STUDENTS URGED TO HELP SUPPORT CAMPAIGN OF NRA

Appeal Made To University Groups By New York Leader

NEW YORK—With a stirring appeal to university students to help in lining up public opinion back of the national recovery administration, formation of a bar committee to interpret debatable points under the "Blue Eagle" code and preparations for a conference of representatives of 800 civic and trade organizations, the local campaigners have swung into a rapid stride for the second midweek of their activities.

The appeal to university students was voiced by Grover Whalen, chairman of the city re-employment committee, before more than 500 summer session students, faculty members and teachers at New York University, recently.

The students are seeing a new economic structure rising—not out of textbooks, but from an ideal that may have existed in the minds of great thinkers of the past, Mr. Whalen said.

"By a single stroke, the President, in creating the National Recovery Act, has revolutionized the economic world that was crumbling and its fragments crashing down upon the defenseless heads of employers, worker and consumer alike."

The fortunes of the Indian princes, in the opinion of Richard Lewinsohn (the author of this list) have most successfully withstood the world crisis.

It is supposed that the greatest of all fortunes is that of the Nizam of Hyderabad, whose treasury in gold and jewels alone is said to amount to \$600,000,000.

Contrary to general belief, the German expert points out, England rather than America is the country of large fortunes. More romantic in origin, most spectacular in such outstanding figures as the Morgans, the Fords, the Rockefellers, the Mellons, the American wealth is said to be 'less solid' and less evenly distributed.

The combined fortunes of these seventeen men might easily settle in full all the debts of the world, but, as the Literary Digest succinctly remarks, there is no danger of their doing it.

Gen. Johnson's Address To Retailers

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The National Industrial Recovery Act is the most significant legislation since the war.
