**STATE ATTORNEY  
SAYS WRESTLERS  
VIOLATING LAWS**

**Louisiana Prosecutor Thinks  
Strangler Lewis And Joe  
Stecher In-Claiming Title  
Have Violated Postal Laws**

SHREVEPORT, La., Oct. 13.—(S)—That Ed "Strangler" Lewis, claimant of the world's heavy-weight championship wrestling title, and Joe Stecher, claimant of the same honors are not violating the postal laws in that both are advertising themselves as champions in newspapers is the opinion of United States Attorney Philip Mecum, of the Western Louisiana district.

Mecum recently announced that he would investigate the records of both wrestlers and see if either had the right to call himself the world's champion, and if either would be violating the postal laws advertising a world's championship.

The decision has been accepted with glee by local admirers of Lewis as Mr. Mecum in his decision rendered declared that "in my opinion Lewis is more generally recognized as having the best title."

Mecum explained that either Lewis or Stecher may advertise themselves as champions and merchandise what is termed "puffing," when a person advertises his career "the best in the world" he is merely "puffing" as far as the postal law is concerned and cannot be prosecuted for using the mail to fraud or making mis-statements, but to the fact that there is no way to prove the car is not the best, Mecum said.

Mr. Mecum's statement follows: "From a cursory examination of the information obtained, I am convinced that the advertisements do not constitute a fraudulent use of the mails. While the title is disputed in some jurisdictions, in my opinion Lewis is more generally recognized as having the best title. Some of the State Athletic Commissions do not recognize any individual as holder of the title and others have never taken jurisdiction over wrestling matches. I do not think it necessary for me to further investigate the complaint. The courts might construe such advertisements as 'puffing' but not fraudulent."

**Carol Not To Interfere In  
Rumanian Affairs Except  
To Protect Son's Heritage**

PARIS, Oct. 13.—"The only thing which would cause me to interfere in Rumanian affairs would be to protect the heritage of my son, Michael—a thing that any father would do."

This statement was made to International News Service today by former crown prince Carol, of Rumania.

Carol denied reports reaching Berlin from Bucharest, that he is seeking to gain the Rumanian throne at the expense of his six-year-old son, King Michael.

The ex-crown prince spoke freely of his plans, saying he would never make any move which would disturb the peace of his native land. He said he intends to bring suit against several Rumanian newspapers because they printed improper translations of articles written by Magda Helene Lupescu, the titan-haired beauty with whom Carol has formed an alliance.

Carol said he believed his announced intention to sue the newspapers had given rise to the story that he had filed suit to try to break the will of his father, the late King Ferdinand. (A recent cablegram from Bucharest reported that Carol had filed suit in the supreme court to contest his father's will and that owing to his being in France a trustee had been appointed to safeguard his interests.

The former crown prince is greatly agitated over the manner in which the Lupescu articles were translated, declaring that the papers involved had printed libelous matter.

"I am informed that some of these stories nearly caused a revolution in my country," continued Carol. "Therefore it is my duty to show these newspapers in the courts. It is the only way to correct the error and to prevent further harm."

Carol said he was quite satisfied with his father's will, even speaking of the codicil which was added as the last words of Ferdinand spoken on his death bed.

"This codicil," added Carol, "said it was the best that I should never return to Rumania or ever do anything to disturb the peace of my country. Naturally I would never do anything like that."

"I am only too willing to keep away from Rumania if it is best for my country."

Hints of a possible estrangement between Carol and his mother, Queen Marie, brought a strong protest from the Prince.

"My mother communicates with me regularly," said Carol. "In fact, we are closer since my father's death than ever before."

**Average American  
9 Times Richer Than  
Average German**

BERLIN, Oct. 13.—The average American is nine times richer than the average German, according to figures just published by the Federal Statistical Bureau here which reckon the per capita wealth in Germany at 1373 marks. This sum equalling about \$310.00, compares with \$2,918 which the U. S. Census wealth per capita of Americans.

Wiesbaden, most fashionable of Germany's health resorts, proves to be also the wealthiest city in the country. The Statistical Bureau calculates that the per capita wealth in Wiesbaden is 3,768 marks whereas Berlin, a poor second, shows but 1,581 marks per head of population.

Nevertheless, Berlin has the greatest number of millionaires, boasting 225 persons who pay taxes on fortunes of more than 1,000,000 marks. In the whole of Germany the first eight cities have a total of 744 millionaires. Next to Berlin comes Hamburg with 165,

**FORD WILL BEGIN  
TO TURN OUT NEW  
CAR IN FEW DAYS**

**Manufacturing Plants Have  
Been Busy For Past Weeks  
Making Major Parts; 125  
Thousand Orders Received**

DETROIT, Oct. 13.—(INS)—The Ford Motor Company will begin to turn out its new model car within a few days, it was announced today.

The manufacturing plants have been at work for several weeks turning out major parts of the new car and a few days more will see the famous assembly line in operation to produce the first of the new type cars, the announcement says.

At the same time the sales department of the company said that 125,000 "advance orders with deposits" for the new car, not yet in production, has been placed with authorized Ford dealers in the United States.

Approximately a quarter of a million additional persons have placed their orders, but have not made cash payments in advance, it was said.

Preparations for production on a full capacity basis are proceeding rapidly, Ford officials say.

The manufacture of the new engine blocks, axles, wheels, pistons, crankshafts and other major parts is now under way and the first assembly of new bodies was begun some days ago.

A longer time must elapse before the car can be put on sale, however, it is believed, as dealers throughout the country must be supplied with new models and

**American Tourists  
Blamed For Slump  
In German Drinking**

BERLIN, Oct. 13.—Despite the fact that American tourists are the most assiduous visitors of beer halls when they reach Germany, America is responsible for a considerable diminution in the consumption of beer by the Germans themselves.

Professional observers in the Federal Statistical Bureau certify that the American example of abstinence from alcohol, and the American example in sports are determinative factors in the decrease in German beer drinking. This decrease is considerable.

The capacity of the Ford plants for both manufacture and assembly have been greatly increased since production of the new model was suspended early in the summer to make way for the new car. The assembly line, formerly at the Highland Park plant, has been removed to the Fordson plant on the river Rouge, where its capacity has just about been doubled. The Highland Park plant, in turn has been converted to the manufacture of certain body and other parts exclusively.

Production executives of the Ford organization expect that more men will be required in the new production that were employed in the old operation, but the amount of manual labor per car will be considerably less in the production schedule for the new car.

**Grand Jury Summons  
Alabama Klan Head**

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Oct. 13.—(INS)—James Esdale, reputed Grand Dragon of the Ku Klux Klan in Alabama, is expected to return to Birmingham today to answer a summons from the grand jury at Inverne, Ala., where he is slated to testify in the investigation into numerous floggings in that part of the state.

Esdale left Birmingham to attend a national meeting of his organization in Chicago, it was reported, and inquiry today revealed that he would "abscond" from Birmingham where officers wait to serve the subpoenas in the Crenshaw county cases.

Beer flows here now in but three-quarters the pre-war quantity, and the beer drinker in this country today gets away with only one pint a day 335 days a year. Before the war the beer consumption divided among the entire population gave every German man, woman and child a yearly drink of 102.1 liters. But children, amateurs and teetotalers reduced the average so that by real beer drinkers was reckoned at 280 liters per head. In 1927 the statistical amount per poll of population is 76.2 liters per year, and the actual amount drunk is reckoned at 139 liters per drinker.

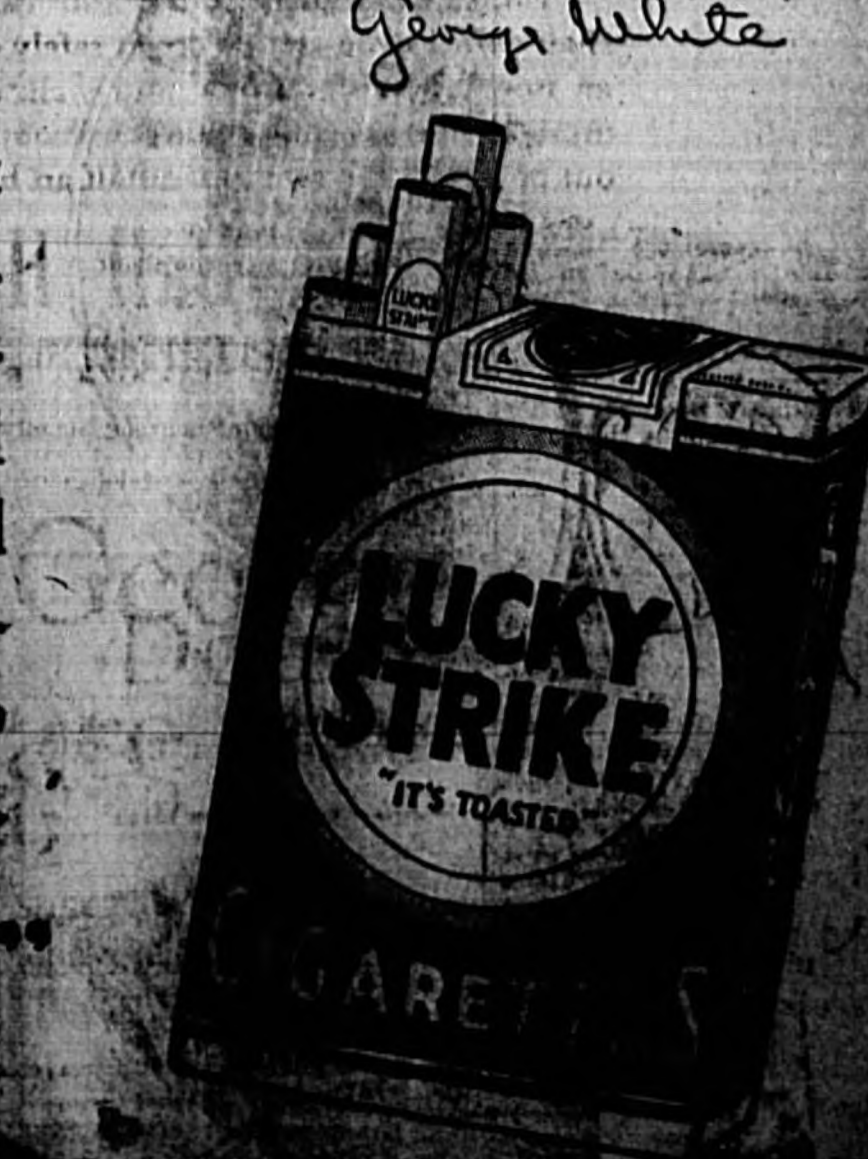

Equally as crafty and unscrupulous as Tweed was old Dick Croker. Once before an investigating committee, Croker with cynical bravado said, "I am working for my pockets all the time."

It must have been an extremely interesting and fascinating game—this running a city to suit yourself, making everyone bow to your wishes or get out, and doing whatever you pleased with the people's money.

George Remus' notorious bootlegger who served several years in Atlanta federal penitentiary for his conspiracies to violate the Volstead Law, is in the toils of the law once more.

The shooting of Mrs. Remus came on the eve of her divorce suit against her husband. Remus is charged with dragging his wife from her automobile and then shooting her.

"Remus who has perhaps been the country's most notorious bootlegger, was a successful lawyer, and the future looked bright for a brilliant career."

The plight of Remus and the effect of his deed upon society is interestingly depicted by the Journal which continues as follows: "This is the setting. It presents some sidelights on American criminology and a basis for a sociological study."

"Remus in his unreal success, by which he amassed an ill-gotten fortune, enticed others to the field of outlawed enterprise. He set an unworthy example. He went to prison but kept his gains, and, thereby he caused many others to think that they would be willing to spend a few years in prison with luxuries if they could keep a million dollars in spite of it."

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As Brisbane Sees It

Columbus Would Laugh. A Story Of G. M. Ford Nearly Ready. Wind, Tide, Waves. Copyright 1927 by Star Co.

FOUR HUNDRED AND thirty-five years ago today in 1492, Columbus sailed the ocean blue and discovered America.

IT WOULD AMUSE Columbus if he could learn that this country's immigration laws now keep out his Italian fellow countrymen that have done so much to build up the United States, since he discovered this western land.

WINTERWEATHER PROMISED OTHER SECTIONS OF U. S.

Propbet Fails To Predict Any Snow Or Ice For This State; Severe Season Faces Most Of State, Asserts Expert

WASHINGTON, Pa., Oct. 12--(INS)—An old-fashioned winter with plenty of snow, rain sleet and ice, is the prediction for the next few months of Paul K. Schimmaek, self-styled weather shark and astrologer.

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—If the American football eleven is more national in its scope and appeal than even the Annapolis or West Point elevens, that team is Notre Dame, coached by the ever-vigilant and ever-robust Knute Rockne.

The game has an eleven been known so universally from coast to coast and from the gulf to the Canadian border as the great machine that rolls out annually from South Bend, Indiana, to travel thousands of miles in the course of the season and finish at or very near the top of the football heap every season.

Perhaps the Carolo Indians of the fabled past with Jim Thorpe, Waukesha, Mount Pleasant and other famous warriors of Glen Warner's redskins had the appeal, in some measure, but never once did the Indians even approach the greatness with Notre Dame then, too, the Indians had their good seasons and their bad seasons.

Small reason to wonder, therefore why Notre Dame is the greatest "big money" eleven the game has ever known or is perhaps likely to know for years to come.

A combination of Rockne and an apparently flexible curriculum which leaves plenty of opportunity for travel during term time have served to make Notre Dame the most travelled college eleven that ever tossed a pigskin.

Even this fall, which apparently is an off year for the South Bend team in so far as travelling is concerned, they already have played or will at Detroit, Baltimore, Bloomington, New York, Des Moines and Chicago, calling for more than 6,000 miles of journeying to and from their battles.

Interesting Document In Ohio Court House Shows Mormon Leader Went To Chardon For Permit To Wed 1st Mate

CHARDON, O., Oct. 13, (INS)—Brigham Young's first marriage license in Geauga County and is on file in the office of Probate Judge Charles S. Lehnart.

In the beginning of the last century the Mormons flourished in Scotland, near Chardon, where a home erected by them is standing today in an excellent state of preservation.

Brigham Young journeyed to Chardon and obtained his license to take his first plunge into matrimonial seas. The license reads accurately, with strict attention to pronunciation and capitalization, as follows:

"The State of Ohio, Geauga County, ss. Personally appeared Brigham Young and made application for a marriage license for himself and Mary Ann Angel of township of Kirtland in said county, and made solemn oath that he and said Mary Ann Angel is of the age of twenty-one years, and the said Mary Ann Angel is of the age of sixteen years; that they are both first cousins, that he knows of no legal impediment against their being joined in marriage."

Witnessed by the Honorable W. W. Wright, Judge by me an clerk of said court with the seal thereon on this 13th day of October, 1927.

W. B. DOUGLASS, Clerk of Circuit Court of Geauga County, Ohio.

Brigham Young or his attorney and subscribed this 13th day of February, 1851, before me, Ralph Gowler, Dep. Clerk.
