He believe we should give military aid to all countries and all peoples whose policies and economic structures are compatible with our own and who are striving against totalitarian doctrines.

He acknowledged that he and Secretary of State Marshall have honest differences about military aid to China.

Rep. Judd (R-Minn.) commented that he did not understand Marshall opposes any military aid for China, but simply does not want such aid in the bill before the committee.

Judd told Wedemeyer there seems to be an effort to spread propaganda that the Chinese government is unworthy and that Communists are not associated with world Communism but are fighting peasants.

The Communists in China, Wedemeyer testified, "are Communists trying to further world Communism."

Wedemeyer, who helped direct Chinese forces in the war with Japan, said economic aid alone "is a question of improving areas and then having opposing forces take them over. That is going on."

He voiced confidence in the Chinese Generalissimo, testifying: "I went to China prepared not to trust him. But I left admiring him. He has the common people at heart. He does not strut. He is not unwilling to make personal sacrifices."

Wedemeyer made an extensive survey in China last summer for President Truman. His findings never have been made public. The general said Mr. Truman has given him orders not to discuss that report. Frequently he asked to be excused from answering specific questions for fear of disclosing secret information.

The committee then voted to hold a closed-door session, excluding newsmen and the public, at which Wedemeyer could speak more freely.

Wedemeyer said Chinese leaders are trying to make a war of life in keeping with American ideals. Army leadership in China is not very good, he said, because "they don't seem to have organizational ability."

But as for willingness of Chiang-Kai-Shek to co-operate, he recalled that one time "I looked like the Japanese would take us (the Chinese) out of the war."

"I asked the Generalissimo for permission to redispense Chinese troops. He did not hesitate. The situation was saved."

Wedemeyer said \$200,000,000 "would have helped China immeasurably" two years ago.

"But today," he added, "I don't think I would recommend \$500,000,000 in aid to China unless there were military aid to protect that \$500,000,000."

"This vast movement that has been so successful in Czechoslovakia, and probably in Finland, is sweeping down from the north. If we in America intend to put a stop to it, we can't do it by purely economic aid."

Implement the U. N. Assembly's Nov. 29 decision. The U. S. delegation was understood to feel the proper time to seek a compromise was when, and if, the American resolution is defeated.

Miller told his colleagues. He is not controlled by special interests and he might even be opposed by political parties.

Miller took no notice in his prepared address of Democratic talk mentioning the supreme commander of Japan as a possible substitute for President Truman on the November ballot. But he said:

"Some of the potential candidates for president have not been anxious for the general to return to this country and give testimony before committees of Congress. They realize the American people could well insist that this great man be our next president."

Meanwhile three former Democratic governors of New England states went on record as favoring General MacArthur for the Democratic Party's presidential nomination.

Attorney Joseph B. Ely, twice governor of Massachusetts; Mayor James M. Curley of Boston, once governor of the Bay state; and Francis P. Murphy, twice governor of New Hampshire, said they would support MacArthur if he could be in command.

Curley told reporters he didn't think it would be necessary to start a movement at the national convention to substitute MacArthur for President Truman because "the country is doing it now."

Murphy said in an interview that "there is certainly no hope remaining under our present leadership. The man in the White House is gone beyond recall."

He said the nation "needs an outstanding leader today as urgently as at any time in history. I don't know of an American with greater merit than General MacArthur."

Ely told interviewers he was opposed to Truman because "he has let political considerations away his political."

"This act was imposed to me by force, by a government installed and maintained in power by a foreign country, a government utterly unrepresentative of the will of the Romanian people."

"This government had violated international pledges binding them to respect the political freedom of the Romanian people, and falsified the elections and annihilated the democratic political leaders who enjoyed the confidence of the country."

"The removal of the monarchy constitutes a new act of violence in the policy of the enslavement of Romania. In these conditions I do not consider myself bound, in any way, by this act imposed upon me."

"With unshaken faith in my future, animated by the same devotion and will to work, I will continue to serve the Romanian people with which my destiny is inextricably bound."

The British foreign office said of Mihal's statement: "At the time he left the throne, we recalled that he had played a great part in helping to release Romania from the Fascist yoke."

"We also recalled that he was one of the rare recipients of the Soviet Order of Victory. That is still our only comment."

Russia Using Jap PW's To Broadcast Soviet Propaganda

WASHINGTON, Mar. 4. (AP)—Russia is using Japanese prisoners of war in broadcast Soviet propaganda to their homeland.

A Moscow radio program recorded here by United States government monitors included the "radio voice" of one Toshio Kimura.

Kimura said that in Russia he saw no "jobless, idle" people, "let alone any food-playing, food-for-nothing, the sort of people we used to see in pre-war Japan."

Another voice, identified by Moscow as that of Mitsui Matsunaga, told the Japanese prisoners are well-treated "under the kind protection of the Soviet authorities."

"We see movies at least once in ten days," he added.

Nearly 20 months after V. I. day, Russia still holds 250,000 Japanese prisoners, American officials estimate.

Moscow started using prisoners' voices after broadcasting several thousand letters over the past five months addressed to their families in Japan. The same device was used by Germany in broadcasts beamed to the Allied nations during World War II.

Moscow combined in the program recorded here that the "humanitarian policy" is being hampered by a "reactionary elements, who are stooges of General MacArthur."

It asserted the broadcast letters are copied by a "Tokyo Hepatrites Assistance Association," and then sold to prisoners' families. The association, Moscow said, had the approval of headquarters of General Douglas MacArthur, supreme commander in Japan.

2/3 cup sifted flour.

1/2 teaspoon double-acting baking powder.

1/4 teaspoon salt.

1-3 cup butter or fortified margarine.

2 squares (2 ounces) unsweetened chocolate.

1 cup sugar.

2 eggs, well beaten.

1/2 cup walnuts, coarsely cut.

1 teaspoon vanilla.

Mix flour, baking powder and salt together. Melt butter or margarine and chocolate over hot water. Add sugar gradually to well-beaten eggs, beating thoroughly. Add melted chocolate mixture and stir to blend. Add dry ingredients and mix well, then add nuts and vanilla and mix. Bake in a greased 8-inch square pan that is 2 inches deep in a moderate (350°F.) oven for 20 minutes. While still warm cut in the size square desired. Remove squares from pan with a spatula and finish cooling on cake rack.

Truman Seeks To Close WAA By June 30th

\$600,000,000 Remaining For Foreign Sale Will Be Transferred To Owners

WASHINGTON, Mar. 5 (AP)—President Truman returned today from his southern vacation. His plane arrived from Key West, Fla., at 2:06 P. M. Mr. Truman's first order of business was a cabinet meeting set for 4 P. M. The President had spent nine days resting at Key West after a five-day tour by plane and boat to Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and Cuba.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 5 (AP)—President Truman asked Congress today to wind up the War Assets Administration June 30. The disposal of remaining domestic surplus war property would be transferred to the Federal Works Agency.

Of the original \$40,000,000,000 worth of surplus property, about \$5,400,000,000 will remain to be disposed of at home by June 30. The \$600,000,000 worth left to be sold abroad by that date would be transferred from the State Department to the owning agencies for handling. These agencies primarily are the Army and Navy departments.

Wallace Tells Of League Formation For U. S. Freedom

NEW YORK, Mar. 5 (AP)—Henry Wallace today announced formation of an "informal" Freedom League because, he said, "the time has come for those of us who believe in old-fashioned Americanism to fight back."

Explosion Kills 1, Injures 3 Others

JACKSON, Miss., Mar. 5 (AP)—A truckload of dynamite blew up today on a highway killing a bystander, damaging three residences and injuring three occupants. The blast was heard in Jackson, 23 miles away.

14 To 20 Crewmen Missing From Tug Capsized In River

Witness Says Current Swept Boat Against Piling, It Then Sank

ST. LOUIS, Mar. 5 (AP)—The Federal Barge Lines said today 13 crewmen were either dead or missing and 12 known to have survived from the accident in which the tugboat Natchez rammed a bridge and sank in the Mississippi River near Greenville, Miss., last night.

Two were known to be dead. One of them was identified as William H. English of Cairo, Ill. The barge lines said the Natchez was carrying a crew of 26.

GREENVILLE, Miss., Mar. 5 (AP)—Fourteen to 20 crewmen were missing today from the 180-foot tugboat Natchez, which rolled over and sank last night after a treacherous Mississippi River current swept it against a bridge piling below here.

Capt. William A. Howell of the tugboat Sohio-Latonia, which brought 11 survivors here, said "there could hardly have been any others" saved. A 12th crewman escaped, however, as he was with the barges and not aboard the Natchez at the time.

The Natchez carried a normal crew of 28, but survivors' figures on the actual number this trip varied from 26 to 32.

Howell witnessed the end of the Natchez from his pilot house. "The current caught her and rolled her over," he said. "She went down in about a minute. The men picked up were mostly deck crew."

The Sohio-Latonia picked up nine survivors, of whom two died on board. Four other men, rescued by other boats, were transferred to the Sohio-Latonia to be brought here.

Mr. Lawton was returning from a school meeting at Southern College with his daughter, who has been visiting him and Mrs. Lawton in Orlando. During a blinding rainstorm while proceeding at a slow rate of speed he ran into the truck, which was parked without lights on the highway.

Both Mr. Lawton and his daughter were immediately taken to the Winter Haven Hospital for treatment.

LAKE SUCCESS, Mar. 5 (AP)—The United Nations Security Council today voted down a Columbian proposal for a week-long recess in its debate on Palestine partition. The United States led the opposition to such a delay.

DAMASCUS, Syria, Mar. 5 (AP)—Fawzi Al Kaakli has established headquarters of his Arab volunteer army in the Nabulus area of northern Palestine.

An official source here said the Arabs now "control all eastern Palestine from Safad to Hebron." Fawzi Bey and his headquarters company rode into Palestine during the night. They joined Arab concentrations surrounding Tulkah, in the mountains north of Nabulus. Fawzi Bey reported to his Damascus headquarters that his "invasion" was completed without incident.

JERUSALEM, Mar. 5 (AP)—Haganah said today 30 Arabs were killed and many were wounded in a four-hour battle with Jews last night on the plains of Sharon between Tel Aviv and Haifa.

The battle erupted when Arabs attacked a Jewish settlement at Magdidi on the Tel Aviv-Haifa Highway, said a communiqué of the Jewish militia issued in Tel Aviv.

Florida Blue Blood Cattle Bring Fancy Prices At Auction

OCALA, Mar. 5 (AP)—The blue bloods of Florida's cattle ranches, many of them holding top grades in the Southeastern Fair Stock Show and Sale, today were drawing fancy prices in the show's official public auction sales.

Two hundred and fifty head of show cattle, headed by the grand Champion Angus steer of Henderson Dial of Sumterville, Ala., were put on the auction block.

By this time next week they will have become choice cuts and steaks in many refrigerators.

Just what the show amounts to in dollars and cents alone is indicated by the fact that last year's sales totaled \$62,637, which buyers paid for the 313,900 pounds of beef cattle that went on sale at the end of the 1947 exhibition.

Show officials expect this year's sales to exceed that sum, which bears out State Commissioner Nathan Mayo's statement at the show's annual banquet last night that the quality of Florida beef cattle is "getting better and better" and that the state is growing faster than any other in the quality and quantity of its cattle.

Hint Dropped Of Spy Ring In America

Harriman Refuses To Give Congress Record of FBI's Inquiry On Condon

WASHINGTON, Mar. 5 (AP)—A hint that the Justice Department is seeking indictment of a suspected spy ring was dropped today during the congressional inquiry over Dr. Edward U. Condon.

Rep. Nixon (R-Calif.) tossed it out at a House Un-American Activities Committee meeting where the Commerce Department struck by its guns and refused again to hand over its loyalty records on Condon Rep. Rankin (D-Miss.) had proposed that the committee make public all its records on Condon.

Nixon objected. He said a New York grand jury is investigating spying by Americans and aliens. He said its findings might be "prejudiced" if the complete files were made public.

John L. Towne, secretary of the Department's loyalty board, came before the committee in response to a subpoena directing that he show up with the papers. But he didn't have the papers. Nor would he answer questions about them.

Secretary of Commerce Harriman advised the committee by letter last night that the records would not be turned over to the (Continued on Page Twenty)

1 Killed In Blast Of Ammonia Tank At Packing Factory

PITTSBURGH, Mar. 5 (AP)—At least one man was killed today in an explosion at the plant of the Danbury Packing Co.

An under-estimated number were injured by the blast, which reportedly occurred in an ammonia tank. All available ambulances were rushed to the scene at Fifth and Frankton Avenues and two fire alarms were sounded.

R. L. Weaver, manager of a nearby auto appliance store, said the plant engineer, James Bell, had been killed by the blast.

At least 100 men were injured, but there may have been more than 100, Weaver said. "Some fellows were trapped in the building, but there was no fire I could see—just a terrific explosion."

The injured were taken to the Pittsburgh Hospital, only a few hundred feet from the packing plant.

About 100 employees fled to safety after the explosion rocked the four-story building in the busy East Liberty section. Some of them escaped down firemen's ladders. Ammonia fumes spread over the neighborhood, and several windows were shattered.

Firemen entering the building donned gas masks and smoke-protective equipment. A nearby restaurant closed several women were carried from the building bleeding from cuts.

GOP Refuses To Mix In Civil Rights Row

Dr. J. H. Miller Formally Accepts Presidency Of University Of Florida

GAINESVILLE, Mar. 5 (AP)—Dr. J. H. Miller formally accepted the presidency of the University of Florida today with a pledge to work toward making it one of the "10" great universities of the country.

Anything less, he said in a speech at the University's annual convocation, "would place the state itself at an unenviable place among the great states of the Union."

More than 100 delegates from South and North American colleges and educational institutions were on campus for the inauguration. Even the national leading educational figures received honorary degrees from the university.

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Plan To Deny Federal Funds To South Voted Down 25-6 In GOP Committee

WASHINGTON, Mar. 5 (AP)—The GOP-dominated House Appropriations Committee refused today to deny the civil rights bill to the South.

The bill committee's recommendation that Congress withhold federal money for hospital building and vocational education from states that deny negro equal educational and job opportunities.

The recommendation was made by a subcommittee headed by Rep. Keefe (R-Wis.). It was knocked out by a vote of 25 to 6.

The bill committee's last-minute action in overriding Keefe's recommendation was a surprise. Subcommittees almost always win their points in the committee.

The subcommittee put the anti-segregation clause into a \$1,012,804,000 bill to supply the Education Department and the Federal Security Agency with funds for the year starting July 1. An attempt to retain the provision will be made when the bill comes before the House for debate next week.

A total of \$120,000,000 of the bill funds would have been affected by the provision. The largest of these is \$135,000,000 for hospital construction. On these funds, the states and local governments put up two dollars for each dollar furnished by the federal government.

Another \$100,000,000 is for vocational rehabilitation grants. The training of blind, deaf and otherwise handicapped persons. And \$12,800,000 for vocational education training in and out of schools. States match these funds 50-50.

The key provision says none of this money shall be given to states or educational institutions on such grounds as race, color, or creed, discriminatory practices deny equality of educational opportunity or employment to any race or person, such educational institutions as race, color, or creed.

Lions Club Fight On Communism Is Told At Meeting

The International Lions Association is engaged in fighting Communism, H. H. Johnson of Daytona Beach, Fla., district president, told members of the Lions club at their luncheon today at the tourist center.

Mr. Johnson told of the growth of Communism in Europe, and declared that in different ways, Communists are trying to get into every branch of our own government and educational system. He said more Communists in the country today than in Russia when it was taken over by them, he declared.

He recalled that Lions International is now considering branching out into fighting Communism. Club members were advised against bringing politics into the club in order to avoid party animosity. He announced plans for the Lions' national convention in New York this summer, and for the State Convention in St. Augustine, May 9-10-11.

Action on a club donation to the Red Cross was deferred pending the report of J. Robson, Jr., treasurer. Richard Doss, club vice president, who directed the meeting, announced the application for membership by R. S. Esterson of the West Coast Food Company.

Clyde Ramsey announced that the meeting next week would be in line with Governor Cabell's declaration of the week as "Sight Conservation Week." Secretary Hamilton Hines, was commended by District President Johnson for submitting prompt and accurate reports. The possibility of organizing a Lions Club in Oviedo was discussed.
