MIAMI, Sept. 14. (AP)—A hurricane of near record velocity, whipped by winds estimated as high as 135 miles per hour, was reported driving toward the Florida coast 570 miles southeast of Miami at 10:15 A.M. (EWT) today. As the storm approached, all army transport planes were sent away to safer fields in Alabama and Tennessee. Many planes had already taken off for other destinations. The A-24s also ordered all troops to be ready for evacuation. At the present rate of movement, averaging 17 M.P.H., the storm is expected to reach the Florida coast about 7 P.M. Saturday.

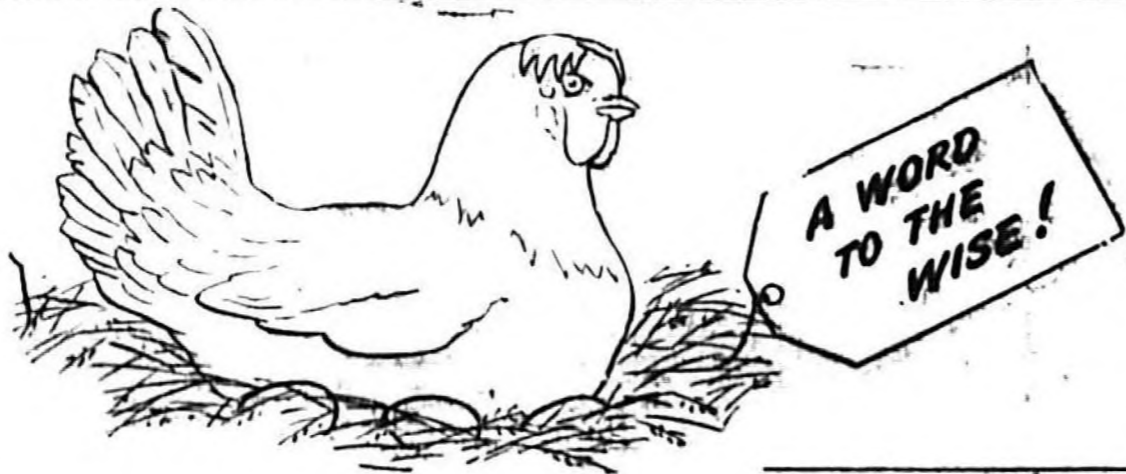

Enrollment At County Schools Seen Increasing

Sense work in Orlando for 20 months. He reported an enrollment of 229, approximately the same as last year.
South Side Primary School, according to Mrs. J.G. Mitchell, principal, has an enrollment of 340, about the same as last year. The first grade is larger and the fourth grade shows a decrease as compared with last term. The West Side Primary School of which Mrs. Marion St. John is principal, has 116 pupils.
The most noticeable change at Seminole High School is the moving of the library from next to the principal's office to much roomier quarters formerly used as a music room in the southwest wing. Miss Edna Chittenden has returned as school librarian after serving as librarian at the Sanford Naval Air Station. She expressed herself as most pleased with the library and pointed out that 40 pupils at a time could use it as compared with 24 in the former quarters.
Adjoining the school library is a small stock room where books may be repaired and papers and magazines stored. The library has about 4,000 books, and according to Principal Harman E. Morris, the outstanding in the state for its reference books and encyclopedias. Approximately 35 standard magazines are regularly subscribed for and five newspapers, giving students plenty of up-to-date reading matter. New shelves are being added and recent expenditures will make possible the addition of many new books both of fiction and non-fiction.
The room vacated is being refurnished and painted and will provide much larger and more convenient office quarters for the school. The rest of the office will serve for space in which to file records. In the basement the cafeteria operated under direction of Mrs. Pearl Hansell has been rearranged for convenience, and a snack bar added for sandwiches and soft drinks and ice cream. Tables and chairs have been repainted in green. Tasty and nourishing meals are available at very moderate cost.
The school faculty, numbering 23, includes the following new teachers: M.V. Wilkins, instructor in physics and algebra; Miss Jessie Durden, who succeeds Mrs. Lee Samuels as girls physical instruction teacher; Miss Ollie Reese Whittle, former music teacher at Leon High School, Tallahassee who succeeds Mrs. Ruth Jackson as teacher of music; Mrs. Nellie Coleman, who returns as Latin teacher; Mrs. Mary Green, teacher of junior English and Miss Chittenden, librarian.
Class presidents recently named are: Glen Lingle Jr., seniors; Harold Kastner, Jr., juniors; Kay Shoemaker, sophomores, and Stanley Bramley, Freshmen. Names of cheer leaders will be announced soon.

Principal Morris pointed out the exceptionally fine condition of the football field which was completely resodded, and has been made free of sandbars by the Junior class. Ample rains have resulted in a fine carpet of grass. In addition the stands have been repaired and made ready for the first home game with Seabreeze on Oct. 5.
At Junior High School the following new faculty members have been added: Mrs. T.I. Harris, 8th grade English instructor, and former teacher of English in Seminole High School. She is a graduate of the Florida State College for Women and has an AB degree as is also Miss Elizabeth Whigham, teacher of 7th grade English who also has an AB degree.
At opening exercises Monday, Sept. 11, T.W. Lawton introduced Mr. True as principal. Pledge to the Flag was led by Edward Marshall.

South Side Primary School has 12 teachers including two new members of the faculty: Mrs. S.O. Shindler, second grade teacher, and Mrs. Troy Ray, fourth grade teacher. The latter has been connected until recently with the State Welfare office.
Mrs. Mitchell, for 20 years a teacher in local schools is very interested in people, "especially children," and today praised the fine work and orderly records kept by the late principal, Mrs. Stella Arrington.
A new and large refrigerator has been added to the school kitchen room which is operated by Mrs. Arley Banks. For better ventilation a big blower fan is being installed in one of the windows of the school auditorium. Activities of the South Side PTA of which Mrs. J.E. Collins is president, are expected to start soon. It is interesting to note in this connection that at the Grammar School a separate PTA group may soon be formed, according to Principal Steele.
All school buses have been repainted and now arrive at the South Side Primary School at 8:45 a.m. instead of 9:00 o'clock as during last term.

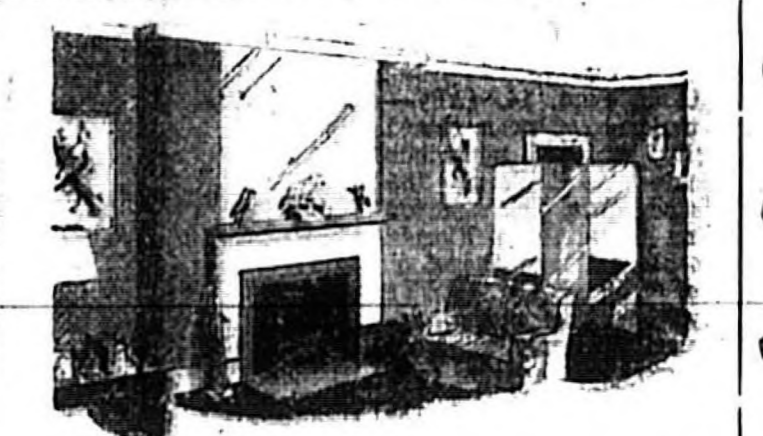

MacArthur Says 'No Kid Gloves' In Dealing With Japs

Continued From Page Two

TOKYO, Friday, Sept. 14 (AP)—The Japanese Government yesterday asked and was given the job of arresting its own suspected war criminals but was expected to get results within two days.

Otherwise, U. S. Eighth Army headquarters intimated, the Americans again will step in and corral the war-makers, Black Dragon jingos and prison camp tyrants who face court martial as war criminals.

The Japanese asked permission to act after Hideko Togo, the fallen war-time dictator, shot and seriously wounded himself Tuesday when American troops came to arrest him at his home in a Tokyo suburb.

The request of the Government obviously was made to save "face," not only for these in the list ranging from highest ranking officials to prison camp guards but for the Government itself.

There was also the possibility that the Japanese thought they might be able to head off a heralded epidemic among the accused.

The Japanese undertook to hand over every Japanese of General MacArthur's list of "wanted" men who is not now in custody.

Ogata Faces Charges

That would include Chief Cabinet Secretary Taketora Ogata, accused of being a member of the Black Dragon Society of Super-Patriots.

Already the Japanese Government had stripped Ogata of his position as president of the board of information (propaganda) but for the moment at least he clung to his cabinet position.

The Japanese cabinet in special session was wrestling with the problem of what to do with elements within the Government that would be unsavory to MacArthur.

Occupation Proceeds

Some Japanese sources, including the superintendent of the Tokyo police, denied that Ogata belonged to the Black Dragon Society of terrorists, as MacArthur's headquarters charged in ordering his arrest.

The seven tenor of occupation was maintained with the Japanese Government announcing the dissolution of two hotbeds of militarism and aggression.

In accordance with MacArthur's demands, imperial headquarters were disbanded, and 15,220 students of the Naval College at the Annapolis, of Japan, were dismissed.

Emperor Hirohito was advised of the dissolution of Imperial Headquarters, set up in 1940 to coordinate Army and Navy operations, by three of Japan's top ranking military officials.

They were Gen. Yoshijiro Umuza, Army Chief of Staff who signed the surrender documents; Adm. Soemu Toyoda, Navy Chief of Staff, and Gen. Sachiu Bhimomura, minister of war.

MacArthur's headquarters announced that Gen. Walter Kraeger would arrive at the western Kyushu naval base of Sasebo September 20 to arrange for the landings of his U. S. Sixth Army of Occupation two days later.

Year. How? Ah, they can't but
will they?

This growing rash of strikes
which is retarding production and
spreading to the radio broadcasting
where so-called "glitter tuners"
those "skilled workers" who are
hired to turn the records over
at the radio stations and must be
expertly trained to order not drop
them has decided that the public
does not fully appreciate their
importance. Must have it
thoroughly brought home that
their minimum wage of \$40 is
not enough. We sometimes think
that a lot of these strikes are
aimed more against the public
than against the employers.

General MacArthur is being
promoted by the New York Daily
News and other papers for the
presidency of the United States
in 1948. MacArthur is a very
popular figure now, probably
America's most popular general.
He is a good speaker and would
make a strong race. But how
popular would he be if he told
the people that the government
can't go on borrowing money for-
ever, that it must trim its sails
to suit the breeze and the breeze
in this case is what the people
are willing to pay in taxes. Even
General MacArthur whom
half a million people in Washing-
ton turned out to cheer the other
day, would soon sink into obscuri-
ty with such forthrightness.

We like the suggestions ad-
vanced by the Kiwanis Club for
the improvement of Sanford. In
some respects they compare very
favorably with those proposed by
the Rotarians. However, we note
a tendency by many people to
support some projects for the
development of Sanford, in oppo-
sition to others designed for the
same purpose. A person is for the
swimming pool if he likes to
swim but he is against the ten-
nis courts because he does not
play tennis. He is for the hos-
pital if he expects ever to have
to go there himself against it
if he can afford to go some-
where else. We submit that this
attitude is exactly what has kept
Sanford from ever doing any-
thing in the past. A town divided
against itself will fall.

President Truman says it is
ally to say that the United
States is financing Britain's ex-
periments in socialism just be-
cause we intend to lend them
money. But doesn't that depend
on how Britain uses the money
we lend them. If she buys coal
mines, now privately owned, with
it, we would certainly seem to
be financing their socialism. If
she uses the money to rebuild
bomb shattered government build-
ings or schools or hospitals, that
would seem to be a legitimate and
reasonably democratic government
expenditure. But since the Demo-
crats made great capital of pri-
vate loans to Britain before and
after the last war, we can ex-
pect the Republicans to be simi-
larly critical of government loans
now. It strikes us there is con-
siderable politics in aid-to-Britain
no matter who grants it.

General John J. Pershing cele-
brated his 85th birthday in Wash-
ington yesterday, proud of his
own military career, proud of the
new Army which has just won
the greatest war in history, and
for which he helped to lay the
foundation, and proud of his own
son, Major Warren Pershing, the
only survivor of his family, the
victim of a Mexican raid in
1914. Pershing wanted his only
son to follow in his own foot-
steps but he could not get into
West Point on account of his
eyes. There followed an interval in
business and then came the war
when the Army was glad to
have young Pershing, in spite of
his bad eyes, as a back private.
He led a company and developed a
duty just like any other soldier.
Warren Pershing has risen to his
present rank of major after
nearly five years of service. No
doubt his father is proud of
him.

The People Pay

It has recently been made pretty clear that the Amer-
ican people are being roundly blamed for their colossal
ignorance and abject stupidity which led to their almost
total unpreparedness for the Jap attack at Pearl Harbor.
What is not yet quite so plain is that the groundwork is al-
ready being laid for the same sort of blame being heaped
upon their shoulders after the next calamity befalls this
country.

Not everyone thought that the United States could
continue to stand astride the path of further Japanese ag-
gressions without having to fight. Many of us said so in
no uncertain terms. Many of us warned again and again
that war was inevitable if the pro-war policies were pursued
and urged with all the power at our command that public
funds being sunk in bond-selling projects be devoted to
preparation and that young men in CCC camps be trained
to march.

But unfortunately not everyone in this country reads
the newspapers, or owns a radio, and many who do seldom
get beyond the comic pages or the sob stories, and so did
not know what was going on in the world. It was also
unfortunate that many who knew, blindly placed their faith
in those elected to office and trusted them to keep us out
of trouble. In a democracy the majority rules and the
majority, prior to Pearl Harbor, seemed to think we were
sufficiently prepared, if they gave it any thought at all.

There are some today who see the folly of the policy
we are now pursuing. Loud voices are raised in favor of
government economy, following the most expensive crisis
this nation has ever survived. Bankers, industrialists, ortho-
dox economists and not a few political leaders are agreed
that further extravagance can only prove disastrous. It
seems almost axiomatic that the government cannot go on
indefinitely spending more than it raises through taxes
without serious fiscal consequences.

And yet there are lots of people who, if they give the
matter any thought at all, relegate it to a position of
secondary importance as compared with their own in-
terests. If they are government employees they
demand a 30 hour week with the same old 30 hour pay-
ment. If they are congressmen they want their salaries raised
to \$2,000 a year regardless of what they are worth or what
the government can afford to pay.

If they are war workers about to lose their fabulous
jobs, they want the government to raise the ante for bud-
geting about 75 percent and extend it for another three months.
If they are interested in foreign exports, they want the
government to lend three to six billion dollars to Britain
five to France, and various amounts to other countries,
with very little prospect whatever of ever getting any of it
back.

All this may add another 30 billion dollars to the pres-
ent debt of 300 billion and many additional billions in the
years to come. And, with higher taxes obviously de-
manded for such a program, in response to howls of pro-
tests from the taxpayers, President Truman promises a
five billion dollar cut in taxes. Thus everybody gets exactly
what he wants, bigger and bigger government handouts
and lower taxes.

As we said in the beginning, there are those who
warn against the folly of any such policy, but there are
too many who either do not read or do not want to be
bothered. And when the crash comes, there will be those
who will say "The American people were to blame."

Well-Earned Reward

Lieut. Gen. Wainwright's promotion to a full general
ship may be, as he suggests, an unusual reward or the
commander of a defeated army, but it will be generally
apprehended.

Everybody knows that Gen. Wainwright's defeat was
no fault of his own, and that he had a laudable assign-
ment in being made to stay behind and fight with out
one possible and, surrender. Then followed three years of
imprisonment and gnawing his heart out over the fate
of the men under his command. Gen. Wainwright and his
fellow-prisoners have earned pretty nearly any reward that
the United States can give them.

I concluded my London visit
Monday afternoon with a 15
minute talk with former Prime
Minister Winston Churchill. Mr.
and Mrs. Churchill are living in
the apartment of their daughter
and son-in-law until they can get
a house of their own in Lon-
don. The housing shortage is
such in London that it is not
easy for a former Prime Min-
ister to find a place in which to
live.

Mr. Churchill looks so young in
spite of his 70 years that I told
him that he surely must have
visited our Fountain of Youth in
Florida. He was very much con-
cerned about the stoppage of
Lend-Lease by the United States
to Great Britain. One of the
things which has struck me most
forcibly both in London and here
is that aid from the United States
is the only hope these people
have against sinking to a stand-
ard of living which will produce
famine, economic and then, Pol-
itical Chaos. If we are to keep
Free Enterprise in the world and
preserve a strong European Mar-
ket for our manufactured goods
and farm products, we must, in a
wise and business-like way, help
these people get out of the slough
of war.

Mr. Churchill spoke movingly of
President Roosevelt and of his
admiration and affection for him.
I flew over to Paris in a con-
verted flying fortress belonging to
Ambassador Winant. The crew
was the crew of the famous Fly-
ing Fortress "Hells Angels" which
did such a heroic job bombing
Germany.

I have been getting an insight
into the conditions in France and
what kind of market we can
expect in France for our Ameri-
can goods. Prices are at least
four or five times normal here.
The Black Market flourishes
everywhere because supplies of
everything, including food, are so
very inadequate for the people.

Col. Hilsman Rescued by Son At Prison Camp

Captain Parachutes On Mukden, Finds Father Sitting On Cot

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14. (AP)—The story of how Captain R.F. Hilsman Jr., of San Antonio, Tex., was part of a parachute rescue team which on Aug. 16 freed his father, Colonel R.F. Hilsman, from a Japanese prison camp in Mukden, Manchuria, was revealed this week by the Office of Strategic Services.

Colonel Hilsman was captured on Negros Island in the Philippines in July, 1942. He had last seen his son in 1940 and had no idea he was a captain with the O.S.S. Captain Hilsman, on the other hand, was convinced that his father was being held at Hoken camp in Mukden. He asked his commanding officer, Colonel Richard P. Heppner, in command of the O.S.S. China area, for permission to join the O.S.S. parachute mission sent in to free Allied prisoners.

Permission was granted, and he landed to find his father sitting on the edge of his wooden prison cot. Both Hilsmans were over-

come with emotion at first to speak. Soon, however, they were comparing notes on their experiences. Their main hope was to be able to return home together to surprise their wife and mother. Mrs. Roger Hilsman in San Antonio.

Colonel Hilsman, West Point graduate and a regular Army officer like his son, was in command of Negros Island when the Japanese invaded. He managed to hold out for two months after the fall of the main garrison at Corregidor, but had to surrender to stronger Japanese forces. Colonel Hilsman's own force, composed of Filipino troops with American officers, was at one time armed mainly with .22-caliber target rifles. The colonel, slight and wiry

Oct. 15 Is Last Day To Mail Xmas Gifts

Starting Saturday, Sept. 15 and ending Oct. 15, Christmas parcels may be mailed to men and women in the service overseas, according to Postmaster Joel Field.

Parcels must not exceed 5 pounds in weight or 16 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. Not more than one Christmas parcel or package shall be accepted for mailing in any one week when sent by or on behalf of the same person or concern to or for the same addressee.

It is absolutely necessary that all articles for overseas be packed in boxes of metal, wood, solid fiberboard, or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard testing at least 200 pounds. When boxes are wrapped in an outside cover of strong paper, be sure that names and addresses of both sender and addressee are written plainly on the box itself. Do not attempt to mail parcels with name and address printed or written on a sticker alone.

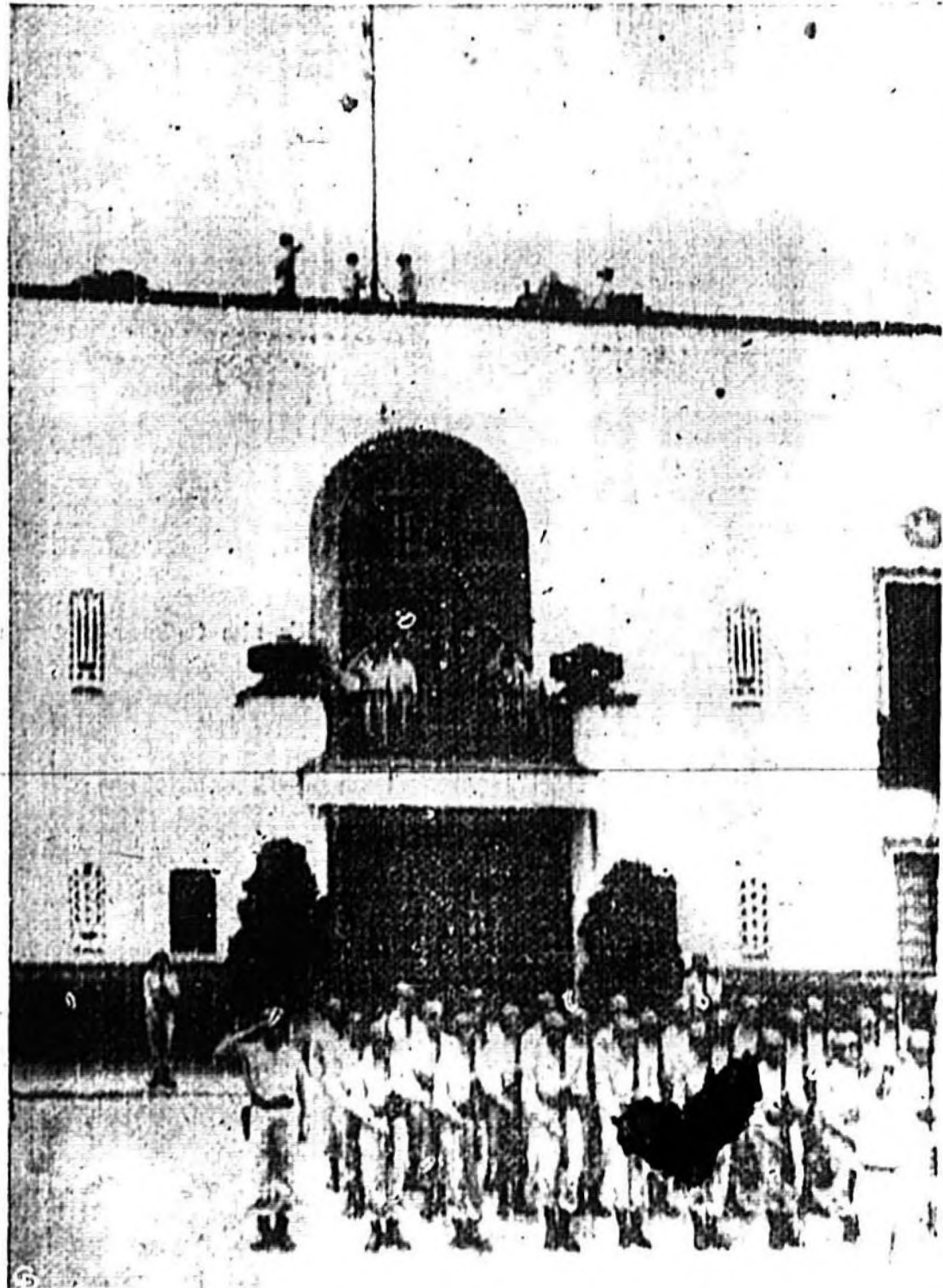

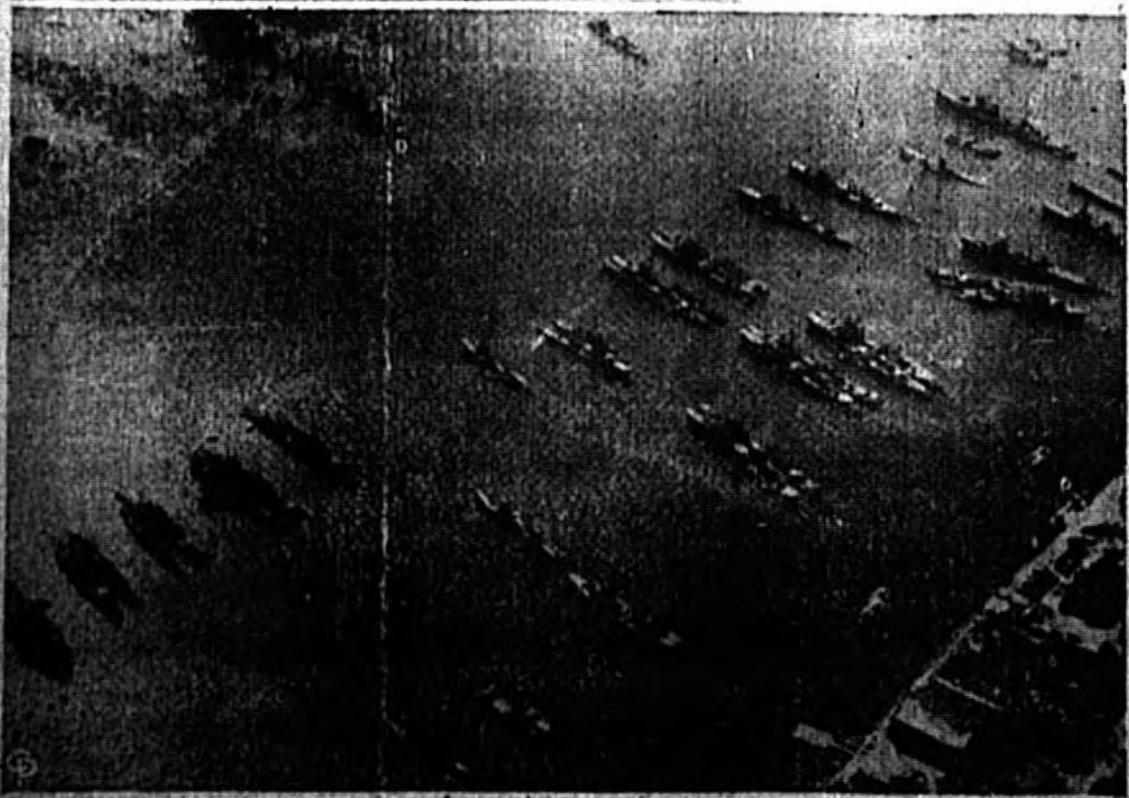

Auto Strike Spreads With Crisis Looming

CIO Union Demands 30 Percent Wage Hike And Prepares For Strike Of 500,000

DETROIT, Sept. 17, (AP)—More than 70,000 workers were idle in the Detroit area today as the huge automotive industry and powerful United Automobile Workers (UAW) Union headed for a showdown on union demands for a general 30 per cent wage increase.

Strikes and layoffs idled 70,000 workers in Detroit and 10,000 in nearby Windsor, Ont., while NAW-CIO leaders went ahead with plans for a possible strike vote affecting 500,000 throughout the nation auto plants.

Striking Kelsey-Hayes workers refused yesterday to heed the call of their union executives and resume production of vital automotive parts.

Thus the gigantic automotive industry started a new recession work week with strikes and shut-downs making 80,000 men and women idle in the Detroit area, and the threat of strikes involving some 500,000 more over the nation.

The CIO United Automobile Workers has pledged \$4,000,000—virtually all its resources—to a fight for an industry wide 30 percent wage increase.

Of auto's big three, Ford has already closed, blaming lack of vital parts; General Motors has been served notice that the union will call on the NLRB to conduct a strike vote, and Chrysler waits on the outcome of a union meeting called for next Sunday which will determine whether a similar vote will be sought.

Only 350 of the 4500 Kelsey-Hayes workers on a "wildcat" strike demanding the rehiring of three workers attended a mass meeting Sunday presided over by Percy Lewellyn, administrator for the UAW, who was appointed by the UAW executive board.

Situation unfavorable
"The situation looks unfavorable, but my job is to stay with the workers," declared Lewellyn.

Lewellyn, who said he was well-received by the strikers, told a press conference that he recommended a return to work that the meeting took no action on his recommendation.

In the meantime the local bargaining committee was reported to have recommended that the strike be continued and the local was said to have approved.

The meeting, regular monthly session of the local, was held in private. It was reported that Lewellyn indicated he did not know what steps the UAW-CIO might take next. He said no plans were made for another meeting of a strikers who have been off the job since Aug. 23.

The closing of the Kelsey-Hayes plant was held chiefly responsible for the decision of Ford to send 60,000 workers home for lack of brake and wheel parts.

The background of the strike—a comparatively small but vital one in the troubled labor picture—was the ejection from the plant of two company foremen last April.

Funeral services for Mr. Rae will be held at 8:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon at the Erickson Funeral Home with the Rev. W. P. Brooks officiating. Interment will be in Evergreen Cemetery. Active pallbearers will be Henry Schumaker, Henry Foster, Bart Wright, Jim Cassidy, Harlie Starnes and S.H. Ernest.

Senator Proposes Storm Crosses Florida, Moves Into Atlantic

4 Billion Dollar Tax Cut In 1946

Personal Income And Excess Profits Tax Would Be Eased

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17, (AP)—Elimination of the three per cent normal tax on personal income and the 95 per cent excess profits levy against corporations was proposed by Representative Knutson (D. Va.) yesterday in bringing about a \$4,000,000,000 cut in 1946 tax burdens.

The Virginian, member of the tax-controlling House Ways and Means Committee, set the issue for a stalling battle in Congress, on reducing wartime taxes.

His plan clashed head on with Knutson's proposal, which would exempt from the 95 per cent excess profits tax and means Republican that personal income levies be trimmed 20 per cent all along the board.

Knutson would have each person compute his 1946 taxes on present rates and exemptions, and then cut the amount by one-fifth. Tax as a better means of deductions would be cut similarly under his plan.

In a statement, Robertson said the three per cent normal tax would be a better means of reducing taxes on over \$4,000,000 personal incomes because:

1. It was imposed on all net incomes over \$100 a year.

2. It was a measure to distribute the unavoidable burden of war taxes and without regard to the fundamental peacetime policy of ability to pay.

3. Its elimination would help to sustain purchasing power in 1946 during a period of falling national income.

4. Such relief would provide relief to all on the same percentage basis, but the measure of actual relief would be greatest where the need is greatest.

5. Congress in the 1941 revenue act substituted the three per cent normal tax for the wartime three per cent "Victory Tax." Its elimination would reduce some \$2,000,000,000 of income persons from paying some \$52.50 on a total tax liability of \$102.50, whereas if his income were \$750 on a total tax liability of \$9.50.

6. If relief be given by means of a 20 per cent credit against total tax liability (as proposed by Knutson), which would cut the Treasury more than the elimination of the normal tax, the relief in the first instance would be only \$20.50, whereas in the second it would be \$1,875.

7. Action Planned Before November
Robertson said his proposal is based on an assumption: 1. That the national income in 1946 will not fall below \$130,000,000,000; 2. Revenue from existing rates in that year would not be less than \$39,000,000,000; and 3. That the budget for fiscal 1947 (the year beginning next July 1) will be limited to essential expenses and will not exceed \$28,000,000,000.

Sanford Rides Out Storm With Little Damage

Over Seven Inches Of Rain Fell In One Day As Wind Reaches 50 M.P.H.

Sanford emerged this morning with minor damage after a tough struggle from rain and buffeting from hurricane winds Sunday but growers in the vicinity have undoubtedly sustained heavy losses in celery, seed beds and other crops due to the almost universal flooding of the farm area. No injuries were reported by the police or sheriff's offices.

According to County Agent C. R. Lawson, the heavy crop appears to be a total loss and everything done so far will have to be done in the next few days.

Rainfall was heavy, amounting to 7.3 inches as compared with 7.0 inches in the storm last year according to H. F. Whitner, weatherman.

However, this time the rain fell within a much shorter period of time and the ground was already saturated by the recent rains. This caused the heavy flooding of certain low areas. The barometer fell down to 29.1 at 1:40 P. M. Sunday then rose. Wind shifted to the east and the Sanford Naval Air Station when the remainder of the day was calm.

Agricultural damage of the storm was heavy, which fall crops were in the early stages of growth. It is estimated that heavy flooding damaged about 800 acres of land.

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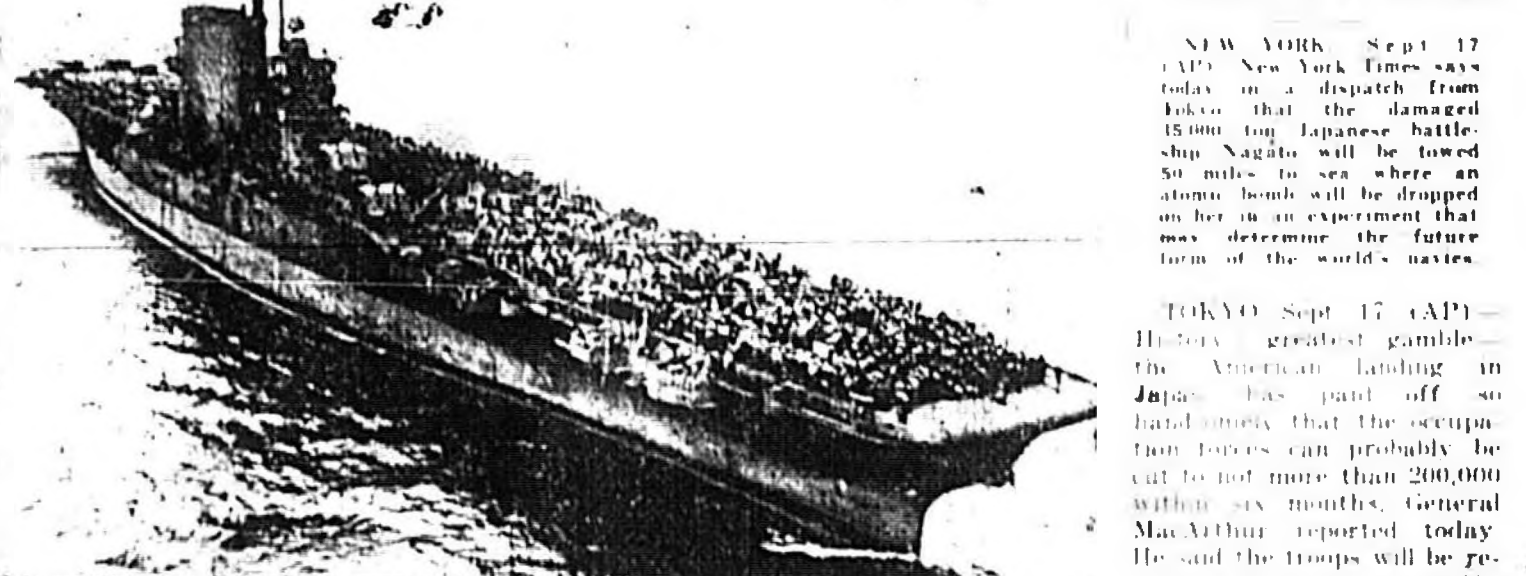
