Body Discovered Day After Mishap

The body of a 19-year-old Marine, apparently killed in an early Tuesday accident, was found after 10 this morning in the median strip of Interstate 4 near the SR 434 intersection at Longwood. (Related photograph on page 2A).

Dr. Gary Broderick's body was identified by Marine credentials but way Patrol said this afternoon the license tags on the wrecked car were issued at Green Cove Springs to a St. Petersburg resident.

Broderick's body was spotted this morning by a passing motorist. It was near the scene of an accident investigated yesterday when a late model automobile wrecked while the driver was trying to negotiate a curve.

Troopers and sheriff's deputies investigated the accident Tuesday and believed that the driver had left the area.

Apparently the impact was of such intensity the body was tossed for a great distance in the air and away from the car. The body was partially hidden from view by a heavy growth of grass in the median.

Trooper C. L. (Tommy) Tomlinson was continuing the investigation today.

If determined a traffic fatality after investigation this will be the 19th county death this year due to car mishaps. In all 1970 there were 19 traffic deaths in Seminole County.

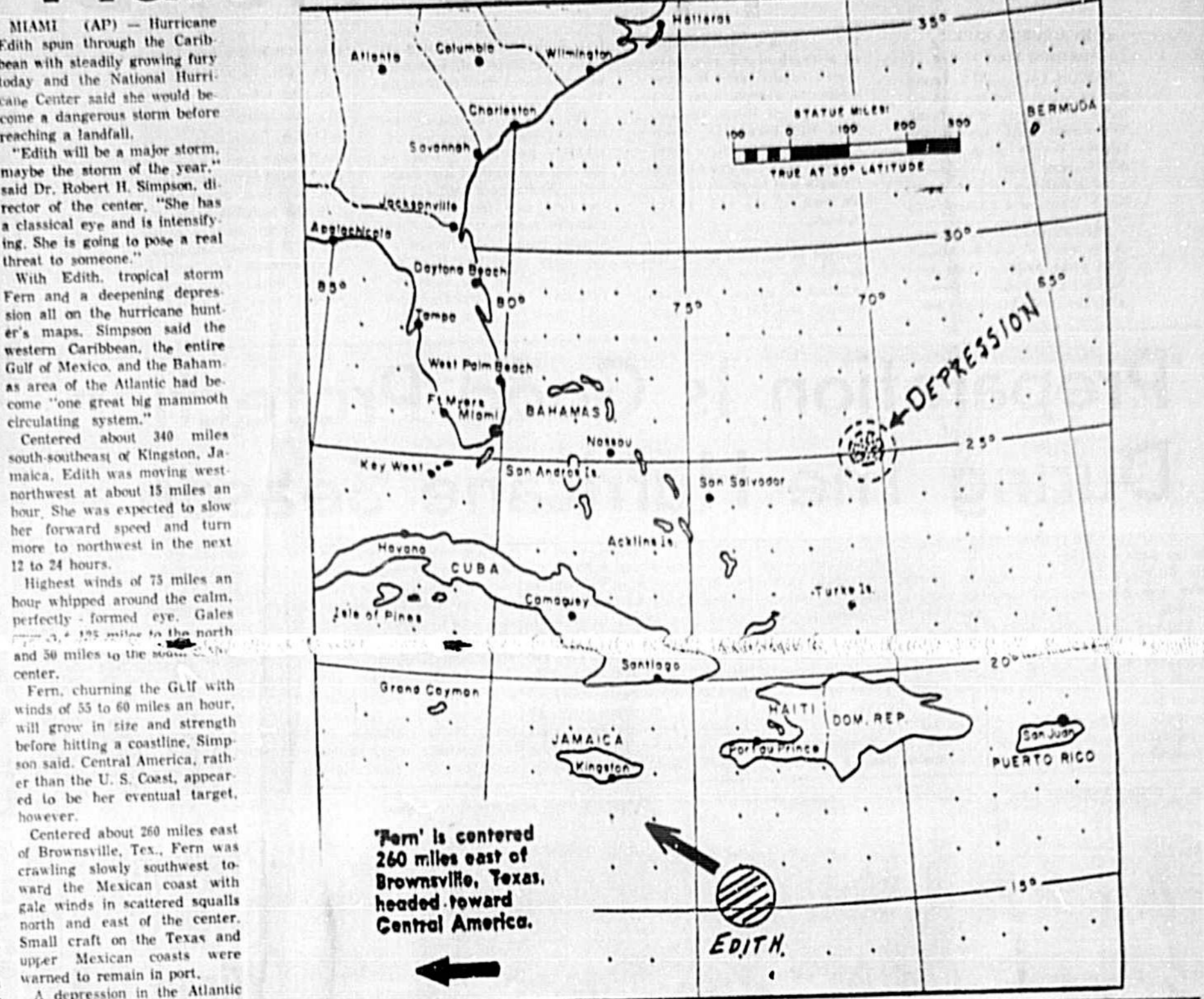

Condemnation Lawsuits Pictured For Park Sites

The right of eminent domain through court litigation, may be utilized by the County Commission to obtain lands needed to complete the proposed Big Tree Park East and Lake Howell Park.

The county Commission indicated it may go to court in condemnation proceedings as its Tuesday night session.

The county is caught in the middle of a dispute among members of the Philoia family who hold title to 55 acres needed in the proposed Big Tree Park site. The family cannot agree whether to sell to the county. At the Commission meeting, Sidney Villen Jr., commissioner in charge of park, termed the Philoia property as being vital to the park.

The Central Florida Diocese of the Catholic Church owns the Howell Park site but has resisted efforts to come to terms with the county to sell the property. Commission Chairman Greg Drummond said one of the reasons indicated by the church for its unwillingness to sell would be its loss of access to its property from Red Bug Road. Drummond was quick to point out at Tuesday's meeting that a bridge would have to be built by the church for it to have access to its property from Red Bug Road.

Road Supt. J. C. Lavender said the cost of such a bridge to any private individual or entity would be \$70,000. They have access to their property from Howell Branch Road because the 80 acres is part of a larger 800-acre tract. The 80 acres have been appraised at approximately \$100,000.

The commissioners passed a motion authorizing Drummond to enter into an agreement to purchase the Sand Lake Park site. The Commission was told by County Planner David Part it should not consummate any purchase agreement if the county is to remain eligible for federal funding. The Commission also authorized Part to complete the necessary paperwork accompanying the application for federal funds. They also acknowledged the offer from Jack Gladding of the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council to aid the county, at no cost, in going after the federal funds.

The Commission also accepted a petition offered by Charles Rabun, representing residents in the vicinity of the Lake Monroe Park East site. Rabun said the petitioners are unalterably opposed to locating the zoo at the site as has been proposed by the Seminole Zoological Society. He cited odor and noise problems emanating from any zoo located in the park. He also said traffic problems would be created which would put a burden on the area's residents.

Rabun presented a counterproposal for locating the zoo at a site near or in the Lake Monroe Park West. Villen said several commissioners have indicated an interest in locating the zoo in the West Monroe site, even though the eastern site is favored of the Seminole Zoological Society.

School Population Up; 22,851 Are Enrolled

Walter F. Teague Middle School led all other county grade 6-8 facilities with 1,350 students. South Seminole Middle School followed with 1,211 students.

The exact figure, according to Teague, is 22,851 students from kindergarten through 12th grade.

As expected the schools in south Seminole increased their enrollments for first-day students over the north county counterparts.

Teague said the first day figures show an overall increase of 768 students in all county schools than closed out the term in June. He said the Ovidio area schools appear to have grown more than any other section based on first day enrollments.

The Sanford area is about as expected with a slight increase over last term, he added.

Lymon High School enrolled 3,908 students for grades 9-12 Tuesday. Seminole High's figures were 1,811 students for grades 10-12. Sanford-Crooks high totaled 803 pupils, all in the ninth grade. Adding Crooks' figures to Seminole High shows that a total 2,611 pupils for grades 9-12 as compared with Lymon's total 3,603, thus giving the south county high school an average of almost 400 students.

Teague said this showed the higher growth rate of the south over the north. In years past, Sanford high schools were enrolling more students than Lymon High.

Ovidio High, which houses grades 7-12, had a first day enrollment of 1,315 students. (Teague had estimated 1,314 students here before opening day).

Walter F. Teague Middle School led all other county grade 6-8 facilities with 1,350 students. South Seminole Middle School followed with 1,211 students.

Sgt. L. P. Root, of the Maitland police, said today the child had left the scene with a bystander when he arrived and has not yet been identified.

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Two GI Units Pulled From Combat Duty U.S. Supports Viet Drive Into Laos

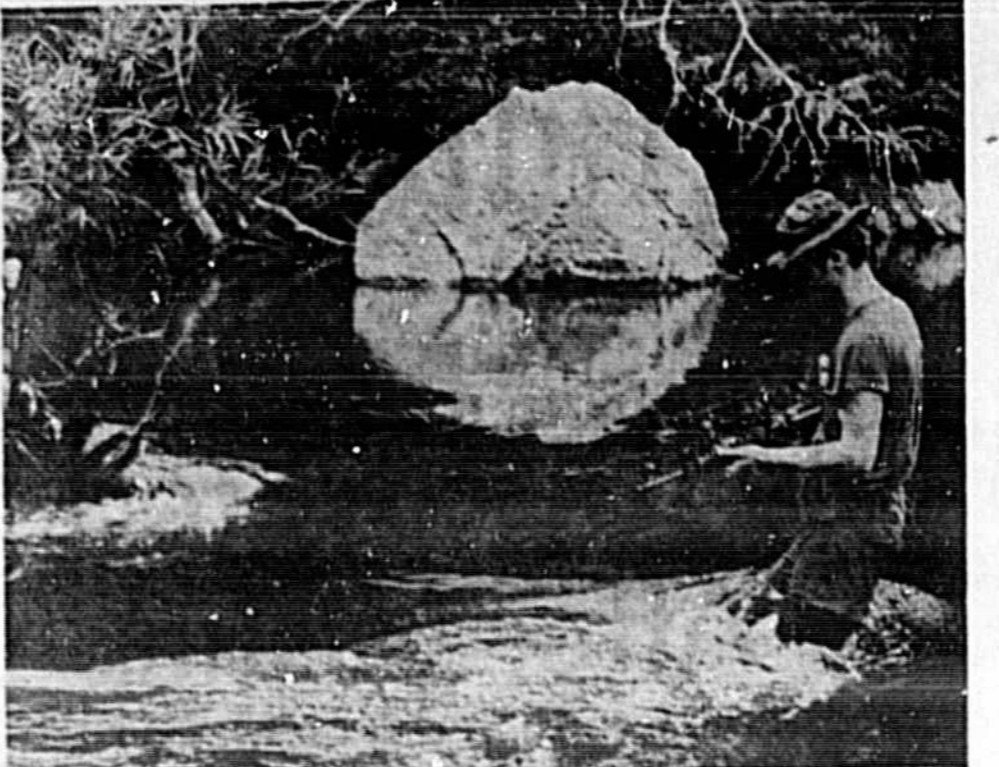

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. forces attacked from land, sea and air today in support of a South Vietnamese drive toward the Laotian border south of the demilitarized zone. No significant contact with North Vietnamese soldiers was reported in the third day of the operation by some 16,000 South Vietnamese troops. American artillery and 200 U.S. helicopters

with a total authorized strength of 835 men have crossed combat duty in preparation for redeployment soon to the United States. The combat will lower U.S. troop strength in Vietnam to about 218,000 men. American strength will be pared to 173,000 men by the end of November.

Some enemy harassing attacks were reported, wounding an undisclosed number of South Vietnamese soldiers. The South Vietnamese re-opened three fire bases and established four landing zones to the east and north of Khe Sanh. South Vietnamese officers in the field said there were no plans to reopen the Khe Sanh combat base, which served as the main operations base for the wild drive into Laos last February. The officers also said there were no plans to

cross the border into Laos. Lt. Col. Le Trung Hien, a spokesman for South Vietnamese headquarters in Saigon, said the forwardmost government troops were 15 miles from the Laotian border and 18 miles from Khe Sanh at last report. In the heaviest raids in two weeks, more than a score of U.S. B52 bombers dropped 600 tons of bombs on North Vietnamese bunker complexes and storage sites encircling Khe Sanh.

Preparation Is Good Protection During The Hurricane Season

(SPECIAL) — Hurricanes can inflict heavy damage on both people and property. Those who are not adequately protected. The key to protection is preparation. By taking sensible measures before, during and after a hurricane, you can guard yourself, your family and property against its violence.

First, keep well-informed when a hurricane or lesser tropical storm is forecast. "Thank you for your information. We will take all possible precautions. Once a warning is in effect, there is no time to waste. Your local radio and television stations will provide current information supplied by the U.S. Weather Bureau. (See map, Page 2.)

When a "hurricane warning" is posted, residents should evacuate beaches and low-lying coastal locations immediately. Don't delay, since roads to safer areas may become flooded due to hurricane winds or rain. Check everything outside your home that might be blown away or blown against the house. Safety specialists warn that garbage cans, gardening tools, toys, lawn furniture, awnings and other loose objects can become destructive weapons in hurricane-force winds. Firmly tie down anything that cannot be stored.

Park your car on high ground in case of flooding. The best place for a car is in a garage or shelter, or any place where trees are not likely to fall. Fill gas tank (in case evacuation is necessary), make sure windshield wipers are in working order, and set brakes after parking.

Check everything outside your home that might be blown away or blown against the house. Safety specialists warn that garbage cans, gardening tools, toys, lawn furniture, awnings and other loose objects can become destructive weapons in hurricane-force winds. Church, Altamonte Dicker Over Park

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — City Council has authorized Mayor Lawrence Swofford to negotiate for the purchase or lease of additional park land which will be included in a "good chance" that the city will pay for the maintenance of the park.

Councilman Thomas Radloff said that he believes it more advantageous to own the property. Swofford told council that the church on a five-acre tract, which is being developed at least five acres, is federally funded on both a purchase and development level. The five-acre tract will be developed in addition to the 20 acres presently owned by the city.

Ken Fry told council that he would like to have the city acquire this property, it will then declare intent with the Jacksonville office of HUD act as an intermediary in the negotiations.

In another matter, the city is also negotiating for property adjoining the present city hall for use by the maintenance department.

Swofford contended that it is not "prudent" to have the maintenance department at the present location that the new city hall should be built on the property, with the maintenance department located elsewhere. Swofford continued that space is at a premium at the present location and a new garage parking structure would be needed. Swofford and Councilman Helen Keyser are in charge of negotiations for the site for the maintenance building.

Altamonte Budgets Near \$5 Million

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — City Council adopted second and final reading of an ordinance annexing the Swint property which is located on eight lots adjacent to Center Street in the Sanlando subdivision, and encompasses R-3 multiple family dwelling zoning.

Two progress reports upon the sewer system were given by consulting engineer W. J. Palm, who told council that the system will be available for book-ups within the week. Connection to the system will be mandatory by Jan. 1.

Council approved payment to Tech Corporation for the pump station in the amount of \$137,522.50. Palm said that this project is practically completed, with all that is needed being calibration of the pump.

Payment was authorized to Chilton Construction Company for the amount of \$10,480.25 for the treatment plant, which Radloff suggested that the fee be rolled back to the 1970 level. Councilman Helen Keyser disagreed, contending that some fees were too minimal, to which Radloff countered that, conversely, some were "grossly too high."

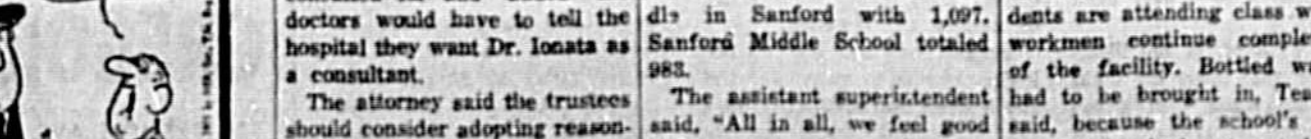

Senators Study Jobs For Welfare Clients

ORLANDO — The Tuesday morning session was on health, welfare and rehabilitation services, scheduled to meet in the Orange County welfare offices. Instead, it met in the offices of the Orange County Community Services — same place, really, but under its new name.

Since Chairman Kenneth Myers (Miami) was unable to attend, Senator Jack Scarborough (Orlando) chaired the meeting. He immediately opened the floor to any citizen for comments.

The first speaker, Ray Knight, Altamonte Springs, asked for an end to county and state welfare subsidy for contraception, claiming that it is a form of self-abuse, is illegal restriction akin to insanity. He insisted that self-control family limitation is a praiseworthy aim, that all Catholics may not accept the value of self-control birth-control. He insisted that contraception creates and develops the unwanted-child syndrome in the younger generation exposed to it.

Then, on the positive side, he called for a program of public service work for wages instead of present welfare dole to able-bodied heads of families, men and women, who simply are unemployable. Their first need is dignified labor; and public service, even on the level of recycling trash from our roadsides and waterways, is dignified labor for the common good. Anything that beautifies the environment can bring satisfaction. Boy Scouts feel this work is an honor, a patriotic "good deed." But the image of public service also must be raised by decent wages, since such service pays its own way in advantages to all.

Senator C. S. Reuters (Sharpes) asked how many able-bodied men would be available in Seminole County, on welfare, for such jobs. Knight answered that there are few, perhaps 10, perhaps 500. "How many women are available for such jobs?" The speaker said there are at least 1,500 unemployed during the summer off-season.

Senator Scarborough brought up the need for day-care services for such welfare mothers, citing this as one primary need for making such a program work. There was agreement of the committee.

FIRST OFFENDERS
Following this opening, the agenda was put in motion. Arthur H. Harris, of the Florida Bar, asked for a larger audience from State Medicaid for medical and hospital care for patients on welfare. He stated that only one out of 200 a month for medical patients, while costs for other patients are \$600 a month. Holding the state aid low ends up with the welfare patient feeling neglected with the second class services, or the nursing home goes into the red.

Hittie Tidwell, of the Division of Corrections, gave an enlightening talk on the prison population. He showed the failure of jail sentences to aid in the rehabilitation of first offenders. The shorter the sentence served, the less the parolee repeats and returns to prison, a survey shows.

Tidwell's presentation was on the Youthful Offenders' Act, being sponsored by Tidwell and the Division of Corrections.

This act aims to limit sentences of youthful first offenders (ages 17 to 23) to two or three years for any first offenses except those carrying the death penalty.

"We have concluded that our teachers and other educational personnel are entitled to be paid in accordance with salary schedules adopted prior to the wage-price freeze," Christian said.

checks with the new raises introduced last Friday when Arnold R. Weber, executive director of the Cost of Living Council, said that most of the nation's teachers wouldn't qualify for pay raises.

At the time, a spokesman for Christian said it meant "we'll have to modify what we've said previously to do."

Earlier announced guidelines had established that in the case of school systems which had adopted a system-wide contract applicable to all teachers, which contract made all teachers eligible to receive payments, Christian said.

"This general policy clearly applies to Florida teachers and other educational personnel," he said.

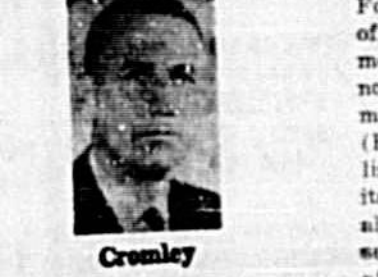
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Global View:

Allende: His Economic Woes

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Politically, Salvador Allende, Marxist president of Chile, has shown himself to be exceedingly adept. It may be that he and his associates are in for a long win.

But Allende has made some quite serious technical economic errors most difficult to understand in view of the Russian, Chinese, East German and Cuban experiences. One would think a man so well-versed in the literature would have learned from their successes and failures.

Second, Allende has fallen into the Russian bureaucratic trap. That is, he is moving quickly to centralize industrial economic management. Mao did not make this mistake. Moscow did and has found it impossible ever since to unscramble the distortions and inefficiencies.

At the Central Office for Discovery and Prosecution of National Socialist Crimes in Ludwigsburg, more than two dozen prosecuting attorneys are at work sifting old evidence and turning up new evidence, reports the West German Information Office in New York.

Legal experts say it is unlikely that mass murders and other major atrocities are yet to be uncovered, however. For one thing, many of the criminals have died. Senior officials responsible for the worst crimes are in their 60s or 70s, if they survive, and often are not of sound enough health to stand trial.

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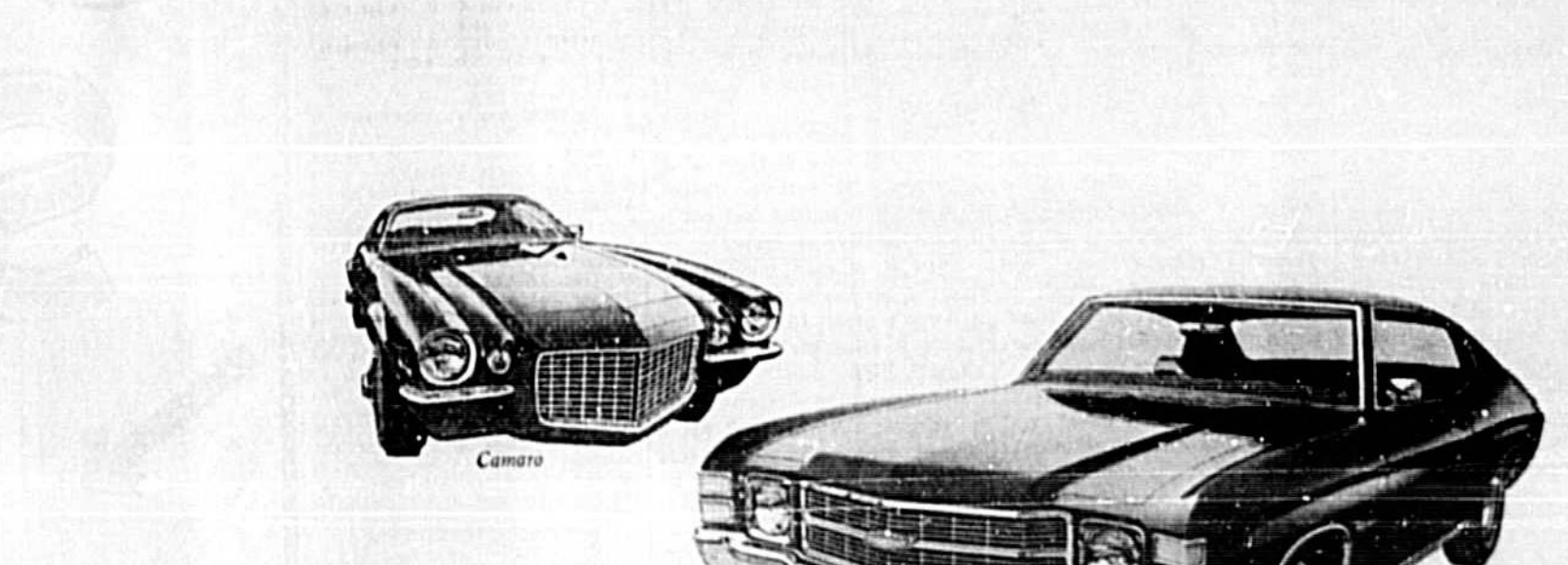

Backstage Dispute Causes Delay Anti-Pollution Bill Hits Snag

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Critics of a major bill to control what may be dumped into oceans, coastal waters and the Great Lakes claim this environmental protection measure is overloaded and running into jurisdictional trouble.
 The bill before the House would regulate dumping of waste: ban transporting and dumping of radiological, chemical or biological warfare agents and high-level radioactive waste; and authorize marine sanctuaries for preserving conservation, recreation, ecological or esthetic values.
 Yet, while some congressmen are seeking to alicc out the full section, others are trying to expand provisions even more by adding an oil-drilling moratorium.
 A backstage dispute among committees postponed House action before the month-long congressional recess. The plan drafted by the Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee was due for floor debate as a first time floor returning legislators today.
 Floor discussion could carry over to Thursday before decisions come on expected moves by Interior Committee Chairman Wayne N. Aspinall, D-Colo., to kill the marine-sanctuaries portion and by Representative F. Lott, R.-Ky., and Charles Eague, R-Calif., to insert the anti-oil-drilling provision.
 Dumping of waste would be prohibited unless authorized by the Environmental Protection Agency or the Corps of Engineers. The Corps could issue permits only to dump dredge and fill material — as long as these operations are in line with EPA standards.
 Although EPA backs the bill, the Interior Department has attacked the marine-sanctuaries provision. The Merchant Marine Committee said the disputed section would let the Commerce secretary designate areas up to the edge of the Continental Shelf as marine sanctuaries. A coastal-marine governor could veto projects involving his state.
 The Interior Department said the Office of Management and Budget and the State and Defense departments "have expressed their concern about the claim to extra-territorial jurisdiction proposed."
 The Lott-Teague amendment would authorize the Interior secretary to impose a moratorium on oil-drilling leases in any area under study for designation as a marine sanctuary. Teague's district includes the Santa Barbara, Calif., region involved in an oil blowout in 1969.

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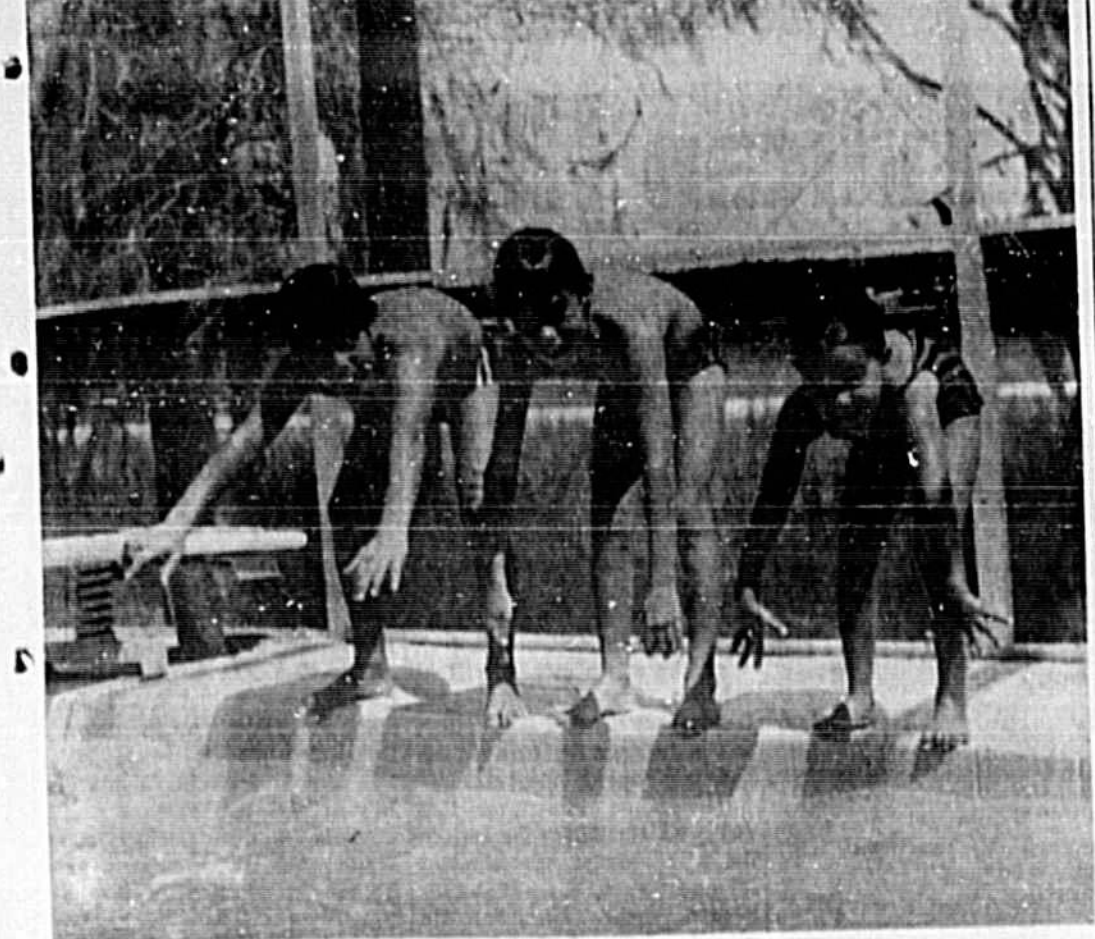

The Doctors' Save-Your-Heart Diet

(Editor's Note: This is third of a series of articles based on the new book "The Doctor's Save-Your-Heart Diet" by Allen Claiborne, NEA food Editor, and David Hendin, NEA Science Editor, published by Award Books.)

(Third of a Series) By ALLEN CLAIBORNE and DAVID HENDIN, NEW YORK - (NEA) - Mention the need for another type of diet and the average dietitian will react with a dramatic, "You-uh...! However, the diet of most Americans poor they are, is just what they need. It is just what it can get.

The diet of most Americans and individuals in most highly industrialized countries is one of excess fat. It is high in saturated fats, too low in polyunsaturated fats. It is estimated that the average American consumes about three times as much saturated fat as polyunsaturated fat (P-S ratio of 3 to 1). The recommended proportion is a P-S ratio of 1 to 1 or lower. Specifically, we're eating too much well-marbled fatty beef, eggs, cheese and butter and not enough fruits, vegetables and fish. It is time to change the types of fats consumed in the daily diet line.

Fats are necessary. The trick is to cut down on fat intake and to substitute the type of fats we consume in such a way as to be most beneficial to each individual. To do this a person must include at least as much polyunsaturated as saturated fat in each day's forays to the table or lunch counter.

Since animal fats generally are high in saturated fat content, it simply means cutting down on or eliminating completely food, notoriously high in animal fats.

Meat and potatoes men and chocolate-bon-bon gals should join "high fat anonymous." These truly common with their future health prospects this will learn and help these fatolites to understand the low-saturated-fat, low-cholesterol management diet. Modifying the fat content of what you eat daily means some adjustments. Few delusions in food for this cholesterol management diet are painful-giving up chocolate pound cake with dark chocolate icing and ice cream is far less painful, for instance, than a heart attack that continues, regular eating of such high-saturated-fat goodies may help trigger.

A low saturated fat, low-cholesterol management diet requires:

- (1) Buying only lean cuts of meat and eating low meats.
- (2) Eating more fish and poultry.
- (3) Reducing animal fats in the diet generally.
- (4) Avoiding excessive use of dairy products such as whole eggs, cheese and whole milk.
- (5) Substituting "special" margarines and soft vegetable oils (salet oils) made with corn, safflower, soybean, peanut and cottonseed oil for butter, lard, hydrogenated spreads and coconut oil. (Olive oil is relatively neutral and may be used occasionally.)
- (6) Adding more herbs and spices to recipes to keep the taste buds tingling.

Following these simple guidelines (for many persons) doctors feel, may help reduce or avoid excessive and damaging cholesterol for men, women and children.

However, it is not the aim of this book to play doctor to millions. Many persons must follow specific diets because of such a condition as diabetes. Those with severe cholesterol problems will need to follow their doctor's recommended diet and exercise instructions. For many, such a diet means a completely new world of taste sensations and a turn-around in eating habits.

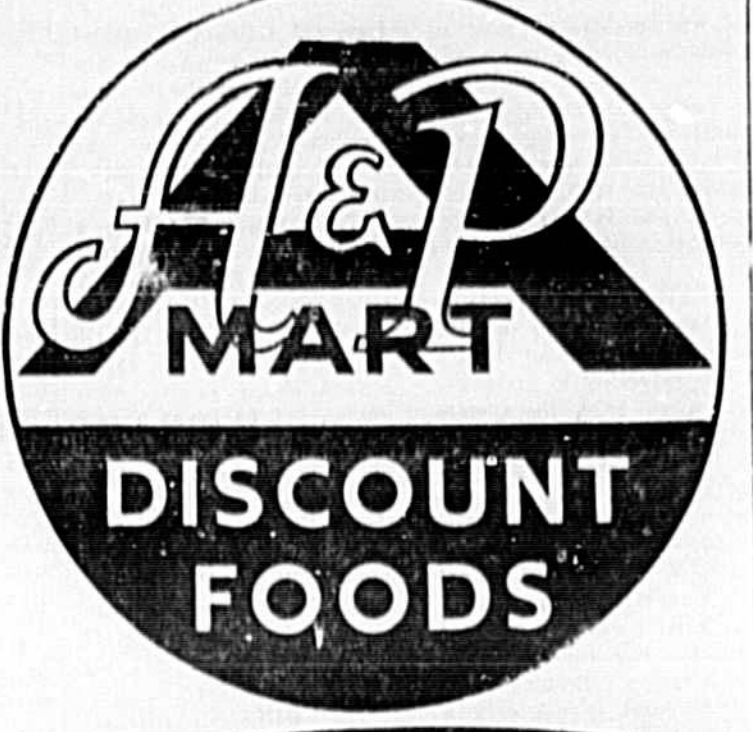

Toast 'n' Cheese Souffle

Toasting white bread from Pepperidge Farm, recently chosen by astronauts for making yourself sandwiches in space, lends itself beautifully to dozens of uses on earth.

The recipe below combines this hearty full-bodied white bread with cheddar cheese in a cover all souffle. It's an excellent choice for luncheon for the ladies.

Prepared the night before or early in the morning, this dish should be refrigerated at least an hour to let the bread drink up the milk and eggs. Allow another hour for baking before serving time.

Good accompaniments are a sliced ham or chilled canned salmon, garnished with lemon and dill sauce. Fresh or frozen asparagus spears add color contrast and pleasing flavor. The souffle is filling, as well as delicious. So plan a light dessert such as sherbet or ice cream.

TOAST 'N' CHEESE SOUFFLE

1/2 cup toasted white bread, slightly dried

1/2 lb. sharp Cheddar cheese, grated

4 eggs, beaten

1 teaspoon minced onion

1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard

1/4 teaspoon salt

dash pepper

2 1/2 cups milk

Remove crusts from bread and slice in half, diagonally. Place crust in bottom of a well buttered 1 1/2 quart casserole and sprinkle with one-half of the cheese. Arrange bread triangles, overlapping around edge of casserole, point sides up, saving five to place in the center.

Combine remaining ingredients (except cheese) and pour over bread; sprinkle with remaining cheese. Cover and refrigerate overnight or let stand at room temperature at least 1 hour. Bake at 325-degree F. for 50 to 60 minutes or until a knife inserted half way from center to edge comes out clean. Makes 4 to 10 servings.

Hawaiian Fruit Sherbet, 3 bananas, mashed

1 1/2 envelope unflavored gelatin

1/4 cup sugar, divided

1 (1-pound) can fruit cocktail, blueberries or peach slices

4 tablespoons lemon juice, divided

1/2 cup ice water

1/2 cup nonfat dry milk powder

Mix together unflavored gelatin and 1/4 cup of the sugar into saucpan. Drain syrup from fruit into saucpan. Place over low heat, stirring constantly, until gelatin is dissolved. Remove from heat; add 4 tablespoons of the lemon juice and drained fruit. Chill mixture in refrigerator until stiff. Whip until soft peaks form, 3 to 4 minutes. Add remaining 2 tablespoons lemon juice and continue beating until stiff, 3 to 4 minutes longer. Add remaining 1/4 cup sugar. Fold in gelatin mixture. Turn mixture into 9-inch pie plate; pour vanilla wafer around sides. Or, turn into a 6-cup mold or 1 large serving bowl. Makes 8 servings.

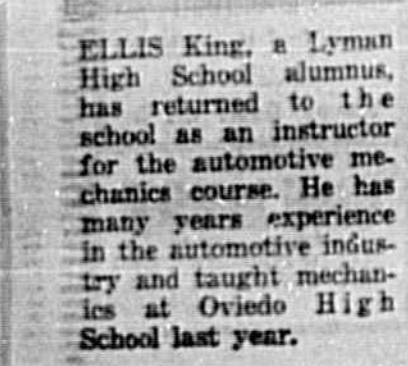
