

In a House of Commons speech on foreign policy, Churchill said the high lovel conference should not be hampered by any long agends, and should be carried out in an atmosphere of informality and privacy and even seclusion.

Churchill was not specific but Churchili was not specific, but supposedly meant he should get together with Pusident Eismhower and Premier Malenkov. He referred to a "conference at the highest level of the leading

The prime minister reviewed what he called the "change in at titude and, we all hoped mood, that has taken place in Soviet Rus ala and the Kremlin itself since the death of Stalin.

He appealed for caution in "doing or saying" anything that might give the Soviet leaders ground for suspicion. He said "it would be a mistake to assume that nothing mistako to assume that nothing could be settled unless or until everything is settled."

Five bids had been submitted for drilling of test wells, but upon the motion of Commissioner John Ivry seconded by Commissioner J. Denver Cordell, the Commission, at least temporarily, rejected all bids.
