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Cleanup nets bizarre finds

SANFORD - Volunteers
discovered two phone
booths, a safe, the tail-end of
a car, batteries, a motorcy-
cle, a bathtub, a commercial
washing machine, and many
bottles and cans in the St.
Johns River on Saturday.

"Some of the bottles were
from the nicker pop days,"
Bill Graf, a spokesman for
the St. Johns River Water
Management District, said.
"There's just all kinds of
garbage that's been there for
awhile."

More than 365,000
pounds of trash were picked
up by 5,900 volunteers
during the fourth annual St.
Johns River Cleanup on Sat-
urday.

"There's still tons more
garbage out there," Graf
said. "These rivers shouldn't
be our dumping ground."

Nearly 1,000 people volun-
teered from Seminole
County, compared to 610
county volunteers at last
year's St. Johns River
Cleanup. Volunteers in
Seminole County collected
more than 50,000 pounds of
trash Saturday, compared to
21,000 last year.

Many of the Seminole
County volunteers were Boy
Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cub
Scouts, and Brownie Troops,
ranging in age from six to
16. School, civic and envi-
ronmental groups also par-
ticipated in the cleanup.

"We're trying to focus at-
tention on the problem,"

Graf said, "A six or seven
year old kid can take pride
that they helped clean up
the river, and they will treat
the rivers and lakes and
streams with a lot of re-
spect."

The only down-side to the
large turnout of volunteers
in Seminole County is that
the county will need to spe-
cial order additional T-shirts
for the volunteers, Graf said.

"They were expecting 700
volunteers," said. "Seminole
County far out-stripped their
expectations. Running out
of T-shirts is a good problem
to have."

Volunteers also hand-
pulled thousands of pounds

Majority supports kitchen in historic district

SANFORD - When Commis-
sioner-elect A.A. "Mac" McClan-
ahan takes office April 6, a
majority of the commissioners
will be in support of the res-
taurant/soup kitchen that
Seminole Volunteer Enter-
prises is planning to open in
the historic district.

Commissioners Whitney Eck-
stein and Velma Williams sup-
port plans by Seminole Volun-
teer Enterprises to open a res-
taurant/soup kitchen at 407
W. Fourth Street. Williams,
Eckstein and McClanahan will
form a majority block on the
commission that support the
project.

Eckstein said she supports
Jean Metts, executive director
of Seminole Volunteer Enter-
prises, 100 percent.

"The majority of the people
she helps are in need," Eck-
stein said. "God forbid that
Sanford, The Friendly City,
turn its back on people in the
city who are in need."

McClanahan said he sup-
ports the restaurant/soup
kitchen.

"I don't believe it's creating
the problem," McClanahan
said. "We've got to make sure
there's proper security. Some
people may abuse food pro-
grams, but you can't penalize
90 percent of the people who
need help because some abuse
it."

Metts said she will work
with Sanford police to ensure

Lost man surfaces after canoe trip

LONGWOOD - Seminole
County Sheriff's deputies yester-
day rescued a 47-year-old
man who was lost overnight on
the Little Wekiva River.

"According to sheriff's
spokesperson Deanna Brown,
Roy Edward Bowling went cano-
eering with a female compan-
ion at 11 a.m. Sunday.

Brown said the two had been
drinking at camped their boat
at about 3 p.m. After both
swam safely to shore, the

woman went for help. Bowling
allegedly lost his shoes and
was too intoxicated to hike.

Once reaching the Sabal
Point area of the Little Wekiva
River at 7 p.m., she notified
deputies and the fire depart-
ment that Bowling was still out
on the river.

Brown said that deputies
and the fire department
searched without success until
2:30 a.m., resuming the
search at 6 a.m. Monday. Russ

County expected to Ok \$10,000 for conference center study

SEMINOLE COUNTY - In his
chairman's report today,
Seminole County Commis-
sioner Carlton Henley is ex-
pected to include a \$10,000
proposal for funding of a study
for a city/county conference
center on the Sanford water-
front.

"Our funding the conference
center study is part of a multi-
step process to get all the
numbers needed for a confer-
ence center," Morris said to-
day. "Before spending millions
of dollars, it is prudent to

spend \$10,000 to be certain
about everything."

As far as Morris is con-
cerned, Sanford is the appro-
priate site for the conference
center. Although he had ear-
lier favored an I-4 site in Lake
Mary, he says there is an ad-
vantage to choosing Sanford
because Lake Mary's planned
center is not large enough.

"There are other advantages
to both sides," Morris said.
"But the lake front proposal
meets everyone's needs." The
county is expected to eventu-
ally fund \$400,000 to the
building of the conference
center.

Senator assists with arrest

LONGWOOD - The county's
top lawman got a helping hand
from the state's top lawmaker
on Saturday morning when
Sen. Bob Graham played a key
role in a Longwood heroin ar-
rest.

Donald Patrick Cappetta,
47, 136 Sandallwood Way, was
charged with three counts of
sale of heroin and one count
each of possession with intent
to sell and possession of drug
paraphernalia. Cappetta was
home with his 7-year-old son
when the arrest was made.

Headed by Seminole County
Sheriff Don Eslinger, the City
/ County Investigative Bureau
team included officers from
Sanford, Lake Mary, Winter
Springs, Altamonte Springs,
Casselberry and Longwood.
Sen. Graham rode with the
only two officers identified in
the arrest -- Metro Services
Director Bill Kennedy and
Seminole County Sheriff's Lt.
Sammy Gibson.

The senator, who served on a
search team once the home
was secured and Cappetta
handcuffed, was instrumental
in helping to locate 10 - 15
bundles of heroin pre-
packaged for sale, with an es-
timated value of \$2,000, as
well as syringes (some ready to
use, filled with liquid), spoons,
lighters, tin foil and tie bands
used to consume heroin.

According to the police re-
port, agents also seized Can-
nabis (under 20 grams) and
assorted paraphernalia used to
smoke marijuana -- bong and
rolling papers.

The senator's name was not
used on the assignment list to
avoid his being subpoenaed at

trial. Sen. Graham has worked
344 days in various industries
throughout the state. He be-
gan the workdays during his
run for governor about 20
years ago. He said this was his
30th law enforcement work-
day and an effort to call atten-
tion to the Central Florida
High Intensity Drug Traffick-
ing Agency.

Sen. Graham said that Cap-
peta was more dangerous
than a high-level heroin dealer
because he only sold it to sup-
port his own habit.

"The heroin Cappetta sells is
more pure and undiluted than
most street heroin, making it
every use potentially lethal,"

he said.
Graham cited 50 recent
heroin deaths in this area as
the reason to intensify the ef-
fort. The senator took time
following the search to speak
with Cappetta's neighbors and
ally their concerns.

According to neighbor Mi-
chael Weiss, who lives diagon-
ally behind Cappetta's San-
dallwood Way home, the fam-
ily's troubles run deeper than
this most recent arrest. Cap-
peta's wife Diane is allegedly
serving time herself.

According to Deanna Brown,
the sheriff's public information

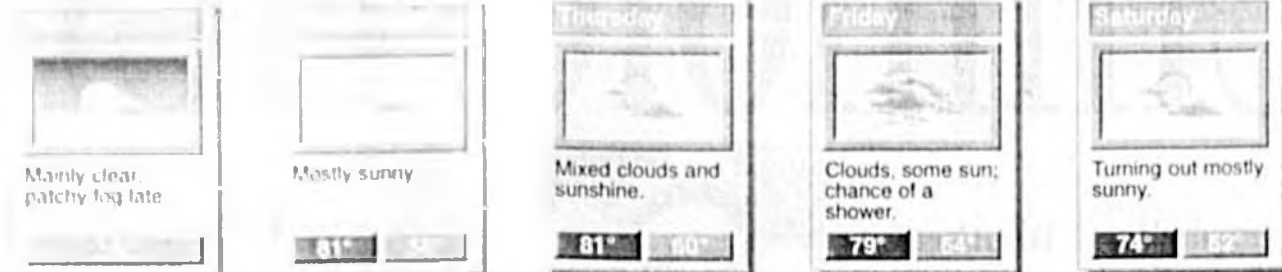

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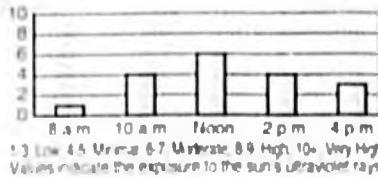

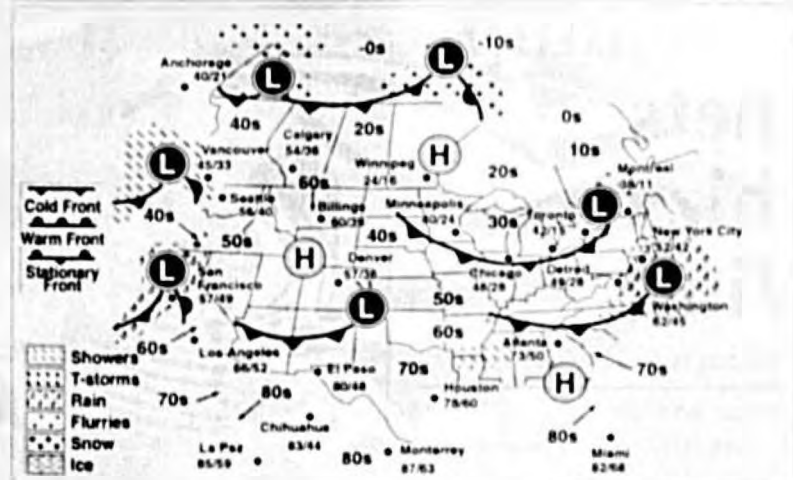

Brown said that because he provided fictitious information to the deputies, Bowling was charged with Obstruction by Disguise and with Possession of Stolen Credit Cards. Both charges are misdemeanors.

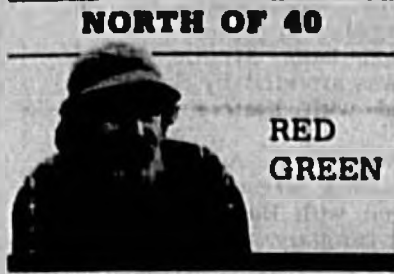

Now, most guys our age get glasses, but I say don't do it. Deteriorating eyesight is part of the master plan. Mother Nature is smart. She knows that at our age we're a lot happier not knowing exactly how we look. They say your eyes are the window to your mind — if your eyes are gone, there's a pretty good chance your brain is shot, too. So let the eyes go. that the program does not foster crime.

Williams said she is concerned about the "strained relationship developing between the haves and the have-nots" over the kitchen. She said 30-35 percent of the people in Sanford "are representative of the people who would be helped" by the kitchen.

Mayor Larry Dale said re-vamping zoning regulations is the only way the city can effect the plans by Seminole Volunteer Enterprises to open the kitchen.

Dale said he is concerned that the kitchen would attract people who are in need from outside the city.

"I'm all for tending to the poor," Dale said. "But, we can not become the master-provider for the county."

Sanford officials are moving

forward with plans to overhaul city-wide zoning regulations, including those regulating restaurants in the historic district. City Manager Tony VanDerworp said the commission will discuss zoning regulations May 10.

Seven historic district residents told the commission one month ago they would fight against the opening of the kitchen, saying it would attract crime and vagrancy. They said the kitchen would lower property values in the historic district.

Sanford resident Dorian Freeman said she has not seen "vagrants running around or people urinating in the streets" at Seminole Volunteer Enterprises, as the historic district residents alleged last month.

"They have done a fabulous job with that establishment,"

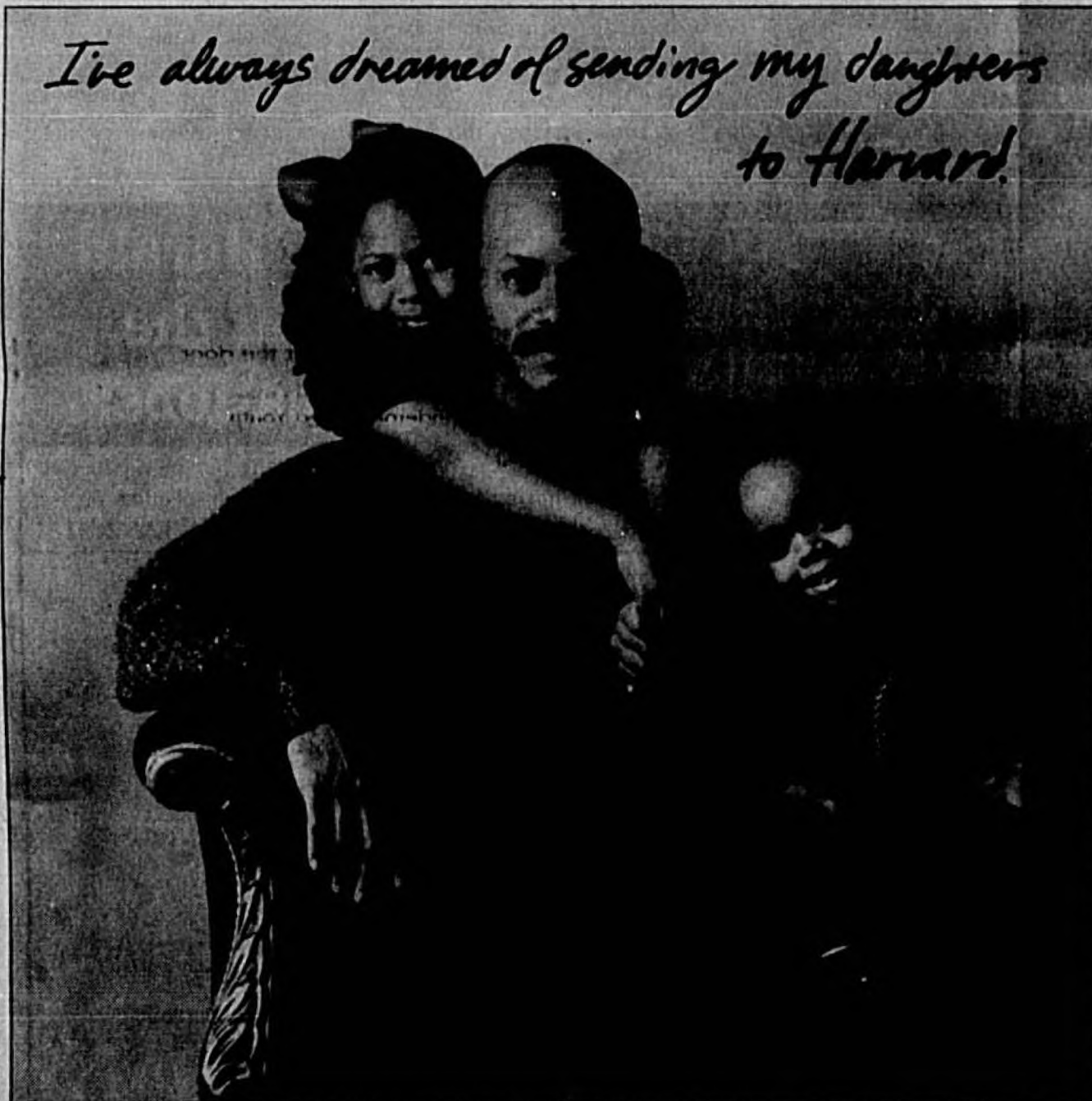
Freeman said of the programs at Seminole Volunteer Enterprises.

Commissioner Brady Lessard has been the commission's most outspoken opponent of the kitchen. He said the "type of assistance" given in a soup kitchen "perpetuates poverty and hunger and ignorance." Eckstein and Williams disagreed with Lessard.

"I think it does more harm than good," Lessard said. "Some of the people in Sanford, including myself, have trouble with supporting these types of programs that have not been proven to work."

Lessard said that education is the key to solving the city's poverty problem.

Sanford resident Art Harris said 10-15 percent of the city's residents are a paycheck away from being homeless.



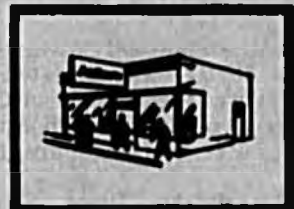

Mount Dora
springs a leak

Mount Dora is supposed to be different than the bigger Florida towns - safely removed from urban rage and danger.

A village of quaint shops and restaurants. An enchanting escape each year for thousands and thousands of art and antique lovers who view the exhibits and breathe in the fresh air. There's an old-fashioned trolley that takes you around the town and along the waterfront.

But recently, the quiet splendor that was Mount Dora's has been violated. Pleasantville has become nightmare village.

Mount Dora is weeping - her heart being broken by a sequence of violent crimes that have residents living in unexpected terror and the town's law enforcement agency distraught.

On Saturday, an Umatilla man shot and killed one bank teller and critically wounded another at United Southern Bank of Mount Dora. The second teller, a 25-year-old woman, underwent 4 1/2 hours of surgery Saturday and probably will be paralyzed the rest of her life.

Fred Anderson, Jr., 30, ordered the tellers into a vault, filled a wastepaper basket full of cash and shot the women with a 22-caliber revolver. The Mount Dora Police responded quickly, proficiently. Anderson was nabbed.

No one knows where or when the next call will be, however. The bank tellers had no idea that Saturday would be so bloody. Either did a race-walker who was stabbed a few months ago or an 85-year-old man killed inside his Mount Dora home.

Why Mount Dora? Perhaps because it was the last likely of places one would expect to be riddled by violent crime. A piece of cake for thugs with revolvers or knives. As if a sign outside the village read: Welcome Muggers. And another reading: We Have No Police Chief.

A few weeks ago, the city manager fired the police chief a few weeks ago. She said the department was being run poorly and that morale was low.

On Saturday, one of the Mount Dora cops who arrested Fred Anderson, Jr., was in tears. He risked his life doing a good job to nab the bad guy. But he wept for the teller who died and the one who was taken to the hospital.

That's the way it is in a small town like Mount Dora, where community cops know the residents, the bank tellers, waitresses, and folks they see everyday and expect to see tomorrow.

Sanford's Acting Police Chief Ray Bronson went to Mount Dora High School and recalls when the town was less spread out. The high school was in the downtown area. The bank that was hit Saturday is in a shopping center off U.S. Highway 441.

"Mount Dora was just a small bedroom community for so long," Bronson said. "But it recent years it has annexed out and become susceptible to crime."

"It is difficult to see tragedies like what happened Saturday," Bronson said. "We just had one here in Sanford - we saw a 13-year-old girl who was murdered. You sit down and cry when it happens. You get the one who did it and pray it doesn't happen again."

Mount Dora is a 45-minute drive from Sanford, an hour or less from anywhere in Seminole County. Hundreds of county residents go to Mount Dora on the weekend, visiting Renningers Flea Market off U.S. Highway 441 or going into the town itself for lunch or a stroll.

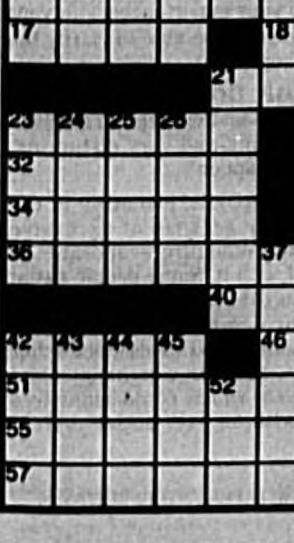

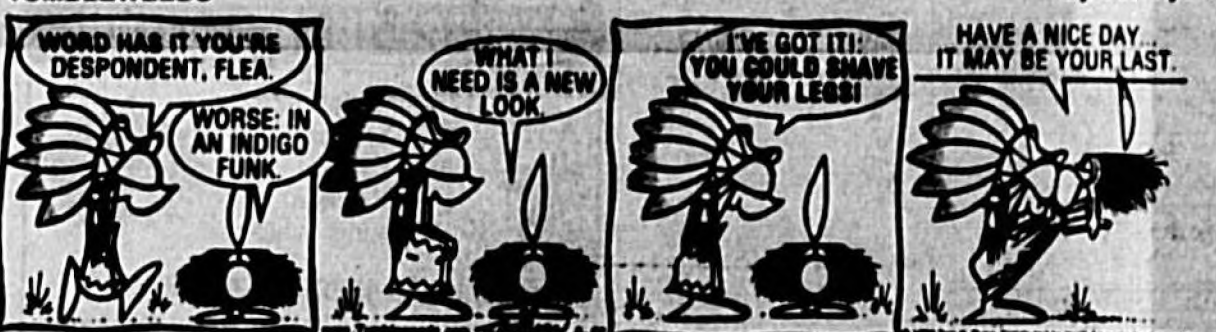

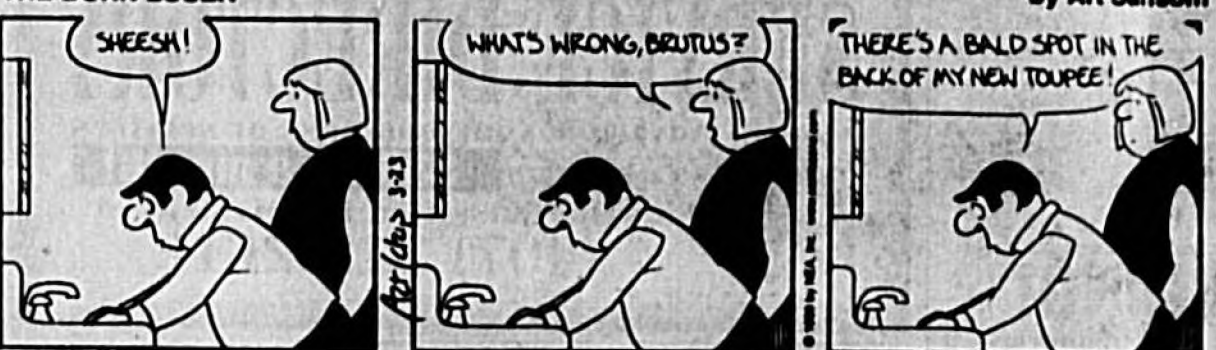

WIN AT BRIDGE

Keep counting those tricks

W.R. Inge, once dean of St. Paul's in London, wasn't afraid to voice opinions outside those theological. For example, he commented, "Democracy is only an experiment in government, and it has the obvious disadvantage of merely counting votes instead of weighing them." It is true that some people have a much better idea of the policies of the political parties than others. But would Inge have really approved making some of the electorate's opinions worth more votes than others?

At the bridge table, though, it is easy to see how some players' counting weighs more heavily on the results than others'. If you count a lot, you will be a winner; if you don't, you won't. Take this deal, which occurred during

a tournament in Santa Fe, New Mexico. How would you try to make three no-trump? West leads a spade to East's ace, and a spade comes back.

North's three-club rebid could backfire, but it is hard to do less with such a strong hand.

Did you play a heart at trick three? If so, you might go down. West will duck the first heart, win the second, and shove you into the dummy with a diamond. The opponents will get one spade, one heart, one diamond and two clubs. (Yes, after the heart queen wins, you can cash dummy's minor-suit tops before playing the second heart, end-playing West, but would you?)

Much better is to play four rounds of diamonds immediately. East switches to a club (best). You win with dummy's king and overtake the heart queen with your king, forcing a hand entry to your second spade trick. You end with two spades, one heart, four diamonds and two clubs.

ASK DR. GOTT

Will non-alcoholic beer cause a belly?

DEAR DR. GOTT: I read your column concerning a beer belly being a sign of cirrhosis of the liver. Does alcohol-free beer cause the same health problems as real beer, and is it as fattening?

DEAR READER: Beer (and other alcohol-containing beverages) provide unnecessary calories that often cause a prominent or protuberant abdomen. In addition, regular consumption of alcohol causes liver swelling, due to the build-up of fat in that organ. Eventually, the excess fat deposits lead to liver-scarring (cirrhosis), which is a serious and common consequence of over-indulgence.

To my knowledge, alcohol-free beer does not cause health problems, cirrhosis or a beer belly. This beverage is safe, providing it is consumed in moderation.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 80 and would like to know how Fosamax reacts. Two years ago I had an operation because of spinal stenosis. It left my left leg and both feet with a frozen feeling and fatigue. I took Fosamax with the calcium you said to take and I feel so strong I put my cane away. My doctor gave me the prescription but won't answer my questions.

DEAR READER: I can't explain this series of events. Fosamax (along with calcium/vitamin D supplements) is the most effective antidote for osteoporosis, an age-related affliction marked by loss of bone-calcium and the risk of compression fractures. The

medicine should have no effect whatsoever on spinal stenosis, pressure on the spinal cord from arthritic spurs or a herniated disc.

I suspect that your operation was a success and that your symptoms cleared up because of the surgery, not the Fosamax. Nonetheless, your doctor must have prescribed the drug because of osteoporosis. Because it is obviously helping you, continue it — and share your experiences with your doctor, who may be able to clarify the issue further.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I perspire profusely whenever I exercise. The problem is irritating and very disturbing. Why does it happen?

DEAR READER: Sweating is the way the body gets rid of excessive heat: As the moisture evaporates, it takes heat with it. Some people sweat more than others. This is a normal physiological variation. Don't worry about it, unless you experience other symptoms, such as weight loss and nervousness, which could indicate a problem with an over-active thyroid gland.
