

YANKEES TAKE OPENER, 12 TO 6

Ruined Porto Rican Capital Rebuilding After Hurricane

SAN JUAN, Sept. 28. (AP)—The sound of hammer and saw was heard throughout the city today as weary populace began to repair the damage left in the wake of yesterday's disastrous hurricane. "We must have no time remaining our homes," said Gov. S. R. B. "Everyone who can handle a tool has turned to this excellent spirit is the only bright spot in our outlook."

The Governor himself went out in an airplane to inspect the areas where the storm struck the heaviest blows, but until a survey is completed there will be no authoritative estimates of the loss. The Weather Bureau stated that reports have been received from all the progress of the storm after leaving Puerto Rico, but information from the North and West of the storm has continued moving westward and is as far West as San Francisco. With practically no clouds being seen from the coast of the disturbance and communication cut off from all the stations over which the storm passed, the Weather Bureau is having difficulty tracing its path.

LONDON, Sept. 28. (AP)—Three of the important Liberal and Labor members of Prime Minister MacDonald's national cabinet resigned today following a disagreement over tariff proposals approved at the recent Imperial Trade Conference at Ottawa. They were Viscount Snowden, former labor party leader, and two Liberal members, Sir Herbert Samuel, home secretary, and Sir Archibald Sinclair, secretary for Scotland.

Reconstruction Finance Corporation Is World's 2nd Largest Financial Group

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—The government's campaign, designed to improve business conditions and reduce unemployment through operations of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, has resulted in the creation of a financial institution, the largest in the United States and larger than any other in the world with the exception of the German National railways.

HAVANA IS UNDER MILITARY RULE; 4 LEADERS SLAIN

MURDER OF POLITICAL ENEMIES OF MACHADO'S ACT OF RETALIATION
HAVANA, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Havana was placed under military rule last night after an outbreak of political violence had resulted in the assassination of Clemente Vaquez Bello, president of the Cuban senate, and three prominent members of the opposition to the administration of President Machado.

In a message to congress the president explained that military rule had been invoked "as a preventive measure against reprisals by friends" of the slain men. He urged that associates of the victims remain calm.

The killing of the oppositionists was described by investigators as an act of retaliation for the slaying of Dr. Vaquez Bello, a strong Machado supporter who, had he lived, probably would have been the next president of Cuba. A fourth member of the opposition was gravely wounded.

Farmers Get Break On Crop Loan Repayments

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—(AP)—It was announced at the White House today farmers owing crop production loans to the government will be asked to pay only 25 percent of the amount due with an agreement to secure the remaining 75 percent on whatever terms Congress may authorize.

TRUCK DRIVER IS BEATEN BY GEORGIA MOB

Group Hauls Him From Car, Kicks, Beats Him With Chair; Peace Move Begun

ATLANTA, Sept. 28.—(AP)—A truck driver reported he was beaten by a group of men near Barnesville, Ga., yesterday in the latest outbreak of violence in Georgia's milk price war.

The driver, P. A. Edwards, an employee of the Pace Truck Line, of Atlanta, reported at Griffin that he was taken from a loaded truck between Barnesville and Forsyth, about 60 miles south of Atlanta, and kicked and beaten because he "didn't stop quick enough."

Edwards said he told the men he was operating in interstate commerce between Jacksonville, Fla., and Atlanta, and that his truck carried no milk, but that someone in the crowd of 25 men shouted:

City Of St. Petersburg Told It Cannot Spend Tax Monies Raised For Bond Committee

TALLAHASSEE, Sept. 28.—(AP)—The City of St. Petersburg was told yesterday by the supreme court it had no authority to transfer to its general operating expenses tax monies raised and designated expressly for payment of bond interest and maturity principal.

The court said holders of St. Petersburg bonds may enforce by mandamus the proper transfer and credit of any monies diverted from the bond account, and "may enjoy any further division of them."

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YANKEE STADIUM MADE READY FOR SERIES OPENER

Huge Field Is Gaily Decorated in Anticipation of Huge Crowd

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—(AP)—They called the hunting to the front of hundreds of sun-baked seats in the Yankee stadium yesterday, and the world's series show itself on Broadway again after a lapse of three years.

Down on the playing field of the big American league ball park the championship Yankees frolic through the first of two innings designed to fit them for the invasion of the Chicago Cubs and the start of baseball's annual All-Ivyoria Wednesday.

There were Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig in rubber shirts, their arms clanking busily on fine brass of rough out, whanging baseballs into the vacant reaches of the right field bleachers where, starting at 1:30 P. M. Wednesday, the frantic faithful will rise and scream for a similar feat each time one of them comes to bat.

An "As big 'Red' Ruffing, chosen to play Guy Bush of the Cubs in the opening game, joined left-handed Ed Wells, Danny MacFayden and Charley Devens pitching for the Yankees, the big and little slugs, all in a gay wood, rattled the fences with line drives.

Around the town the excitement and allure of the big series crowded out in the usual places. At the bleacher entrance the solitary sign of Bill Cunningham, from Kansas City, already in line several days for the honor of being No. 1 into the far-flung stands Wednesday, was broken by the appearance of Ruth himself, to autograph a ball for the most persistent patron of the series.

While the Yankee business offices were crowded with purchasers, the rush for tickets fell far below that of the three-year reign of the Yankees from 1926 through 1928, when a single strip of tickets covering three games, was harder to get an audience with rivalry.

This year there will be plenty of seats for the New York games for anyone. Prospects now are for crowds here ranging from no higher than 50,000 for the opening game down to 40,000 or so thereafter. Apparently the interest is here, as great as ever, but the \$1.50 asked for a single reserved seat for the three home games stretches just a bit beyond the reach of many of the old guard. Most of them will join the bleacher line Wednesday morning, when the \$1.19 seats go on sale with the \$3.30 reserved grandstand seats.

Stadium capacity now is about 60,000. The world's series single game record of 63,900 was set here in 1926.

Washington's Teeth Subject Of Argument

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—(AP)—George Washington, says Representative Sol Bloom, did not cross the Delaware wearing a set of false teeth with a spring so strong they kept his mouth agape and let in the wintry winds, or later.

The New York congressman, an admirer of the first president and an associate director of the George Washington bicentennial commission, issued yesterday a statement to say that so far as he could find "there is no record of Washington having false teeth at the time of crossing the Delaware."

The full set of false teeth, made of hippopotamus ivory, came years later, Bloom said.

SCHMELING WINS OVER WALKER IN TECHNICAL K. O.

Fight Stopped As German Manhandles His Opponent in Eighth

BOWL, NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Max Schmeling, former heavyweight champion, scored a technical knockout over Mickey Walker at the close of the eighth round of his 15-round bout with Mickey Walker last night when his manager, Jack Kearns, refused to let the little Irishman continue.

Kearns, Walker's manager, relinquished his fighter's chance when Walker's left eye had been closed and his face badly cut by two knockdowns in the eighth round.

Walker was so badly battered under Schmeling's vicious attack in the eighth round that he barely lasted the three minutes under terrific punishment. Seeing his battered warrior's condition, Kearns leaped into the ring as the bell sounded, took Walker to his seat and refused to let him continue. Schmeling also floored Walker for a count of six in the first round.

Schmeling weighed 188 1/2 pounds, Walker 174 1/2.

Schmeling, after losing his title to Jack Sharkey in 15 rounds this summer, leaped into the ring brown and sturdy. He had every physical advantage. Walker came into the ring with plaster patches on the bridge of his nose and under his left eye.

Jack Sharkey, heavyweight champion, climbed into the ring while Schmeling grinned and led the cheering from one corner.

As Joe Humphries, the announcer belted for Jack Dempsey, the former champion leaped into the ring and to the amazement of the critics, tore across to shake hands with Jack Kearns, a man who piloted Dempsey to the championship and later split with him. Kearns now manages Walker.

To make it unanimous, Dempsey shook hands with everyone else in the ring including Sharkey, an old enemy.
