

# U.S. Jobless Rate Rises To 10.4 Percent

For the second month in a row, the unemployment rate has topped 10 percent of the national work force. The seasonally adjusted October rate is the highest since 1910, but still far short of the record rates posted in the Depression racked mid-200s. Rates for 1929-46 are based on all working Americans 14 and older, Since 1947, only those 16 and over have been coun-

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Unemployment shot up three-tenths of a percentage point in October to a new post-Depression high of 10.4 percent, the Labor Department reported today, with another 290,000 workers added to the jobless rolls during the month.

The number of persons officially out of a job in October rose to 11.6 million, the Bureau of Labor Statistics said, while total employment declined during the month by 630,000 to 99.1 million.

The report marked the worse jobless situation in the United States in 42 years

The unemployment increase occurred in all categories except for black workers. That category remained at a record 20.2 percent rate. Joblessness in the construction industry con-

tinued to rise, increasing slightly to 23 percent. The seasonally adjusted 10.4 percent rate,

reflected an over-the-month increase of 0.3 percentage points, and is the highest since 1940, when the annual average rate was 14.6 percent. The all-time high was 24.9 percent in 1933, during

the heart of the Great Depression.

Bureau Commissioner Janet Norwood, in remarks prepared for a congressional Joint Economic Committee hearing, said "the employment situation deteriorated further" during the month, noting that because of a turnover in jobs,

# Florida Jobless Rate Jumps Up To 8.7%

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Florida's unemployment rate jumped to 8.7 percent last month, better than a percentage point increase over September and the highest level in six months.

The Department of Commerce released October unemployment figures today. There was no immediate explanation for the rate jump, but an analysis of the situation will be released later today.

Florida still fared better than the country as a whole. The national jobless rate for October was 10.4 percent, another record as national unemployment continued at a post-World War II high.

The Florida rate has changed slightly one way or another in recent months, but it remained below 8 percent until last month. It was 7.7 percent in August, 7.3 percent in July, 7.5 percent in June, 7.9 percent in May, 8.7 in April, 8.9 in March, 7.3 in February, and 7.4 in January.

While the U.S. unemployment rate continues upward, the Seminole County jobless rate has continued to hold at a low point.

The Seminole jobless rate for both August and September remained 5.8 percent. These are the most recent jobless records. The Orange County jobless rate for September was 7.4 percent and the rate for the same month for Osceola County was 7.8 percent.

# LM Cemetery Issue Back Up

Pat Southward was sworn in as an interim Lake Mary City Council member Thursday night and immediately began a change of direction in city priorities.

Mrs. Southward and Cliff Nelson, who are previous two and three-year council veterans, respectively, were appointed to replace resigned councilmen Gene McDonald and Vic Olvera until newly elected officials take office in early January.

Mrs. Southward, appealing to her new council colleagues, got a change of heart on an earlier position about whether the city should take over operation of a privately owned 88-yearold city cemetery in the city. She asked for a report from City Manager Phil Kulbes on the adequacy of the city's water system. She also gained approval to spend \$500 to replace the roof on the shelter at Crystal Lake beach.

Mrs. Southward urged that the Lake mary Cemetery Association be invited back before the council at its Nov. 18 meeting to discuss a possible city takeover of the historic twoacre cemetery east of the railroad tracks at Palmetto Avenue and Lake Mary Road.

The officers of the cemetery association in August asked the city to take over maintenance of the cemetery and promised to turn over to the city about \$16,000 in an interest bearing account along with title to the property.

At that time, however, McDonald with support from Councilmen Richard Fess and Ken King said erosion of capital would mean that eventually the maintenance costs would become a city responsibility. Fess said at the time the maintenance of the cemetery could become a nightmare. It would take too many man hours and cost too much money, he said. Asked if the cemetery would be a liability to the city, City

Attorney Robert Petrce said at the time that anything owned by the city could be a liability.

Councilmen Ray Fox and Olvera and Mayor Walter Sorenson favored the cemetery takeover to "preserve the city's roots."

Mrs. Southward said Thursday night she was "surprised and appalled" at the city's response to the cemetery association. She said the cemetery along with the old building refurbished as a city hall and the city's volunteer fire department are very important to long time citizens of the community.

She urged residents of the city, who have strong feelings on the issue, to attend the Nov. 18 council meeting.

Kulbes said he will have a preliminary report available to the council by the Nov. 18 meeting and he was given 60 days to provide a complete report.

Many pioneer families of the city are buried at the cemetery. Spokesmen for the association said the interest from the account would be enough to pay for the maintenance.

The work on the shelter roof is to begin immediately. Mrs. Southward said its condition represents a hazard.



are best left unsaid." The issue began when Whigham, representing client William Brown in an appeal from a Board of Adjustment decision denying Brown the right to keep a mobile home on a six-acre tract off Wood Street, told

the council what he had found in his research. Whigham of the Stenstrom law firm in Sanford said he found that for 20 days in August 1973 the city had no zoning ordinance. During that period any use of land which existed was "grandfathered" - considered legal despite any zoning regulations passed thereafter, he said.

Whigham added a zoning ordinance patterned after Seminole County's zoning law was adopted 20 days later, but the adoption may have been in violation of the city charter which requires that such an ordinance be posted at city hall for 30 days prior to adoption.


Thus Whigham believes the ordinance was not properly adopted.

Whigham showed that Brown's mobile home was on the property in 1969 by using aerial photographs. But he added that the county has no official records to show that the trailer was legally placed on the property to begin with.

Councilman Ray Fox said that everytime anyone goes to the county for copies of records, such as these, none seem to exist.

"The county's been in existence a number of years and I'm astounded at the lack of recordkeeping at our grand edifice (the courthouse)," he said.

"I don't like this," Fox added. The whole issue about mobile homes in the city began early this year when City Manager Phil Kulbes discovered numerous trailers

parked on several small tracts off Humphrey

It was noted at the time that single mobile homes were permitted in Lake Mary at that time only on agriculturally zoned parcels of 10 acres or more and within zoned mobile home parks. Thus those trailers and a number of others in the city were illegally placed on property and would have to be moved unless they were there before the city was incorporated and with approval of county authorities.

The council's response to the problem was to adopt an ordinance repealing the 10-acre spots in agricultural zoning as sites for mobile homes, allowing the trailers to continue in mobile home parks.

The council also decided to determine on a case-by-case basis if other mobile homes had been grandfathered in by virtue of their existence prior to city incorporation.

Kulbes was instructed to document mobile homes existing in other than mobile home

park zoned areas. Brown's trailer was found in the process.

The continued location of Brown's trailer on Wood Road was approved unanimously by the council last night. But he was warned that the trailer can not be replaced.

SLICK JOB

# Illinois' Next Governor Is...Still Undetermined

CHICAGO (UPI)-GOP Gov. James Thompson and Democrat Adiai E. Stevenson III both claim victory, but Illinois' razor-thin gubernatorial race-marred by soggy ballots, computer hangups and other problemstoday remained unresolved.

Votes were tallied through the night from more than 100 precincts. A tally was expected sometime today showing-unofficially-who will be the state's next governor. Regardless what the figures are, however, a recount and a court fight seem likely.

Incomplete returns tallied by the News Election Service had Stevenson with a less than 1 percent lead -1,777,785 to 1,774,227, a margin of 3,558 votes. But Thompson said his figures showed him 171 votes ahead.

### Goldwater Doing Fine

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI)-Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., was in "excellent condition" following successful triple-bypass heart surgery and should be out of bed and walking around today, his doctor said.

Goldwater, 73, underwent 90 minutes of surgery Thursday at St. Joseph's Hospital. Dr. Ted Diethrich, president of Arizona Heart Institute who preformed the surgery, said the three blocked coronary arteries caused no muscle or heart damage and Goldwater probably would be released within seven to 10 days.

Goldwater, known as one of the nation's leading conservatives, had no history of heart problems, said Diethrich who discovered the blocked arteries during a routine examination this week.

# Former Hostages Sue U.S.

WASHINTON (UPI) - Three years after Moslem militants stormed the U.S. Embassy in Iran, 10 American citizens taken hostage or forced into hiding in Tehran are suing their own government for \$100

It is the first time the U.S. government has been sued by any of the 66 hostages taken captive on Nov. 4, 1979. The suit was filed in the U.S. Court of Claims Thursday - the third anniversary of the embassy seizure - by seven hostages who were released after two weeks of captivity and three embassy staff members, who hid for three months at the Canadian Embassy in Tehran before escaping Iran.

The claim seeks \$10 million for each.

# But Prices Fall

# Wall Street Trading Sets New Record



NEW YORK (UPI) - Wall Street, boosted by Wednesday's record Dow Jones industrial average, had its busiest day in history but prices plunged as many investors cashed in on huge profits made in the three-month rally.

With the Labor Department scheduled to report on October's unemployment rate - expected to be higher than September's 10.1 percent - and the Federal Reserve preparing money supply figures, trading was likely to be restrained in today's

The Dow, which soared a record 43.41 points Wednesday to an all-time high of 1,065.49, skidded 15.27 to 1,050.22 Thursday in a late selloff.

Several analysts said profit-taking was not surprising since the closely followed average, which Wednesday eclipsed its old peak of 1,051.70 set Jan. 11, 1973, had gained 73.77 points in the previous three sessions.

Thursday's New York Stock Exchange volume climbed to a record 149,350,000 shares from 137,010,000 traded Wednesday. topping the old mark of 147,081,070 traded Oct. 7.

"This was a normal retreat since the Dow had gained 73.77 points in the previous three sessions," said Newton Zinder, E.F. Hutton vice president. "I think things will cool down for

"This has been a market of surprises and this was one of them," said Trude Latimer, Evans & Co. analyst. "The day was disappointing from the start when institutions didn't do the buying everybody had expected."

The market has rallied this week on investor belief the Federal Reserve would cut its discount rate since the economy remains mired in recession.

Donald Maude, a policy committee chairman at Merrill Lynch, predicted interest rates would decline in the near future and the Fed would ease credit conditions to foster an economic recovery.

Treasury Secretary Donald T. Regan said "American corporations are still undervalued" by securities markets despite the historic rally that began in mid-August and drove the Dow up 288.57 points.

Regan also suggested election results - in which the Republicans here antrol of the Senate but lost ground in the House - might make the administration more willing to compromise in the future.

Leland Prussia. Bankamerica chairman, said the economy may have made a bottom in the recession but it will remain sluggish well into 1983.

# **Husband Consultation Law** Is Ruled Unconstitutional

MIAMI (UPI) - A federal judge has ruled for a second time that a Florida law requiring a woman to consult her husband before having an abortion is unconstitutional.

U.S. District Judge Sidney M. Aronovitz ruled Thursday that the husband consultation requirement in Florida's 3-year-old abortlon law is an invasion of a woman's privacy.

It was the second time Aronovitz has ruled on a class action suit filed in 1979 by Broward County obstetrician Dr. Mark Scheinberg. In December 1979, he struck down a section of the law requiring the consent of parents or a judge for a minor to have an abortion. He also ruled at that time against the husband's consultation provision, but the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals sent that part of his ruling back for review.

### \$100,000 Herpes Suit Filed

FORT LAUDERDALE (UPI) - A 24-year-old woman who "didn't consent to catching a disease" from a man she slept with has sued him for \$100,000 for giving her herpes, the incurable venereal disease, her attorney said.

Susan Liptrot, of Fort Lauderdale, claims that her paramour assured her he was disease free before the two had sex, according to Ms. Liptrot's attorney, Terri-Ann Miller, Instead, Ms. Liptrot became a victim of "herpes fraud," contracting the painful virus, she said. According to the Herpes Resources Center in Palo

Alto, Calif., Ms. Liptrot's suit is the first herpes damage suit ever filed between an unmarried couple. A 50-year-old woman in North Carolina has sued her husband for \$3 million for allegedly giving her the

# Judge Fines City \$10,000

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) - The city of Jacksonville must pay \$10,000 because its jail population slipped past a court-ordered 418-inmate limit twice this fall, a federal judge has ruled.

City officials have not said whether they will appeal the ruling. The fines are due by Nov. 15.

# **Double Taxation Study** Now In Its Final Phase

municipalities and County Administrator Roger Neiswender are scheduled to conclude discussions on double taxation with two final meetings - Wednesday and Nov. 17

Then it will be decision time. The cities will decide whether they want to take the issue to court and the county will decide whether it wishes to avoid a legal battle and compromise.

The courts have ruled that double taxation occurs when city residents must pay the county taxes for which they receive no substantial benefits.

# New Tamper-Resistant Packaging Required

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The government said Thursday it will require non-prescription capsules and most liquid drugs such as eye drops to have tamper-resistant packaging within 90 days, adding one or two cents to the cost of each product.

The regulations, a result of the murders of seven Chicagoarea people by cyanide-laced Tylenol capsules, will give manufacturers a choice of packaging techniques such as seals, shrink bands and bubble or strip packs.

But within 180 days, packages must also have a distinctive and hard-to-duplicate design around the seal, and a prominently displayed warning that the product should not be

purchased or used unless the package is intact.

The drugs required to have more secure packaging within 90 days include oral, vaginal, rectal, eye and nose drugs. These include capsules, nose drops and eye drops.

In 180 days, tablets and suppositories will be required to have tamper-resistant packaging. Officials said the delay will ensure that more susceptible products are given first priority in the push for tamper-resistant packaging

The rules will not apply to foods or products applied to the

In 15 months, officials said, no over-the-counter drug may be

sold without tamper-resistant packaging. Health and Human Services Secretary Richard Schweiker said some improved packages could be on the shelves within a week or two-

"It isn't fool-proof," Schweiker said. "We don't want to oversell it. We greatly lower the odds of doing it. ... It will significantly decrease the ability to fabricate or duplicate or open a package and not be detected."

The government estimates the new packaging will cost consumers one or two cents per package, for an industry-wide cost of \$20 million to \$40 million. The rules affect an estimated 2 billion packages a year.

# Supreme Court Considering **Casselberry Track Conversion**

the constitutionality of the 1980 bill which allowed the conversion of a Casselberry harness track to a greyhound racing facility. Final arguments were made before the court Thursday. It is not known when the justices will rule on the case.

Lawyers for the state and the Seminole Greyhound Park are seeking to have overturned rulings by the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals and Seminole Circuit Court Judge Kenneth Leffler who said that the conversion was unconstitutional.

The ruling was based on the grounds that the conversion violated state laws governing the proximity of pari-mutuel facilities and usurped the duties and privileges of both the state Division of Pari-Mutuels and the Commission on Pari-Mutuel Wagering. In his decision, Leffler said that the state should not have granted Seminole Greyhound Park racing dates because state law specifies that racing parks must be located 100 miles apart.

The Daytona Beach Kennel Club is only about 50 miles from the Casselberry track and the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club in Longwood is only two miles away.

The bill that allowed conversion of the track

The Florida Supreme Court is considering was sponsored by State Rep. Robert Hattaway, D-Altamonte Springs, and was pushed through the House in the final days of the 1980 session. Since that time, the conversion has been challenged by several other dog tracks in the state and the track has been embroiled in troubles since its first racing season.

Seminole Greyhound Park owners Bill Demetree, of Orlando, and his brother, Jack, of Jacksonville, were represented before the state Supreme Court by attorney Barry Richard who argued that the conversion bill was properly adopted as a general bill because it potentially could apply to all harness tracks in the state.

J. Kermit Coble, who represented the Daytona Beach dog track, said the bill should have been adopted as a local bill, which would have required advance public notice or a referendum. Even than it would have been unconstitutional, attorneys argued, because it would have granted special privileges to a private corporation and would regulate a business already regulated by a state agency.

Richard argued that there was an overriding public concern in converting the track quickly from a money-loser to one that made the state millions in gambling and tax revenue.

# Vietnam Vet Takes Life **During Own Private War**

OCALA (UPI) - Stanley Moody, clad in khaki combat fatigues and armed with bayonet-tipped rifles, bolted from his house into the warm Florida night mumbling something about stopping the Viet Cong.

An hour later, after a one-man gun battle under a bright full moon, police found the exsoldier's body lying in the grass beneath a Nagpole.


The 38-year-old father of two, described as "one of the happiest and most patriotic guys around" had killed himself with a shot to the head, authorities said Thursday.

Ocala resident Larry Larson, 37, heard shots as he drove past the grassy clearing near the Salt Springs community in the Ocala National

Forest about 11:30 Wednesday night. Larson stopped to investigate and a stray bullet pierced his leg.

"He wound up getting shot, but not seriously wounded," Marion County Sheriff's investigator Leo Smith said. "Stanley wasn't shooting at anything in particular. He was just having his own war."

The veteran of two tours with the American Special Forces in Vietnam suffered occasional spells in which he would don his uniform, smear his face with camouflage paint, grab his guns and talk as though he were stalking the enemy through steamy jungles back in Southeast Asia.

# Yale's Gag Rule For Conservatives

The liberal cultural monopoly which holds power in the American academic community can't stand any challenge to its power. It is all for first amendment rights, unless those who assert those rights happen to be conservatives.

This is what's happening at Yale University, the prestigious Ivy League institution which affords room for all points of view providing those points of view are liberal-to-radical. Yale is now saying in effect that no conservatives' voices are to be allowed on campus.

Evidence of this appeared when the powers that be at Yale decided to promulgate a new set of regulations designed to silence The Yale Literary Magazine, edited by Andrei Navrozov. This splendid journal, which features the writings of some of America's most distinguished authors, is unacceptable to the liberal monopolists in the Yale faculty and administration because it is conservative in character. The magazine criticizes the liberal orthodoxy in American intellectual life.

Liberal and radical faculty members apparently are most offended by the fact that Mr. Navrozov, a 1978 graduate of Yale University, publishes the writings of his father, Lev Navrozov, a brilliant writer and translator of Russian works who escaped the Soviet Union in 1972. One irate Yale professor complained that The Yale Literary Magazine has a "clear anti-Soviet, right-wing slant." Obviously, Yale Lit, as it is known, has to go. And that's what the University, of which A. Bartlett Giamatti is president, intends to achieve.

Under the new rules devised by the foes of first amendment rights for conservatives, the magazine will be seized from its present owners

- Yale students and alumni who bought it in 1978, and handed over to unidentified "Yale students." (Macmillan) Brozer views would have be concerned too many years ago. radical

Novrozov and his associates are fighting back, however. The Yale Literary Magazine has sued Yale University, charging suppression of dissent.

To many Americans, it will appear incredible that a famous university would take this mean and sneaky approach to muzzle a journal of the highest quality, simply because it expresses conservative cultural views. Such, however, is the character of the liberal establishment in the American academic world. What Yale University is doing with The Yale Literary Magazine is a form of book burning. Using bureaucratic ploys, Yale University is engaging in its own type of witch hunt or academic McCarthyism.

One recalls the rage at Yale University when, a generation ago, William F. Buckley Jr., then a young Yale graduate, published his book "God and Man at Yale." Now, Giamatti and his associates can't stand Navrozov's brilliant conservative commentaries. They have devised a gag rule.

In the process, however, the reputation of Yale University suffers. The nation is given an example of liberal narrow-mindedness and

# Big Often Better?

NEW YORK (UPI) — The recent wave of mergers has led some to fear that all the nation's industrial assets eventually will wind up in the hands of a few giant corporations, setting the stage for widespread collusion, monopoly pricing and inferior products.

For decades, many economists would have endorsed some of those fears, but thinking on the subject has undergone a revolution of sorts and a growing legion of economists has become skeptical of many traditional precepts in antitrust doctrine.

Some even have embraced the belief that the merging of America is beneficial.

Among the leaders of the revolution is University of Chicago Economist Yale Brozen who contends the only thing Americans really need fear is that antitrust agencies will keep working to prevent big business from getting bigger and more efficient.

His antitrust views go beyond the Reagan

administration's accommodative philosophy that "bigness is not necessarily badness."

Big business, Brozen asserts, often engenders lower prices increased efficiency.

engenders lower prices, increased efficiency
 and even more competition.
 Meeting over lunch with a group of reporters to discuss his new book, "Con-

reporters to discuss his new book, "Concentration, Mergers and Public Policy," (Macmillan) Brozen acknowledged such views would have been branded heresy not too many years ago.

But he said conventional wisdom regarding bigness and industry concentration was based on "specious fears and biased data."

More recent studies, Brozen said, show that when a few big companies dominate an industry, the effects can be positive.

He said one study shows that if you were to take all the industries where four firms have more than 50 percent of the business and break up those firms in order to reduce concentration, "the result would be a 20 percent rise in per-unit costs and a 10-15 percent rise in prices."

His evidence also disputes notions that once a firm gains dominance in a market, its position is entrenched.

"Concentration persisted only when the foremost firms routinized innovation in processes and products and maintained their greater relative efficiency in the face of rising efficiency in other firms," he said. "Any lapse provided would-be entrants lurking at the edge of every industry an opportunity to strike."

Fears that collusion goes hand in hand with concentration are unfounded, he said. Conspiracy, he said, occurs as often in diffused industries.

The facts also run counter to predictions that mergers ultimately will lead to concentration of economic power in the hands of

Brozen doesn't advocate that government encourage growth of large firms, because economies of scale aren't available in all industries. He does think antitrust restrictions on the growth of firm size need to be loosened because they "prevent competitive behavior by our most efficient firms."

He stops short of saying all antitrust size restrictions should be abolished. There is evidence, he said, that a dominant firm can jack up prices for a short time before market forces come into play and competitors move in and bring prices back to competitive levels.

# From Around The World

NEW YORK (NEA) — While Americans went to the polls — try to indicate, by their selections among a series of frequently poor choices, how they would like their country governed for the next couple of years, herewith a few impressions gathered in the course of a recent trip to Asia and the South Pacific.

There is something going on in the corner of the world that used to be known as French Indochina, and Uncle Sam has a hand in it.

The three countries that were ultimately carved out of Indochina are, of course, Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia. All three are now under communist control, with the pro-Russian and anti-Chinese regime in Hanoi calling the shots. But there are serious anti-Hanoi resistance movements in all three nations.

The best known of these are the rival forces of Son Sann, Prince Sihanouk and Pol Pot in Cambodia, which have recently drawn together in an uneasy alliance to overthrow Hanoi's puppet, Heng Samrin. It would be misleading to regard all three as anticommunist, however, since Pol Pot is essentially a free-lance megalomaniac with a record for genocide that would make a hyena vomit, and Sihanouk is an aristocratic opportunist who has repeatedly sold his valuable hide to the highest bidder, including at one time or another just about everybody interested in the area, and currently is a pensioner in Peking. Son Sann, however, is a decent man and an anti-communist, and he has joined hands with the other two because he believes, probably rightly, that ousling the Vietnamese is the absolutely essential first step in the recovery of Cambodia's political health.

That much has been in the newspapers. What has not, so far as I know, is that the United States (according to informants who are themselves involved) is quietly encouraging collective action — military and otherwise — against Hanoi among the Cambodian trio and resistance movements in both Laos and Vietnam itself. And that, of course, implies the quiet provision of military aid — probably through air drops and over the Thai border.

As the Pentagon has poignant reason to know, jungle warfare has its own rules. Hanoi undoubtedly controls the major cities and large areas of the countryside throughout Indochina, but it cannot prevent sizable enemy forces from maintaining themselves on Laotian, Cambodian and Vietnamese soil. What has been lacking until recently was the unifying impulse and the logistical support, and the Reagan administration has now provided these — one more proof that President Reagan doesn't necessarily regard all territories that the Soviet Union and its puppets have conquered as inviolate.

If there is one sure way to infuriate what might be called "world liberal opinion," it is to run your country efficiently, incorruptibly and on the basis of a foreign policy that is firmly (though quietly) anti-communist and a domestic policy that is perhaps best described as "anti-hippie" — meaning tough on drugs and men with long hair.

That is the sin of Lee Kuan Yew, prime minister of the island republic of Singapore 1 pop. 3 million). Lee, who is the leader and hero of the numerically dominant ethnic Chinese, has been Singapore's boss for 23 years, and shows no signs of tiring. Under his rule the lush, green island has sprouted a whole skyline of high-rise office buildings, as well as hillsides full of handsome, low-cost housing and a hotel row that reminds one forcibly of Waikiki.

Naturally this sort of thing can't be allowed to go on. Hippies and drug addicts of the world, arise! (But don't arise in Singapore, or you're likely to wind up in the cooler.)

New Zealand has no problems — at least, as problems go. Recently it was deemed worthy of three column inches in a major Christ Church newspaper that a sailor from a passing vessel had had his appendix successfully removed in a local hospital.

One curious note: the dial phone in my hotel room went 9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1-0, rather than the other way around. But then, as a friend of mine pointed out, New Zealand is in the Southern Hemisphere.

# Soviet Space Battleship?

WASHINGTON — The Soviet Union may be planning a space spectacular in the months ahead, a surprise on the order of the Sputnik launching of a quarter century ago. Officials and experts on the Soviet rocket program believe it could be a giant space station equipped with a laser weapon.

The experts say there is increasing evidence of a new Soviet space spectacular, though they don't say what the evidence is. Congress and the public, however, would do well to ponder in advance the effect of a new Soviet breakthrough in space.

Twenty-five years ago, Sputnik caught the American government and public unaware, Americans were shocked to find that the supposedly backward Soviets were first in space. The United States launched the crash program in space which led to the U.S. landings on the moon. Sputnik also had a tremendous impact on American education, spurring a new emphasis on science.

Ironically, the warning of a new Soviet space spectacular comes at a time when the U.S. space program is regarded as much more sophisticated than the Soviet effort. In the space shuttle, the United States has a tremendously valuable tool for space research. It also could be a very significant military platform in space.

While the Soviet space program is more primitive, it always has been directed towards military operations in space. The Soviets already have a killer satellite which has been tested 20 times. The United States has the know-how, but has not proceeded with development of a satellite-destroying weapon. That's the story of American efforts in space—much military potential but no immediate military capability. This leaves the United States in a vulnerable position.

The Executive and Legislative branches should consider well in advance what the U.S. response should be to a Soviet space battleship, if that is indeed what is launched. The Soviets have stressed "man in space" programs, with cosmonauts aloft in space stations for long periods of time. The United States has not regarded this as scientifically significant, but the Soviet program may have great military significance.

At the minimum, the U.S. should push ahead with development and deployment of a satellite destroying device. It also should accelerate work on laser weapons.

The government also will have to consider the very tough problem of where funding for a new military space effort will be found if such an effort becomes our principal national security priority.

The Soviets deny all manner of consumer goods to their people in order to finance military projects.

But any story that can incite a four-page, single-spaced letter from an associate attorney general of the United States has to be hot stuff. Especially since the letter was in response to initial inquiries from my associate Tony Capaccio.

Maybe you can figure out what was so upsetting about the story. Here it is:
Associate Attorney General Rudolph Giuliani is a devoted fan of the New York Yankees. One of his earliest memories is of being dressed up by his father in a pinstriped Yankee uniform. He can rattle off Bronx Bomber statistics till your eyes glaze over.

In his Justice Department office are two treasured souvenirs of the Yankees' glory days—a baseball autographed by Yogi Berra and a small wood-and-cast-iron stadium seat, its blue paint peeling, from the House that Ruth Built.

The little seat bears only the number 15 stenciled on it in black, but its saga is as complicated as that of Citizen Kane's equally beloved "Rosebud." The point at issue is exactly how the seat got from the old Yankee Stadium to Giuliani's Washington office.

In his four-page letter to me, Giuliani says he got the little seat in 1973 or 1974 as a gift from a law student who had worked for him in the U.S. Attorney's Office in New York. He unaccountably left it behind when he came to Washington for a government stint in 1975. But two years later, after he had returned to private practice in New York, another former student assistant lugged the seat uptown to Gluliani's office at 30 Rockefeller Plaza. No

On Aug. 25, 1981, Giuliani, by now a Justice

Department bigshot, went to New York City on official business and dropped by his old office with Chief Inspector John Walsh of the U.S. Marshals Service. He "had never seen a big law firm," Giuliani explained. "During the tour Walsh saw my former office and the chair. Mr. Walsh then offered to bring it to Washington for me. I told him not to do sc."

But within a week, Walsh did just that. He claimed he picked the little seat up in Giuliani's old Justice Department office, neglecting to mention that he had to go 68 blocks uptown to fetch it.

Walsh brought it to Washington, on government time, as checked baggage on the Eastern Airlines shuttle, and took it with him to the U.S. Marshals' headquarters in suburban Virginia. There, on Sept. 3, 1981, the little seat was presented to a grateful Giuliani on an inspection of the marshals' office by Howard Safir, a Marshals Service official.

in a closed-door meeting last August, a now-retired marshal. Elliott Williams,

complained that Walsh had fetched the seat on government time and at government expense to curry favor with Giuliani, who oversees the Marshals Service. Present were Giuliani, Deputy Attorney General Edward Schmulta. White House Counsel Fred Fielding, Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., and

several Senate aides.

Giuliani and Schmults assured Thurmond they would investigate Williams' charges.

"They both agreed they would look into it," said a source who was at the meeting, "but no one has contacted Williams as far as I know."

Williams confirmed this.

Giuliani and Walsh Insist that the delivery of the little seat involved no government expense. Walsh said he was coming to

Washington on official business anyway.
"It was my idea to bring it down," he said.
"I felt it meant a lot to him. I thought it would

be a nice gesture."

"Let us ask God to deliver this nation...that it be freed of this painful plague of terrorism," the pope, his voice tinged with emotion, told 200,000 people at an outdoor mass Thursday during a visit to Toledo.

John Paul's condemnation was prompted by the machine-gun killing Thursday in Madrid of top Spanish army officer, Gen. Victor Lago Roman, by suspected Basque terrorists.

TORONTO (UPI)-Some 10,000 Chrysler Canada workers went on strike in three Ontario centers today in a walkout that will idle thousands of workers in the United States and could imperil the struggling U.S.

# **Budget Cuts May Force 3,000 Layoffs**

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services officials are planning to fire 3,000 employees if HRS is forced to bear the brunt of \$300 million in cuts

necessary to balance the state budget. HRS Secretary David Pingree has put together a contingency plan that calls for about 3,000 layoffs effective Jan. 1, including about 450 at Florida State Hospital in Chat-

There was good news of sorts for state budget planners Thursday, with release of the

report of tax collections for October. The state collected about \$390 million last month, \$20 million more than expected under the revised revenue estimate that is the basis of the proposed \$300 million spending reduction

The total was still \$10 million off the old estimate that was the basis for the current budget, so Gov. Bob Graham and legislative leaders likely will proceed with budget-cutting

They probably will put off any decisions until early December.

Seminole coach Jerry Posey and his players know about disappointment. They have anguished through a season filled with seven losses and no wins. It's been especially excruciating for the 'Noles because they feel three of those

seven setbacks could have been wins. For tonight's 8 o'clock battle in Longwood, however, no prompting from the coaches will be needed. Tonight's opponent is Lyman and there is no love between these two old Seminole County rivalries.

"Everybody's really thinking about Lyman," said senior Dion Jackson Wednesday between bites of his bacon and cheese sandwich at the Sanford Optimist Player of the Week luncheon. "If we don't win another game this year, we want to beat Lyman."

And the Greyhounds feel the same way. Last year, while en route to an undefeated Five Star Conference championship, Sanford mangled the 'Hounds, 26-0.

This year, it's Lyman which is headed for the Five Star and district title. Three wins in the final three games against Seminole, Spruce Creek and Lake Brantley will give Lyman a 6-1 conference record. Apopka is the only team which can equal that, so if the two teams tie, Lyman is the champ because the Greyhounds whipped Apopka two weeks ago.

"We'd love to be the spoiler," confirmed Posey. "Lyman's in the driver's seat, no doubt about that. They've got the easiest road, but I'd love nothing better than to derail them."

To do that, the Seminoles will have to put the clamps on Lyman's stable of running backs. Coach Bill Scott interchanges fast backs Vince Presley, Theo Jones and Willis Perry with power runners Phil Germano, Gene Allen and David Jacobs in no particular order.

Add to that the aerial wizardy of Jerry Axley and receivers Robert Quesinberry, Todd Marriott and Willis Perry. Marriott still leads the county with 19 receptions but he's only snared four in the past four games. Perry has 17 catches.

Axley bit his first six passes against Lake Howell to move the Greyhounds to a quick score. Once Lyman grabbed the lead, though, the passing game went under wraps. Axley has completed 45 percent of his passes for 787 yards and six TDs.

Seminole's defense has been the most porous in the county, yielding 27 points per game. Offensively, the Tribe has generated just 83 points in seven games.

Jackson, a defensive back, did a lot to shore up those defensive deficiencies with eight tackles and 10 assists in Seminole's 15-14 loss to Lake Brantley.

"Dion was pulling up the slack, that's

for sure," said Posey, "Some gains looked like they'd go for eight or nine yards but he was stopping them after

Offensively, Clifton Campbell, a sophomore elevated from the junior varsity five games ago, ripped off two touchdowns of 64 (screen pass) and 81 (end sweep) yards.

Posey was not surprised at the 153yard rushing performance of Campbell. but he was impressed with the wiry youngster's speed.

"On that touchdown run it looked like two Brantley kids had the angle on him, but he just blew them right off," the "Chief" said.

Campbell is joined in the backfield by senior Ron Burke at fullback, junior Mike Futrell at quarterback and junior Tim Lawrence at the other halfback. Lawrence has been Seminoles biggest pass catching threat with 12.

Posey knows he'll need a defensive effort similar to the one Lyman has been getting from linebackers Mike Hill, Paul Ellis and the Pilot brothers -James and Greg.

In the past four games, coach Paul Thomann's defenders have allowed just 45 points, just a shade over 11 a game. He'd even settle for a performance like last year.

"I was watching the film of last year's shutout and we really kept them bottled up," laughed Posey. "I said to coach (Dave) Mosure, 'where are those guys when we need them.""

Maybe they'll show up tonight.



# Gout Is Affected Little By Diet

DEAR DR. LAMB - Just so my wife will have some peace of mind I am writing to you concerning a problem that I've had. I received different advice from two wellqualified doctors, one a surgeon and the other a general practitioner.

I've had a severe case of gout on two separate occasions. I asked each doctor what kind of a diet I should follow, anything I should avoid, etc.

Doctor A advised me to stay away from all kinds of fowl, chicken, turkey. I stayed with this advice until recently when I had another painful attack of gout. I will try anything to get this condition corrected and kept under control. I saw Doctor B and he advised me to stay off liver. pork and beef - to eat fish, veal, chicken, turkey. Now my wife doesn't know what to cook for me. Can you suggest the best way to correct and

control this condition? I don't want to tell these two doctors about this because they are good friends and I don't want to hurt their feelings. It's just that I need help. If you have any leaflets on this subject please send me

DEAR READER - Your letter is an example of how people get caught up in the little things and fall to take care of the blg things. The truth is, diet is not the most important aspect of gout treatment today. Gout is caused by an excess amount of uric acid and it is produced by your own body cells rather than being in the foods you eat. A baby calf on a milk diet, which contains no uric acid or purines that uric acid is made from, still produces urle acid.





# Schedule Annual Rose Pruning During The Winter

Grooming is a regular feature of rose culture. It consists of selectively trimming at monthly intervals to keep plants healthy, attractive and productive. Removing faded flowers after each flush of bloom improves plant appearance and prevents fruit development. This conserves food material for additional growth.

The first flowers allowed to develop should be cut with short stems to leave as When plants are well established. flowers



much foliage as possible on the plant. may be cut with longer stems, and then

only cut the length of stem needed.

Remove suckers (leafy shoots) that develop from the rootstock from below the graft union, by breaking them off rather than cutting, in order to remove all basal buds. Remove dead wood and canes showing stem disease symptoms when they are first noticed. Cut affected part back to healthy wood and remove the affected part from the garden area.

Pruning: Roses need pruning once a year in Central Florida in most cases.

The pruning should be scheduled during the plant. Leave at least half the length of the winter. Major yearly pruning con-each main cane that is 1 to 3 years old. sists of removing some of the healthy top growth as well as twigs and branches nine weeks after pruning. that are dead, diseased, injured, unsightly or thin and spindly.

The half-hour program, playing Wednesday, Nov. 10 over PBS, presents a new look at the Puritans, through poetry, paintings artwork and household goods they left behind. # November 10 MTV: The Appearance, Sound Of 'Visual Radio'

There didn't appear to be anyone much over the age of 30 in front of or behind the cameras on a recent day at the MTV: Music Television studio in Manhattan. Video Jockey Mark Goodman and a small crew were taping the "wraparounds" - rock news, tour dates and background information on bands - that you hear in between the nonstop flow of video clips playing on MTV's 24-hour schedule.

The v.j.'s job is nearly the same as that of the radio d.j., who introduces records, reads commercials and tosses in rock trivia. And MTV is like radio with visuals, but with one crucial difference: Not one iota of what you see or hear on MTV is live, though pains are taken to give it a live feeling.

Goodman and four other v.j.'s memorize fact sheets and semi-ad lib their lines in front of the cameras.

Sometimes minor flubs are even left in.

MTV's acquisitions people decide what video clips will air, much like a radio station's programming

"There's a certain part of your brain that doesn't work when you watch television," continues Goodman, "whereas in radio you use the 'theater of the mind.' On radio I could say things that would be funny because the listeners couldn't see me.

But on TV we have to compete with 'Saturday Night Live.' We're not standup comics."

MTV has made waves in the recording industry for creating a national market for video clips, spurring record sales and exposing some groups that radio might otherwise have ignored. But the real breakthrough would come if MTV were live. The freespirited nature of rock 'n' roll seems slightly stilted when confined to MTV's prepackaged format. But then, the bulk of what's on the channel — the video clips themselves - are packaged in the same vein. After all, what could be more artificial than a group lip-syncing lyrics and pretending to play their instruments?


