Police arrest suspected jewelry thieves

SANFORD - A man who was reportedly cooperating with investigators in the arrest of a robbery suspect has been charged in the case after being iden fied by the victim during a chance meeting at the Sentmole County Sheriff's Department.

The victim, Vincent Pompo, at about 8 p.m. Saturday refused to shake hands with Gary Alan Stoves, 22, when the two met after sheriff's deputies arrested Thomas Scott Miller, 22, in connection with the robbery of Pompo's Lake Mary jewelry shop

"I can't shake your hand, robbed me," Pompo said to on State Road 434

Stoves, according to a sheriff's report. The two had met at the sheriff's department, where Pompo was called to identify Altamonte Springs motel where Stoves and a woman were picked up before Millers arrest at 4:33 p.m. Saturday.

An anonymous telephone tip had led investigator Ralph Salerno to a room at the Day's Inn. 450 Douglas Road, where charges of armed robbery and he met Stoves and Lisa Lee



Customs service rules are upheld

For more than 50 years, the U.S. Customs Service has sensibly allowed retailers to buy such trademarked foreign-made goods as cameras, perfumes, watches, and wines from independent dealers overseas and sell them in this country at prices that are often lower than those set by the manufacturer's authorized dealers. By avoiding the middleman and catering to bargain-hunting consumers, discount retailers have built up a gray-market" economy that generates about \$6 billion in retail sales annually in this

Understandably, foreign manufacturers and their American subsidiaries have tried to fight this competition with lawyers as well as salesmen. In a lawsuit filed in 1984 by Cartier. Inc. against K mart Corp., the trademark holders argued that the Customs Service regulations were unfair to them, gave the discount importers a free ride, and did not provide consumers with proper warranty protection. Moreover, they maintained that gray market unporters are not immune from (1930 protectionist law that prohibits such importing practices for merchandise which bears a trademark owned by a cittzen of, or by a corportion or association created or organized within the United States.

That argument brought a 4-4 split among Supreme Court justices in 1986. But newly appointed Supreme Court Justice Anthony M. Kennedy was the tie-breaker in a ruling that prudently upholds most of the Customs Service tradition. The distinction, according to Justice Kennedy, should be whether the firm with a U.S. trademark is an independent business or a subsidiary of a foreign firm. When the trademark is held by a person or business that makes the product overseas, no protection is provided from gray-market competition. The trademark law was not designed to protect a foreign manufacturer that "employed the simple device of incorporating a shell domestic subsidiary," according to Justice Kennedy.

Because of the weak dollar, it is unclear what the short-term effect of the ruling will be on gray-market imports. Many retailers and consumers are likely to continue avoiding gray-market goods because their warranties are often not knoored in this country. But the long-term effect can only keep U.S. prices in time with world-wide prices for similar items and discourage U.S. distributors from whitnarily raising prices, in that respect, the court's ruling is a victory for competition and the American consumer.

Democrats split on taxes, policy issues

MACKINAC ISLAND, Mich. (UPI) — Democratic Party platform writers ended their first drafting session with agreements on reordering the nation's priorities on a host of social issues but still divided over taxes, military spending, nuclear policy and the Mideast.

And at least some of the thorny issues — particularly Jesse Jackson's call for increased taxes on the richest 1 percent of Americans and a freeze on defense spending — could go to the floor of the July convention in Atlanta that will nominate Jackson's rival, Massachusetts Gov-Michael Dukakis, as its presidential candidate.

But party leaders, including platform committee chairman Gov, James Blanchard of Michigan and Rep. William Gray, D-Pachairman of the 15-member drafting committee, pronounced themselves pleased with the results of two days of working sessions that ended Sunday.

Gray said negotiations would continue between the two camps as well as among other members of the committee and platform panel staffers, and the drafting committee would meet again before the scheduled June 25-26 meeting of the full platform committee in Denver

Those who came "hoping for blood will find the floor is clean." said Eleanor Holmes Norton, the Jackson campaign's official representative to the panel, as the session concluded.

Although no votes were taken and no specific planks adopted, representatives of both the Jackson and Dukakis campaigns came to general agreement on 10 domestic policy issues ranging from drugs to health care, education and the economy

But Norton said the Jackson forces would continue to press for the tax increase, the military spending freeze, a party pledge of no-first-use of nuclear weapons by the United States and a Middle East policy including self-determination for the Palestinians in the Israeli occupied territories of the West Bank and Gaza Strip

Jackson, she said, has left his options entirely open on which issues he will go forward with and said that in talks with the candidate early Sunday, Jackson said he was generally pleased with the progress being made.

In particular, Dukakis delegates and representatives agreed to accept Jackson's proposal that the platform specifically brand South Africa a "terrorist nation"

"We have no problems with decla...ig South Africa a terrorist state because it is a terrorist state." said Rep. Robert Matsui. D-Calit... a Dukakis delegate on the committee, defusing what had been expected to be a contentious

The two sides also agreed that the platform should specifically call for a national drug ezar to lead a new war on drugs, that "freedom of reproductive choice"— abortion— "should be guaranteed regardless of ability to pay" and that the platform should specifically include endorsement of the Equal Rights Amendment.

Specific language on abortion and the ERA had been pressed by the Jackson campaign and women's organizations fearful the Democratic Party would abandon those traditional commitments to eliminate the "special interest"

Eco-fanatics endanger lumbermen

BLUE LAKE Cant (NEA) - In California's Mendocino National Forest, south of here, dozens of fir trees were "spiked" last year by radical environmentalists determined to frustrate plans for accelerated logging in the region

Likewise in Washington's Mount Baker Snoqualinie National Forest and Oregon's Siskiyou National Forest, north of here, large metal spikes were maliciously driven into trees scheduled to be felled.

The spikes, usually iron but sometimes ceramic to frustrate metal detectors are up to 11 inches long. Their only purpose is to shatter loggers chain saws or mill band saws, thus thwarting attempts to harvest timber.

The most recent episode was recorded late last month, when an anonymous letter tipped off officials of the federal government's Bureau of Land Management to the spiking of about 90 trees in southern Oregon

If undetected, spiking poses a terrible threat to the safety of workers in an industry already fraught with danger — as vividly illustrated by an incident last spring involving a redwood tree felled here along California's North Coast.

A jagged tooth from the blade of a band saw in a Louistana Pacific Corp mill struck a spike embedded in the log A 12 foot section of the blade flew wildly across the room and into the face of mill worker George Anderson


The metal slashed Anderson's hard hat and plastic face mask, deeply gouged his right cheek, broke his jaw, knocked out a dozen teeth and almost severed his jugular vein.

As Anderson lay crumpled on the floor, bleeding profusely from the severe wounds a ro-worker apparently saved his life by holding the gashed jugular vein together for almost an hour before an ambulance could reach the remote mill.

The 23-year-old mill worker now has recovered but his life was senselessly endangered by a hazardous practice. That practice is aggressively promoted by a group of environmental fanatics, known as Earth First!

Tree spiking is an extremely effective method of deterring timber sales, says Ecodefense A Field Guide to Monkeywrenching, a book written by Dave Foreman, an Earth First! lounder now living in Arizona.

"The object of these spikes is to destroy blades in the sawmill," adds the book

Reagan's other summit

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Reagan, preparing this week for the annual economic summit hailed U.S. gains in the world economy as the model for America's trading partners moving toward greater growth and away from protectionism.

He trumpeted U.S. strides in employment, a reduction of taxes and curbing of inflation, as well as increased trade investment in the United States and abroad.

"The United States has been one of the biggest gamers in the global economy." the president noted proudly in his weekly radio address. "It's not surprising that country after country have followed us on the path to greater economic freedom.

But the president, again calling on Congress to quickly work up new trade reform legislation without two controversial provisions, warned that protectionist restrictions will deflate those gains — at home and overseas.

One of the great lessons of the last seven years is that when people in free economies are allowed to trade with one another around the world, the result is greater prosperity for us all. Reagan said.

"And make no mistake, the global economy is the basis of our prosperity and the foundation of our economic future. I can think of no surer way of detailing our economy than to try through protectionist measures to seal America off from trade and investment with the other countries of the world."

Reagan, as he prepares to meet for the final time with six other chiefs of state beginning Sunday, also lauded the recent free trade agreement signed with Canada as a "model that can be initiated and expanded and ultimately made universal among free nations

Fortunately he said we and out trading partners are going to deal with economic matters together because that sathe only way to move ahead. Lai glad to say we're moving away from protectionism and toward greater economic growth and job creation.

Reagan began his term about eight years ago at the first economisummit conference in Ottawa with the Group of Seven nations — the United States Japan West Germany France Britain Italy and Canada

Officials have conceded the June 1921 summit will likely revolve around non-contentious issues and avoid customary differences over trade agriculture Latin American debt and American budget deficits No major breakthroughs are expected.

Instead the national leaders are expected to use the meeting in part to salufe the two term terms of Reagan.

This will be my eighth and final economic summit and there will be much to celebrate—the president said—Today—we have a global economy in which the United States is at the very center.

On the trade bill, Reagan sant his senior advisers stand ready to assist the congressional leadership on a new trade bill—that will strengthen America's international competitiveness.

Reagan's repeated call for new legislation came as the Senate last week sustained his veto of the massive trade bill because of provisions to force employers to notify workers of imminent plant closings and restrictions on Alaskan oil exports

Melanoma vaccine

MIAMI BEAUTI (UPI) — Six hospitals are beginning tests on a new type of vaccine that could reduce recurrence of malignant melanoma a skin cancer that strikes one out of every 128 Americans.

The inclanoina vaccine does not prevent cancer, but given after surgery it could prevent the recurrences that often prove fatal. Said Dr. Marc K. Wallack of Mount Sinai Medical Center in Miann Beach.

Pinya Cohen vice president for regulatory affairs at Mericux Institute, which makes the vaccine said the company is cautionsly optimistic about the vaccine. We don't want to present it as some thing that is safe and effective yet. It has to be put to the test. That is what the clinical trial will do.

Joann Schellenbach a spokeswoman for the American tancer Society said the an nouncement was good news because melanoma is such a deadly cancer, and we've been experiencing an epidemic in the last few

Schellenhach said Americans' increased exposure to ultraviolet rays in sunlight had boosted the lifetime chance of getting melanoma from 1 to 1500 in 1930 to 1 in 128 today. If the trend continues, the risk will be 1 in 90 by the year 2000.

If detected very early as a small shallow mole like growth melanoma is effectively treated with surgery, and about 90 percent of patients are cured. But once the cancer spreads out of deeper layers of skin and into lymph nodes and other organs, the cure rate plummets to 12 percent. Schellenbach

It's a difficult carrier to treat once its spread. If this approach proves successful, it will be very welcome. Schellenbach said.

The trial is the first carefully controlled test of a controversial type of vaccine made from the cell membranes of four strains of labgrown melanoma cells. The cancer cells are infected with smallpox-like virus which leaves distinctive protems on their membranes.

Small early trials of the vaccineconducted without control patients receiving a dummy drugindicated that the vaccine appears to be safe and patients getting it had about 35 percent less recurrence of their cancer than would be expected for patients of their age and stage of

Plan on a federal tax increase

WASHINGTON — The painful legacy of the Reagan administration is a federal deficit that will reach \$176 billion next year. But that isn't Reagan's problem. He is unlikely to mar his lame-duck months with an ugly debate about how to reform spending and taxation policies.

Reagan's successor will inherit that job, and unless the next president has a miracle cure for the entrenched spending habits of the lederal government, tax increases are inevitable. The campaign rhetoric to date has produced nothing that sounds like a miracle in the making. True to form, the candidates are shy about discussing tax increases.

But several possibilities theories are making the rounds in Washington, and most of them will

• Taxpayers have already watclied as Reagan's tax reform ateaway at the consumer interest deduction. The interest on credit cards, autoloans and other personal loans is no longer fully deductible. The reform package also eliminated deductible interest on home mortgages after the first and second residence.

But that hasn't kept creative financial planners from finding a way around both restrictions, using one to take care of the other

The technique is simple. Take out a home equity loan on the first or second residence. Because the original mortgage is deductible, the equity loan is also deductible. That money can be used to finance personal expenses, such as a new car, or to pay off credit cards or to consolidate other loans that are not deductible, or even to buy a third home.


Congress is on to this mancuvering and may righten the laws on home equity loans to make sure they aren't used to reduce a tax bill Mainter option for raising revenues also focuses on the home Currently, the profit from the sale of a home is not taxed if the money is reinvested in another house within two years. If the seller dies before he or she has a chance to reinvest the cash, the treasury writes off that source of income completely, By imposing a tax on only 30 percent of capital gains, the U.S. coffers would see an increase of \$27 billion by 1993.

• Many community facilities, in

cluding schools and roads, are financed by bonds, and the interest earned by the bond buyers is tax free because the borrower is a government entity. Federal law has allowed cities and states to extend their tax-free status to private developers to build facilities that are a benefit to the community; such as an industrial park or low-income housing. Private developers, like tax-free bonds because the interest is lower. But the federal government may see a way to increase tax revenues by outlawing the extension of the tax-free status to private developers.

• It is no secret that some Democrats favor a national safes tax — in tax lingo, a value-added tax. A 5percent value-added tax could reduce the federal deficit about \$77billion by 1990 and another \$459billion by 1993. Republicans aren't promoting the value-added tax and Democrats are not uniformly behind it in this election year.

• Congress could skip all the machinations and simply raise the rates on existing taxes. With that option, there is no added enforcement burden and there are no messy changes to the tax law. But there are disadvantages, Taxpayers get discouraged when they lose more of their paycheck to Unete Sam, and discouraged taxpayers have less incentive to work and


Author dies of lung cancer

U.S. warplanes bombed Libya on April 14, 1986, hitting military installations in Tripoli and near Benghazi in retaliation for alleged Libvan links to terrorist attacks in Europe, including the bombing of a West Berlin nightclub that killed a U.S. soldier and a Turkish woman.

Gadhaft's 15-month-old adopted daughter reportedly was among the 15 people killed in the U.S. air raid but the Libyan leader was not in his compound at the time of the bombing.

Scientists discover virus that helps AIDS symptoms develop

of the discoverers of the AIDS announced the finding Sunday at the opening of the Fourth International Conference on AIDS, the largest meeting ever held on the fatal disease.

Gallo said the new virus, which his laboratory identified last year, apparently does not itself cause AIDS. Many people are injected with the herpes virus and most suffer no symptoms, he said.

But in people already infected with the AIDS virus, the herpes virus multiplies rapidly and helps the AIDS virus destroy certain T-cells - white blood cells crucial to the immune system.

U.S.S.R. holds beauty contest

MOSCOW (UPI) - The Soviet capital's first beauty contest dazzled spectators with a swimsuit competititon in a stunning break with public prudery, but the official Tass news agency played up the new Miss Moscow's "good taste

and sense of humor." Mariya Kalinina, a 16-year-old high school graduate. drew oohs and ahhs from the audience as she stood in a line of swimsuited contestants before winning the beauty pageant Sunday in a giant sports complex.

The Miss Moscow is charming and elegant, feminine and artistic." Tass said. "She is distinguished by good taste and a sense of humor, as it is not enough to have just a good appearance to win the Moscow contest.

Kalinina, a slim brunette who graduated high school this year and will turn 17 in September, won a cruise on the Mediterranean for emerging as the winner.

Russian Christians celebrate

MOSCOW (UPI) - An estimated 15,000 faithful. including the highest-ranking Vatican delegation to visit the Soviet Union, jammed the courtyard of the 700-yearold Danilov Monastery for a special service marking 1,000 years of Russian Christianity.

As police in bright blue uniforms politely ushered the crowds, the thousands of believers Sunday filed into the golden-domed monastery that was given back to the Russian Orthodox Church last year after being used for decades as a warehouse.

Many of the Russians stood for the entire four-hour liturgy, sung in the open air on a day that began with rain that later gave way to sunshine by the time the service ended at 2 p.m.

Church official Aleksel Ryzyaninal said an estimated 15.000 people attended the service, held in a courtyard surrounded by church buildings and chapels, all of which were too small to hold the crowd.



And Johnson responded with an 18-point. 14-assist, 6-rebound game Sunday to spark Los Angeles to a 99-86 victory over the Detroit Pistons and a 2-1 lead in the NBA

"It'll be interesting to see how we respond, come back," Detroit Coach Chuck Daly said after the Pistons lost the home court advantage they had gained in Game 1 of the NBA Finals. Game 4 is Tuesday night with Game 5 set for Thursday night, both on the Pistons' court. "We've lost to Chicago, Boston and now L.A. at home."

Riley appealed to his team to treat Game 3 as a championship game. They treated it more like a buffet dinner - helping themselves to the win with a 31-18 third quarter.

Afterward, they treated themselves to a real buffet in the dressing room whipped up by Christine Johnson, Magic's moin.

"It wasn't quite like that," Riley said of how he asked the defending champion Lakers to approach the game. "Anything you do, you have to have a mission. But you also have to have a goal.

"Our goal was to win the game. Our mission is to win the series. This win was as big as we've ever had. Now it's their squeeze

The dollar edged slightly higher today in light trading on major world money markets as many traders stepped to the sidelines to await Tuesday's report on the U.S. merchandise trade for April. Gold moved lower.

In early New York trading, the dollar was slightly higher against key foreign currencles in light trading.

Market watchers in New York said traders were preparing themselves for Tuesday's report on the nation's trade picture.

Traders said they are expecting the merchandise trade report to show a slight widening in the deficit to around \$12 billion from an adjusted \$11.95 billion in March.

In earlier trading in the Far-East, the dollar gained against the Japanese yen, closing at 125.19 yen, up 0.34 from 124.85 yen on Friday.

Currency dealers in Japan said operators refrained from taking large positions ahead of the U.S. April trade figures due to be announced on Tuesday.

In Europe, the dollar opened at 1.72 West German marks in Frankfurt, up from Friday's close of 1.718.

In Paris, the dollar began the day at 5.8325 French francs, up from 5.8025.

The dollar began the week in Amsterdam at 1,933 Dutch guilders, up from 1.9305, and opened at 36.17 Belgian francs in Brussels, up from 36, 10.

The dollar was also higher in Milan, opening the day at 1.282.00 lire, up from 1.277.25. but it slipped in Zurich to 1.433 Swiss francs, down slightly from 1.4345 last Friday.

In London, the pound opened at \$1,825 compared with \$1.8175 on Friday.

On the bullion markets, gold fell \$6.50 in Zurich to \$451.50 an ounce, and lost \$5.90 in London to \$451.35.

The London morning gold fixing was \$450,50, off \$6.75 from Friday's close.

In the Far East, the Hong Kong Bullion Exchange was closed for a national holiday, trading will resume on Tuesday


Newman, director lose appeal

The justices refused to hear an appeal by Newman, director George Roy Hill and Pan Arts Production Corp., of a decision by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals throwing out their antitrust suit against Universal Studios and MCA Inc.

The dispute stemmed from the distribution of two 1970s movies, "Slapshot," and "The Sting," on video cassette tape, Newman acted in the pictures and Hill directed them and both were entitled to a percentage of their proceeds.

In April 1985, Newman and Hill filed suit against the motion picture makers, alleging they conspired to fix the percentage of revenues paid to artists from videocassette profits from the movies in violation of the Sherman Act.

Federal firefighting officials said Sunday night it will be at least three days before they can contain the blaze.

About 130 miles to the north, erratic weekend winds tripled the size of a smaller blaze on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation in eastern Arizona, the site of Indian ruins dating back 500

The border fire was burning out of control 15 miles south of Sierra Vista, but no longer threatened any other structures after destroying a tourist rest area at the Coronado National Monument, said Bill Speight, spokesman for the Coronado National Forest.

The fire started about noon Friday in Mexico and quickly swept into southern Arizona, briefly threatening nine homes after it crossed into the Coronado National Forest.

No injuries had been reported and the cause of the blaze had not been determined.

"The fire was burning pretty well today," Speight said. "We dropped 20,700 gallons of fire retardant from four air tankers, and I don't know how many gallons of water from 10 helicopters." The wildfire, fueled by winds gusting up to 30

mph, consumed desert vegetation, officials said. "Some areas almost turned into what we call moonscape - nothing left but white ash," Coronado National Forest spokeswoman Lee Posgue said. "It's made some really hot runs up these carryons."

More than 1,100 firefighters were on the fire lines Sunday, using 17 fire engines and two buildozers in addition to the air tankers and

Another 350 firefighters from New Mexico. California, the Indian nations and the Army were expected to join in the battle by today, Speight said.

"They're just constantly coming in." he said. By Sunday night, the fire had charred 6,000 acres in Arizona, up from 5,000 acres on

Saturday, and 2,000 acres in Mexico. Speight said the fire continued to burn out of control, but "we're predicting it will be contained

by late Wednesday." On the Apache Indian reservation in eastern Arizona, gale-force winds fanned a lightningsparked fire from about 200 acres Saturday to more than 600 acres Sunday, said Joyce Hassell

of the U.S. Forest Service. About 400 people - backed up by three helicopters, six engines and two buildozers were fighting the blaze consuming Douglas fir and pine, Hassell said. Air tankers had been placed on stand-by.

Temperatures Sunday rose to the high 80s and humidity was in the low to middle teens.

Hassell said there were no injuries, but authorities were concerned about damage to archeological sites. Three experts were working with fire crews to help locate and protect the sites, many of which are historic migratory




