Turning trash to cash

BUSHNELL — After two years of regulation writing, probes by state environmental officials and red tape, rural Sumter County finally has received permission to turn its garbage into cash.

The state Department of Environmental Regulation sent a letter this week giving county officials the go-ahead to turn garbage into composted material to be used as fertilizer.

Sumter County would be the first state-approved seller and distributor of the compost, and one of the first in the nation.

McGee caseworker sentenced

BARTOW — A state welfare worker convicted last month in a precedent setting case stemming from the beating death of a 2-year-old boy was sentenced today to three months probation.

Supporters for Margaret Barber, 62, a caseworker for the state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, cheered after they learned she would not serve any jail time. Barber said she plans to appeal the sentence.

Barber and three other HRS workers were charged last year in connection with the death of Bradley McGee. It marked the first time in Florida that state employees were criminally charged in one of their child care cases.

City crunch is on

Falson: Dip into coffers won't put city in a bind

SANFORD — Although City Manager Frank Falson has recommended using more than \$350,000 of the city's \$3.5 million "rainy day" fund to balance his proposed \$22.1 million budget, he said Sanford's security won't be affected in the event of an emergency.

"We're in no danger of coming up short," Falson said Thursday.

Falson said the use of the cash reserves are needed to have a city budget that balances the amount of money coming to the city — revenues — and the amount of the money spent — expenses. The reserves are normally used in emergencies and to allow the city to operate October and November until property tax revenues begin flowing into city coffers.

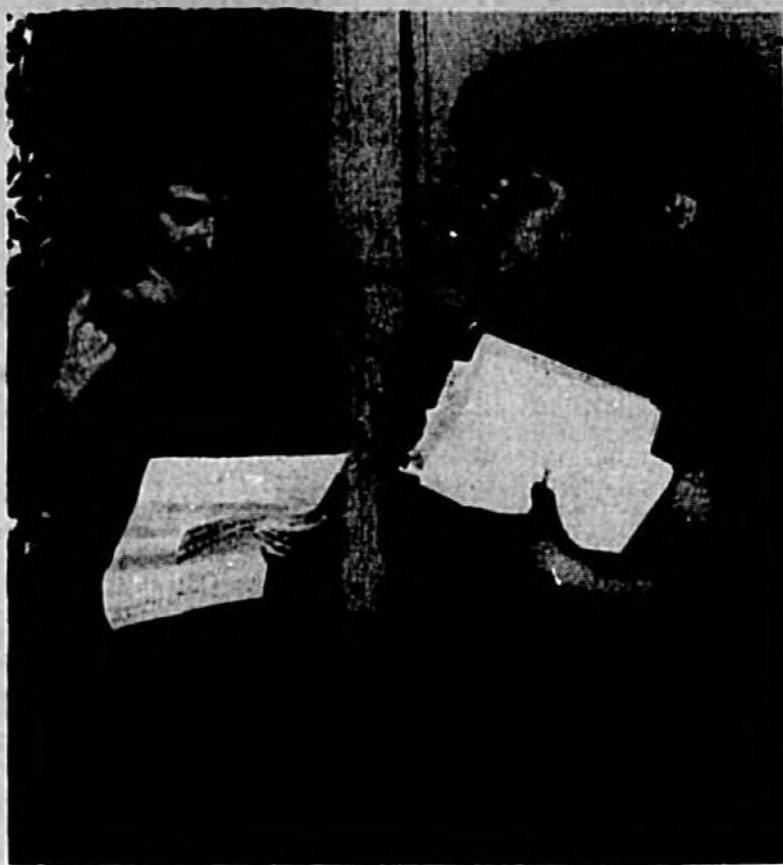
Falson said although city department directors requested about \$1.5 million more than was available for personnel, operating expenses and equipment, he trimmed their requests to an affordable \$13.2 million to keep his recommended budget balanced.

Commissioner Herbert "Whitey" Eckstein said he's reviewing the budget to see if any small purchases such as lawn mowers can be eliminated or their purchase made with other revenues to reduce the amount drawn on the reserve fund.

Eckstein said he is also reviewing the tasks performed by the 15 clerks that have been hired to save \$308,000 to determine how critical they are to city operations. He said he is considering a slight tax increase in conjunction with the additional expense-saving measures if the clerks are critical.

"I have to strike a balance between the taxpayers and the employees," Eckstein said. "We have the highest millage rate in the county, but I also want the employees to know I care."

Laid-off employees say their protest isn't over

SANFORD — Fifteen embittered city employees Thursday morning shot questions at City Personnel Director Tim McCauley, as the official gathered the workers to explain to them why the city was going to have to lay them off.

The employees wanted to know who determined that they must go and how they came to the determination. Many said they would take their protests to the city commissioner.

The group was angry at the city and alleged that some mismanagement of finances had occurred.

McCauley told the group no grievance hearing would be provided them, according to civil service laws.

"Last year the city spent \$10,000 on new uniforms for the Little League baseball team," Patricia Lee, an accountant clerk for the finance department, said. "A lot of parents are losing their jobs so that they can't put food in the mouths of these little children so that they can wear these little league uniforms. Excuse me, but this doesn't make sense."

Commissioner Whitey Eckstein, who

U.S. cities struggle with fiscal woes

WASHINGTON — The fiscal woes of the nation's cities are increasing even as local officials seek to squeeze more money out of increased taxes and user fees and cut spending, the National League of Cities said this week.

The league, in a survey of 576 communities with populations over 10,000, also found that more than half of the cities — 54 percent — will run a deficit, with spending outpacing revenues in their

current budget year. Last year, just 33 percent of the responding cities reported a deficit.

In addition, some 23 percent said they expected to see an actual decline in local revenues.

Especially hard hit in the Northeast, the league said, where the region is struggling with a widespread economic slowdown that is even more sluggish than the national economy. In that region, five out of six communities reported a diminished capacity to meet their local financial needs.

What was acutely true of the Northeast.

Litton: No new taxes in Lake Mary

LAKE MARY — City Manager John Litton didn't actually say, "Read my lips," but he managed to hold the line with the city's fiscal year 1991 \$9.9 million budget he has proposed, calling for no new taxes.

While the proposal is up over this year's \$9 million budget, the millage rate would remain at 3.880, where it has been for the past three years.

The value of a mill in Lake Mary in 1990 was \$291,820 in revenue, while for 1991 a mill is expected to represent \$355,988 in revenue. "Overall," Litton said, "we are projecting general fund revenues to increase by 4.5 percent during fiscal year 1991."

Litton presented his initial budget message to the Lake Mary city commission last night, at the end of an almost five-hour meeting. Litton told the commissioners, "The City of Lake Mary is currently in excellent financial condition due to the foresight of each and every one of you and your willingness to make those monetary decisions which are not always popular."

From an accounting standpoint, Litton said there were still some problems on the expenditure side in making sure that items are being charged to the proper programs and object codes. He also had some concerns about allocation charges including distinguishing between the general and enterprise fund when it comes to accountability and justification.

While several cities in Central Florida have found the need to either raise the millage rate or

cut back on city personnel, Litton reported his budget proposal calls for a staffing increase. He wants to add a secretary to the planning department, hire a full-time recreational leader for the parks and recreation department, a part-time employee for maintenance in the new city hall and a full-time maintenance worker to help maintain the grounds outside the city hall. Additionally, several positions already on staff would be upgraded.

Litton explained a number of expenditures contained in his budget proposal saying that while \$10,000 had been earmarked in the 1990 budget for "other legal services," another \$50,000 was added into the 1991 budget to pay attorneys to

Chef saves steakhouse from arson

FERN PARK — "I just wanted to get the guy out of there. The guy didn't scare me. I wanted him out of there before he found a match," chef Robert DeLuca said today after saving Freddie's Steakhouse in Fern Park from an accused arsonist last night.

DeLuca, 36, of Fern Park, said there were about 25 patrons and workers in the steakhouse on U.S. Highway 17-92, when Hugh Francis MacDonald, 53, of Kissimmee, allegedly entered the building at about 6:48 p.m. Thursday, and began pouring liquid, possibly gasoline, from a can inside the building.

The fluid was poured on floors and walls. DeLuca said he remembered the suspect being in a confrontation with staff at the steakhouse Monday night, when MacDonald was allegedly making lewd gestures and remarks to patrons. He was forced to leave the restaurant Monday and allegedly made threats at that time, DeLuca said.

DeLuca said he confronted the suspect as soon as he realized there was a

Chickens help county stand guard against deadly virus epidemic

SANFORD — There are some things only a chicken can do. Like lay eggs. Peck the ground all the time. And possibly save human lives by testing for a deadly disease.

In Seminole County and surrounding areas, chickens are being used to detect a deadly virus transmitted by certain mosquitoes. The virus, St. Louis encephalitis, is an inflammatory disease which affects the brain, nerves, and spinal cord.

In the early 1960s it killed 55 out of 315 infected people in a Tampa Bay epidemic. Eight people died in Central and South Florida in a 1977 epidemic of 110 cases, and it reached as far as the Panhandle in 1980. Since then, there have been less than four cases per year reported. But you can probably thank the chickens for that.

The county uses the chickens by setting up flocks in selected areas which are close to water or swampy areas — mosquito breeding areas. The hope is that an infected mosquito will bite one of the chickens, and the disease will show up in blood samples taken from the flock every two weeks. In this way, an epidemic can be detected early, and

3,400 prisoners reclassified

TALLAHASSEE — A new state prison policy developed after a convicted cop-killer escaped from a work-release program was announced by Gov. Bob Martinez Thursday to keep violent criminals out of programs with low supervision.

The new rules were drafted by the state Department of Corrections. They are part of a statewide crackdown on prison security following the June 19 escape of Donald David Dilbeck, who was charged with

stabbing a woman to death in the parking lot of a Tallahassee mall following his escape.

"These new guidelines will provide for better security of the prison population," Martinez said. "The sentence of the court will be carried out and carried out in a better way."

Under previous prison guidelines, inmates could be reclassified after serving 40 percent of their minimum required sentence.

The new policy will have no effect on the ongoing early release program for state inmates, Martinez said. But inmates convicted or first- or second-degree murder will

be kept on close custody status until they have served all their mandatory time and are within one year of release.

Inmates getting closer scrutiny also include those convicted of attacking law enforcement officers and those who have a history of escape attempts.

The new policy also takes most of the discretion away from prison administrators when it comes to placement of inmates in work release programs, and shifts about 3,400 inmates from minimum and medium security to close custody status.

UFO scientists, abductees gather

PENSACOLA — Hundreds of UFO enthusiasts — from scientists and ministers to self-claimed abductees and the curious — are gathering in Pensacola for a weekend symposium about flying saucers and extraterrestrials.

The 21st annual Mutual UFO Network Symposium features a host of speakers and a tour of a suburb where residents claim to have seen UFOs, paralyser beams and diminutive aliens over the past few years.

Kathryn Ware, publicity chairwoman, said Thursday that 720 people from across the United States and abroad are registered to attend the symposium Saturday and Sunday.

"Most of them are serious researchers, investigators, part of the MUFON organization," said Don Ware, eastern regional director of the private group that looks into reports of UFO sightings.

"We do get a number of other people, some apparently as a result of on-board experiences," said Ware, who did not know how many of the attendees claim to have been abducted by aliens.

Jobless rate slips to 5.2 percent in June

WASHINGTON — The nation's jobless rate slipped to 5.2 percent in June on a burst of hiring in the health industry and other service sectors of the economy, the Labor Department said today.

Private economists expected an increase to 5.4 percent in June following civilian jobless rates of 5.3 percent in May and 5.4 percent in April.

Counting military personnel, the June jobless rate stood at 5.1 percent.

The Labor Department said 40,000 new jobs were created during the month. But if the layoffs of 57,000 temporary workers were not counted, job growth would have totaled 97,000 new positions last month.

President asked to donate fees

MIAMI — A member of the Public Health Trust has asked Jackson Memorial Hospital President Ira Clark to donate to the hospital fees he accepted in the past two years while acting as a paid consultant to a medical supplier that does tens of thousands of dollars in business at Jackson.

The request, submitted in writing by Stanley Tate to Trust Chairman B. Boyd Benjamin, was to be read Thursday at a special meeting of the trust's executive committee. Benjamin called the meeting specifically to discuss Clark's relationship with Hill-Rom, an Indiana company that has paid Clark \$2,000 twice and picked up his air fare and hotel bill to attend the company's meetings.

But Clark did not show for the meeting, and those who attended the meeting decided not to discuss the matter.

Lawyer wants record recalled

CORAL GABLES — Lawyer Jack Thompson claims that Miami-based rap group 2 Live Crew used his voice illegally in the band's new recording, "Banned in the USA." Thompson said he wants the record recalled.

In a letter to Dade County State Attorney Janet Reno, Thompson said his appearance on the "Donahue" show last month is on the new single by the group.

Thompson said his voice was used without his authority. He urged Reno's office to assign a special prosecutor to investigate whether charges can be filed against the group.

Thompson, who has led the anti-obscenity crusade against the group, said he received harassing phone calls after the recording was played on Miami radio stations.

Embezzler's son tries to work deal

MIAMI — The son of a convicted embezzler is trying to work out a deal with prosecutors that would allow him to join the armed forces.

Craig Gherman, son of convicted embezzler Henry Gherman, said he would plead guilty to one count of transferring \$600 in counterfeit money in return for a light criminal record that could allow him to join the armed forces.

"Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, any of them. Here is a young man we can rehabilitate and have him learn a trade," said Mitchell Panter, the younger Gherman's court-appointed lawyer.

Anti-pollution gear is targeted for inspection by new state law

TAMPA — State officials are running a little behind in their efforts to enforce a new law making it illegal in Florida to sell or drive vehicles without their original pollution-control equipment, authorities said.

The 40 state inspectors who will enforce the new Clean Outdoor Air Law, which went into effect Sunday, won't finish their training until late next month, said Bob Daugherty, environmental administrator of the state Department of Environmental Regulation's mobile source control section.

The inspectors will investigate car lots for outlaw automobiles, Daugherty said. Until the inspectors go to work, the DER will respond to car buyers' complaints.

As of Jan. 1, a seller must certify in writing that a car's emission system has not been tampered with.

For car models between 1975 and 1980, the fuel cap that prevents the use of leaded fuel and the catalytic converter, which converts toxic gases in exhaust into carbon dioxide and water, must be intact and working.

For 1981 and newer cars,

dealers must make sure cars have other anti-pollution systems such as exhaust gas recirculation systems that cool the cylinders, and the fuel emissions evaporation system that absorbs hydrocarbons when the car is off.

All other cars do not require certification because, Daugherty said, emission controls were not part of the package.

Dealers violating the law will face a first-degree misdemeanor charge, punishable by up to one year in jail and a \$1,000 fine. A second offense could lead to a loss of the dealership.

Fraternity members working off sentences

SANTA ROSA BEACH — Ten University of Alabama students caught with items they swiped from local homes and businesses for a theme fraternity party have been spending weekends sprucing up beaches.

"I get eight full hours from them," said Malcolm Patterson, executive director of the South Walton Tourist Development Council. Patterson has been their taskmaster since June.

"If they make it through this summer, they will never forget this as long as they live," Patterson said Thursday. "I intend to see to it that they pay the way that I think the court intended for them to pay."

The 10 members of the Sigma Nu fraternity were ordered June 11 to clean up

Walton County beaches in deal in which the state agreed not to prosecute them on felony charges.

The students were arrested in south Walton County April 16 after a Blue Mountain Beach resident reported hearing a chain saw about 2 a.m. Five students were found in a truck and five in a vehicle they had brought from Tusculoo, Ala.

In the large truck, authorities found concrete pelicans, ceramic birds, hand-carved wooden statues, a wooden anchor, beach signs and a 15-foot tall palm tree that had been cut down.

Authorities said they were cutting down a second palm tree when they were nabbed. Deputies said the items, taken from homes and businesses in Seagrave Beach, Grayton Beach, Blue Mountain Beach and Seaside,

were to be used in a shipwreck-theme party. The fraternity members were charged with grand theft, criminal mischief and possession of burglary tools.

In June, Circuit Judge Laura Melvin agreed to a plan negotiated by prosecution and defense attorneys that requires the students to spend summer weekends doing manual labor for the tourism council.

A violation by one means they all could go back to court.

On Saturdays, they work 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and Sundays they work 8 a.m. to 3 p.m., so they can return to Alabama. So far, they have shoveled oyster shells, picked up trash along beach roads and landscaped parks and boat launches.

Patterson compared his role to that of a drill instructor.

Three charged in drug bust

CASSELBERRY — Three residents of 517 Lake Kathryn Circle, Casselberry, were arrested on narcotics charges Thursday night after City County Investigative Bureau agents with a warrant searched their house.

Elections challenge continues

SANFORD — The law suit filed by school board candidate Bill Kroll, former school board candidate Wes Pennington and Jim Ocque, representing the Seminole County Republican Executive Committee, continues in Seminole County circuit court.

While Judge Kenneth Leffler last week made a decision which called for all candidates running in for school board office in November 1990 to run on a partisan ticket, he stopped short of proclaiming the non-partisan elections unconstitutional.

The plaintiffs have requested a hearing on a motion for injunctive relief in which they will ask Leffler to declare the unconstitutionality of the special act, claiming that candidates and potential candidates were being harmed by the failure of the court to declare the special act that allows Seminole County to have a non-partisan school board and which has been in place for 14 years, unconstitutional, according to school board attorney Ned Julian.

"I really thought this was over," said Pat Telson who early yesterday morning was served with a summons to appear at the hearing. "I don't know why this is dragging on."

Supt. Bob Hughes who was served with a summons on Tuesday called the request "a last ditch, desperation effort or sour grapes on the part of the plaintiffs." He said also that the request for a hearing "amounted to harassment."

Attorney Michael D. Jones, who represents the plaintiffs, and Kroll would not comment on the suit or the request for injunctive relief. Pennington and Ocque could not be reached.

According to Hughes, he, member Joe Williams and vice-chairman Nancy Warren, all of whom will not run for reelection until 1992 were not specifically named in the original law suit and the judge did not rule on the whether their seats should be partisan or non-partisan for that reason.

By declaring the special act unconstitutional, Leffler would have forced the removal of the every board member and the superintendent. If such a declaration had been made, the board members would have to be either reappointed by the governor until regular elections were held in November or they would be replaced by the governor.

In a similar case decided earlier this year in Martin County, the non-partisan elections were found to be unconstitutional and the board was removed from office. Gov. Bob Martinez, however, reappointed all the members until regular elections were held citing that he believed the will of the people would not be served by removing those people from office who they had elected.

Seminole County school board officials think if it came to the same point here, the governor would make a similar decision.

When the decision was made in the original suit on Friday, Kroll, Pennington and Ocque filed their amendment and request for a hearing immediately, though the defendants were told they had 20 days in which to consult with an attorney and respond.

"This is not 20 days," said Hughes. "If the court allows anything to happen this quickly it is a kangaroo court and lynch mob." Hughes added, however, that he believed Leffler would not allow that to happen.

Supervisor of elections Sandra Goard, who is also named as a defendant in the suit, said she had not yet received a summons to appear on Monday.

Hughes, Telson and Williams have been served with a subpoena to appear at Monday's hearing.

Defense cuts should be made with care

Defense Secretary Dick Cheney's plan to reduce U.S. armed forces by 25 percent over the next five years goes more than halfway toward meeting the demands of congressional leaders for military savings. The steep cuts proposed by the Pentagon can be implemented without jeopardizing America's national security, provided that —

• Agreement is reached soon between the superpowers on treaties slashing conventional arms in Europe and strategic nuclear arsenals;

• And the peaceful, democratic evolution of Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union continues.

These are two big ifs that lawmakers should not ignore as they seek to reduce the deficit through cutbacks in defense. It is particularly worrisome that the Kremlin has pulled back from reaching an early accord to remove troops from Central Europe. At the start of the year, a treaty was expected to be ready for signing at the June summit in Washington. Now it is doubtful that an agreement will be reached this year at all. Meantime, Mikhail Gorbachev's future is increasingly uncertain.

Cheney's proposal cuts deeper than the military services have recommended. For instance, he would pare the Army from 18 divisions to 12, two fewer than the generals want, for a total reduction of 224,000 soldiers. Twelve divisions will be adequate only if a conventional forces agreement is reached, thereby eliminating Moscow's military superiority in Europe and allowing the removal of some American ground troops.

Under the Cheney outline, the Air Force would shrink from 36 to 25 tactical air wings. (The Air Force proposed 28.) And the Navy would drop to 455 ships, compared with the 600-ship fleet that existed briefly in the late 1980s. Significantly, Cheney would decrease the Navy's aircraft carrier fleet from 14 to 12.

Despite the scale of these reductions, some on Capitol Hill are insisting it is not enough. A contingent of Democratic lawmakers wants, for example, to chop the Navy's carrier fleet to 10 instead of 12. Yet the carrier's prime usefulness is not in fighting the Soviet Union but rather in dousing flare-ups in the Third World. The easing of the Cold War is not likely to eliminate such low-level conflicts, which demand a carrier fleet with global reach.

As Congress presses ahead with the Pentagon cuts, emphasis should be placed on light, mobile combat forces and naval units that can respond quickly to contingencies around the world. And the pace of the reductions should be deliberate enough not to outrun the promising changes occurring in the crumbling Soviet bloc.

Waving the flag for Beetle Bailey

Getting the Pentagon to laugh at itself is almost as tough as getting it to manage its budget efficiently. But some enlightened brass finally decided that a cartoon strip poking fun at the Army was — well — patriotic.

So after 40 years of creative insubordination, Pvt. Beetle Bailey was feted at the Pentagon recently.

For once, the joke was on Beetle Bailey's creator, Mort Walker. Imagine opening the comic section one day to find that Sarge had proudly recommended Beetle for a medal honoring his contribution to the morale of his fellow soldiers. You would expect Beetle to wake up in the last panel and shake off the remnants of a crazy dream.

Walker must have thought he was dreaming, too, as he received a "Certificate of Appreciation for Patriotic Civilian Service" in the Pentagon briefing room, and generals eagerly asked him for his autograph. For years, the Army has given Walker flak for portraying Gen. Halftrack as half-senile and Sarge as a humorless brute, to the point of banning his strip from the military newspaper, The Stars and Stripes.

Maybe Walker is doing something wrong, if the Pentagon no longer takes his humorous criticism from a private's eye view seriously. Maybe the generals have decided it's time to end a little Cold War of their own. Or maybe the Army is finally ready to admit that, yes, men can laugh at themselves.

Whatever the reason behind the Army's change of heart, it's great for public relations. Let's just hope those budget cuts don't give the Army an excuse to discharge Pvt. Beetle Bailey again.

Small towns become ghost towns

LAKOTA, N.D. — The windswept prairie stretches to the horizon in every direction. Interrupted only by occasional stands of trees and even fewer farmsteads. The silence is broken only by the lonesome whistle of a Burlington Northern freight train.

Those are the sights and sounds of a distressed county, its withering communities and its troubled people. Here in North Dakota — and elsewhere in the Northern Plains, Midwest and Rockies — hundreds of towns bereft of the resources needed for survival are in danger of being almost wholly abandoned.

There is no reliable count of how many communities have vanished in recent decades because the Census Bureau does not monitor the status of unincorporated towns with populations under 1,000 — those most likely to disappear.

What is known is that in the last half of the 20th century, several hundred incorporated towns have failed, for unexplained reasons, to appear in each new decennial census.

Reliable information is available on a county-wide basis — and it provides little solace to those concerned about the decline of the nation's rural areas. In Iowa, 90 of 99 counties lost population between 1980 and 1987. Less extreme declines were registered in North Dakota, South Dakota and Minnesota.

Here in Nelson County, the agricultural

economy long has relied upon the production of

wheat, barley, corn and sunflowers. But that task becomes more difficult each year as the already thin layer of topsoil blows away because of inadequate moisture, excessive heat and high wind.

"People are drawing back," says Brian M. Haugen, county director of the federal government's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. "Some of them are under pressure from lending institutions."

Many farmers are repairing old equipment instead of buying replacements. As a result, sales have slumped at the implement companies that long have been mainstays of rural economies — and the impact continues to ripple throughout the community.

In the county seat of Lakota, the Lofton Johnson Department Store has been abandoned, as have been the Lakota Shoe Store, Wheeler's Exxon Service and other retail establishments. But operating businesses still far outnumber abandoned storefronts in the three-block-square commercial district.

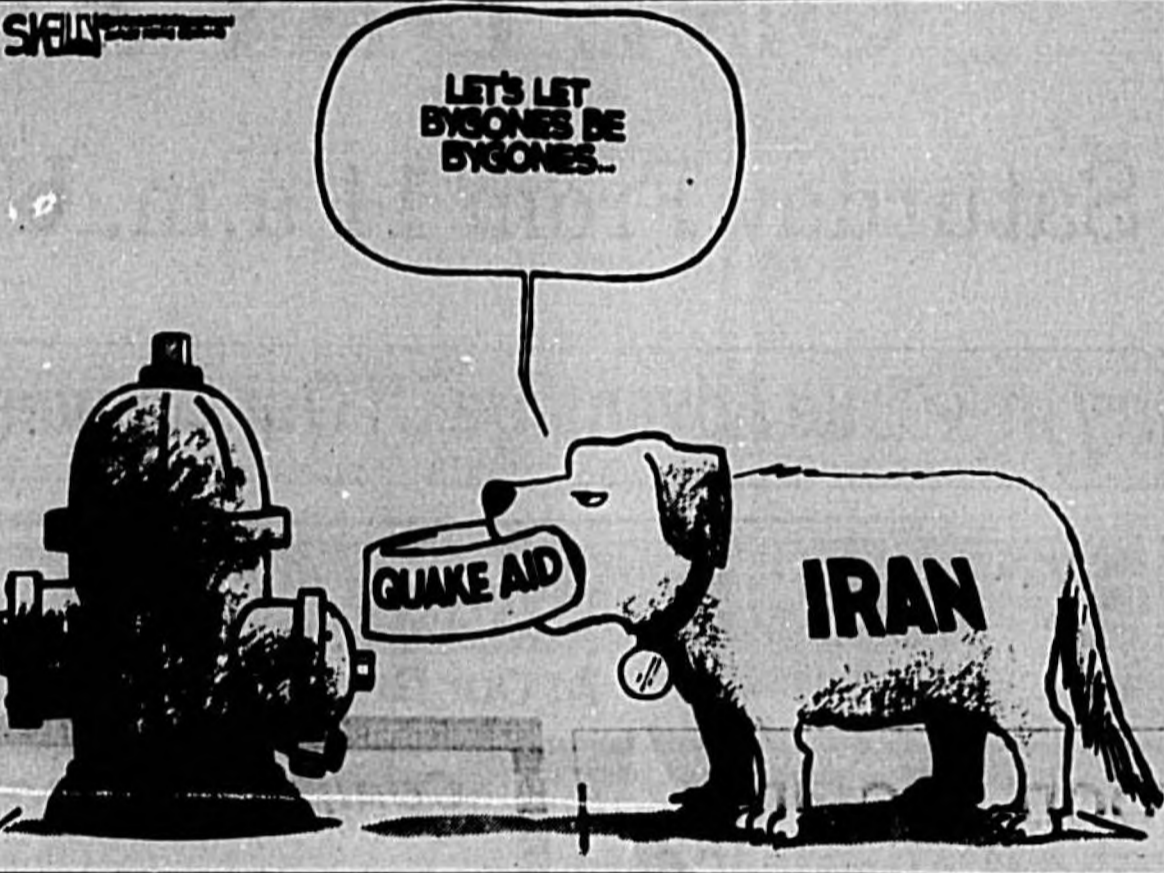
The situation is far bleaker in McVie, Whitman, Aneta and the county's other towns — all of which can now support little more than a general store.

In the censuses of 1910, 1920 and 1930, Nelson County's population appeared to have stabilized at slightly above 10,000 — but it has plunged in every subsequent count and today stands at less than 4,700.

That means the county has an average of fewer than five residents per square mile — and many of them are elderly people who must be supported, directly or indirectly, by younger men and women still able to work.

Specifically, Nelson County has 41 people aged 65 or older for every 100 residents aged 15 to 64. Only one of North Dakota's 52 other counties has a higher proportion of elderly people.

Per capita income averages almost \$12,000 nationally, just under \$9,650 in North Dakota — and less than \$8,100 in Nelson County. In all of 1987, there was not a single new housing start in the county. In 1988 there were two.

Scouts show youth still care

WASHINGTON — The older the nation gets, the more we seem perplexed by our young people.

As we mark the 214th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, the Times Mirror Center for the People and the Press has issued a report saying that today's 18- to 30-year olds know less, care less and vote less than any previous generation. The authors term this "the age of indifference," adding that, "The ultimate irony is that the Information Age has spawned such an uninformed and uninvolved population."

This is not the first time we have been given this message. Last November, People for the American Way released a study by pollster Peter D. Hart, focusing on 15- to 24-year-olds, that found they were "turned off by politics and tuning out on citizen participation." Asked to describe a good citizen, few of those Hart interviewed suggested any civic involvement; only 12 percent even mentioned voting as part of the definition. Their teachers, in a parallel poll, agreed by a 2-1 margin that today's high-school students have less interest in public affairs than their counterparts from the previous decade.

The consistency of these studies' findings clearly sends a warning signal about the failure of our older-generation Americans to impart to our children the importance many of us feel about the obligations and rewards of involvement in the community and nation.

But these studies don't capture all of the American reality either, as I was reminded this spring when I listened to the leaders of some of the major youth organizations, meeting under the auspices of the Council for the Advancement of Citizenship. Julian Dyke of the Boy Scouts of America, for example, said that membership in the Scouts has grown every year for the last ten years, reaching 4.3 million — one-third higher than it was in 1980.

So has emphasis on community service. Last year, he said, a "Scouting for Food" program, in which Scouts went door-to-door in their own communities, saw four million Scouts collect 72 million food items for distribution locally to homeless and needy people.

Others at the table contributed examples of volunteer youth programs based in schools, churches and other community organizations, that have enlisted thousands of teens and even younger children in projects tackling civic needs.

"When you give them an opportunity, they respond," said Charles Tampio, vice president of Close-Up Foundation, which runs excellent Washington seminars for high schoolers. "The key is for parents and teachers to realize that school is not preparation for citizenship, but rather that students are citizens."

The Freedom Foundation in Valley Forge

promotes a "Bill of Responsibilities" that is the active counterpart to the Bill of Rights. Their message, said its director of youth programs, D. Susan Wallace, is that "participatory citizenship is the price of freedom."

Kathleen F. Kirby of the Constitutional Rights Foundation said its programs in East Los Angeles have demonstrated that "the kids' volunteer activities are the best way to get the parents involved. The youngsters work on projects to help elderly people and newly arrived immigrants — and they feel so good about it their families often 'adopt' those folks."

But youth programs require adult leadership. Dyke, the Boy Scouts' director of public affairs, and Girl Scouts' president Betty F. Pillbury, said that despite the increasing number of families where both parents work they have no shortage of people willing to lead troops. Between them, the two organizations now have almost two million adult volunteers.

True, they have had to move with the times. The Boy Scouts put training materials for Scoutmasters on VCRs that can be watched at home and audio cassettes that can be played during car commutes. The Girl Scouts often divide troop leadership among four working women, with each taking responsibility for one meeting or Saturday outing a month.

And the programs also have moved with the times. Dyke sent me the 1990 edition of the Boy Scout Handbook. It is a far cry from the one I carried in my knapsack almost 50 years ago. Sure, there are still chapters on knot-tying and identifying trees by their leaves. But up front is a parents' guide to the serious problems of child abuse and drug abuse. And you can now win merit badges, not just for archery and woodwork, but for studies of American business, labor and diverse cultures, for citizenship in the community, the nation and the world, for consumer skills, environmental projects and handicap awareness.

In a pamphlet, "Relating Traditional Values to Immediate Community Needs" Ben H. Love, the chief Scout executive, wrote: "We must wholeheartedly accept our responsibility to protect the weak, the needy and the destitute."

Corterra: Is it a country or not?

WASHINGTON — Looking to invest in the next exotic resort in the South Pacific? How about an offshore banking haven and communications hub with no income tax? Corterra, a nation of 12 tiny islands scattered north of Tahiti, is supposed to be just the opportunity. Never heard of it? Neither had we.

But the country's purported representatives insist it is for real and are touting the tropical paradise to the affluent residents of Scottsdale, Ariz. Upstate Scottsdale is abuzz with talk of impending investment opportunities on the islands. What these people don't know is Corterra doesn't officially exist; no one recognizes it as far as we could tell after contacting officials from Fiji to Hong Kong to New Zealand and back. It's largely the product of one man's claim to 12 desolate islands.

Patrick Walters, an aerospace engineer in Utah who moonlights as Corterra's prime minister, says he's spent nearly a decade seeking official recognition, unsuccessfully. Walters nevertheless is already taking bids for development. His people are passing out Corterran business rules and have set fees for obtaining banking licenses, ranging from \$2,500 to \$10,000. Golf course developers and international investors have reportedly been consulted. Although Walters says that no money has changed hands yet, his appointed ambassador to the United States predicted, "We should begin development within two to three years."

To persuade us as to Corterra's legitimacy, Walters sent our associate Dean Boyd a certificate of recognition from a Norwegian group called the International Council of Independent States.

But when we contacted its director, Geir Sor-Reime, in Stavanger, Norway, he told us his group is intended primarily for fun. "Most of our members are imaginary countries," he said. "In fact, you could call us the International Council of Imaginary States." Members range from postage stamp buffs who make stamps of imaginary nations, to exile groups that claim disputed territories by making up their own countries. Sor-Reime says Corterra is one of the few members trying to portray itself seriously as a nation.

Walters' literature on the islands also claims it has been a sovereign state since 1974. Walters claims to trace his lineage — and rights — to an Anglo-Saxon sailor named Hagoth who explored the area in 53 B.C.

Not everyone, of course, accepts Walters' interpretation of history. U.S. officials and numerous Pacific island governments say that according to international law, five islands of Walters' nation belong to Kiribati, an independent country nearby. The foreign secretary of Kiribati, Peter Timestone, declared Walters "must be living in a dream world." In his literature on the country, Walters' only mention of Kiribati is the fine print on a map pointing out the five islands claimed by that country since 1979.

Walters tells us that some in Washington have been privately supportive of his efforts in the past. From 1980 to 1988, Washington let Walters register as a foreign agent here for Corterra's interests. The political activities listed in his registration papers include correspondence with a high-ranking State Department official. Walters said that his ties to this individual strengthened after Kiribati negotiated a one-year joint-fishing project with the Soviets in the 1980s.

State Department officials assure us that Washington is on good terms with Kiribati.

preventative measures — usually spraying for mosquitoes — can be taken.

"It's a way for us to see if the disease is present without sickening people out there," said John Cochrane, director of environmental health for Seminole County public health unit.

About 80 percent of a flock of ten laying hens must be infected before preventative action is taken. Cochrane said Seminole County chickens have not yet shown enough of the disease to warrant a scare, but no one wants to take the chance of another outbreak.

"The disease has been fairly active in the chicken population, but nothing to warrant drastic action," he said. "But it does bear watching."

The chickens are merely a host to the disease, Cochrane said, and they show no clinical symptoms of it. He also said they will not transmit the disease to man, through contact or eating food from an infected chicken.

Many counties in the state use the sentinel chicken method, especially in the Tampa Bay and Pinellas County area, since that's where the most outbreaks have occurred. In Seminole County, the hens are stationed

at fire departments in Geneva, Paola, and Midway, and a forestry station in Longwood. The personnel at the fire departments take care of the chickens, and in return, Cochrane says, they get to eat the eggs.

"They come up to the front window and watch us in the morning," said Tom Braceband of the Seminole County fire department, Station 34 at State Road 46 and Wayside Drive. "We enjoy having the eggs."

The chickens at that station appeared to be in good health. Braceband said they usually let the birds roam free outside the station during the day, and then keep them in elevated wire coops at night.

Cochrane said when the program began in 1977, it was state-funded. However, about three years ago the money ran out, so the county picked up the bill.

The chickens were formerly maintained by private organizations, Cochrane said, but this year Seminole County Public Safety Department volunteered to help. The program usually runs from May to November only — the time when mosquitoes are active.

After samples are taken by

Seminole County staff, they are sent to a laboratory in Tampa which researches mosquito-borne diseases. It is not known exactly where mosquitoes pick up the disease, although suspects include rodents, bats,

birds, reptiles, amphibians, or surviving mosquito eggs or adults.

Any type of fowl can pick up the disease, Cochrane said, but chickens are the easiest to work with.

however, was generally true across the nation. In the South, 67 percent of cities responding to the survey said they were less able to meet their financial needs this year than last. In the West, the figure was 66 percent and in the Midwest, 60 percent.

"What this means for hometown America is that, at a time when we should be investing in our future, we are not even keeping up," said Donald Borut, executive director of the NLC.

"The marginal areas of local budgeting have disappeared and while new responsibilities continue to arrive at City Hall, the bucks are stopping somewhere else," he said.

Borut said municipal leaders are making budget decisions that are "tough and sometimes painful and honest, though rarely what you would call

popular."

For example, on the revenue side, 76 percent of the surveyed cities said they were increasing fees and charges; 43 percent implemented new fees and charges; 41 percent increased local property tax rates; 15 percent increased other tax rates; 5 percent increased local sales tax rates and 2 percent boosted local income tax rates.

On the spending side, 51 percent reduced the growth rate of operating spending; 39 percent contracted out services to reduce spending; 37 percent reduced actual levels of capital spending; 23 percent made cuts in the city workforce; 22 percent froze municipal hiring and 11 percent reduced service levels.

Borut said the survey results should serve as "a warning signal about stresses on our local revenue systems."

about them."

But commissioner A.A. "Mac" McClanahan said the reductions, including the "dips" into the cash reserves are more acceptable than a tax increase.

"I've been dead-set against using those reserves all along," McClanahan said. "But this year, I went along with it with the the situation we have. With all the talk about tax increases on the county and the state and the federal government, it's got to start on the local level."

Last week, Faison proposed increasing the city's current tax rate of 6.87 mils to 7.87 mils to raise approximately \$618,000 needed to pay for such additional state-required expenses to increase pension contributions and for garbage recycling. To balance the \$22.1 million budget, Faison relied on \$82.719 from cash reserves to meet the demands of increasing expenses.

Commissioners rejected the increase, telling Faison to keep the current tax rate which costs homeowners \$6.87 per \$1,000. For example, an owner of a \$75,000 home with a \$25,000 homestead exemption pays taxes on \$50,000. For that amount, the Sanford tax bill if left at the current rate would be \$343.50. If increased another mil, the tax would be \$393.50, \$50 more.

Faced with a potential \$618,000 deficit, Faison recommended Monday eliminating 15 clerk-typists, including two part-time employees, to save \$308,868 of the potential deficit. He also recommended eliminating the 3 percent cost of living increase for employees, adding another \$270,228 to the needed savings, but commissioners rejected the pay hike, so Faison recommended drawing the same

amount from the \$3.5 million reserve fund.

Faison recommended reducing the potential deficit another \$28,422 by eliminating a proposed new three-man advanced life support (ALS) unit with an ALS coordinator and ALS equipment. The remaining \$10,683 can be removed from the potential deficit by employee vacancy freezes, Faison said.

Faison has recommended not replacing a total of 12 full- and part-time jobs when they become vacant. He said after the 15 employees fired Tuesday leave during the next 90 days, those would be the last firings he would recommend.

Faison said the firings of the 15 clerks would cause a slowdown in city paperwork.

"Sure, it will cause an administrative slowdown," Faison said. "People won't be immediately available to help the public or answer the telephone. The police department will see a slowdown in the amount of paperwork they have that can be done."

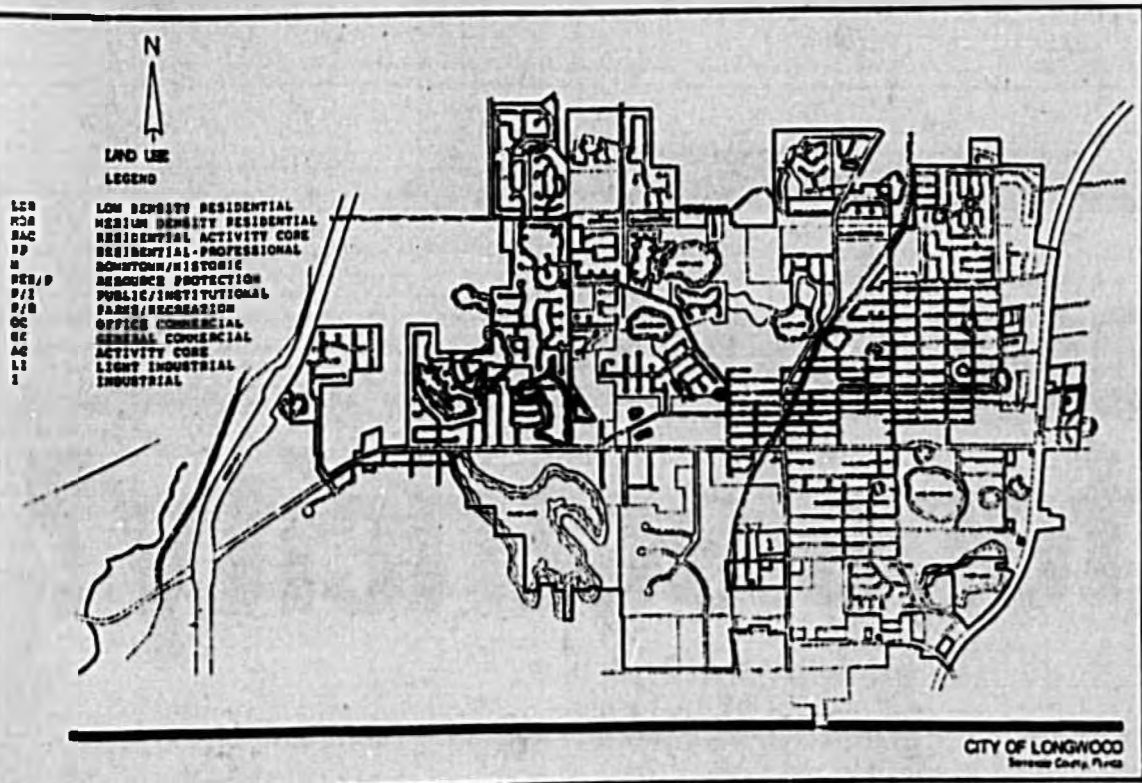

The hearing, open to the public, will be held September 25 in Denver, where Bush served as director of the failed Silverado Banking, Savings and Loan Association.

Supporters agree Snyder was effective

WASHINGTON — Supporters called homeless advocate Mitch Snyder a savior, while critics called him an incurable egomaniac. But all agreed that his tactics were extremely effective.

Snyder, 46, the Madison Avenue executive turned unpaid director of the Community for Creative Non-Violence, was found hanged Thursday at the homeless shelter he operated in the nation's capital in what police called an apparent suicide over a shattered love relationship.

Jobless rate slips to 5.2 percent in June

WASHINGTON — The nation's jobless rate slipped to 5.2 percent in June on a burst of hiring in the health industry and other service sectors of the economy, the Labor Department said today.

Private economists expected an increase to 5.4 percent in June following civilian jobless rates of 5.3 percent in May and 5.4 percent in April.

Counting military personnel, the June jobless rate stood at 5.1 percent.

Brady: No recession for U.S.

WASHINGTON — Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady, concerned the economy is performing below the Bush administration's expectations, believes the United States will steer clear of recession.

In a briefing Thursday for wire service reporters on next week's Houston economic summit of industrialized nations, Brady also repeated White House concerns about the adverse impact of high interest rates on growth.

"I don't necessarily agree high interest rates in the United States are a good thing," Brady said. "I think we are below the administration's growth goals and would like to get on the path again as soon as possible."

The Federal Reserve Board has maintained high interest rates as part of its drive to wipe out inflation over the next five years.

Nonetheless, "I don't see a recession," Brady said. "Although it's obvious we've got slower growth, I think of a recession as negative growth."

New limits on water pollutants

WASHINGTON — The Environmental Protection Agency proposed new limits Thursday on 24 pollutants in drinking water, a move expected to require additional decontamination efforts by 2,300 water systems serving 2 million people.

The 24 substances include nine possible or probable cancer-causing agents, ranging from industrial wastes such as dioxin, solvents such as methylene chloride, and pesticides such as alimazine, widely used on corn and soybeans.

Other health effects of the substances include damage to the heart, kidneys, liver, reproductive organs, brain and nervous system.

The new regulations, subject to review and

possible revision, would take effect in the fall of 1983, and would be in addition to restrictions already imposed on 34 other water pollutants.

EPA officials said most of the 24 contaminants are rarely found in drinking water at dangerous levels, although they acknowledged there is little monitoring data about some of them.

They also said ground water surveys have found some cases of pesticide residues higher than allowed by the proposed limits.

However, the pollutant with the widest health impact of the 24 is sulfate, a metal that can cause stomach upset and diarrhea and is most dangerous to infants, the officials said.

About 1,100 of affected systems will have to take action against sulfate.

Wildlife refuge contamination continuing

WASHINGTON — Federal wildlife managers have not developed a program to detect and clean up contaminants that are killing birds, fish and other animals in the nation's wildlife refuges, Interior Department investigators reported.

An audit by the department's office of inspector general cited several cases, most of them in California, where

the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service either overlooked potential contamination of its refuges or endlessly studied the situation.

The report, released this week, comes 10 months after the General Accounting Office concluded that mining, off-road vehicles, recreational boating and military flights are damaging 59 percent of wildlife refuges.

Adding to that list of woes, the inspector general's office finds that the response to

chemical contamination of refuges has been haphazard.

"The (Fish and Wildlife) Service has not taken the steps necessary to implement a viable contaminant detection and resolution program for all refuges," the report said.

The approach of the wildlife service, which manages 452 refuges, "has primarily been one of reacting to adverse situations rather than, attempting to achieve long-term solutions," the report said.

Jackson to seek 'shadow' Senate seat

WASHINGTON — Jesse Jackson announced he will seek one of two symbolic "shadow" seats in the U.S. Senate, newly created positions to champion statehood for the District of Columbia.

"Statehood for the District of Columbia is the most important civil rights and social justice issue in America today," Jackson said Thursday. "Today I have decided to announce my candidacy for the position of U.S. senator from the District of Columbia."

The City Council passed legislation in February creating two six-year terms for "shadow" senators and a two-year term for a "shadow" member of the House.

Del. Walter Fauntroy, D-D.C., the city's only representative to Congress, does not have voting rights. Fauntroy is running for mayor.

City voters agreed in 1979 to allow the Senate seats, but the council three times refused to place the issue on the ballot. The elected officials will receive no pay or city funding.

Six other city residents have announced candidacies for the second Senate seat and the House position.

"We deserve statehood because we pay federal taxes," Jackson said. "Residents of the District pay over \$1 billion annually in taxes to the federal treasury, more total federal taxes than eight states."

There are 630,000 residents of Washington, which has a larger population than Delaware, Wyoming, Vermont and Alaska.

Federal legislation to initiate statehood for the city was introduced in May by Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., and Fauntroy.

"President Bush has projected some misinformation about the District," said Jackson commenting on Bush's opposition to district statehood. "He is also split about applying the same principles of democracy everywhere. He advocates statehood for Puerto Rico. They do not pay taxes; we do."

Kennedy helps rescue couple near Hawaii

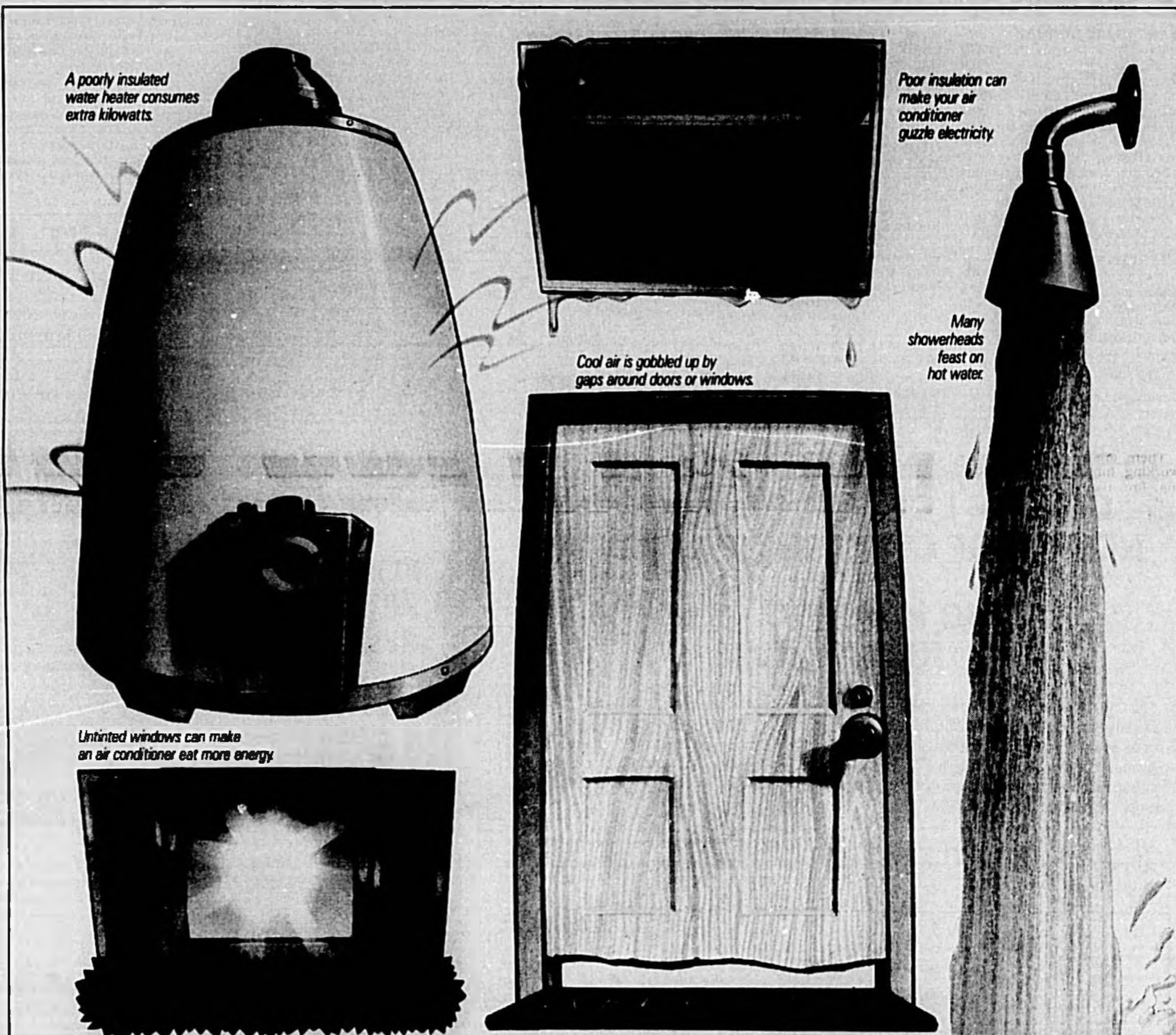

BOSTON — Rep. Joseph Kennedy II, D-Mass., plunged into shark-infested waters off the coast of Hawaii to help rescue two people whose fishing boat had capsized, published reports said Friday.

Kennedy and his twin 9-year-old sons were on vacation, fishing off the coast of Kona in Hawaii Sunday afternoon when they heard a distress call over their radio, the congressman and other witnesses said in telephone interviews with the Boston Herald and The Boston Globe.

Rep. Bart Gordon, D-Tenn., Houston Oilers lineman Colin Scotts and former Washington Redskins All-Pro lineman John Wilbur were also aboard Kennedy's chartered fishing vessel when the distress call came in.

A 17-foot Boston whaler, already weighted down by a catch of tuna and a marlin had flipped

forbidden the distribution and/or sale of any newspaper or newsprint product within the city limits of Lake Mary, unless the paper on which it is printed contained at least 50 percent recycled fiber, effective July 1, 1991. Fess said the ordinance followed a similar statute under consideration by the Florida Legislature which would make such requirements mandatory statewide.

The proposal was tabled after about 90 minutes of discussion.

Fess also included in the ordinance a prohibition on certain convenience stores and take-out restaurants forbidding food products to be taken from their establishments in any plastic type container or plastic coated paper that would not be degradable within 12 months.

Commissioner Tom Mahoney set the tone of the discussions by

questioning why the three-page proposed ordinance did not have any supportive materials. "This doesn't follow normal procedures," Mahoney said. "There's no staff input, and in one place it refers to a Florida statute, but we don't have a copy of that statute."

Commissioner Paul Tremel asked if the newspaper restriction would include every paper produced in the entire nation, as many are mailed in to Lake Mary residents. City Attorney Ned Julian responded that the ordinance "only affects what is sold in Lake Mary, not what comes in the mail."

During the public participation, Gary Heffer, representing the Lake Mary Sun newspaper, said, "The big papers can afford to convert to recyclable paper, the smaller ones usually can't afford the cost." He asked if this included newspaper inserts which are included in local

papers but are often printed elsewhere.

Scott Sherman, vice president of operations for the Orlando Sentinel, commented on the Florida statute, saying the statewide ban wouldn't go into effect until October 1992. He said for the Sentinel to comply with the statute or the ordinance, it would take three years from start up.

Three representatives of various plastic producers were also present. Vicki Kidd with Amoco Foam Products said,

"Our research shows that the so-called degradable materials are not degrading in our landfills as fast as people think." She also noted that there is a diminishing number of landfills and recycling plants in the state and the nation. Kidd concluded her remarks by giving each of the commissioners a yo-yo, made out of recycled plastic from McDonald's restaurants.

During the final discussion, Commissioner Mahoney said he didn't like the wording of the proposed ordinance.

"There are too many holes in it, especially some of the words that are used," Mahoney said. He called attention to the word "encouraged," saying, "If we enact an ordinance, we aren't trying to encourage anything, we are saying that's what must be done."

With a lack of support for the measure indicated from Commissioners Mahoney, Tremel and George Duryea, the matter was tabled until city's staff can come up with additional sup-

attended the meeting, said the commission could consider alternatives at its meeting Monday night.

"We'll have to see what everyone says and look into this to find out if some of the positions really didn't need to be cut," Eckstein said. "Maybe there are other areas of the budget where we can shave things off so we don't have to lose so many people."

Lee also questioned how those who were being let go were chosen.

"We produce so much paperwork every day," Lee said. "I have more skills than the others that are being kept and I have the performance records to prove it. How do they think they are going to get all that paperwork done?"

McCauley told the group that City Manager Frank Faison made the determination as a result of a request by the city commission to come up with a budget plan that would not include increasing the city ad valorem tax by one mill.

The commission Tuesday approved Faison's suggestion to dismiss all of the city's clerk typist personnel and some other positions in the city bureaucracy.

There are nine clerk typists working for finance, engineering, fire, recreation, police and parks departments. All of them were given 60-days notice, which will be followed by a final 30 day notice this September. The other positions cut included two part-time secretaries that work for the city manager, city clerk and personnel departments, two building inspectors that work for the building department and a budget analyst and an account clerk that work for the finance department.

Together there are 15 people classified in 14 positions, including two part-time positions. "I'd like to know where Frank Faison is today," Lee said. "Why isn't he here?"

McCauley said he assumed Faison had other work to do.

"So as of today, we are seeking unemployment; is that correct?" asked Pam Barkimer, a budget analyst for the finance department. "I've been looking for another job for some time. Now, they are going to provide me with the opportunity to find it."

"When the commission was going over the budget, did they know that an entire class of positions was going to be cut?" asked Lyle Willis, an inspector in the building department. "I'm optimistic," Willis said later. "I'm hoping to go to the commission meeting Monday night and get some straight talk from them. I'm personally hoping that they will consider another alternative."

Willis said he was afraid to comment further for fear of being fired immediately for insubordination.

Other employees, however, were more vocal.

"I am going to fight this all the way," Lee said. "I'll take this to the commission and if they want to see performance records to know how well we work, I'll show them."

McCauley said the individuals were chosen because the city manager deemed them least critical to the daily operation of the city.

Some of the employees didn't agree.

When one of the workers asked McCauley how much the department heads had to say about who was being cut and why, Police Chief Steve Harriett interrupted the discussion, fervently addressing the question.

"Let me interject," Harriett said, rising to his feet from a chair in the back of the room.

This department head found out when the city commission found out Tuesday afternoon. I had no say as to who was being cut."

wage a legal battle with Florida Power Corporation over the city's plan to bury power lines along Lake Mary Boulevard. He also recommended maintaining a \$100,000 contingency fund for any emergencies such as a hurricane.

In another revenue producing area, the budget proposal calls for no increases in permit fees or water and sewer rates, with the exception of establishing a reclaimed water charge and possibly establishing a stormwater utility.

One matter that may be draw considerable discussion is a list of seven Capital Projects, many of which relate to the widening

project of Lake Mary Boulevard. These include installation of a 20-inch water transmission line, installation of a sanitary sewer line, the Lake Mary/Seminole County wholesale water connection, two 1 million gallon storage tanks, raw water improvements, replacement of one utility service truck and the purchase of an electronic meter data collection device.

"These seven projects," Litton said, "add up to almost 1.8 million dollars of new money needed for 1991 for capital projects in the enterprise fund." He added, "While that figure may seem like a lot of money, it is not when you consider the magnitude of our capital requirements both now and in the

years to come. We all know those dollars do not represent cash in hand, but is based on a lot of good faith estimates coming true."

Litton said, "We must retain enough reserves to deal with unexpected occurrences or shortfalls, as the case may be." With this in mind, the budget proposal is based on the assumption that Lake Mary will borrow \$1 million at 7 percent over 20 years.

Litton's budget proposal, however, is only the beginning. From this point on, each individual area of the budget will be examined closely, with the first of a series of budgetary meetings slated to be held July 12 in the new city hall, 120 Lake Mary Boulevard.

Garrison upsets Graf, to meet Navratilova in title match

WIMBLEDON, England — Zina Garrison, frustrated in 33 previous Grand Slam tournaments, Thursday upset defending champion Steffi Graf in three sets to become the final obstacle between Martina Navratilova and a record ninth Wimbledon singles crown.

The fifth-seeded Garrison, playing with the composure and consistency which long had eluded her, advanced to the first major final of her 11-year career with a 6-3, 3-6, 6-4 victory.

Second seed Navratilova, 33, dispatched No. 4 Gabriela Sabatini 6-3, 6-4 to move within one match of the record she wants so much. The left-hander, who reached the final for the 11th time in 13 years, is tied with Helen Wills Moody with eight Wimbledon singles titles.

The odds will be heavily in Navratilova's favor Saturday. She has won 27 of 28 matches against Garrison, the only loss coming at the 1988 U.S. Open.

"Obviously my record's overwhelming but this (grass) is the surface where she is most likely to

do it again," said Navratilova, who has not won a Grand Slam title since the 1987 U.S. Open.

The 28-year-old Garrison always had struggled with her nerves and concentration but against Graf her play was impeccable.

"She didn't make any errors ... she was going for the right shots, doing the right things," said Graf, who blamed her own poor play for setting up Garrison's opportunities.

Garrison, who came into the match 1-5 against Graf, had not beaten her since 1985. But after the biggest victory of her career, she said "the strange thing is, I was very relaxed."

The Texan, who topped French Open champion Monica Seles in the quarterfinals, stuck resolutely to her strategy of playing the West German's backhand and rarely subjected herself to the powerful forehand. Garrison came to net at every opportunity and had the speed necessary to cut off passing shots and chase down the deep placements which have brought Graf nine major titles.

Not since the 1987 Australian Open has a Grand Slam final been played without Graf, a

string of 13 straight major tournaments.

Graf said her recent sinus problems were not a factor in her loss. She believes her departure opens the door for Navratilova.

"I think now it's pretty sure Martina's tournament. Zina doesn't have the game to beat Martina," said Graf.

Garrison, when told Graf's prediction, would only say, "You get to a final like this or grass and anything can happen."

Navratilova downed Sabatini for the 13th time in 16 career meetings. The Czechoslovakian native executed her serve-and-volley game to perfection. The Argentine occasionally made brilliant shots but never showed sufficient consistency to pose a challenge.

"She's tough, she's very tough, but she's beatable," Sabatini said of Navratilova's prospects.

Saturday will mark Navratilova's ninth consecutive appearance in Wimbledon's singles final and she said the two-day wait would be difficult.

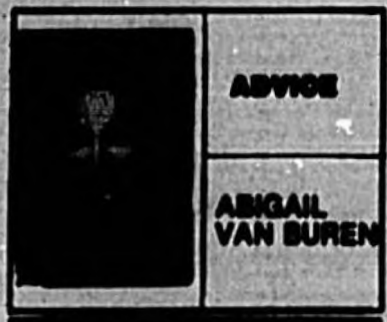

Pray for our brothers bound by misfortune

The word of God has much to say in reference to us being a follower of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Jesus tells us what is required of us who seek His service.

Jesus says, count the cost. My question is, as Christians, have we really counted the cost.

The kingdom of God requires a serious decision. This decision is not a mere matter of enthusiasm; but rather a matter for sober consideration.

In Luke's Gospel, Chapter 9, Jesus had just finished His message at Galilee and had arrived at Judah beyond the Jordan where great crowds had followed him. As they were walking down the road, a man met him and said, Lord Jesus, I will follow you wherever you go. This man spoke with so much

confidence, but did not realize the sorrow and death the Lord would suffer. Nevertheless, Jesus explained to him and made him aware of his present circumstances so this man could know with open eyes whether he really wanted to serve him or not. If this man was following him for earthly gain, Jesus was saying, you are going to be sadly disappointed. A shallow commitment is easily made, but behind it is often a selfish motive.

Our motive should never be for selfish gain, but rather for the building of our community, and the needs of other people.

John F. Kennedy, our former president, made a powerful statement years ago. "Ask not what the country can do for you, but what you can do for your country". Well, I say to you, ask not what your city can do for you, but what you can do for your city.

The time for playing church is over. It is time to mean business with God, and make a difference in our city. You may say, what can I do. Pastor? You can stand up and be counted and say I will make a difference. You ask, Pastor, where do I start? Start by praying and asking God for direction.

I'm reminded of Jesus as He looked over the multitude and

was moved in his heart with compassion, the people were like sheep without a shepherd; they had no direction.

As my wife and I travel 5th Street, 13th Street and the various streets in Sanford, we see the prostitutes, the drug addicts, the alcoholics and are moved with compassion, because they are like sheep without a shepherd; they have no direction. You ask, what can I do? You can pray and have compassion for those bound by drugs and homosexuality.

There is only one time in the word of God, that it is recorded that Jesus, himself made a prayer request. He said the harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Pray ye therefore, that the Lord of the harvest might send laborers into the harvest field.

My prayer request also, is that God will send laborers into the harvest field, that we might see the revival that God desires to do in Sanford.

Doctor suffering from burnout needs help

DEAR DR. GOTT: My doctor is burned out, mean and impatient. I would like to change to another physician, yet when I call others they insist on a complete physical for new patients. Can a doctor insist on this?

DEAR READER: You've raised two important issues.

The first is medical burnout. This is a more extreme manifestation of a feeling we all have once in a while: tired of the same old problems, demands and routines. You know what I mean? The I-had-a-lousy-week-and-can't-wait-for-Saturday syndrome. Being periodically fed up with your boss or your job — or even your marriage — is normal. With burnout, however, the feelings of anger and despair are so pervasive that the person has great difficulty merely functioning. Unfortunately, burnout is common in the healing profession because we work long hours with additional heavy demands on us.

When a doctor no longer tries to be kind, caring and considerate — and turns into a dragon instead — burnout may have set in. The physician may need a rest, a vacation or some counseling. Doctors who are surly, mean and impatient may have other problems, too, such as alcoholism, drug abuse or emotional illness. In other words, the healer needs healing.

As a patient, you may be able to help your doctor. Mention to him — or perhaps, to his nurse — that you have seen a change in his personality and just wanted him to know. You don't have to go into detail or get too involved. If other patients provide the same perceptions, the doctor may be motivated to seek assistance.

The next step is to write a letter to the county medical society. You don't have to go any further than saying you've noted a change in your doctor's approach to you, and you would like to let someone in authority know about this. In case there is a problem. Let the medical

society take it from there. The second issue you raise is the practice of demanding complete exams on all new patients. I know this is routine in certain sections of the country, particularly in the Sunbelt. Although a part of me says that a doctor can give more competent care after becoming familiar with a pa-



atient, another part of me says this is simply another medical ploy to make money.

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WIN AT BRIDGE

Willy Nilly had been reading about ducking to break up the opponents' communications. Unfortunately he had not been reading Bill Root's "How to Play a Bridge Hand." He was happy to accept the invitation to game with a 17-point no-trump opener and a good five-card suit. When West led the two of spades, Willy ducked in dummy. East won the king and promptly shifted to the king of hearts. Willy refused this trick also. East continued with the jack of hearts, and declarer again played low. Now East wisely changed direction, playing the 10 of spades. Willy won dummy's ace of spades and took

the diamond finesse. West won the king and took two more spade tricks. Willy's error was failing to realize the danger of a heart shift if East was allowed to win the first trick. If the two of spades had been led from a four-card suit, declarer was safe in taking the ace of spades immediately and finessing in diamonds. If the spade two were some kind of tricky lead from a five-card suit, declarer would not be in a stronger position by allowing the opponents to win the first spade. The rule is simple: Do not avoid winning the first trick in the led suit when you can be hurt by a switch to another suit.

Bush seeks NATO changes

LONDON — Through substance, style and semantics, President Bush sought formal support Friday for his vision for a kinder, gentler NATO that would force Cold War hostilities in a gesture of peaceful intent toward what remains of the Soviet empire.

Forced to act by the events transforming Europe, Bush placed a proposed redefinition of NATO's military posture and political role before leaders of the 16-nation alliance for their expected assent at the close of a pivotal two-day summit.

Fewer tactical nuclear weapons, accelerated troop reductions and closer political interaction with what remains of the Warsaw Pact were keystones of the blueprint Bush circulated in advance of the first summit-level talks on the future of the 41-year-old alliance.

Before winding up a 32-hour visit to London and jetting off to Texas, where he hosts some of the same allied leaders at the seven-nation Economic Summit of top industrialized democracies, Bush planned a breakfast meeting with British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher.

In fact, Thatcher was among those looking for concessions from other NATO leaders as the U.S.-proposed summit-ending communique was negotiated into the night Thursday by Secretary of State James Baker and other foreign ministers.

Within NATO, differences in priority and approach have only complicated the task of forging a new allied consensus on its future, driven on the American side by a compelling need to establish a firm anchor for continued U.S. involvement and leadership as the superpowers see their influence — measured heretofore by

military presence — in a more unified Europe.

"It's not business as usual at this meeting," White House press secretary Martin Platzer said Thursday. "We are at an historic turning point in the terms of the future of the alliance. The debate is real. The discussion is real."

The overall strategic objective of the NATO meeting was to offer the Soviet Union at least rhetorical proof that it has nothing to fear from the West or, even more to the point, from a united Germany embedded in NATO.

To that end, Bush tried to make the most of facing up to the political and military realities of the new Europe in what Platzer characterized as a mission of "reaching out to old adversaries."

"We will show that NATO has a new dimension of cooperation with the Soviet Union and with the new democracies of Eastern Europe," Bush told his NATO counterparts.

To that end, Bush suggested that Gorbachev be invited to address a future NATO summit and that NATO establish some form of observer status or other liaison with the Warsaw Pact.
