Cited for their annexation policies were Casselberry Longwood and Altamonte Springs. They will be asked to submit their annexation ordinances for 1970 to the County so that a determination can be made as to the legality of their annexation practices.

As recently as last week, commissioners decided to withhold the road and bridge fund rebates to these municipalities pending an acceptable settlement of the issue. Commission Chairman Greg Drummond and Commissioner Sidney Vihlen both felt that the matter should be settled and that allowable funds be delivered to the

municipaliities as soon as possible Acting County Attorney Howard Marsee advised that the commission could pay funds on areas not under question and "sit on the rest" until the city goes to court or until a declaratory judgment is issued.

Administrative Assistant Rodney Layer was instructed by Drummond to contact City of Sanford Commissioner John Morris and inform him that the County has already been (before his publicized advice) in contact with the state fire

The fire marshal was in Sanford to inspect the court house and refused to do so, because "the officials of the county already are doing everything that I would recommend. You are having an evaluation study conducted, you have plans to either correct or tear down so why was I called

"Twelve hundred dollars has been authorized for this evaluation study by the architects, Dragash, Gutman and Matz and we are still awaiting results. We would not consider retaining this building unless it is economically feasible. Of course there might be some vested interests who would like to have the Sanford fire department come up with some extreme recommendations to suit their plans," Drummond

Penalty Charge Coming

"Every time we bring pressure to bear, we have a short time acceleration, then a return to a slow pace," Drummond blasted out against Greenhut Construction Company for the new courthouse, and clerk of the works, Dick Shea. Drummond asked Marsee if the county is in proper

position to call against the bonds since the company did not meet its contract agreement When asked for the amended completion date on the

court house, the architects said there was no amended completion date. "We are several weeks past due and we have asked the contractors to accelerate their work." Drummond also said the conditions inside the shell of the new building are 'unspeakable,' "I can't understand how they get any work done at all."

Dick Matz, architect, told commissioners they had taken action to get the area cleaned. He said that they had an average of 70 men working each day on the project.

Drummond recommended that Marsee and Matz get together to discuss the letter concerning the lack of good faith by Greenhut and bonds and surety. He also suggested that the last payment of \$400,000 be withheld, and that the six months penalties figure of \$73,000 be called.



FOREHAND AND BACKHAND GRIPS The first instruction a novice receives concerns the proper use of the

forehand and backhand grips. These are relatively simple to learn. However, for many, these grips may feel uncomfortable to hold. The only way to develop a "feel" for each grip is to continually practice (on and off the court) moving to and from the respective grips.



B. BACKHAND GRIP: To get into the backhand grip, move your hand an eighth of a turn to the left of the forehand grip (top view). Notice that the "V" is now on the left bevel, and the right thumb lays across the side of the racquet (side view).

Abortions Climb In Dade Co.

MIAMI (AP-- Atty, Gen. Robert Shevin today said hundreds of legal abortions have been performed in Dade County in the two months since the Legislature passed the new, liberalized abortion bill. In an interview with the Miami

News, Shevin said the number of abortions performed in Dade County "certainly is in the hundreds, and could reach 1,000." Shevin said his estimate was based on conversations with gynecologists

no hospitals have sent abortion reports to the State Health Department. He said the abortion law requires



"If there are some physicians who are waiting for any further legal interpretations before administering bortions under the law they shouldn't wait any longer," Shevin said. "And it would be almost impossible to bring any sort of action against a doctor who proceeds cautiously in abortions, for it would be damned hard to prove that a girl's health wouldn't have been affected," Shevin added.

Shevin said one physician reported performing about 25 to 30 abortions in
