

Be On Guard

As more and more commodities become scarcer or are
prohibited altogether, and as shifts of population occur at
accelerated pace with many new strangers appearing in
various communities throughout the country, the tendency
to break the law, particularly as regards to stealing, will
increase.

Therefore, the public should be on guard more than
usual and should take more than ordinary precaution to
protect property in these unusual times. Things of special
value should be kept well locked and the matter of seeing
to it that homes are shut up tight when the owner is ab-
sent should be of paramount concern.

In this connection, co-operation with the police depart-
ment would be of great importance in curbing any out-
break of thievery or other lawlessness. With its radio
communication system, the local police is equipped to render
unbelievably rapid service in any reported case of law
breaking or emergency.

Many people don't realize that the two-way radio
system on our "prowl" cars makes it possible for the police
department to dispatch one of these units to the scene of
trouble within seconds after a telephone call has been re-
ceived at headquarters. All that is needed to make this
system wonderfully efficient is for the public at large to
take advantage of it by waiting no time in getting to a
telephone when there is trouble.

Very often prompt notification is the all-important
factor which determines whether or not a crime is thwarted
or is solved after it is committed. The matter of a few
minutes might make all the difference in the world, there-
fore a person should use all haste in getting to a telephone
and calling "police station" when he suspects a crime is in
the offing or knows one has been committed.

Homefront Casualty

In recent weeks there have been increasing suspicions
that the apparently urgent Army plans to establish a sub-
sidiary air base at the new Dunnellon airport had fallen
through.

Now those suspicions have been justified with the re-
velation that the Army has dropped original plans of having
a base at which some 3000 men would be located, and now
intends to use the field as little more than an auxiliary,
with perhaps 400 men stationed there.

Just about three months ago it seemed that the project
was at white fever heat, and the Army fellows were de-
manding cooperation from local authorities.

So the local committee hustled to round up the addi-
tional leases from the dozen of widely-scattered property
owners. By the time that was done, the Army fellows had
cooled off on the idea, although there was real speed made
in complying with the request. Now they seem to have
dropped it altogether.

We'll try to be reasonable. We'll realize that a ter-
rible war is on, and in the hurly-burly many errors are
committed. There are casualties of the war on the home-
front as well as elsewhere.

So we'll have to be patriotic, and say, "O. K. Army
fellows. You messed us up badly, but we know you didn't
mean to. However, we hope you treat us better next time."

hoof, which is the way they market it.

Accordingly, they call on Nathan Mayo, Florida's Com-
missioner of Agriculture, to take the matter up with Mr.
Henderson or whoever is the proper authority and find out
whether something can be done about it.

Meat prices have been set by the packers in accordance
with the ceiling established by the price administrator, but
it seems there has been no ruling on what is a fair price
for the producer of meat animals, an oversight that leaves
room for a wide margin.

Since the packers are obviously not operating at a loss,
it is not fair for the industry on which they depend to
operate at a loss and we hope the packers will not stand
aloof but actually co-operate to bring about a better market
for Florida cattle.—Orlando Sentinel

This Price-fixing Out

The Florida Supreme Court has ruled unconstitutional
an act of the Legislature by which the retail price of liquor
in this State was fixed at forty percent above its wholesale
price. But in doing so by a five to two vote the Court
reversed a previous decision which had set the price at
three.

A St. Petersburg drug store brought the suit, which
caused the reversal. It contended that the act was in re-
straint of trade. It desired, apparently, to sell these bev-
erages at less than forty percent profit.

The act apparently was in the interest of wholesale
liquor houses. By the fixing of retail sales prices at a high
rate above wholesale prices, the wholesalers had a better
chance to collect for goods they sold on credit to retailers.—
Bradenton Herald.

FROM COAST TO COAST
In these on the outside looking
in it may seem that a Congress-
man's work is confined to your
own community or county. This
is not true. In fact, we get re-
quests from every section of the
District, from coast to coast and
tip to tip. The interest varies
from a Veteran's claim to pro-
jects in the amount of millions
of dollars. CAMP ROOSEVELT
Just this past week I am glad
that I have been of assistance
to the people of Ocala and the
surrounding section in retaining
the full N.Y.A. program at Camp
Roosevelt, Ocala. The city of
Ocala and Marion County and the
Vocational Education Department
of the state has spent a good
deal of money on this training
program. There was a definite
plan by N.Y.A. officials in the
state to abandon the Camp but
we were finally successful, after
numerous conferences and discus-
sions in retaining the program
there. MARINE BASE—At this
writing there has just been an-
nounced a Marine Glider Base to
be located between Cocoa and
Titusville, Florida, near Indian
River City. There are to be 1500
men and the necessary officers
stationed there and all the neces-
sary buildings constructed and
equipment provided. There are
three of these bases authorized
throughout the United States at
a cost of \$10,000,000 but I have
been reliably informed by the
Navy Department that this one
will probably run as high as
\$5,000,000. There are other pro-
jects throughout my District which
will be announced from time to
time as they materialize and are
approved by the War Relocation
Administration.

RELIEF—WE HOPE—I have
conferred with Mr. Joseph B.
Eastman, Director of the Office
of Defense Transportation, con-
sidering the previous ruling cur-
tailing the operation of trucks
and insisting on full loads on re-
turn trips. This ruling almost
paralyzed transportation in the
State of Florida and certainly
damaged a good many businesses.
When I first urged Mr. Eastman
to relax the regulations he de-
clined to do so, saying that they
could not hear of it, but after a
good deal of argument, and as a
result of communications which he
received, the regulation was final-
ly suspended until July 1st. The
members of the Florida delega-
tion, and for that matter, I sup-
pose all members of Congress
have been pressing Mr. Eastman
to get him to relax these regula-
tions. Of course he will not dis-
close his plans yet, but I believe
with the information that he has

in hand that he will issue a more
liberal ruling before the first of
July. At least we shall do our
best to see that he does.

Sanford Awaits All Day Holiday Party Tomorrow

Big Celebration For "Stay-At-Homes" Features Parade, Speakers, Pageant

Sanford's biggest one-day celebration in years, a "super-magnificent" 16-hour holiday party, consisting of numerous and varied events that will appeal to young, old and otherwise, is set for tomorrow at the lake front.

From 3,000 to 10,000 Seminole County and other Central Florida citizens, according to various estimates, are to put in their appearance at the old fashioned "stay-at-home" party, and it is expected that most everybody will have more fun than they had in previous July 4 trips around the country.

The entire affair, including a gigantic fish fry, is free to all but the public is urged to donate a piece of rubber and metal and also buy a defense stamp. Over 5,000 pounds of fish will be prepared for consumption, it was announced. Coffee will be provided, but the picnic committee, under Chairman Gus Schmalz and Secretary C. R. Dawson has advised the public to "bring your own sugar."

Apparently on the assumption that youth must be served, the first feature of the day is a series of athletic events for girls and boys from six to 17. Races, a tug-of-war and boxing matches will be the main events of the program, which will run from 9:30 A.M. to 10:30 A.M. at the area south of the diamondball field. Those who will participate are asked to meet at the field at 8:00 A.M. by L. J. McLucas, who is in charge of this program.

A monster parade is set on the schedule, with hundreds of people and about 30 airplanes flying part. It will start from the Armory at 11:00 A.M. and run west on First Street, ending up at the rear of the Court House. (Continued on Page Four)
