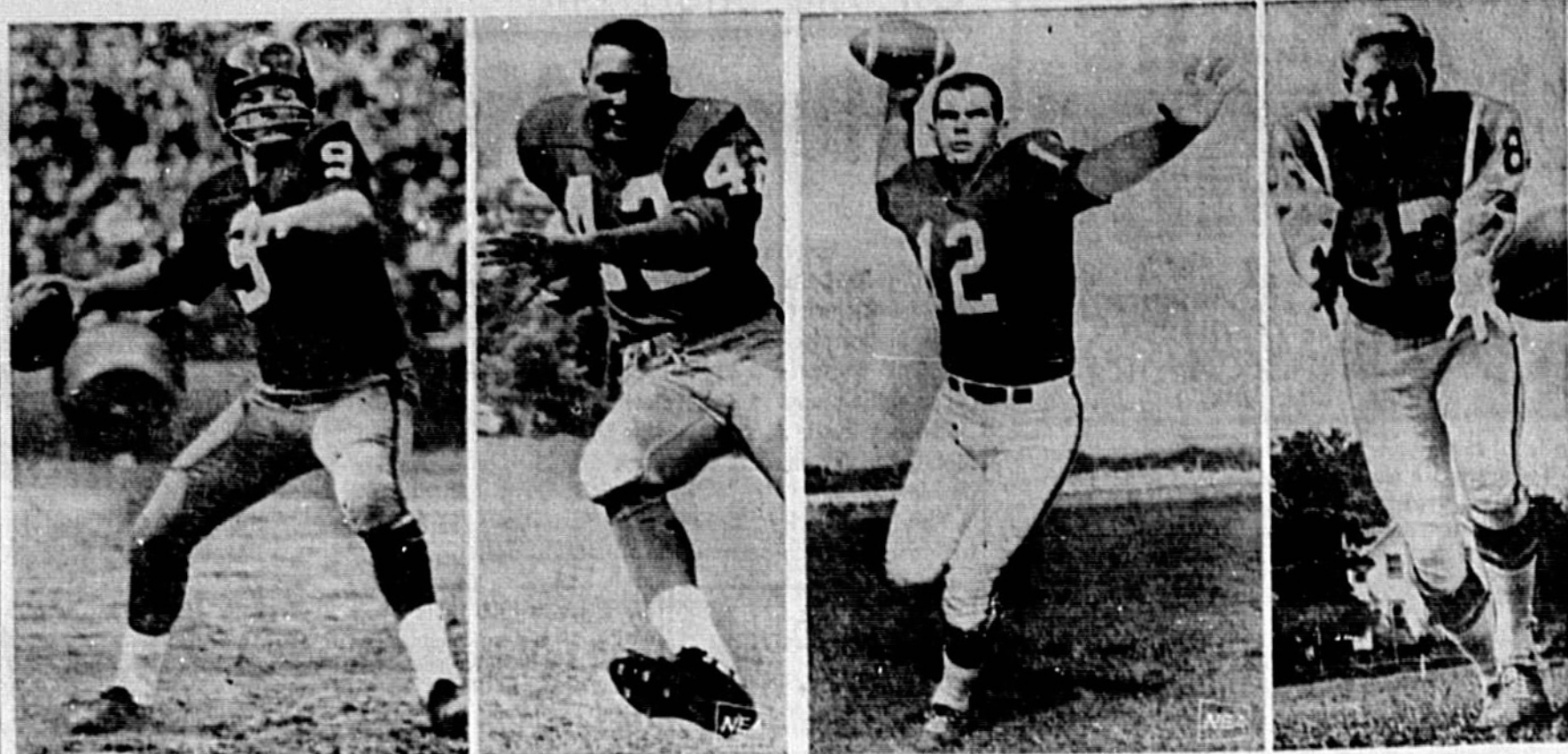
## Added Treat

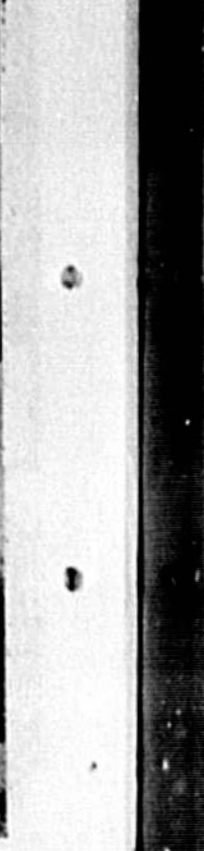

## Campaign Analyses

**HUMPHREY**

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP) — Hubert H. Humphrey's campaign is showing smoke if not fire. With his quest for the presidency in its second week, the vice president drew in Toledo what appeared to be the biggest crowds of his campaign—and he was as obviously delighted as a boy with a double dip ice cream cone.

"Thank you, thank you very much," he said beamingly, pumping hands as a hundred or more persons crowded around his car Sunday outside an ice cream parlor.

Humphrey is behind and knows it. He started late and slow. Even the money, he says, is in short supply, thus his television advertising was late. He also feels the turbulence surrounding the Chicago convention hurt him in the polls.

But Humphrey, the cheerful exponent of the politics of hope, still manages to sound confident.

Wait until the middle of October, he says, then go out and cover all the Nixon money available. "We're going to win," he says.

Although Humphrey was the frontrunner, he came out of the convention without much treasury or organization. And Humphrey was disappointed in the first week of his campaign.

He sprinted from coast to coast and back—with a tailwind of disappointing crowds, hecklers and snubs from Texas Gov. John Connally and California's Jesse Unruh, as well as some well-publicized oratorical miscues over the party's Vietnam plank and the withdrawal of troops from Vietnam.

Humphrey was tired—trying to cover too much ground, talking too long without guarding his tongue closely enough and campaigning past midnight.

The first post-convention poll results came in and Richard Nixon, his Republican opponent, was still far ahead.

Even then, Humphrey saw a bright side—that now antiwar dissidents could see that their next president would be Nixon if they didn't do something for Humphrey.

More advance men were added to his campaign to bring out the crowds. The scheduling crew was shaken up. Enthusiasm was collected so that Humphrey could go ahead with his advertising.

In addition, Humphrey was endorsed by President Johnson. And from the other side of the Vietnam issue, he won public embraces from Sens. Edward M. Kennedy, George S. McGovern and Wayne Morse. He also made a pilgrimage to see the Democrat who pulled off one of history's best-known political upsets, Harry S. Truman.

Would all this activity be enough? Humphrey thinks he can win by taking the offense against Nixon on issues of personality, propriety, by calling for civil justice as well as law and order and by trying to paint Nixon as more of a hawk or foreign policy hardliner than Humphrey.

Nor is Humphrey reluctant to portray himself as, if not the best presidential candidate possible, at least a better alternative than Nixon or George C. Wallace.

His biggest problem, and he knows it, is Vietnam. He is said to be under strain: pressure to make some dramatic gesture or statement that would divorce him from the Johnson administration's Vietnam policy. It seemed unlikely that he would put more emphasis than he has on Vietnam, but he is again biting with greater emphasis that while he is only a vice president and a candidate now and thus with no control over events, he would put an end to the war on top of his priorities as president.

**NIXON**

NEW YORK (AP) — Richard M. Nixon, confident but cautious, is campaigning for a grinning George C. Wallace to an audience in Dallas the other day. "Reminds me of the old joke that begins, 'They laughed when I sat down to play...'"

"Well," he said to the boom of applause and the scream of rebellious yells, "not many Democrats or Republicans are laughing now."

Nixon's standard campaign speech includes a set series of taunts at Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, the Democratic nominee.

Nixon tells the crowds—generally big ones—that a nation in trouble should not turn for leadership to a member of the administration that got it there.

George C. Wallace, the third party candidate, gets not a word from Nixon on the campaign platform. The Republican nominee contends that would only build up Wallace, so he never mentions the man.

Nevertheless, Wallace is a matter of real concern to Nixon's strategists. They believe Nixon can maintain his current lead in the opinion polls, and translate it into victory over Humphrey. But they share a fear that Wallace might win enough electoral votes to deny a majority to either of the major party candidates, thus sending the election to the House of Representatives.

Robert Ellsworth, Nixon's national political director, charged in an interview that the Democrats have a conscious strategy designed to do just that.

"The Democrats are doing everything they can to build up Wallace," Ellsworth said. He says they see in a House decision their best chance of denying Nixon the presidency.

Nixon's campaign pace is generally a leisurely one, with two or three speeches a day, each virtually identical. The schedule is shaped around television, and the question and answer program Nixon is staging in the major states.

There have been four so far: Ohio, Illinois, California and Pennsylvania.

There will be at least a half-dozen more. Nixon's travels are frequently structured around the campaign television shows.

So is his speech. Each of them is preceded by a day of relaxation and preparation.

Nixon's campaign speech features an appeal to the people the candidate calls forgotten Americans. "You are Republicans, you are Democrats, you are independents," Nixon says. "You have been quiet. You have been going to work and you have been paying your taxes and supporting your schools."

But now, says Nixon, these quiet, forgotten Americans are aroused and ready to speak out with votes on Nov. 5.

The set speech's main assault on Humphrey links the vice president to that administration. Leading in the public opinion polls, Nixon has passed to his campaign staff a word of warning against overconfidence.

**WALLACE**

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — George C. Wallace to an audience in Dallas the other day. "Reminds me of the old joke that begins, 'They laughed when I sat down to play...'"

"Well," he said to the boom of applause and the scream of rebellious yells, "not many Democrats or Republicans are laughing now."

Wallace has said that even he, whose political antennae are probably as sensitive as anybody's, did not anticipate when he announced his third party candidacy in January the degree of success it would achieve.

Wallace, for example, expected his "mission impossible" task force of Alabama lawyers to win for him a place on the ballot of 40 states at most.

Last week, when he met the qualifications of the 50th state—although Ohio remains in doubt—he began referring to the Democrats and Republicans as "the other two national parties."

He says his campaign treasury is in good condition, "but don't get the idea we're swimming in money," and he plans to eliminate many of the fund-raising dinners "that have been a staple of his campaign appearances. There also is a rumor that he soon will replace his prop-driven DC7 airplane with a speeder prop-jet model.

He also plans to slow the pace of his campaign. Last Friday he completed a fatiguing swing through the Southwest, Midwest and South, and will not resume again until next Friday, when he will embark on a trip through the Northeast, Midwest and Far West.

The secret of Wallace's success has become clear as his traveling road show—complete with a country band and two blonde vocalists—the Taylor Sisters, Mona and Lisa—has wound its way through 31 states. Wallace has demonstrated an acute sense of the fundamental fears and irritations that gnaw at a great many bewildered Americans, and an ability to speak of them in simple, colorful terms. "I reply to them," Wallace said the other night in Florida. "In the words of an old hillbilly song: 'It's too late to ask for forgiveness.'"

## New Move To Block Fortas

WASHINGTON (AP) — Opponents of Abe Fortas' nomination to be chief justice are considering a parliamentary maneuver that could kill the appointment without the bloodletting of a filibuster.

The move would involve a vote to recommit the nomination to the Senate Judiciary Committee. Opponents are counting noses to see if they have the strength.

The move surfaced Monday as one of several developments on the embattled nomination. Majority Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana has said he will take up the big defense appropriation bill before calling up the Fortas nomination.

Word that a move to return the nomination to the Senate Judiciary Committee is under consideration came from Sen. Mark O. Hatfield, R-Ore.

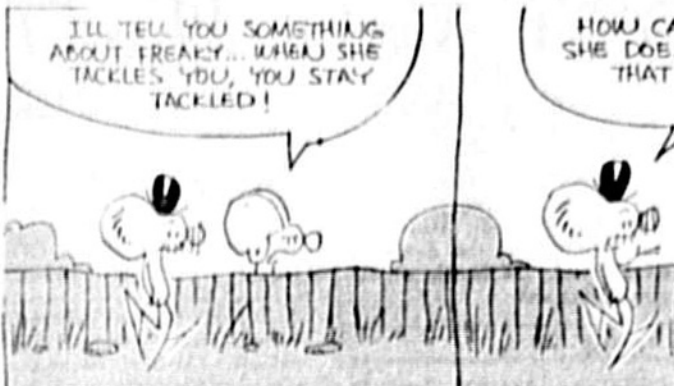

### Gurney Urges Votes For Pueblo

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Rep. Edward Gurney, R-Fla., suggested Monday that absentee ballots be sent to crew members of the Pueblo "so these men can register their feelings about the Johnson-Hurphrey administration."

Gurney, campaigning for the U.S. Senate against former Gov. LeRoy Collins, made the suggestion in Tampa Monday when he addressed a group at a bar.

"I hope and pray with all Americans that the crew, now in its ninth month of captivity, will be released soon," Gurney said. "However, if they are not released, they would relish the opportunity to express their disgust with the administration for not protecting them."

"I am sure they wonder, as do millions of Americans, why the U.S. had only seven out of 51 aircraft in South Korea fact held 56 Russian MIGs. This poor protection for the Pueblo is even more shocking in view of intelligence reports months before its capture that North Korea was plotting some aggressive action."

"It's one thing to send a ship to spy, just as the Russians spy off the U.S. coast, but sending her on a dangerous mission with out being prepared to protect her is gross negligence," Gurney said.

Meanwhile, Collins continued to hit hard at Gurney's Vietnam War policy, saying it would in fact "be the active engagement of the Chinese in a land war."

Gurney's a g g e s t e d seven days ago that the U.S. invade Laos, Cambodia and North Vietnam.

Collins labeled Gurney's war posture as disastrous and said the invasion he suggested would constitute "an act of irresponsibility."

### On Pueblo N. Korea Repeats Demands

TOKYO (AP) — The North Korean Communist party newspaper said today that the 52 crewmen of the Pueblo will never be released unless the U.S. government admits the U.S. Navy ship violated North Korean waters and apologized.

The newspaper, Rodong Shinmun, said the Pueblo crewmen are spies and have to be punished according to North Korean law. But it said they "honestly confessed" their actions and pleaded for leniency, saying they acted under orders.

"In view of these facts," the party organ continued, "it will be possible to send back the crew only when the U.S. government bears responsibility as the organizer of the crime, makes due apology to the government of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea and gives assurance that such crime will never be repeated."

### Russians Demand More Concessions Of Czechs

PRAGUE (AP) — Czechoslovak sources say the Russians have offered to withdraw all but 100,000 of the half a million troops occupying the country if Prague's leaders make more concessions to the Kremlin.

Three Czechoslovak leaders are scheduled to fly to Moscow this week for more negotiations. Sources say the Russians are demanding stricter controls on the Czechoslovak press and the removal of additional figures from Czechoslovak public life.

The latter are believed to include newspaper editors, writers and other persons who were critical of the Soviets before the Aug. 21 invasion.

Three Cabinet members, all key figures in the Czechoslovak liberalization drive, have already given up their posts under Soviet pressure. They are Foreign Minister Jiri Hajek, Deputy Premier Ota Sik and Interior Minister Josef Pavel.

Despite the initial agreement by the Czechoslovak leadership to censor the press, Czechoslovak news media have maintained an unfriendly tone toward the Russians and the other four Warsaw Pact allies, whose troops invaded the country.

Mansfield was forced to adjourn the Senate early Friday when a quorum of 51 members didn't appear on the scene. That's when he called the Senate into session two hours before

## 14 School Guards Approved

Hiring of 14 school crossing guards for the dangerous intersections in the county near schools was authorized by the Board of County Commissioners yesterday afternoon. The Board also agreed to request chiefs of police and the sheriff's department to deputize the guards to give them arrest authority.

The guards to be recommended by the School Board will man their posts 45 minutes in the morning and 45 minutes in the afternoon at schools where single sessions are held while guard hours at double session schools will be set accordingly.

Rate of salary set is \$1600 per hour. Equipment for the guards including vests, gloves and helmets were authorized.

The guards will be located at 14th and Mangousteau for Goldsboro School; 419 and Academy for Jackson Heights School; Sigoo and Milway, Milway School; SR 418, Moore-Wilson School; Sanford — 57th and Park — Onora, Pine Crest; 427 and Market, Rosenwald; 17-22 and 18th Street, Sanford Junior High; Winter Park Drive and Wilshire, South Seminole Junior High and Elementary Schools; Third and French, West Side Grammar; 415 and Sanford, 415 and Magnolia, Southside Grammar; Bear Lake Road and Graves Court, Bear Lake School and 436, Altamonte Elementary. ## County Approves Hwy. Beltline

Resolution requesting the state to consider the inter-county beltline as one of its proposals to the Federal Bureau of Roads for federal funding under the expanded government highway program was adopted by the Board of County Commissioners Tuesday.

The beltline to run around Orlando and extend into Seminole between Longwood and Altamonte Springs, north of Casselberry and close to Goldenrod will be a limited access throughway.

Harlan Hanson, director of the Orange-Seminole-Osceola Planning Commission, recommended the action be taken "to let the state know we are interested in the inter-county beltline."

Hanson said the beltline meets most of the Federal Bureau of Roads criteria and the potential of the highway would be tremendous to Seminole.

Commissioner W. Lawrence Swafford "went along" with the recommendation but noted he didn't "see much advantage in it."

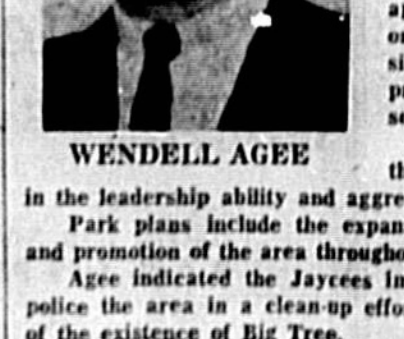

## \$250,000 Shopper Mall Contract Let

Contracts have been signed and work will begin immediately on downtown Sanford's new \$250,000 shopping mall, Sanford Realtor Ernest Southward announced today.

Being built by Russell A. Firestone Jr. Investors, the 14,000 square foot plaza will be located next to the Post Office between Palmetto and Sanford Avenues and will front Commercial Street. Initial plans call for space for from six to eight businesses, according to Southward, who represents Firestone in the deal.

Plans were designed by Eoghan Kelly, local architect, in cooperation with Firestone architects Wong and Tung, of Hong Kong, China.

A small mall will be featured and landscaping will highlight shrubs and a fountain surrounding the entire area. Set-back featuring, giving the mall "the look of tomorrow," will completely hide service area from public view. The mall will run from the spacious parking lot behind the buildings, through the plaza, and front Commercial Street.
