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Engineers Support Sanford Area Port

(First Of Three) Enough potential cargo is available to support a port terminal at Sanford and the economy of the area is in excellent shape for the construction of such facilities.

Those are the findings of an engineering study ordered by the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

The report was released today by Francis E. Roumillat, Jr., chairman of the chamber's Port Authority Committee.

"The St. Johns River probably is the most valuable asset in Seminole County and we conclude that an excellent opportunity exists to develop the St. Johns and recommend that a one-berth port terminal facility be constructed. " the report prepared by Lockwood Greene Engineers, Inc., states.

The engineers view the construction of the port facility as a lure for new indus-

History shows that industry, commerce and population develop as a result of the establishment of water terminal facilities,

Economic benefits to be realized from the port, in addition to the coming of new industries, would be from two primary sources: (1) savings to the area on freight rates and (2) the monetary value added to the area economy by the movement of cargo

As for potential cargo, the Lockwood Greene report contends:

As far as import cargoes are concerned, one firm, whose name must be kept confidential at their request, indicate that they would be interested in shipping 25,000 to 100,000 tons a year of dry bulk commodity

nal would enable the barge shipment of automobiles and trucks from the Great Lakes area to Sabford.

In standard tonnage, this means that if a terminal existed at Sanford today, it would have been possible to import 81,000 tons of automobiles and trucks. Cost of minimum facilities for the Port of

Sanford are estimated at about \$530,000. Such facilities would enable the barge terminal to commence operations and expand at a later date.

The minimum cost would include wharf construction, clearing, grubbing, fill, paving and railroad work. The wharf and

transit shed deck would be the principal cost item, estimated at \$141,400. The total does not include cost of prop-

erty, legal fees or engineering. The site recommended for construction of

the water terminal is immediately west of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad bridge, crossing the St. Johns River on the west end of Lake Monroe, The area of the propcity is about 130 acres.

The site is located at the junction point of water, rail and truck transportation. U.S. Interstate 4 and U.S. Highway 17-92 are near by.

"This is a tremendous advantage not enjoyed by many other terminals," the engineers declare.

The engineering firm cautions that it will take about five years for Sanford to reap big benefits from the terminal once it is built.

They believe it will take that long to develop potential traffic and to sell the port's services to manufacturers and receivers of

St. Johns Traffic Potential Phenomenal

(Second of Three)

Potential commercial traffic at the Port of Sanford may include a veriety of commodities from citrus to ce-

The principal export cargo, according to the engineering study made for the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce by Lockwood Greene

Engineers, Inc., would be canned non-perishable citrus pro-

In a one-year period 1962-63, a total of 195,362 tons of this commodity moved to cities located on the Atlantic Intracoastal Waterway.

In addition, about 60,000 tons of citrus pulp probably will be shipped to the New England area within the next two or three years. This is another potential commodity for barge transportation.

Sugars, fertilizers and phosphates are other possible export cargos to be handled at the Port of Sanford.

One firm, which wishes to remain confidential, indicates that it would be interested in shipping 25,000 to 100,000 tons a year of dry bulk com-

modity by barge to Sanford. The Orlando newspapers use approximately 20,000 tons of newsprint per year and this probably could pass

through the port. A new newsprint mill is being constructed at Augusta, Ga., a city which already has a barge terminal on the Savannah River.

Newspapers in this area

from this mill in the future.

Merry Brothers Shipping Company estimates that it would ship 3,000 to 5,000 tons of brick per year into Sanford. They also have their own terminal facility on the Savannah River at Augusta. Another industry in the tributary area using paper, and again whose identity must remain confidential, uses paper in the amount of about 6,000 tons per year.

Columbia Nitrogen of Augusta probably will ship 2,000 to 5,000 tons per year of liquid bulk to the Sanford area by barge.

If these cargos could become captive to barge transportation using the Port of Sanford, they alone should justify a one berth barge

terminal facility, the engineering study finds. Considering all three water-

ways - the St. Johns River. the Cross-Florida Barge Canal and the St. Johns-Indian River Canal - it is estimated that the Port of Sanford would handle between 500,000 to 550,000 tons of import and export cargo per year.

However, it is believed that it will take a period of about five years to develop the potential traffic.

"The Port must be sold and the advantages of using water transportation must be pointed out to manufacturers anl receivers of goods," the engineers believe.

The engineering firm found that barge traffic on inland waterways has been increasing steadily over the years.



SELMA, Als. (UPI) -Cky police today removed a 30-foot long wooden barricade called the 'Selma Wall' put up to stop hundreds of white and Negro civil rights demonstrators from marching on the county courthouse.

"Today is voter registration day. If they want to go down and register, they can," said Public Safety Commissioner Wilson Baker,

Baker pointed out Dallas County is under a federal court order to speed up the registration process.

The barricades were removed at 7 a. m. after the demonstrators had maintained another all-night vigil they first took up last Wednesday at a point on Sylvan Street in a Negro housing area.

The demonstration on Sylvan Street began as a prayer vigil and protest in the fatal beating of the Rev. James Reeb, a 38-year-old white Unitarian minister, attacked by whites last Tuesday night.
