

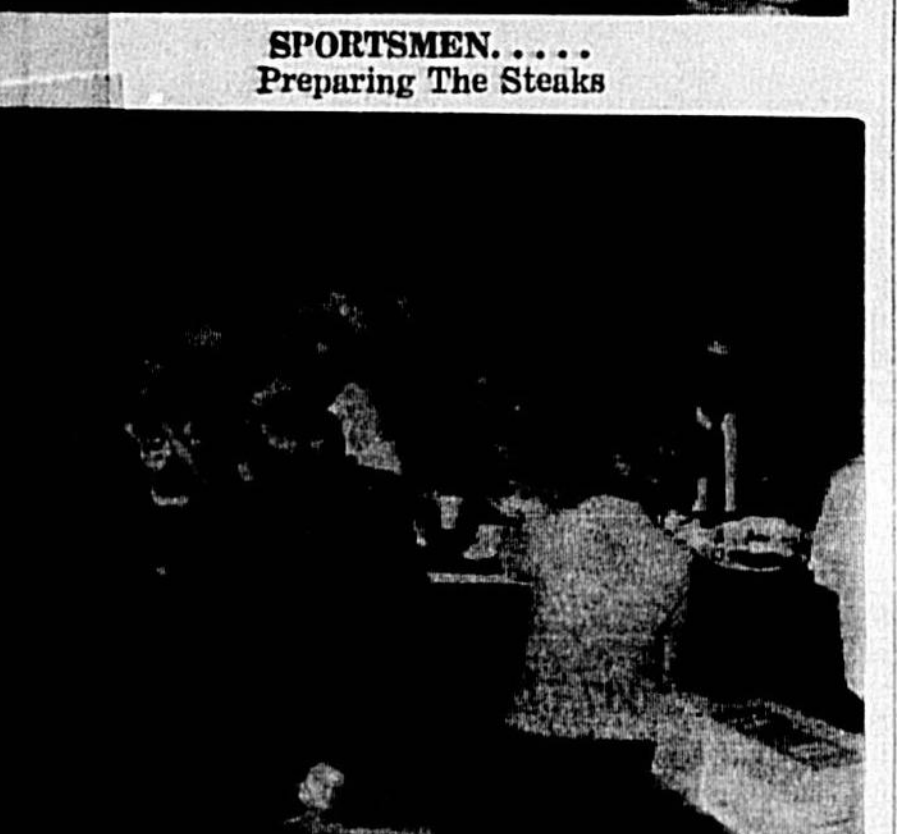
KNEE DEEP in OUTDOORS

The pitcher-in Pirates, trailing the Dodgers by 2½ games with five to play will see Bob Veale, Vern Law and Woody Fryman the rest of the way. Of the trio, only Fryman is completely sound physically.

Los Angeles, with six left, has Don Drysdale, who has pitched 111 innings and the country's No. 11 arthritic patient, Sandy Koufax, set for the stretch drive.

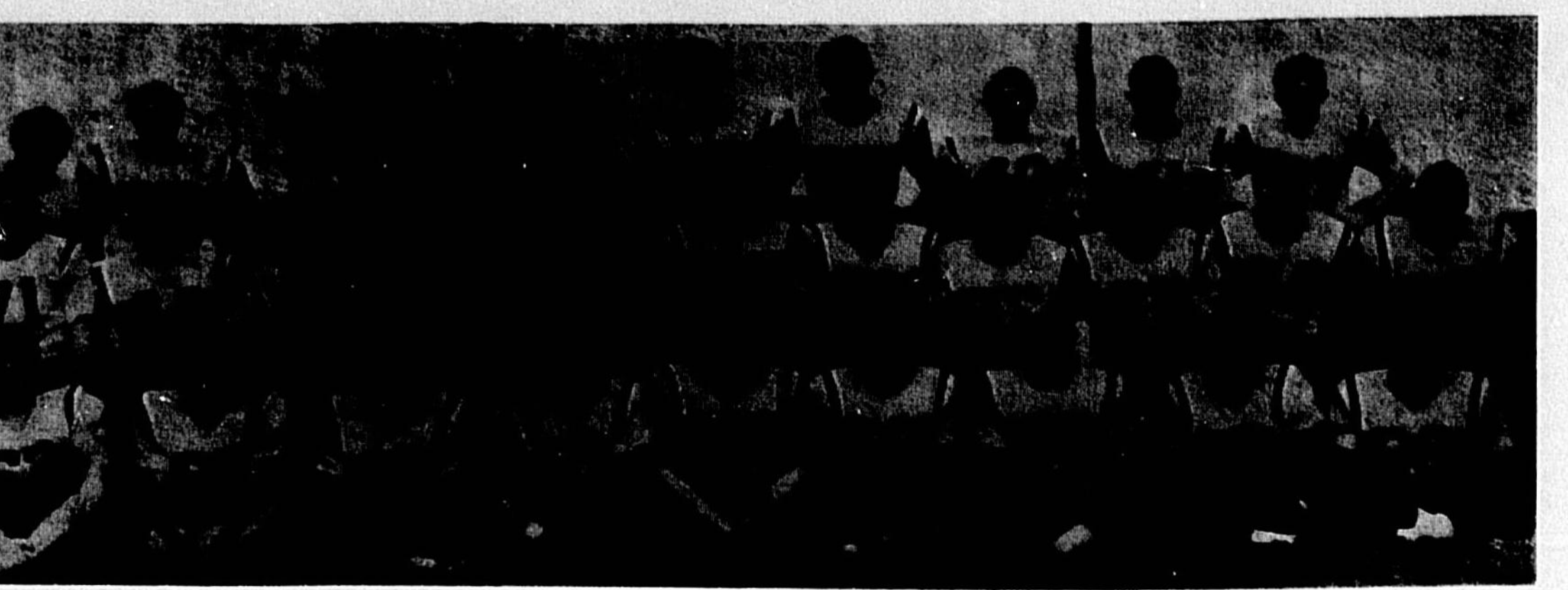
Veale, his back heavily taped, goes for the Pirates tonight against Philadelphia's Larry Jackson. The tall left-hander figures to get his final start of the regular season Saturday against the San Francisco Giants.

Veale wrenched his back last month and has been troubled ever since. Law, who goes against Jim Bunning Wednesday, also is hurt. He beat Atlanta 8-6 Saturday but didn't finish. He came up sore later.

Fryman, opens the final series of the regular season Friday when he faces the Giants at Fenwick Field.

The rookie left-hander, who has won 12, will be followed by Veale and Law Saturday and Sunday if the two ailing hurlers can make it. Tommy Sisk, a 10-game winner, looms as the No. 1 replacement. After that it's catch-can.

Take 2½ Game Lead The Dodgers In Command

Tom Fairly made a big hit in the Dodgers in such a position that if they split in their last six games the Pirates would have to win all five of theirs for a tie.

"Things are a little better than they were this morning," Dodger Manager Walter Alton said after the game.

Fairly hit a two-run homer his first time up, then added two singles as the Los Angeles Dodgers defeated St. Louis 6-3 Monday night. Briggs, meanwhile, singled home the winning run in Philadelphia's 11-inning 5-4 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

The combination increased Los Angeles' National League lead to a commanding 2½ games over Pittsburgh and left the Dodgers in such a position that if they split in their last six games the Pirates would have to win all five of theirs for a tie.

Rugged Notre Dame Gains In College Grid Poll

Notre Dame's football team is over its tough opening game hurdle and is gaining ground swiftly in the weekly Associated Press college poll.

The Irish made the most rapid advance among the leaders this week, moving from eighth place to fourth on the strength of their 26-14 victory over Purdue.

Michigan State strengthened its lead in the poll, moving 35 points ahead of runner-up UCLA. The Spartans, who led by 10 points a week ago, collected 22 first-place votes and 367 points in the balloting by 40 regional selectors. UCLA had 11 first-place votes and 332 points on a basis of 10 for a first-place vote, 9 for second etc.

The Spartans and UCLA each have 24 records. Michigan State after trouncing Penn State 42-8 and the Bruins after defeating Syracuse 31-12 last Saturday.

Alabama, the national champion the past two years, edged Notre Dame for third. The Crimson Tide had 266 points, five more than the Irish. Alabama opened its season with a 34-0 victory over Louisiana Tech.

There also was a close vote for fifth place with Southern California retaining that position with 226 points followed by Nebraska with 203 and Arkansas, 201.

The Trojans whipped Wisconsin 38-3. Nebraska fell two places despite a 28-7 triumph over Utah State while Arkansas, Vanderbilt, 42-0 and moved into the ninth spot while Tennessee, which opened its campaign by beating Auburn, 28-0, took over 10th place.

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) — As long as there's a Syracuse University football team there it will be a number '44'.

And, as long as there's a '44,' there probably always will be an outstanding player at left halfback for Syracuse.

It has become one of the most coveted sweater numbers in college football. It's a built-in lure for a boy, particularly a Negro boy, who likes to run with the football.

The number now graces the jersey of Floyd Little, a 185-pound, bow-legged wild o' the wisp from New Haven, Conn., already being hoisted for All-America honors.

Before Little, Davis, a poor boy from Elmira, N.Y., winner of the Heisman Trophy and later victim of leukemia, was recruited by Brown.

Resigned by attractive offers from scores of colleges, he chose Syracuse. The deciding factor was the numeral '44.' "It's become a custom," Little, relating recently in the Syracuse fieldhouse, said. 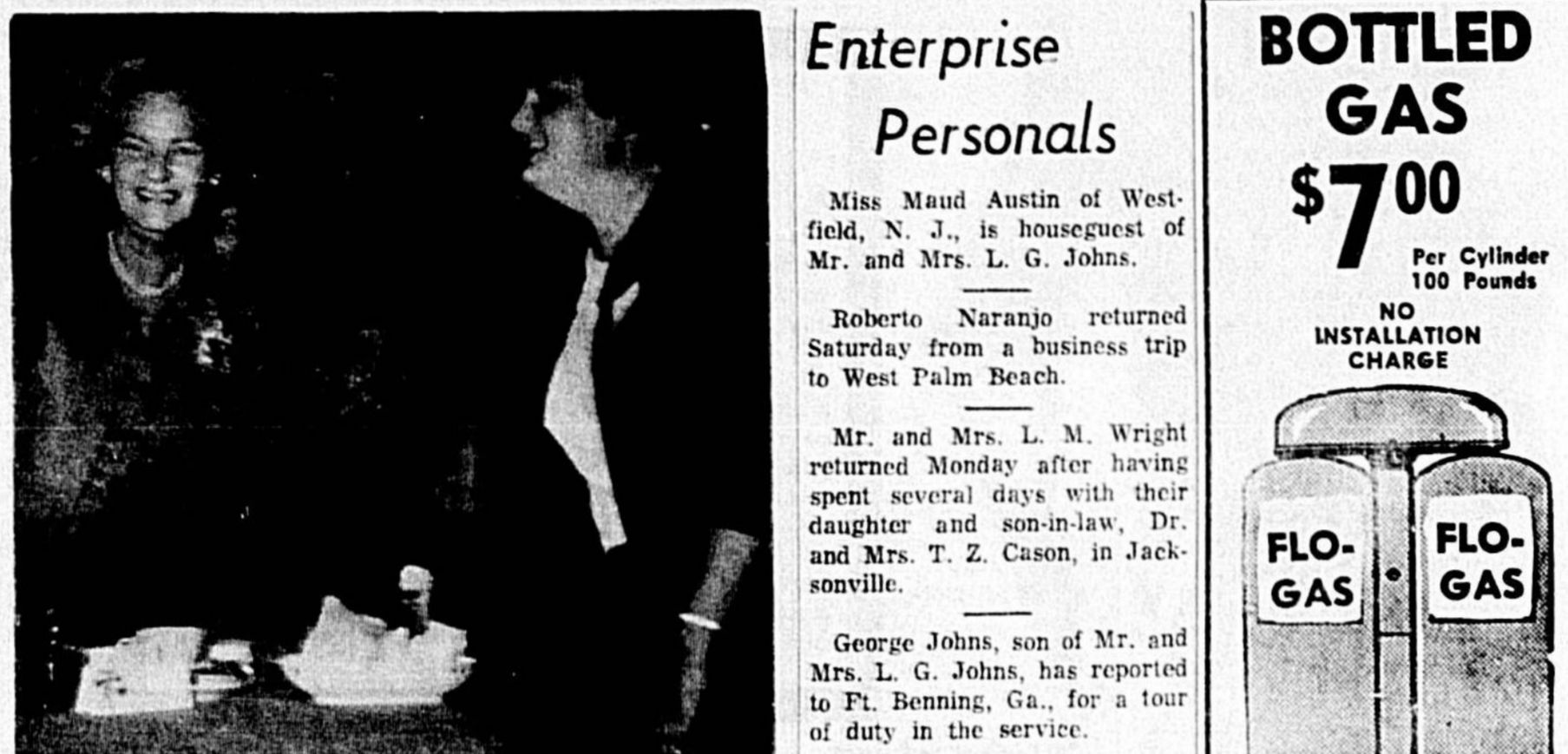

Southern Lawns Kept Green With Proper Winterseeding

Lawns look dingy in a hurry about autumn, but the berseemeadow should be mowed low and perhaps be thinned in order to provide space and access to soil. Seeding is best done as the permanent turf starts to disintegrate and begin its winter slumber. If weather stays cold germination of the wintergrass may be slow, so have patience. About 10 or 15 pounds of an all-fine-textured wintergrass mixture should adequately seed a thousand square feet of lawn if the seedbed is prepared.

It is rather easy for declarer to look over dummy and decide on a line of play that will bring home his contract. It is much harder for a defender to do the same thing and work out a plan to defeat the contract.

The reason lies in that the declarer is looking at 26 cards that he can play as a unit while a defender looks at 10 of his cards and another 16 belonging to an opponent.

Playing today's hand East wins the first trick with the ace of hearts and looks the dummy over carefully. He has one trick in hearts but that suit isn't going to bring in anything more. He also expects notice that West has a trump.

He tries to lead the minor suits in that to find three

five spades, two hearts and six cards in the minor suits. It also appears to him that his partner will hold one or two honors in diamonds. If he holds two honors and exactly three diamonds, West will be sure to collect one diamond trick but after that South will be able to discard two clubs on dummy's fourth and fifth diamonds. This will leave South with only one club and ten tricks.

The trick goes a step further and sees that if West does hold two diamond honors, a small diamond and the queen of clubs there is a way to beat declarer. He leads his four of clubs, West's queen forces dummy's king. Later West gets in with a diamond and gives his partner two club tricks.

'The Farm Front'

Co-operative System Urged For Farmers

TALLAHASSEE — (Special to the Herald) — Florida farmers who find themselves fighting a losing battle against unfair prices and shrinking markets might investigate the co-operative system as a possible means of meeting many of the problems inherent in today's highly specialized world of "bigness."

Unfortunately, many of our farmers have attempted to go it alone for too long a time. Time was, of course, when the grower had only to harvest his crop and there was a ready market for them.

The little farmer now finds himself competing on the open market against large-scale operations and he simply can't meet the challenge. The usually has two alternatives: 1) quit the farm or 2) heed the saying, "In unity there is strength," and join forces with others in a similar situation.

This is a timely subject because Cooperative Month will be observed throughout the nation during October.

A farming cooperative is an agricultural enterprise or organization owned by farmers who use it to market their crops collectively and thus strengthen their bargaining power.

Kenneth T. Nadin, executive vice president of the National Council of Farmer Cooperatives, explains it this way: "The real purpose of the cooperative is to increase the income of its members and patrons by introducing a new element of competition into the markets in which farmers buy and sell."

There are many kinds of co-

operatives, ranging from large regionals to small locals. Business areas include rural electric and telephone systems, dairy, credit unions, housing, insurance, irrigation, fruit and vegetable processing, purchasing, grain elevators, marketing, etc.

The cooperative principle is not a new one. It has been used in England for at least 75 years and Denmark's cooperatives recently celebrated their 100th anniversary.

Although cooperatives are known to have been in existence in this country since the turn of the century, they were not formally recognized by the federal government until four decades ago.

On July 2, 1926, Congress passed the Cooperative Marketing Act which provided the U. S. Department of Agriculture a permanent basis for research, education, and service work with farmer cooperatives. The act created what is now the Farmers Cooperative Service to be the liaison agency.

The research program has given special consideration to cooperative features, such as financing, membership, and management. It also has helped solve practical operating problems.

There is another side to the value of cooperatives, according to Jerry Vornitz, executive director of the Cooperative League of the USA. He believes that "without these cooperatives, the American pattern of agriculture might long have been given way to corporation farming in our country, thus depriving our Nation and the world of the most efficient, single kind of productive enterprise that mankind has yet developed — the American owner-operated farm."

Many cooperatives have found it profitable to process their own products and perform other integrated services. They also are improving the quality and variety of their products and developing greater markets for them.

At this point, it may seem that the farmers want to take all and give nothing. That's not true, for as Deputy Administrator Martin Abrahamson of the Farmers Cooperative Service points out, farmers spend nearly \$17-billion yearly for farm supplies and equipment, and the rural cooperatives provide employment for about 200,000 people in their home communities.

And then there is the money spent on clothing, vehicles, property improvements, taxes, education, professional services, etc. So, the benefits certainly are not limited to farmers.

But there is one point which needs emphasis. The farmer must not be a loner anymore. He needs to join a team because group action by the producers has more influence on prices and other terms of sale.

Sanford Barbers Increase Haircut Price To \$1.75

Most barber shops in the Sanford area will go up on their prices, effective Oct. 1, spokesmen for the local shops announced today.

"Rising costs in operation, rent, supplies, laundry and salaries have forced us to increase our rates. We hope the public will understand," one local owner declared.

Contrary to action taken by the Central Florida Barber's Association, Sanford barbers will not charge adult prices for children's haircuts on Saturday. New prices will be \$1.75 for men's regular haircut and \$2 for flat-tops. Children's prices will remain the same—\$1.50.

The new rates reflect a 25-cent increase over present rates. Sanford barbers said they understand shops in the South Seminoles area are planning to go along with the proposed increases which cover shops in Orange, Ocoee, Lake and Seminole counties.

U. S. Consultant 'Impressed' By Community Progress

Moving a civilian commercial enterprise onto the Sanford Naval Air Station property before the Navy moves out is "entirely possible."

This was the opinion expressed today by William J. Sheehan, consultant to the director of Base Economic Adjustment, Washington, D. C. in a meeting with the Base Acquisition and Utilization Committee of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

Sheehan's affirmative answer was in reply to a question from George Tooley.

Tooley emphasized that it is important to the economy of the area to establish a new payroll to forestall a "dry spell" when the base is closed and its \$13 million annual payroll goes with it.

Sheehan cited examples illustrating that this is being done at other military bases in order to ease the transition and economic suffering.

The defense department consultant said he is "very impressed with what has been done in this community, your efforts to assist industry and your self-help program."

He described the acquisition and utilization of the base facilities as a three-point program involving, (1) organization, (2) program design and (3) execution.

"One of the major problems you will have to wrestle with is the many federal and state agencies with whom you will have to deal and the miles of red tape to be cut. This is where I come in," he promised.

Sheehan, in Sanford to understand preliminary studies of civilian utilization of the base emphasized that the 1,700-acre facility has a varied potential for different kinds of uses including industrial, aviation, educational and recreational.

"There is little room for error in a project of this size and scope and it is critical that you be sure to fully assess this facility in terms of the tremendous development opportunities," Sheehan told the committee.
