hires Don Rathel As Director

The Sanford Industrial Board, in special session today, hired Don Rathel as director at a starting salary of \$18,000 per year.

Rathel yesterday submitted his resignation as executive director of Florida Defense-Space Industries in Orlando.

It will be Rathel's job to "bird-dog" industry for Seminole County.

Rathel was one of many interviewed this week by industrial board members seeking a replacement for Col. George Kelly who earlier had been hired by the board.

Kelly, now serving with the Air Force, was ordered to remain in service because of the Vietnam Crisis.

Rathel's first job will be to help submit a budget to the city July 19.

Rathel is expected to discuss with City officials a contract agreement. However, Board Member Howard McNulty emphasized that "when he (Rathel) feels he can't do the job he, can leave anytime."

However, McNulty added, "we have complete confidence in him."

Rathel hopes to move his family from Buahnell in Sumter County in the very near future. He moved to Florida in 1948. He is graduate of Ball State University in Indiana and Georgia Peabody College in Nashville, Tenn.

He served as consultant to industry and manager industrial development of the Dept. of Florida Development Commission from 1964-65. For the past two years he was executive director with the space industries firm.

Rathel has a vital interest in aviation. He is a commercial pilot and a committee chairman of the International Space Electronics Symposium.

Veto Called 'Crippling' Blow To SIC

County School Board Chairman Mason Wharton blasted Gov. Kirk's appointment of William J. Phillips to the post of School Superintendent last night calling it a "cheap" trick.

Wharton made the remarks after the School Board meeting.

Yesterday, Gov. Kirk appointed William J. Phillips of Orlando as superintendent of schools here, recommended his salary be \$18,000. Phillips had switched his party affiliation from Democratic to Republican prior to his getting the appointment.

In an angry statement, Wharton said: "Gov. Kirk, the GOP advisory committee and legislative delegation has shown a complete disregard for the educational system of Seminole County in making this appointment."

"I feel Gov. Kirk has put a darn cheap price on the position of Superintendent of Schools here when he allowed it to be brought by an individual switching his party affiliation."

"As far as giving him \$18,000, the School Board sets his salary and we do not plan to increase it next year."

"The Herald attempted to contact Phillips for a statement. He was not available. He is expected to be sworn in by Tom Adams, secretary of state, this afternoon."

During a routine school board meeting, the board accepted schematics for the proposed new Orville High School. Architects Schweitzer and Schweitzer told the board they plan to have preliminary plans ready for approval at the August School Board meeting.

Ruling Delays Court Probe On Juvenile

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—An investigation into the imprisonment of a Marion County juvenile was delayed by the 1st District Court of Appeal Wednesday.

Last month the Supreme Court ruled that juveniles were entitled to the same constitutional rights as adults—that if arrested they must be told of their right to a lawyer and their right to legal counsel.

A circuit court in Duval County subsequently ruled that the extension of the constitutional rights to juveniles was retroactive—meaning that juveniles convicted without counsel could petition for a new hearing or trial.

The Marion County youth, 15-year-old Hocke Durham from Summerfield, was sent to the Marianna School for Boys on May 16. The Supreme Court decision was handed down five days later.

The youth's attorney charged that he had been illegally imprisoned in violation of his constitutional rights.
