

Most of us would admit that we do not read the Bible enough. And we feel a bit guilty about that. We may take up the Holy Scriptures from time to time but we do not really "search the Scriptures" as Jesus tells us to do.

However, so often when we do read the Bible it seems to be speaking about and to a world that is so much different than our own. Take the story of the building of the Tower of Babel for example. Here some people from a time long ago saw the problem facing them and they got together to build a huge tower that would reach all the way to heaven itself. This was to be their "monument" so that future generations would never forget them; one of those great, joint-projects which would draw them so close together they would never be scattered across the face of the earth.

And right away, all of us know and feel that this can have little to do with us today. If for no other reason, because our view of the world and the universe is so much different today. Today we would never even think of doing something like that - even though our chances of success would be better (what with our new techniques, better materials and equipment for building skyscrapers). We wouldn't try building such a tower because our idea of sky and heaven has changed; we know that the moon is not just some great lantern which God hangs in the sky at night, because we've been there, our countrymen have walked on the moon.

Thus, this Bible story of the Tower of Babel becomes just another bit of evidence which shows that the Bible is mainly about the "Childhood" of the human race, when things were a lot simpler than they are today. And so it goes with much of

God is so real to people back there. He is virtually the nextdoor-neighbor of Abraham and stops in for a visit on occasion. God sets up His own special tent in the midst of bunch of nomads in the desert, traveling from Egypt to Palestine. God is always heavily involved in their daily life - sending them kings to rule for Him, and priests to serve for Him, and Prophets to speak for Him. But, in the end, it all comes to naught and God has to retire from the scene before the new, modern era in human history begins. And from there it is only a short step to our own time when there really are no

Today, many people conclude that they really don't need God and they are thankful that we are rid of all that "superstitious rubbish" of the past, that could only hold men back from doing what they can and must do for themselves.

But, is it really all so different today? Or, are we still trying to build the same tower-on a much bigger, vaster scale but with the same end results? Is it possible that mankind is working feverishly today, trying to build a lasting monument to what Man can do without God - while only the blind can fail to see the signs on the horizon of where it is all

Now we wonder about how long we can continue living on this planet which our "progress" is turning into one vast age heap. We say it was "pride" which caused the people of Babel to build their great tower. But is mankind oday any less free of that same pride? "Look at what man can do!" mankind shouts today. And notice that it all seems to end up in the same place - the same inability to even understand each other. And we are divided into races and classes and colors who forget their common humanity and can no longer reach each other through a common language that means something different for each people.

The question is: "Is the trouble that there is no longer a living God?" or is it rather that there are very few Abrahams, very few who will listen when God does speak to them? You see, perhaps the Bible doesn't have much to say to us (at least, it seems that way to many) because we no longer search (literally, ransack) the Scriptures and so miss what the Holy Scriptures are saying to us in our time and place - and we fail to see the present, in the light of God's Jealings with men and men's dealings with God in the past

God is still God! And He will no more be mocked today than He was back there, as we can plainly see in the fact that we still reap what we sow! If we will only read our modern history in the light of the history of God's dealings with men in the Bible, we will see that God is still after today what He has always been after - to be known and acknowledged as the Living God that He is, the Living God whom mer ignore and despise at their own peril, but under Whom they can live to their temporal good and eternal blessing



Eyes On The Indochina War Issue

Specific action by the Congress to control the Indocina war by means of funding is important enough in itself. Yet it attains a much greater significance if it is considered against the background of yesteryear.

It is not being too sophisticated to start from the premise of a presidential election year when congressional seats will be up for voter approval, to say that it is the political fire which is giving the "hot-foot" to our elected representatives.

Nor is it wrong to note the efforts which President Nixon has made and is making to bring this evil and disastrous war to an honorable conclusion, to say that he, too, feels political heat.

What can be said, however, is that the climate in Washington is encouraging action by both the legislative and executive arms of our government to quit talking, promising and debating and to get to the action which the American people have long sought and, so far, been denied.

That this will become a key issue in the presidential campaign can no longer be guestioned. The Indochina war has presented many facets in the quarter-of-a-century during which the be-devilled peoples of that area have been a prime subject of international concern and conflict.

Today it is an arena where the great might of The American air and naval arms is being exerted to destroy the capacity of the North Vietnamese to wage war. It is not a spectacle which can be viewed with pride.

Its results — even those allowed to be known by the authorities - are bad enough to support the conclusion that the destruction of lifesupporting facilities by air attack will call for longtime aid from the United States.

President Nixon, seeking a second term, has a lot of explaining to do. For he was elected in '68 as the candidate who "had a plan to end the war." Yet he is the commander-in-chief who expanded the Vietnam war into Cambodia and

It was his decision to pull out the stops and allow American air and naval power be exerted to its utmost with the continuing loss of life and

Tax Increase

Boosts On The Way No Matter What

The recent statement by Treasury Secretary George P. Shultz that he sees no need for any new tax increases next year is a welcome one for most taxpayers, although it stands in sharp contrast to much conservative thought. Only a few days earlier, J. Irwin Miller, millionaire

chairman of Cummins Engine Co., a New York Stock Exchange listed firm with assets exceeding \$175 million, told a congressional committee that "you gentlemen are going to have to raise taxes." Miller said government services are falling apart and

that no amount of tax reform and no increase in government efficiency will be sufficient to meet the substantial im-Herbert Stein, chairman of President Nixon's Council of Economic Advisers, said an across-the-board tax increase

after the election would be "neither desirable nor plausible." Casper W. Weinberger, director, Office of Management and Budget, declared there would be no tax increase unless Congress deliberately forced one via a spending spree. Continued government deficit financing is the main factor involved in further tax considerations, since this is

linked directly with continuity inflation. Shultz is predicting a \$27 billion budget deficit for fiscal 1973, getting under way this month, up from the \$23 billion deficit reported for the year ended June 30.

Lest we forget, there is a tax boost already scheduled for calendar 1973.

While a value-added tax, an excess profits tax or some other new tax might not be a reasonable near-term or intermediate-term likelihood, it is a fact Americans will be paying additional federal taxes next year on the same basic

Many workers may not realize they will be called upon for up to 25 per cent more Social Security tax dollars in 1973. Their employers will match the employes' payments, on the latter's behalf, as in the past.

For 1972, taxes are up 5.2 per cent to a maximum of \$468 for employes, based on the cutoff point of \$9,000 wages. For 1973, there will be a 5.5 per cent boost in taxes on

wages up to \$10,800, or a maximum tax of \$594. For 1974, another 5.5 per cent boost in taxes is on the way on wages up to \$12,000, which translates to a maximum tax of

Self-employed will find taxes for the same three years, respectively up 7.5 per cent to a \$675 maximum, up 7.8 per cent to an \$842.40 maximum and up 7.8 per cent again to a

It isn't likely to end there either. After 1974, the \$12,000 taxable base can be increased automatically under a cost-ofliving escalator clause when benefits are raised. The base would increase from there proprotionate to any

advance in average wages subject to Social Security. To place the rising taxation in a perfectly clear light, your Social Security as an employe making \$12,000 this year would amount to \$4%. If you are earning the same amount two years from now, you will be paying \$660.

Two of the contests for Republican nominations in the September primaries should be very interesting. These are between David Bowen and Davie Sims for district 3 school board and Tom Radloff and Dick Williams for district 3 county commission.

Almost everyone describes both Bowes and Sims as "nice guys." Bowes suffered a heart-breaking loss four years ago when he was put down to defeat by only 50 votes. It is always hard to lose a race, but to come so close makes it even more difficult.

The county commission contest sits Radloff, an Altamonte Springs first term councilman against Williams who has worked long and hard for his party. With little doubt, Radloff is the underdog here. The winner of the Bowen-Sims race will face Missouri Belle Swofford in November while the winner of the Radloff-







6. Do I have a second ball handy in case I need it? 7. Do I spend too much time practicing my swing before


