### Florida Power Corporation Expansion Plans Clarified

DELAND — A major expansion of Florida Power Corp. facilities in the Deland area is "in the making," and a 60,000 kilowatt generating unit is on order which will practically triple the capacity of the Enterprise power plant, John Gravelle, manager for Deland area, confirmed Saturday.

However, reports from the Sanford area that the expansion program will amount to, or exceed \$1,000,000, with the immediate 60,000 kilowatt increase rated at more than \$1,000,000 are a bit "premature," Gravelle said, because engineering on the project has not been completed, and costs cannot be figured until that is done.

Preparatory work on the expansion of the Enterprise plant is under way at present, he said, and it is expected the new generating units will be installed late in 1953 or early 1954.

The present rated capacity of the Enterprise plant is 37,500 kilowatts, but if overloaded in time of emergency can produce up to 50,000 kilowatts.

The addition of the 60,000 watt-unit will bring the total rated capacity up to 97,500 kilowatts, with a possible development of up to 100,000 kilowatts.

The net results of the expansion to Deland will be the installation of new power lines, new substations, and electrical potential to care for any probable industrial and residential development.

Central Florida is growing rapidly, Gravelle said yesterday, and the Florida Power Corp. has been eyeing future needs for the past two or three years seeking to determine the probable expansion of industry and of residential consumers.

"We hope, through the expansion program, to be able to serve satisfactorily the many new residential consumers of electricity for years to come, and to have sufficient power to service all of the industries expected to find their way into Central Florida in the near future," he said.

The House granted about 305 millions for operations and 28 millions for capital outlay.

The first session was exploratory only, with no serious effort to bring items on which the House and Senate differed into line.

"We were concerned with looking for those items in which the greatest difference exists," Sen. Dayton, chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, said. "Our first meeting found us agreed only on those items on which we already were in agreement."

The conference met in a spirit of co-operation, however, and no serious difficulties in reaching a solution agreeable to both Houses is expected, Dayton said.

The conference committee, made up of Sen. Dayton, Collins and Fraser, and Reps. Moody, House appropriations chairman; Fawcett and McFarland, will meet again at 4 p.m. Tuesday.

### 'Voice' Head Says U S Ranks Third In Airwaves Battle

NEW YORK — The head of the Voice of America testified today that the United States ranks third among nations in the international battle of the airwaves—for behind Communist Russia.

Robert J. Francis, acting director of the "Voice," said that Russia is "spending more money in an effort to keep the signal (of the Voice) out than we do to put it in."

He told a Senate subcommittee that both Russia and Great Britain lead the United States in the hour-volume of international broadcasts, and that the U. S. soon will rank fourth—behind France, too.

The subcommittee, headed by Sen. Bourke B. Hickenlooper, (R-Ia.), opened its new hearings in the "Voice's" office in Manhattan

beneath the glare of television lights.

Hickenlooper announced at the outset that an objective was to permit "Voice" officials to "answer criticisms" and to make suggestions for remedying faults in the "Voice's" operations.

In previous sessions, he said, "the Voice has been criticized for technical inadequacies, incompetency of personnel, weaknesses of policy and poor programming and presentation."

He said the subcommittee will do all it can to make the "Voice" an "authentic, dignified and useful voice that speaks throughout the world for the United States, the ideals of freedom and human dignity for which we strive."

Gruenther, 51, remained at Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers in Europe to succeed Ridgway as SHAPE's chief of staff.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower today nominated Adm. Arthur W. Radford to be chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, succeeding Gen. Omar B. Bradley. He also nominated Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway to succeed Gen. J. Lawton Collins as Army chief of staff.

## Mrs. Linde Tells Lions Club About Purposes Of USO

Mrs. Selwyn Linde, regional director of the United States Servicemen's Organization, briefly explained the inter-workings, functions, and purpose of the USO before the Lions Club at the Yacht Club today.

She began by citing Sanford as being an "unselfish town" and praised the contribution of this City in providing money and facilities for naval personnel stationed at the Sanford Naval Auxiliary Air Station.

"USO is not a government agency," she declared. "It is a volunteer organization, not from the government, but from individual community fund drives, public donations, and other charity organizations."

"The great bulk of the operating capital is raised in large cities such as New York, Chicago and from generous contributions from large corporations. This money is in turn relayed to regional offices where there are a large number of military bases such as here in Florida."

"The USO operated during World War II as an emergency measure with a working budget of \$25,000,000 in 1943 alone. Today, it has a budget of \$10,000,000 and since the Korean conflict has been placed on a permanent basis, is directly responsible to the President of the United States, Mrs. Linde said.

"There were over 300 USO's scattered all over the world last year to serve our boys in uniform, she stated.

"The USO and its seven agencies are now sponsoring a 'United Defense Fund' drive to raise money with which to operate USO centers, like your own, all over the nation and in the far flung regions throughout the world," she said.

"Since Sanford has no community chest, it must conduct a separate drive like so many other communities that do not have a community chest. The purpose of this drive is to help our boys in uniform, she stated.

## Attlee Charges Some In U.S. Are Against Accord

LONDON (AP)—Clement Attlee, opposition leader in the House of Commons, charged today that there are elements in the United States that do not want a settlement in Korea.

These elements, Attlee said, want an all out war with Communist China and against communism in general. He also charged that the United States is not a government agency.

"The former prime minister, leader in the Labor party, spoke in a Commons debate devoted to the Prime Minister Churchill's appeal yesterday for a conference of world leaders aimed at peace. The Churchill appeal was supported today, in effect, by Pope Pius XII, who called for frank discussions among world leaders as 'the first and indispensable condition of peace.'"

Attlee called for the seating of Communist China on the United Nations Security Council, an action the United States has refused to take. He also charged that the United States is not a government agency.

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## Steady Prices On Citrus Promised By USDA Survey

LAKELAND (AP)—Continuing steady prices are assured Florida growers in view of the May crop estimate of U. S. Department of Agriculture, Florida Citrus Mutual says.

In a monthly estimate, the USDA reported Florida's crop of Valencia (late season) oranges at 32,500,000 boxes.

The estimate surprised many citrus men who thought it would be a million to a million and a half boxes lower. That was because many groves have not been planted since 1945 and would have boosted prices.

Even though the estimate stayed the same, Mutual told growers they should not worry about prices. "We see no reason for growers to be at all apprehensive about profitably disposing of their crop where it is abundant, but it is a high rate of pay running over \$2 an hour."

The USDA estimate of other Florida citrus raised early and mid season oranges remained at 41,300,000; lemons, seedless grapefruit one million boxes to 17 million; and left seeded grapefruit unchanged at 18 1/2 million boxes. All of these varieties have been almost completely cleaned up for this season.

About 13,700,000 million boxes of Valencia oranges remained as of May 9, the growers administrative committee reported.

WACO, Tex. (AP)—Martial law was declared here today as the death toll from three Texas tornadoes reached 64. The S. Weather Bureau warned more tornadoes may occur in a wide Texas area today or tonight.

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—House Bill No. 112 was introduced by Rep. Mack Cleveland of Seminole County yesterday relating to salt water fish, declaring snook to be game fish, prohibiting certain commercial dealing in snook; setting a size limit; setting a possession limit; prohibiting commercial transportation of more than the possession limit, permitting the taking for scientific purposes under certain conditions; and providing for a study referred to the Salt Water Fisheries Committee.

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—The Senate today defeated, 21-6, a bill which would have raised the salaries of the governor to \$20,000 a year and given cabinet officers and Supreme Court justices \$15,000. The governor is paid \$12,000; cabinet officers \$10,000 and Supreme Court justices \$12,500.

The Senate rejected the bill after adopting a series of amendments which fore the heart out of the Appropriations Committee recommendations and a grand clause to virtually give any citizen authority of the state.
