

# Cleanup nets bizarre finds

SANFORD . Volunteers discovered two phone booths, a safe, the tail-end of a car, batteries, a motorcy-cle, a bathtub, a commercial washing machine, and many bottles and cans in the St. Johns River on Saturday.

"Some of the bottles were from the nickle pop days," Bill Graf, a spokesman for the St. Johns River Water Management District, said. "There's just all kinds of garbage that's been there for awhile."

365,000 More than pounds of trash were picked up by 5,900 volunteers during the fourth annual St. Johns River Cleanup on Saturday.


"There's still tons more garbage out there," Graf said. "These rivers shouldn't

be our dumping ground." Nearly 1,000 people volun-County, compared to 610 volunteers at last county year's St. Johns River Cleanup. Volunteers in Seminole County collected more than 50,000 pounds of trash Saturday, compared to 21,000 last year. Graf said. "A six or seven year old kid can take pride that they helped clean up the river, and they will treat the rivers and lakes and streams with a lot of respect." The only down-side to the large turnout of volunteers in Seminole County is that the county will need to spe-cial order additional T-shirts for the volunteers, Graf said. "They were expecting 700 volunteers,", said. "Seminole County far out-stripped their expectations. Running out of T-shirts is a good problem to have."

Mount Dora is supposed to be different than the bigger Florida towns - safely re-moved from urban rage and danger.

A village of quaint shops and restaurants.

An enchanting escape each year for thousands and thousands of art and antique lovers who view the exhibits and breathe in the fresh air. There's an old-fashioned trolley that takes you around the town and along the wa-


terfront. But recently, the quiet splendor that was Mount Dora's has been violated. Pleasantville has become

nightmare village. Mount Dora is weeping -her heart being broken by a sequence of violent crimes that have residents living in unexpected terror and the town's law enforcement

agency distraught. On Saturday, an Umatilla man shot and killed one bank teller and critically wounded another at United Southern Bank of Mount Dora. The second teller, a 25-year-old woman, underwent 4 1/2 hours of surgery Saturday and probably will be paralyzed the rest of her life.

Fred Anderson, Jr., 30, ordered the tellers into a vault, filled a wastepaper basket full of cash and shot the women with a 22-caliber revolver. The Mount Dora Police responded quickly, proficiently. Anderson was nabbed.

No one knows where or when the next call will be, however. The bank tellers had no idea that Saturday would be so bloody. Either did a race-walker who was stabbed a few months ago or an 85-year-old man killed inside his Mount Dora home. Why Mount Dora? Perhaps because it was the past likely of places one rould expect to be riddled

hospital. That's the way it is in a small town like Mount Dora, where community cops know the residents, the bank tellers, waitresses, and folks they see everyday and expect to see tomorrow. Sanford's Acting Police

Chief Ray Bronson went to Mount Dora High School and recalls when the town was less spread out, The high school was in the downtown area. The bank that was hit Saturday is in a shopping center off U.S. Highway 441.

"Mount Dora was just a small bedroom community for so long." Bronson said. "But it recent years it has annexed out and become susceptible to crime.

"It is difficult to see tragedies like what happened Saturday," Bronson said. "We just had one here in Sanford - we saw a 13-year-old girl who was murdered. You sit down and cry when it happens. You get the one

who did it and pray it doesn't happen again." Mount Dora is a 45-minute drive from Sanford, an hour or less from any-

# It's time for landscape spring cleaning

At last!...The weather has warmed enough to venture outdoors without being cocooned in several layers of winter wear. That means, 'tis the season to prepare for another great gardening year. So, stretch those muscles, and clean and sharpen your gardening tools. Because, for a beautiful garden, we need to get started on a few simple tasks.

The first assignment at hand is to prune dead and/or damaged wood from ornamental shrubs and trees. Also trim back and thin out the branches of summer blooming shrubs to improve the plant's shape and flowering. Wait until after flowering to do any extensive trimming of spring flowering shrubs and trees.

It may not seem that insects are active, but if pests such as scale insects infested ornamental plants or fruit trees last year, apply a dormant oil spray now for scale control. Read and follow all label instructions when applying the product.

Next, clean out all the dead growth of perennials and grasses before their new growth emerges. Then dig, divide and replant summer and fall blooming perennials. But, before you reset them in the flower bed, take the opportu-

nity to work the soll and add compost or other organic matter to it. This improves the soil's ability to hold water and nutrients, and helps the plants develop stronger root systems. As you clean plant beds, be sure to remove all weeds and gradually clean-out old mulch. leaves and other winter debris. Refresh the beds with new mulch and add the debris and old mulch to the compost pile.

Early spring, while the plants are still dormant, is a good time to transplant ornamentals or install new bareroot plants. Be sure to soak the root system of bareroot plants a few hours before setting them out. If late season cold weather is forecast before you have a chance to do this, "heelin" the plants in soil or moist sawdust in a protected location, until you can work

the soil and install them in the landscape. Be sure when planting or transplanting a plant that you trim damaged roots and loosen the soil where it will be placed. Also, set it so that its crown is no deeper in the soil than it was originally. Setting a plant too deeply in the ground is certain death.

Now that the plant beds have been tidled, freshen up edges between them and turf areas. And, speaking of the lawn, once the turf shows its new spring growth, it's time to rake out old grass clippings if they have built up excessively in the turf. Don't remove all the clippings, though, because this would expose weed seeds, which will certainly use this as an opportunity to grow. Add any clippings removed to the compost pile. Once the cleanup is done, fertilize the lawn with a fertilizer product containing at least 25 percent slow-release nitrogen. If weeds have been a problem, use a weed and feed product containing a preemergent herbicide for crabgrass and annual weed control or purchase the herbicide product and apply it separately.

Sorry, we're not quite done...If you've decided to add a new plant bed to the landscape, it's time to prepare the soil. Once the soil is dry enough to work without exces-

sive clumping, till it several times to a depth of 6 to 8 inches, After the soil has been tilled, it seems you're ready to plant. But, hold on a minute --Arst check the soll pH and add organic matter to the soil.

Most plants grow well within a pH range of 5.0 to 6.5. If the soil pH is too low, add agricultural or dolomitic limestone to raise it. Use 4 to 5 pounds per 100 square feet for sandy soils and 5 to 6 pounds per 100 square feet for loamy soils. In instances where the soil pH is too high, add 1 pound fine sulfur per 100 square feet to lower the soil pli. (Organic matter is the best means to gradually lower soil pH. though). Spread the material evenly over the new bed area and till to a depth of 6 to 8 inches. It will take a few months for the lime or sulfur to fully work, but the soil pH will start to increase/decrease in about eight weeks.


Whether your soil is sandy or clayey, use organic matter to improve the soil. Organic matter helps sandy soils retain motsture and nutrients, but also acrates clay soils which prevents soil compaction and Improves drainage. About eight weeks before planting, apread four to eight inches of compost, composted manure or a similar product over the plant beds and till to a depth of 8 inches.
