Presently, most citrus pulp is handled in 100-pound bags because of its non-free-flowing characteristic. If a method can be developed to allow efficient handling of citrus pulp in bulk, the money saved per bag would be 30 to 45 cents.

Dr. I. J. Ross, assistant agricultural engineer at the experiment station, says, "Materials handling research in the agricultural engineering department is being directed at the specific problem of developing reliable means of removing non-free-flowing feeds from bulk storage."

"An experimental vertical screw unloader is being tested in a hopper-bottomed storage bin to remove citrus pulp from the bin," he added. "The experimental unloader consists of a four-inch diameter auger which has been extended vertically into the cone-shaped hopper of the storage bin. It is driven by an electric motor in a direction which will pull the citrus pulp down and out of the bin."

Dr. Ross' tests with the screw auger include: RPM of the auger, height the auger must penetrate into the hopper, the power requirements to turn the auger and the capacity. So far he has learned that a one-fourth horsepower motor at 600 RPM will unload 250 pounds of citrus pulp in one minute. He is continuing the tests at various RPM and horsepower.

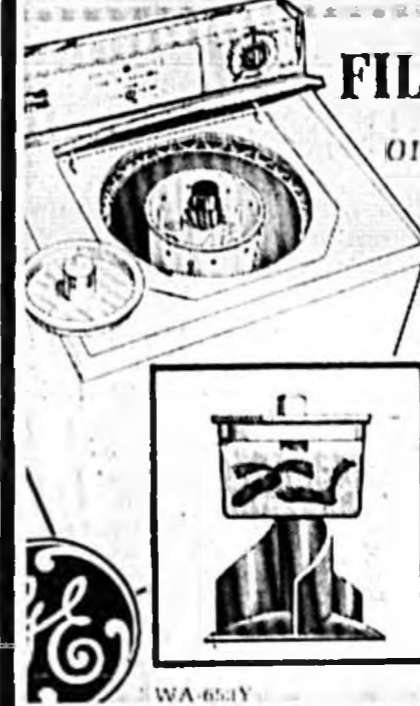

In general, the higher the moisture content of a feed,

the more difficult it is to remove the feed from bulk storage.

Dr. Ross expects that results of the experiment will be available to feed handler within one year.

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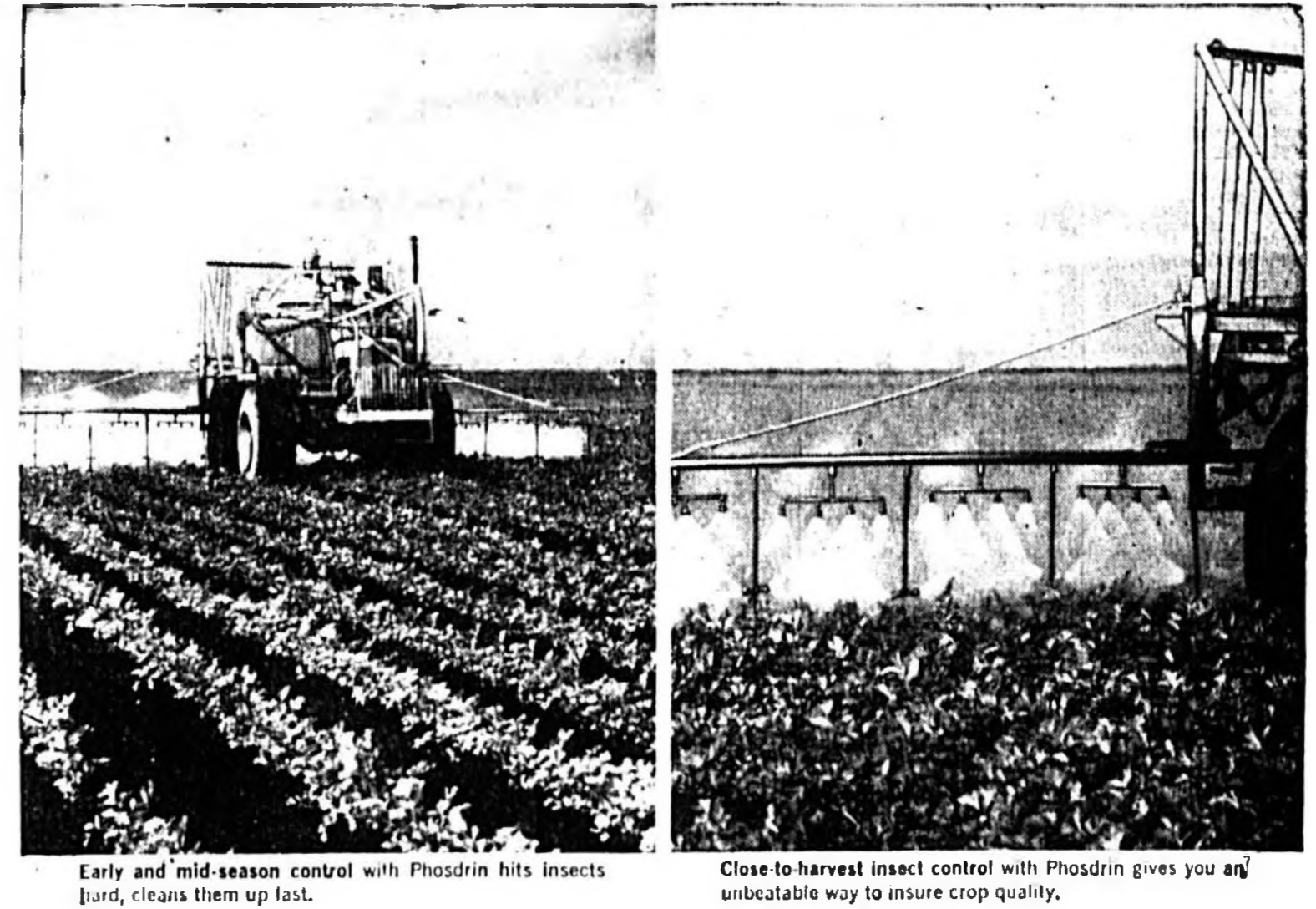

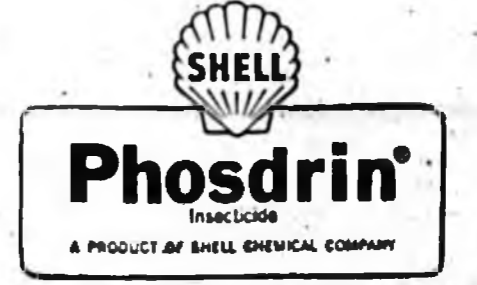

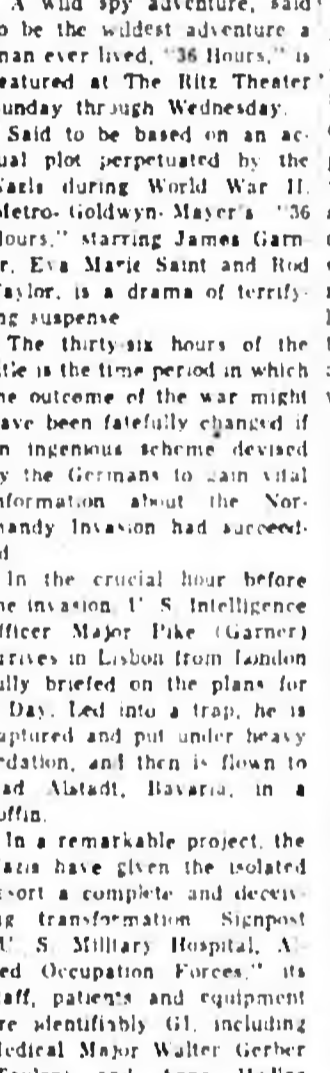

## Fat Farouk Fortune Mystery To Romans

ROME (UPI) — Former King Farouk of Egypt, despite his ponderous weight, is practically the "Invisible Man" of Italy.

The fat, goateed man who once reigned over more than 20 million Egyptians still makes his home here, but his life is modest and extremely private.

That's a far cry from when he came to Italy after a coup d'etat forced him to abdicate in July, 1952.

When Farouk arrived at the Isle of Capri after the coup, he was aboard the Egyptian royal yacht Mahroussa and had it well-stocked with whisky, champagne and gin to start his exile in proper style.

He used to be surrounded by an army of servants, friends and persons eager to satisfy his every desire.

Thousands of foreign tourists would stare at the fat man with the black pointed beard and dark glasses sitting at a table outside the Cafe de Paris on Via Veneto.

Farouk's troubles began shortly after his arrival in Italy. His yacht left Farouk, his wife, then 18-year-old commoner Queen Narriman, and their six-month-old baby King, Ahmed Faud II, and headed back to Egypt and a new regime.

Next to go was Farouk's personal yacht, the "Fakhr el Bihar" which was sold in the autumn of 1952.

Then it was Queen Narriman and the couple's son, who lost a throne before he was old enough to realize he even had one. In March, 1953, she left Farouk—taking the child—and divorced him the following year.

But Farouk was undaunted. He became one of the sights on the Via Veneto and was seen nightly in one or another of the clubs, usually with some blonde, almost always young.

## Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Thailand, standing athwart the southwesterly course any great Communist push would take, is not quite the sturdy rock pictured in much of the argument over Southeast Asia's future.

There are indeed strong elements of a kind almost totally lacking in South Viet Nam and neighboring Laos. But there are also substantial weaknesses — above and beyond the admittedly troublesome subversion in Thailand's northwest.

Look at the good side first — the side which seems to get nearly exclusive emphasis from those who contend that Peking and Hanoi are not likely to shove the Thailand "rock" aside, no matter what successes they might have in Asian lands east of it.

Thailand does have a relatively stable government, dominated by the military. Under the SEATO pact, it has firm guarantees of its borders. And it has special assurances of military backing from the United States.

It is not a country seething with anti-Western feeling, for Thailand never has been colonized by the Europeans. The worst it suffered was the indignity of several unequal treaties granting trading and other concessions to the colonial powers.

Students of Thailand's history ascribe the country's avoidance of colonial status partly to the opportunistic diplomacy of shrewd 19th century kings and partly to British and French willingness to have the country serve as a buffer between their Asian holdings.

Relatively speaking, Thailand's economy has been a solid one. Average yearly income per person is roughly 40 per cent greater than in struggling India.

Yet the offset of this encouraging evidence is considerable.

The most perilous aspect, viewed against the backdrop of possible Communist encroachment, is the apparent big gap between Thailand's and their military-dominated government.

The Thai people are long

accustomed to authoritarian government, and to a politics which concerns itself mainly with Bangkok and a few other cities and attends little to the problems of the rural areas. The old complacencies are slowly crumbling, however, as a changing world brings new complexity and diversity.

In a new book on Thailand's relationship with the United States, Frank C. Darling of the University of Colorado says this of Premier Thanom Kittikachorn and the country's army rulers:

"One of the major limitations is their inability to represent the diverse interest groups which are emerging from the gradual expansion of modern technology."

"They cannot make rational and realistic decisions on the complex technical and social problems which the country will face as it moves into more advanced stages of economic growth."

Darling is one who thinks U. S. aid, bent to the military, has helped reinforce Thailand's "political gap" and

slowed vital economic changes.

Another observer, D. Inso, who lived for years in Bangkok, agrees that the altering economic situation in Thailand is bound to have effect, particularly since a stronger middle class of managers, technicians and skilled workers is emerging.

Thailand has not held a general election since 1957, and that one was clouded by sharp charges of rigging against the governing party. There is no real progress, says Inso, "from nationalism to national participation."

Tropical productivity has made subsistence living easy except in the sometimes rain-starved northeast. But Thailand must feed a growing population and enter more and more into uncertain world markets. Some analysts doubt its easy-going people, even with varied new government development efforts, are pulling abreast of the challenge.

Together with other troubles, these problems make the Thailand "rock" a good deal less solid than granite.

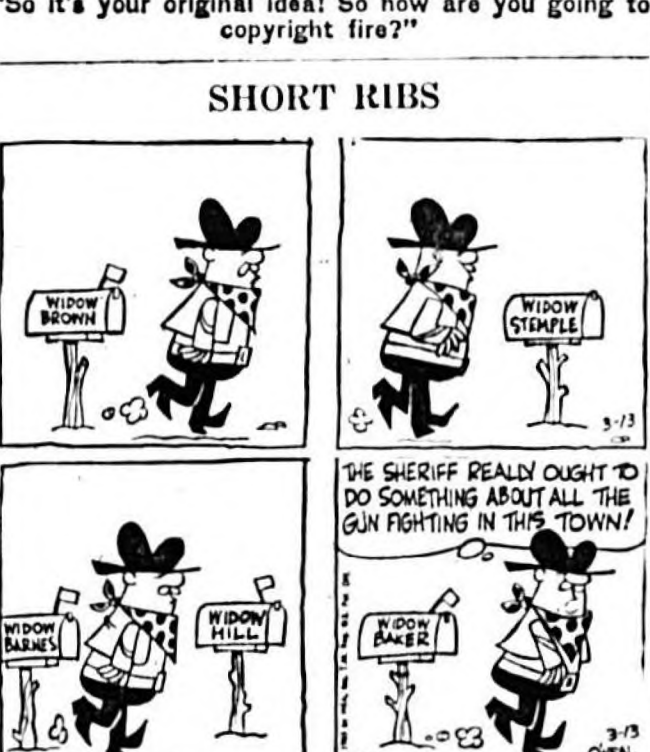
**Billy Caspar Leading Doral**
