




Thus far yesterday, the military said, British fighters have destroyed 39 German aircraft over the Dunkerque sector and may have destroyed six others.

128 Students Receive Diplomas At Commencement Night Exercises

Before a capacity crowd of approximately 1,200 people that filled every seat in the high school auditorium, lined up in the back and along the sides, and overflowed in the corridors and on window sills, the graduates received their diplomas.

In his address entitled "What? How? and Why?" Mr. Lawton pointed out that "the average senior has spent 1,120 hours preparing for something ahead. It is the product of these hours that is for sale, not the hours themselves."

"Don't be a job hunter," said Mr. Lawton. "That is, don't ask for a job merely on the basis that you need one. Sell yourself. You have something to offer. Such assets as character, ability, pep, personality, even a pleasing smile are good selling points."

"Above all demonstrate continued courage and unflinching determination as you face the world."

While stressing the point that new jobs are now open to young graduates in such fields as personnel administration, air travel, the rooming, clubbing, beauty shops, hairdressing and other lines, Mr. Lawton stated, "there are many jobs not yet created. Perhaps you 128 graduates will create 128 new jobs."

"Climaxing his address," he said, "of the 128 seniors who have lived only 2000 are written in history. Your chance of achieving anything is now in your hands. You are the only two who are listed because of great wealth. Your contribution to society may be your value in the world."

G. E. McKay, principal of Seminole High School, gave out the diplomas one by one to the 128 seniors. The boys were clad in sober black robes and the girls wore white gowns.

Silent prayer was said for W. E. Betts, Jr., a well-known Sanford boy who was to have graduated with the outgoing class. Betts, who died of a heart attack two months ago, was awarded a diploma posthumously.

Dr. Browning, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, led the seniors and audience in prayer.

A large number of medals were awarded. James Blair was awarded the Peter Schuch trophy given to the most valuable player on the 1939 football squad.

Walter Anderson, a freshman boy, gained the Dr. E. D. Moberly medal for turning in the best scholarship average for the entire year of 1939.

The Long Medal, an honorary medal for the highest grade over a four year period, was awarded to Patricia Reynolds.

Karl Neumann, representing the Kiwanis Club, presented a medal and letter to Ed Higgins, Jr., president of the Kiwanis-sponsored Key Club.

The Wart Jewelry Co. presented a watch to the senior class president, James Blair, for the year's most outstanding young man. Charles Chapman for girls presentation, Thomas Bell for boy's presentation.

Bondholders Lose Another Round In Fight To Cancel City Bonds

Circuit Court Of Appeals Upholds Validity Of Amendment Invoked By Sanford

The City of Sanford won another round in its fight with the holders of its old bonds. City Attorney Fred R. Wilson said today, when the Circuit Court of Appeals concurred in a decision of the district court and upheld the validity of the Pepper Amendment to the Municipal Bankruptcy Law which the City is seeking to invoke to force these minority creditors to enter into the refunding program.

In its decision, a copy of which was received by Mr. Wilson yesterday afternoon, the Circuit Court of Appeals refused to allow the appellants to set aside the action of the district court which issued an order rejecting the appellants' objections and denied the appellants' motion to dismiss the City's action.

These bondholders have in their possession \$12,000 of the City's bonds. They have declined to exchange these bonds for the refunding series which bears a lower rate of interest than the bonds they hold.

The bondholders sought to have the amendment under which the City is attempting to force them to exchange held invalid by arguing that the consent of those who have exchanged their bonds before the amendment was passed were not sufficient to force the plan upon them. This amendment provides for such action.


Attorney Wilson, who has handled the entire bankruptcy proceedings for the City, said that the decision of the circuit court will mean that the City will not have to pay the appellants' costs. They may appeal this decision to the United States Supreme Court, they may attack the composition of the plan which the City has mapped out in its bond exchange, they may enter the refunding program, or they may make an agreement with the City to settle these bonds outside the refunding program.

Such an agreement has already been discussed with certain of the creditors but no plan favorable to both parties was worked out.

"That the amendment was intended to reach and provide a remedy for the wretched situation which the City of Sanford finds itself in, I think there can be no doubt," the court said in its decision.

PARIS, June 4.—(AP)—The war ministry announced today the latest figures in yesterday's raid on Paris had reached 900 victims, including 254 dead and 652 wounded.

The massive figures placed the dead at 46, and injured at 200. Additional bodies have been discovered in the ruins of buildings demolished or burned by hundreds of Nazi planes which swarmed over Paris and some of the wounded reported earlier have died.

Of the dead, 125 were civilians, and 50 soldiers. The wounded included 543 civilians and 107 soldiers.

Canada may be used as a base for the British empire's fight against Germany—in event of a Nazi conquest of England—it was indicated today by Prime Minister Churchill who told the Commons:

"We shall never surrender."

And even if this island or even a part of it is subjected and starved, then our empire across the seas, armed and guarded by the British fleet, will carry on the struggle until in God's good time the new world in all its strength and might sets forth to the rescue and liberation of the old."

Churchill would be the point to conflict among the empire's dominions and colonies.

Churchill told the cheering Commons that a fleet of 1,000 Allied ships had rescued 335,000 French and British soldiers in the great retreat from Flanders.

Officer Tells Of Allied Stand In Flanders Battle

LONDON, June 4.—(AP)—A Belgian staff officer said last night his nation has "a quarter million men" training in France and hopes to have 500,000 troops in the field by fall to replace those surrendered by King Leopold III.

A major of Belgian grenadiers told how Belgian officers, non-coms and privates knelt on the beach every beach at Le Pannes, near Dunkerque and begged to be taken off to "fight again for Belgium's honor."

"They had fought a good fight," he said. "They had been without food, without ammunition, without sleep for nearly two weeks. They had seen their world collapse, and they still wanted to fight."

He told of conditions which led to King Leopold's surrender.

"The Germans hit us hard and rolled us back from the beach," he related. "We had 500 tanks, planes and when they were gone we were at the mercy of the German air craft. Our planes were busy elsewhere on the coast while we did not have a single shot left."
