Gun discharges at Oviedo High, student charged

OVIEDO - A 16-year-old Oviedo High School student spent the night at the Seminole County Juvenile Detention Center after a gun he carried in his pants pocket discharged in a classroom on Monday.

Neither the boy - Christopher Alexander Iglesias - nor anyone else was injured in the incident. The bullet tore through his pants leg and lodged in the carpet of the portable classroom.

Iglesias, who had only a couple of tardies on his record, was taken to the county's Juvenile Assessment Center. He gave the gun to his teacher, and said that he brought the .22 caliber pistol to school to protect himself from people in his neighborhood.

His name was released because the charges of possession of a firearm, possession of a firearm on school property and discharge of a firearm are considered to be felonies.

Lt. Tony Velez of the Oviedo Police said that Iglesias did not show the gun to anyone at school or brag about having it.

The boy told the police that he needed something to protect himself while he was away from the school.

Iglesias, a member of the freshman football team and a tuba player in the band, had no prior criminal record. He was described by one school official as a "good kid."

"The young man was very cooperative and very remorseful," said Oviedo High School Principal Robert Lundquist. "He realizes what he did and what could have happened. We're fortunate no one was injured."

School Resource Officer Diane Farrell of the Oviedo Police said that there have been very few incidents at the school the past school year - her first there. "We had some fights and drug-related incidents," she said.

Farrell said that she had not met Christopher Alexander Iglesias or heard of his having any previous problems.

"There hasn't been anything like this happen here this year," Farrell said. "These are good students - 99 percent of them are wonderful kids." However, a district report indicates that there were five weapons violations at the school the previous year.

Lundquist said he did not know if Iglesias would be able to resume classes at the school. "It's too early to determine that," he said. "Once they are through with the boy at the Juvenile Assessment Center, we hope to sit down with him and his parents."

There are 2,500 students attending Oviedo High School, located at 801 King Street in Oviedo. Graduation is April 25 at the University of Central Florida Arena.

Sanford will continue with energy assistance

SANFORD - The Sanford City Commission voted to continue supporting a home energy assistance program Monday after debating whether the city or the county should be responsible for the program.

The commission agreed to continue contracting with the state's Department of Community Affairs through March 31, 2000 to administer the

county-wide Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program.

Mayor Larry Dale said that the program should be administered by the county. He said the program costs the city money in staff time required to help administer the program.

"I have a problem with us carrying out a county program at city expense," Dale said. "This is not a city service."

Dale said he has received complaint calls from non-city

residents about the program.

The U.S. Department of Energy funds the program to assist clients with income at or below 125 percent of the poverty threshold set by the federal government. Clients receive assistance with their electric bill once every 12 months, and crisis assistance once per season during winter and summer, if the funds are available.

The program gives preference to the elderly and handicapped. Clients may receive

weather-related assistance.

From April 1, 1998 through March 31, 1999 the Community Development Department assisted 1,174 households with weather related assistance, 1,004 households with home energy assistance, and 344 households with crisis assistance.

The majority of the clients assisted with the program are Sanford residents. Community Development Director Charles Rowe said. However, there are

no statistics available to say where the majority of clients come from.

"Many are from the Sanford Housing Authority and other low income rentals around the city," Rowe said.

Rowe said that city administration of the program is beneficial to Sanford residents. He estimated that about 80 percent of the people who benefit from the program are Sanford residents.

"Proximity means access," Rowe said. However, there are

Students learn about self esteem from an expert

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - A third grade class at Altamonte Elementary School received a memorable visit Monday.

An inmate from the Seminole County Jail visited Cindy Decesare's third grade class to discuss how the wrong choices effected his life and his family.

The inmate, who the class called "Mr. Eric," is in the last month of an eight-month sentence for violation of parole. He has recently written a children's self-esteem book about his experiences that will soon be published.

Seminole County Deputy Sheriff David Cogle showed the class slides of a day in prison, while "Eric" talked about his experiences. Cogle has been visiting the class on a weekly basis since the start of this school year.

"I can stand up there and say don't do it.

don't do it, all I want," Cogle said. "It doesn't have the same effect as an inmate coming to the class. I get to go home at night."

"Eric," who has two children under age five, told the class that he missed spending time with his family during the holidays.

"He talked about the holidays, and how he didn't get the opportunity to eat a Thanksgiving dinner," Cogle said. "He talked about not celebrating Easter with his family."

"Eric" also told the class about the constant noise guard yelling at prisoners, and the disorientation of time that inmates experience. Assistant principal Pat Westbrook said this made an impression on the students.

"He talked about losing track of days," Westbrook said. "The only calendar is in the church. And the sound of doors slamming continuously. The yelling and hollering never stopped, it never stopped. There is no silence, ever."

Lake Mary borrows water from county

LAKE MARY - Lake Mary city commissioners on Thursday will vote to enact an emergency ordinance limiting water use following a shortage on Monday which forced the city to "borrow" potable water from Seminole County.

According to the city's public works director, Rick Diaz, the city received about 150 calls from citizens com-

plaining about low water pressure.

Diaz said that it took about a half hour to replace a half-million gallons depleted from Lake Mary's tanks and wells. City residents usually average 3.5 to 4.5 million gallons of usage daily, but had reached 5 million gallons early Monday morning. The only damage reported was a small water main break at Feather's Edge, off Rinehart Road. This, combined with the extensive water usage, placed water pressure at extremely low levels throughout the city, Diaz said.

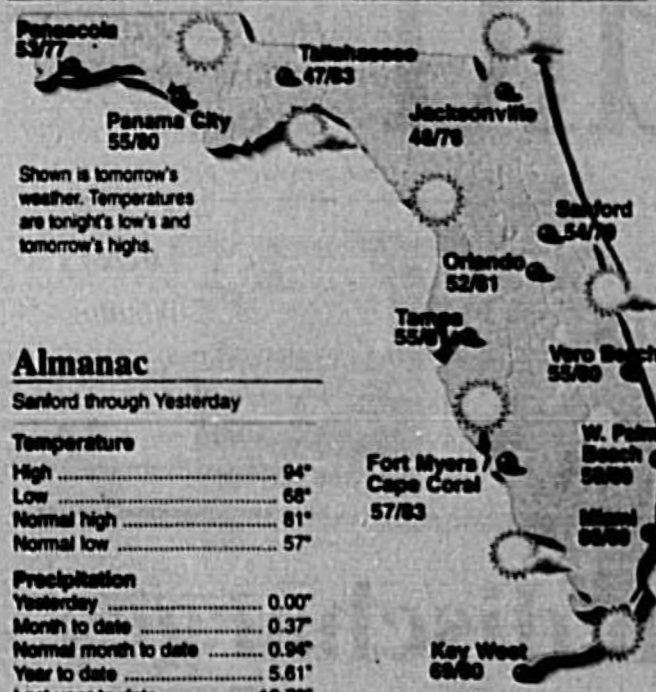
Diaz points to the "lake" [retention area] in front of city hall as proof positive of the severe conditions facing metropolitan area residents. It is barely damp with a minimum amount of hydration.

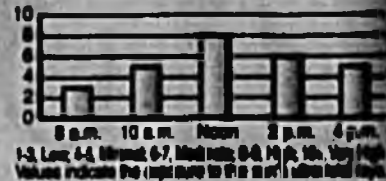

Commissioner Whitey Eckstein said the city should look into streamlining the number of county social welfare programs within the city.

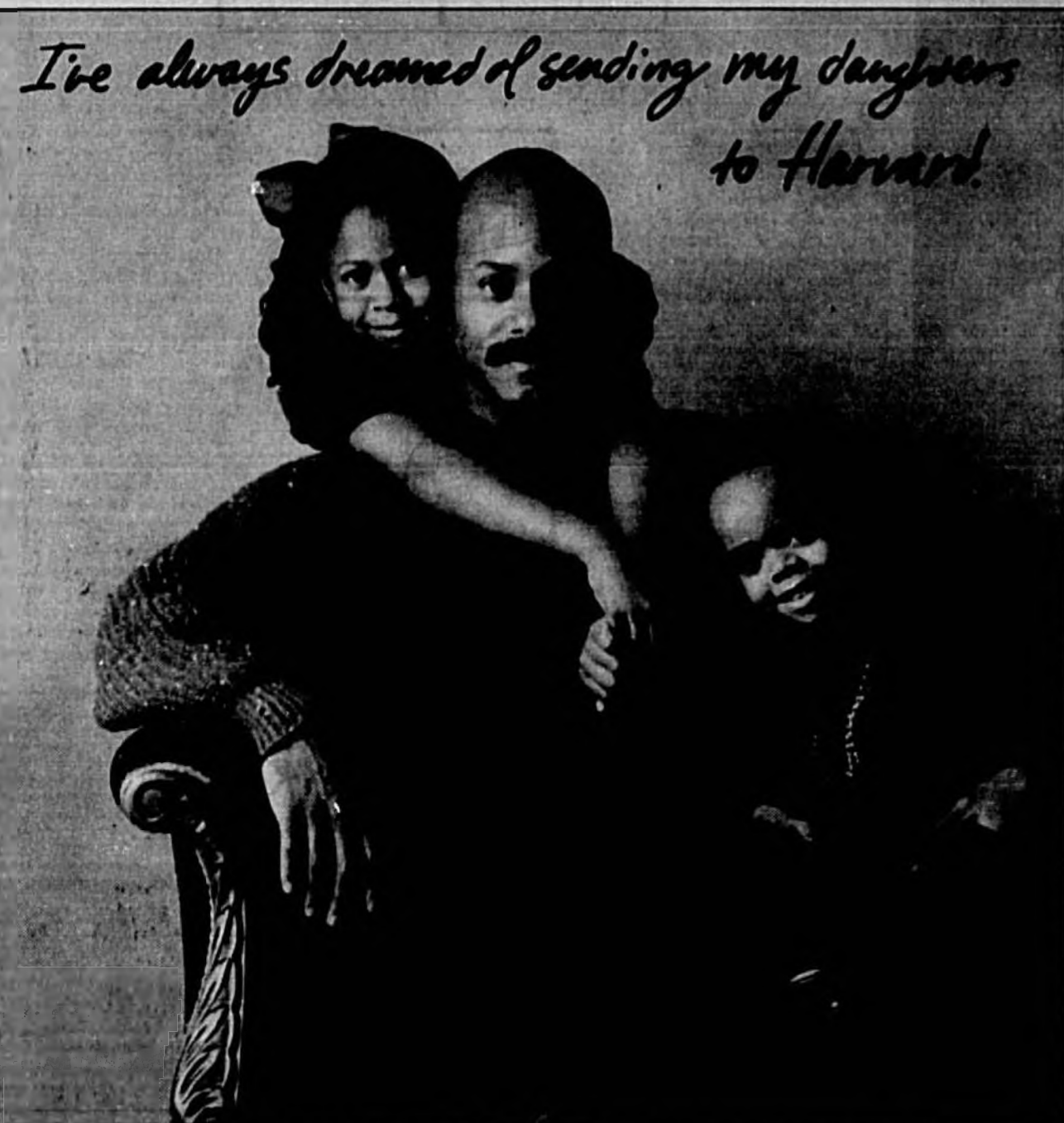

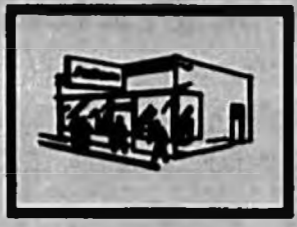

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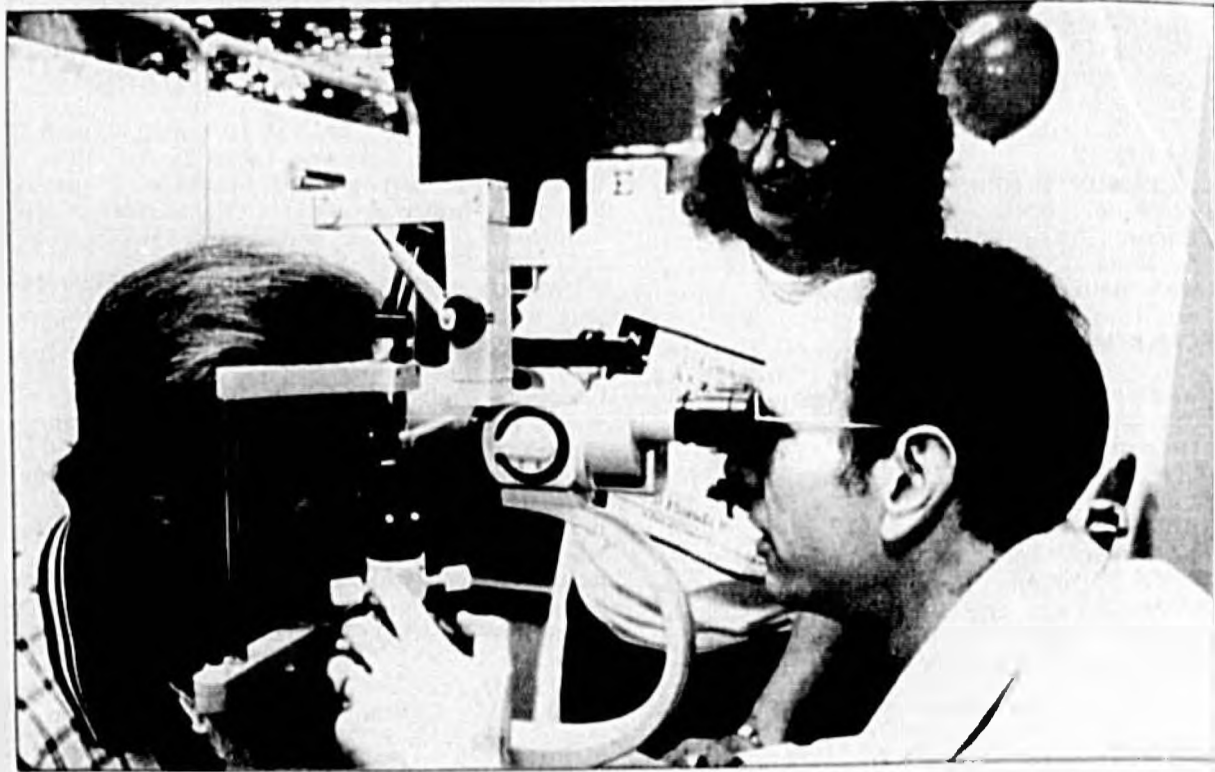

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Wynn's triumphs begin in Sanford

He was a burly kid who could throw a baseball through a brick wall. He showed up at the Sanford ballpark in March 1937 wearing tattered clothes and no shoes.

His name was Early Wynn. He had just turned 17.

He had brown eyes, black hair and a mean streak once he crossed the white lines and stood at the pitcher's mound. The Sanford Lookouts had themselves a corker.

Early Wynn was so damn good the Lookouts had him start 37 games, pitch 235 innings, play in the outfield and occasionally pinch hit. Amazingly, his arm didn't fall off — like what's happened now to Kerry Wood of the Chicago Cubs.

Wynn won 16 games as a 17 year old in the Florida State League and 300 games in 23 seasons as an American Leaguer. He had five 20-win seasons. He captured his 300th when he was 43. He was elected to the Hall of Fame.

Early Wynn died last week at the age of 79.

In recent years, he helped hundreds of older players who did not have the salaries or pensions of today's athletes. Wynn cringed when his ex-Cleveland Indian teammate Mike Garcia had no money to pay his medical bills. Wynn rounded up a posse to help.

Wynn lived in Florida in his retirement. Now and then he would be a guest at one of the baseball car shows or visit at the Players Association Reunions in St. Petersburg.

Whenever the oldtimers recalled Wynn, they recalled one of the grittiest pitchers of all time. No one dug in too deeply when Wynn pitched. He drilled more than his share and scared the bee-jebers out of many more.

Wynn's attitude was that he owned the territory between the white lines. Opposing batters were intruders. He had no mercy for any of them — and they knew it.

His first major-league seasons were with some pretty bad Washington Senators teams. He pitched in three games as a 19-year-old in 1939 but didn't win his first until 1941. In 1943 with most of the game's big stars in the service, Wynn was 18-12 for the Senators. He pitched 257 inning.

When he went into the Army in August, 1944, Wynn's big-league record was 39-48. After the war he won 261 more games. He was 17-15 for the 1947 Senators, who traded him to the Cleveland Indians two years later. At 39, he won 22 games for the Chicago White Sox.

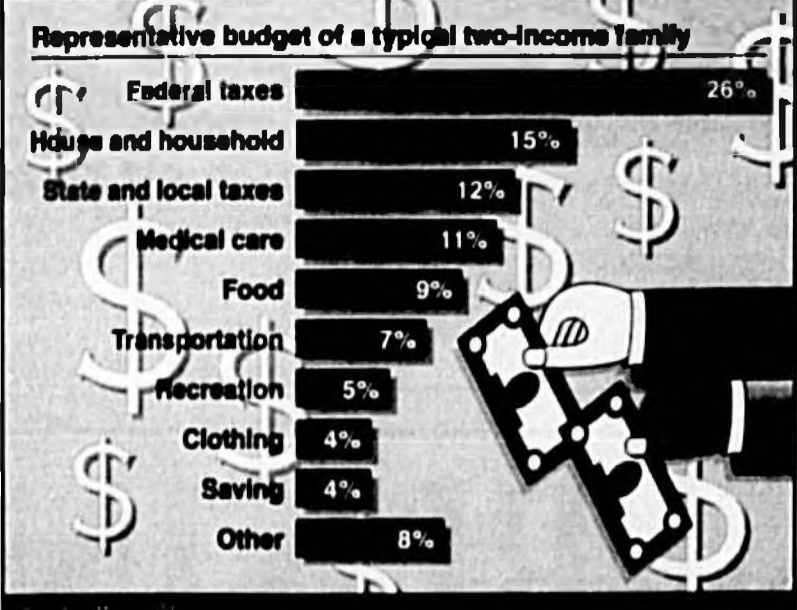
When he retired, Wynn became a major-league scout. He evaluated players mostly on the major-league level. During the 1960s, he would travel frequently with the Washington Senators or the Chicago White Sox on their chartered team flights.

He was a quiet man. Unless he was approached. Early Wynn was a man of very few words. Sometimes on the chartered flights, he'd chat awhile with Senators pitching coach Sid Hudson who had been Wynn's teammate in the 1940s. Or he'd sit with Gil Hodges, the ex-Brooklyn Dodger who managed the Senators in the mid-1960s.

One of Wynn's closest friends in retirement was ex-teammate and scout Ellis Clary, who lives in Valdosta, Ga. In 1938, when the two were at Charlotte in the Piedmont League, Clary gave Wynn another name other than Early. The name was "Gus."

Wynn must have liked the moniker because he frequently signed his name Early "Gus" Wynn. One tough cuss this pitcher named Gus. One of the best in baseball history.

Bonding with Bond, then and now

James Bond has always been both ahead of, and just behind the loop. He was English, when America was the dominant force in the world. He wore a tuxedo, when everybody else was wearing tie-dyed tee shirts. He smoked, drank and gambled in exotic locations, while the rest of us stayed at home, waiting for the VCR to be invented. He had sex at the drop of a hat, while the rest of us stopped wearing hats around 1962.

He's always displayed a kind of Hat Pack insouciance which, apparently, will never grow old. He'll always be totally cool, in a square kind of way, like Henry Mancini, Hugh Hefner or Peter Lawford.

It's amazing to me that the Bond series still has "legs." Of course, they've been tinkering with the formula ever since Sean Connery left. He was more ruthless than his successors. Roger Moore was more of a cartoon, even dressing as a clown in one outing ("Octopussy"). Timothy Dalton tried to bring the series back to its roots in his two movies, and he was all right, except he always looked like he was nursing an ulcer. Pierce Brosnan seems to be striking a balance between the New Age Man of the '90s, and the handsome cad we know so well. His new boss is a woman who considers Bond a sexist dinosaur. The women he woo is capable of beating him up. He shows a little regret when he has to kill the bad guy, but still not enough to let him live.

The titles of the movies have become more bizarre. While the titles of actual James Bond stories were used up some years ago, the producers have done a pretty good job of duplicating their obscure tone. We had "A View to a Kill," for instance. What does that mean? I saw that sorry excuse for a movie, and I don't recall any voyeurs viewing a kill (besides the audience).

The last entry, "Tomorrow Never Dies," had almost the purity of a Zen koan. But once again its relation to the plot was tenuous. The next movie is called "The World Is Not Enough." Whether it refers to the insane schemes of a mad industrialist remains to be seen. But I have read a little advance press about the movie, and it sounds like the producers are pushing the Bond envelope to its very limits.

Apparently, in its opening scenes Q is killed, M is kidnapped, and 007 blames himself. His guilt sends him to a psychiatrist. I don't know much of what happens after that, except that

John Cleese will play the new Q (R?), providing some comic relief to the proceedings.

As a long time James Bond fan, I'm not sure I want to share his anguish. Spies don't cry — that's a rule. On the other hand, Bond has a lot of baggage. His lovers have a way of getting killed, for instance — not only killed, but murdered in bizarre ways. Jill Masterson was smothered by gold. Aki was killed by a poison dribbled into her mouth as she slept. Then there's his arch enemy, Ernst Stavro Blofeld, who keeps coming back, no matter how many times Bond kills him. That's got to have a devastating effect on your psyche, especially if you have a license to kill.

I'm not sure how healthy it would be to be James Bond's shrink. After all he would, in fact, know too much. If it were Sean Connery's Bond, he might be tempted to terminate his shrink at the conclusion of his analysis, just to be on the safe side.

Of course Pierce Brosnan's Bond is a little kinder and gentler. He's even quit smoking. Who knows? He might forsake martinis for vitamin enriched smoothies, and one night stands for a committed relationship. I do hope he'll stop working through his issues long enough to blow up a Mercedes or two, maybe even an oil rig in Azerbaijan, or a floating Caribbean casino that's really a missile silo. Somehow, I think Bond will come through.

Prisoners only receive one pencil per week to write a letter," Eric told the students.

"If the pencil breaks you wait until next week to get another one," Westbrook said.

Cogle said he hoped "Eric's" visit would make an impact on the students.

"I personally think kids are kids no matter where they come from," Cogle said. "At some point, we all go in different directions."

Cogle told the class that "Eric's" name and the criminal charge is irrelevant, because he has the same duties as any other inmate. Cogle did not tell the class what charge had placed "Eric" in prison.

"He just told the class he was serving eight months for doing something stupid," Cogle said.

Cogle has been teaching the third grade class about making positive choices in life. He speaks to the class weekly about peer pressure, conflict resolution, communication, the principle of action-and-reaction, and making choices.

Before moving to Seminole County, Cogle participated in a program called Like Officers Very Easily with an elementary school in Baltimore, Md. after students in the school sent flowers, cookies and letters to a partner of his who had been shot in the stomach during a shoot-out.

"You remember Scared Straight where kids were taken into jails and the inmates would yell and holler," Cogle said. "That doesn't work. This is the opposite approach, with an inmate coming to talk to the class."

The mandatory water restrictions during last year's drought period were allowed to lapse in most Central Florida communities. Lake Mary began to address the shortage issue then, budgeting for construction and installation of a million-gallon water storage tank, like the one seen from Inter-

state-4 in the city of Altamonte Springs. Diaz said that city leaders have budgeted two new wells this fiscal year. He said, "Even when times are good, we still need voluntary" restrictions on consumption.

Lake Mary's water restrictions are exactly the same as Seminole County's -- No watering between 10 a.m. and

4 p.m. or on Sundays. Watering is permitted at even-numbered addresses on Monday, Wednesday and Friday and at odd-numbered addresses on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

In Seminole County, Acting Utilities Manager Ruth Lala said that the county's restrictions had never been lifted. She said that all cit-

ies, including Sanford, are likely to enact some form of mandatory restriction this week. The city of Casselberry faces the toughest restrictions around, with no watering allowed from 10 a.m. to 8:30 p.m.

City Commissioner Gary Brender was there to assess the impact to Lake Mary residents. He said that

commissioners will vote on Thursday although it's "fair to have voluntary water restrictions all year." He boasts that Lake Mary has "access to the best and most abundant water source in the whole state" and that the key is to get restrictions in place at all times.

Diaz said that residents should consider options in

lawn and garden maintenance as well. "The weather this weekend was so great," multitudes of people tended to gardening and car washing. He is part of a group which will address St. Johns River Water Management District's incoming Board of Governors this week to ask for help with key water conservation issues.

Oviedo High School junior pitcher Paul Lubrano has had several so far this season...and had another one Monday night.

Lake Mary added two runs in the third inning and a run in the fourth inning to increase the margin to 8-3, but DeLand did not quit.

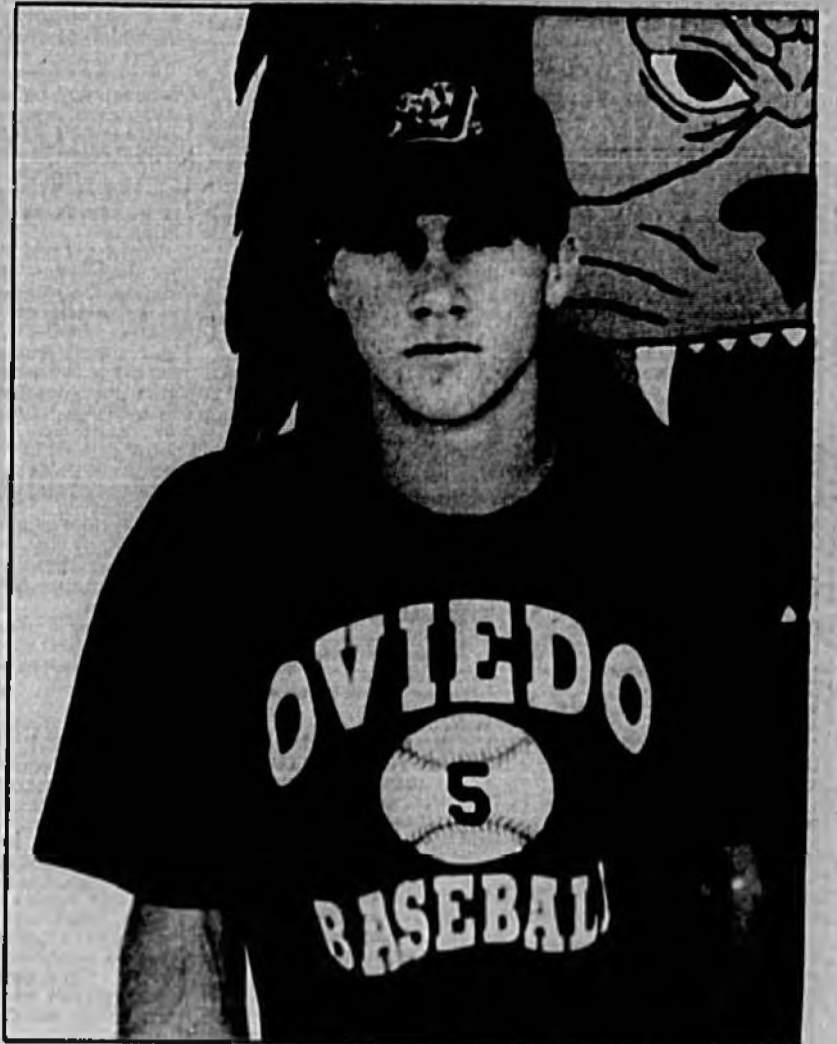

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WIN AT BRIDGE

Trust partner's signals

Yesterday, West led the club king. His partner held J-7-6-3. Knowing the lead showed the king and queen (lead ace from ace-king!), East encouraged with the seven, showing an equivalent honor to those promised by the opening lead, either the ace or jack.

Signals are important, making defense less difficult than it would be "flying blind."

In this deal, South was in four spades. How should the defense have proceeded?

Note South's two-spade response. This is a strong jump shift. Many players are taught that you need 19 points for this bid. That is wrong! It is much better to use the response with only some 12-15 high-card points. You describe your hand and leave it to partner to decide whether to stop in game or to move toward a slam.

Note also West's opening lead. Against a suit contract, a lead from a strong short suit is usually preferred to one from a weak long suit.

Under West's heart king, East should signal with the nine. He wants partner to continue hearts, so he drops his highest spot-card. Less experienced players play the six, but that might be discouraging from the 10-9-6. Always signal as clearly as possible.

West continued with the heart queen and his third heart. What did East do now? Knowing South had to have the club ace for his bidding, East led the 13th heart. This promoted West's spade queen as the fourth defensive trick.

Perhaps you think that was easy. However, there's no point signaling if partner isn't watching your cards — and vice versa.

Tracheostomy is a drastic step

DEAR DR. GOTT: I saw on TV a new procedure for emphysema patients that involved making an incision in the trachea; then a tube is inserted to blow oxygen right into the lungs. Would this help a patient who is in the final stages of the disease?

DEAR READER: Perhaps. But it is quite drastic; even the most severely handicapped emphysema patient can usually be helped by supplemental oxygen delivered by a machine (or a tank) through a tube leading to the nose, without the necessity for surgery. The technique you describe (tracheostomy) is more suited to acute respiratory failure in a hospital setting — or, of course, to television.

DEAR DR. GOTT: In a recent column, you correctly identified the ways in which religious faith leads to a healthful lifestyle. However, as a psy-

chologist at a seminary, I believe that you take a reductionist point of view by stating that good health is due to scientific principles, not to divine intervention. Because we cannot explain miracles, is it not better to leave the issue to theologians?

DEAR READER: Not in my opinion. Actually, the authors of the study I reviewed concluded that matters of faith are directly related to scientific explanations, even though such explanations may be founded on principles that we don't fully understand.

If you want to believe in divine intervention, that is your right. But I prefer the position that such events are more likely the result of complex

physical phenomena. Reductionist or not, this view makes more sense to me. For example, the great scourges of history, including syphilis and plague, were once believed to be acts of God. Now that we understand the scientific basis of such events, however, they are both treatable and preventable. The theologians were not a great deal of help in this regard. So, I prefer to put my hopes on the scientific approach, rather than on theologians, who can continue to debate how many angels can dance on the head of a pin.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My mother has had double vision for 2 months. Her doctor gave her special eye exercises that did not help. What's the next step?

DEAR READER: Double vision (diplopia) has many causes, ranging from an imbalance of the eye muscles to serious neurological disorders, including tumors, infection or stroke. The causes are endless. In my opinion, your mother needs evaluation by a neurologist AND an ophthalmologist, in addition to having further testing, such as a CT scan.
