## Jordan's Hussein Urges PLO To Recognize Israel

**United Press International**  
Jordan's King Hussein urged the Palestine Liberation Organization to recognize Israel in a new Arab peace initiative but the Jewish state angered Washington by announcing a new settlement drive in the occupied West Bank.  
In Beirut, U.S. envoy Morris Draper was meeting Lebanese Prime Minister Cheik Wazzan today to discuss the pullout of all Syrian, Palestinian and Israeli forces from Lebanon. Draper met Syrian leaders Thursday in Damascus.  
In the northern Lebanese city of Tripoli, artillery battles erupted for the second straight day today between factions favoring and opposing the presence of Syrian forces in Lebanon, right-wing Phalange Radio said.

## Pope Condemns Attack

**MADRID, Spain (UPI)**—Pope John Paul II vented his anger at terrorists who killed a Spanish general and headed today for southern Andalusia, a province dominated by Islam for 700 years before being reclaimed by Christianity.  
"Let us ask God to deliver this nation...that it be freed of this painful plague of terrorism," the pope, his voice tinged with emotion, told 200,000 people at an outdoor mass Thursday during a visit to Toledo.  
John Paul's condemnation was prompted by the machine-gun killing Thursday in Madrid of top Spanish army officer, Gen. Victor Lago Roman, by suspected Basque terrorists.

## Chrysler Workers Strike

**TORONTO (UPI)**—Some 10,000 Chrysler Canada workers went on strike in three Ontario centers today in a walkout that will idle thousands of workers in the United States and could imperil the struggling U.S. automaker.  
The Chrysler workers walked off the job at 10 a.m. EST in Windsor, Ontario after the collapse Thursday of talks over union demands for pay hikes.

## Budget Cuts May Force 3,000 Layoffs

**TALLAHASSEE (UPI)** - Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services officials are planning to fire 3,000 employees if HRS is forced to bear the brunt of \$300 million in cuts necessary to balance the state budget.  
HRS Secretary David Pingree has put together a contingency plan that calls for about 3,000 layoffs effective Jan. 1, including about 450 at Florida State Hospital in Chattahoochee.  
There was good news of sorts for state budget planners Thursday, with release of the

report of tax collections for October. The state collected about \$390 million last month, \$20 million more than expected under the revised revenue estimate that is the basis of the proposed \$300 million spending reduction.  
The total was still \$10 million off the old estimate that was the basis for the current budget, so Gov. Bob Graham and legislative leaders likely will proceed with budget-cutting talks.  
They probably will put off any decisions until early December.

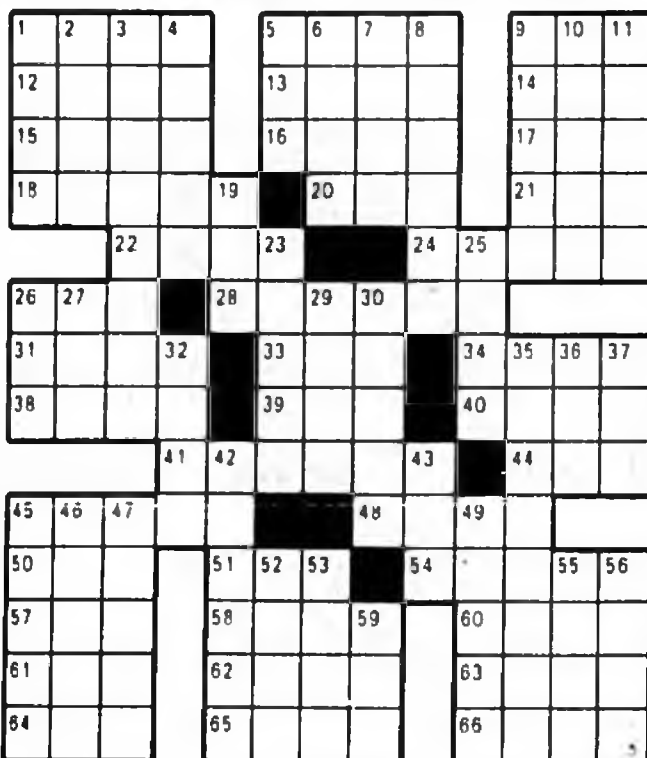

Gout Is Affected Little By Diet



DEAR DR. LAMB—Just so my wife will have some peace of mind I am writing to you concerning a problem that I've had. I received different advice from two well-qualified doctors, one a surgeon and the other a general practitioner.

I've had a severe case of gout on two separate occasions. I asked each doctor what kind of a diet I should follow, anything I should avoid, etc.

Doctor A advised me to stay away from all kinds of fowl, chicken, turkey. I stayed with this advice until recently when I had another painful attack of gout. I will try anything to get this condition corrected and kept under control. I saw Doctor B and he advised me to stay off liver, pork and beef — to eat fish, veal, chicken, turkey. Now my wife doesn't know what to cook for me. Can you suggest the best way to correct and control this condition?

I don't want to tell these two doctors about this because they are good friends and I don't want to hurt their feelings. It's just that I need help. If you have any leaflets on this subject please send me one.

DEAR READER — Your letter is an example of how people get caught up in the little things and fail to take care of the big things. The truth is, diet is not the most important aspect of gout treatment today. Gout is caused by an excess amount of uric acid and it is produced by your own body cells rather than being in the foods you eat. A baby calf on a milk diet, which contains no uric acid or purines that uric acid is made from, still produces uric acid.

The typical gout diet that was once used eliminated organ meats such as liver, kidneys and sweetbreads.

Sardines and anchovies were also on the list of big ones to eliminate. Some diets also required eliminating beans. But the most strict diet can only decrease the uric acid level in the blood 1, or at the most, 2 mg. Today the approach to gout is to stop your own cells from producing too much uric acid, which is very effective, or to increase elimination of uric acid. To give you more details on the gout diet and modern management I am sending you The Health Letter number 16-10, Gout, The Uric Acid Disease.

DEAR DR. LAMB — I am a 22-year-old male. When I was 16 I had a serious exploratory operation, which left an ugly scar on my stomach. I'm still embarrassed to take my shirt off.

I definitely need some sort of solution to get rid of this scar. I am sure there is some way to hide it. I know about Covermark, but I would rather have some sort of permanent solution. I would appreciate any suggestions.

DEAR READER — In the first place you have undoubtedly overemphasized the importance of your scar. It is probably of little consequence to anyone but you. And as time goes by you will realize that the scar is not a problem. But since you feel this way about the scar you might want to see a plastic surgeon. Sometimes they can improve the appearance of a scar by localized surgical procedures on the skin.

Schedule Annual Rose Pruning During The Winter

Grooming is a regular feature of rose culture. It consists of selectively trimming at monthly intervals to keep plants healthy, attractive and productive.

only cut the length of stem needed. Remove suckers (leafy shoots) that develop from the rootstock from below the graft union, by breaking them off rather than cutting...

The pruning should be scheduled during the winter. Major yearly pruning consists of removing some of the healthy top growth as well as twigs and branches that are dead, diseased, injured, unsightly or thin and spindly.

Shortening main canes and lateral branches, removing small twigs and some of the oldest canes improves the plant's form. It also regulates height and produces better light conditions within

the plant. Leave at least half the length of each main cane that is 1 to 3 years old. The first flowers can be expected eight to nine weeks after pruning.

To avoid dieback and encourage rapid healing, pruning cuts should be made just above a dormant bud (eye) and wound surfaces larger than thumb size should be protected with a pruning paint.

When an entire branch is removed, make a smooth cut at the point of juncture.

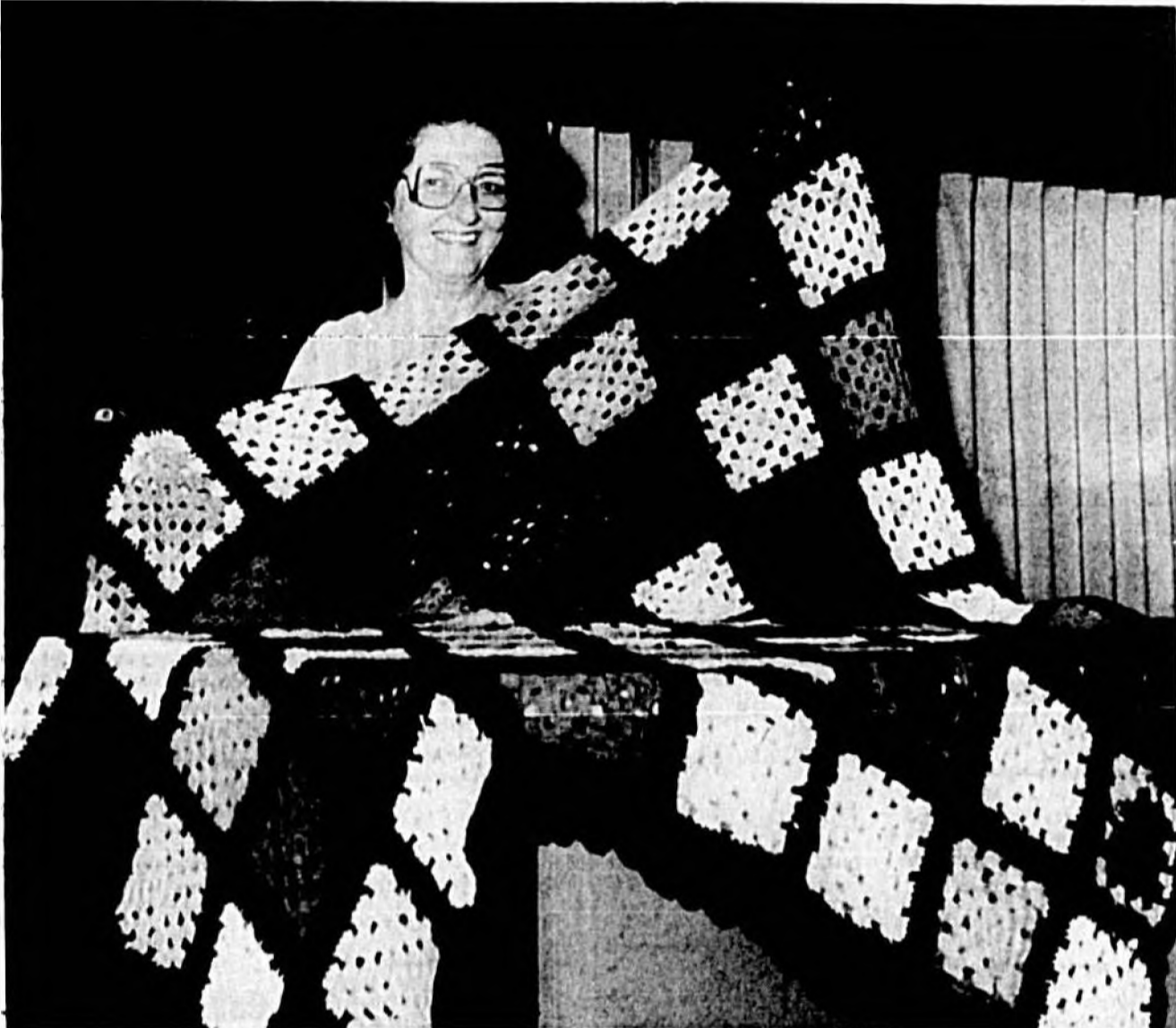

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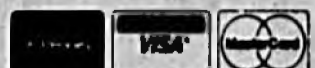

# Lear Vs. Falwell In War Of Words

NEW YORK (UPI) — Norman Lear, who produces the sort of television fare the Moral Majority loves to hate, is on the counterattack in what could escalate into the greatest propaganda battle since Goebbels took on Hollywood in World War II.

To hear the Moral Majority tell it, Lear is just a

shade less virtuous than Satan, and his mission in life is to turn a nation of videophiles into depraved rapists and child molesters by dosing them with prime-time prurience, bloodshed, irreverence and exposed female anatomy.

To hear Lear tell it, in a new half-hour special titled "Life and Liberty ... For All Who Believe," the Moral

Majority is a phalanx of Nazis in three-piece suits who will have our minds and bodies in chains by the end of the year if they are not stopped.

Somewhere between the two polemics, the truth must lie, in a nation that has survived worse demagogues than Jerry Falwell — but Lear emphatically does know how to fight.

"Life and Liberty ... For All Who Believe" is a title taken straight and unexpurgated from the "Christian Pledge of Allegiance" as some rock-bound fundamentalists have rewritten it.

By implication, those who chant the pledge would endorse neither life nor liberty for those who do not "believe."

In a slickly produced semi-documentary, hosted with an air of imminent doom by Burt Lancaster, Lear has snipped selected news footage designed to prove the point.

Some of it truly is frightening.

Right winger Paul Weyrich, executive director of the Committee for the Survival of a Free Congress and Falwell's mentor, is there with his cynical assessment of the political process.

"I don't want everybody to vote," he says. "Elections are not won by a majority of people. They never have been from the beginning of our country and they are not now. As a matter of fact, our

leverage in the elections, quite candidly, goes up as the voting populace goes down."

The book-burners are there too — barbecuing volumes and records to cries of "Praise Jesus." Falwell is there too, thumping his electronic pulpit to "get people saved ... get them baptized ... get them registered to vote."

So is the Rev. Bailey Smith, spouting his conviction, "God does not hear the prayer of a Jew," and so is volcanic evangelist Jim Bakker, looking for all the world like the young Rudolf Hess.

Unfortunately, so is Dean Wycoff, the former West Coast Moral Majority leader who made headlines by espousing mass execution for all homosexuals.

Lear might be accused of overkill with that one. Whether Wycoff's blood-thirsty views got him bounced out of the Moral Majority as a result of genuine revulsion or merely the cynical conviction he had become bad press, he did get bounced.

"Life and Liberty ... For All Who Believe," which will be playing under syndication at various times in various markets throughout November, is propaganda, but it is powerful propaganda.

The same cannot always be said for the ham-handed tactics frequently displayed in the same vein by Lear's antagonists.

**HOLLYWOOD (UPI)** — The old Lana Turner, Kim Novak legends of discovery at drug store soda fountains are impossible to project into the '80s if for no other reason than that soda fountains have disappeared.  
 Young hopefuls today are discovered at individual interviews or cattle calls where they often are trotted before casting directors and producers like so many sides of beef.  
 Once cut from the herd, the prospects are asked to run the gauntlet of approval from a series of executives.  
 Take the case of Kathy Maisnik, the dimpled brunette co-star — with Brian Dennehy — of the new "Star of the Family" television series.  
 Never one to hang out at soda fountains in Monterey Park (a part of Los Angeles), Kathy, 20, studied music and singing at the Los Angeles Music Center.  
 Her dramatic background was limited to student productions at Alhambra High School and community theater offerings, none of which had producers battering at her door.  
 While she strove to prepare herself for a musical career as a student at the Civic Light Opera Workshop, producer Larry Brezner was searching for an actress-singer to play 16-year-old Jennie Lee Krebs in his series.  
 The production team of Rollins, Joffe, Mora and Brezner already had come to terms with Paramount Television and ABC to produce the series, principally on the strength of landing Dennehy as the star.  
 The situation comedy was to be based on the relationship between an old-fashioned father and his post-pubescent and independent daughter who has landed her first job in show business.  
 "We spent six months looking at 1,500 young girls," said Brezner, a world-weary, sophisticated producer. "We looked at them in person and on video tapes. Those who could sing couldn't act. The actresses couldn't sing."  
 Kathy, who had found an agent earlier this year, was one of the herd of youngsters called in for an interview, the first obstacle in the gauntlet.  
 "I was surprised to get past the original interview with the casting director, Bobby Hoffman," Kathy said. "He called me back for a second time."  
 Kathy had cleared the first

two of five hurdles. Although they liked her looks and talent, Brezner and Hoffman kept searching and interviewing.  
 Hoffman called Kathy back a third time to read for Brezner and the other producers — hurdle three.  
 They agreed she was indeed the right young actress. But Kathy had to pass muster with the bigwigs at Paramount Television and was summoned before Gary Nardino who added his stamp of approval — hurdle four.  
 Kathy, by this time, was giddy with hope. In her limited experience she had never survived more than a third interview.  
 The final okay had to come from Tony Thomopoulos, ABC's production chief, who nodded approval and wonder of wonders, hurdle five had been cleared. Kathy was hired.  
 "Brian read with Kathy for Thomopoulos," Brezner said. "He helped make the decision in her favor."  
 "After the reading he told me, 'That kid's great but I'm afraid of her. She takes

center stage like nobody I've ever seen.' Brian is 6-foot-4 and weighs 240 pounds. Kathy is 5-foot-3 and handled him beautifully.  
 "The scene called for Kathy to tear into Brian and she did it convincingly. That's exactly what we were looking for. Something magical happens when they work together on camera."  
 Brezner grinned across the lunch table at the Paramount Studios commissary at a pleased Kathy.  
 "I was really shocked that I got the part," Kathy said. "In a way Brian is a father figure for me, just like my own dad is. They are both very protective."  
 "The stories in the show reflect my real life. I still live at home and whenever I go out at night my father wants to know who I'll be with, where I'm going and what time I'll be home."  
 "This is my first professional job and I'm very lucky because I'm learning as I go along and I'm getting paid for it. I think I've already shown a lot of improvement from the first show."

# MTV: The Appearance, Sound Of 'Visual Radio'

There didn't appear to be anyone much over the age of 30 in front of or behind the cameras on a recent day at the MTV: Music Television studio in Manhattan. Video Jockey Mark Goodman and a small crew were taping the "wraparounds" — rock news, tour dates and background information on bands — that you hear in between the nonstop flow of video clips playing on MTV's 24-hour schedule.

The v.j.'s job is nearly the same as that of the radio d.j., who introduces records, reads commercials and tosses in rock trivia. And MTV is like radio with visuals, but with one crucial difference: Not one iota of what you see or hear on MTV is live, though pains are taken to give it a live feeling.

Goodman and four other v.j.'s memorize fact sheets and semi-ad lib their lines in front of the cameras. Sometimes minor flubs are even left in.

MTV's acquisitions people decide what video clips will air, much like a radio station's programming

spontaneous. "There's a certain part of your brain that doesn't work when you watch television," continues Goodman, "whereas in radio you use the 'theater of the mind.' On radio I could say things that would be funny because the listeners couldn't see me. But on TV we have to compete with 'Saturday Night Live.' We're not stand-up comics."

MTV has made waves in the recording industry for creating a national market for video clips, spurring record sales and exposing some groups that radio might otherwise have ignored. But the real breakthrough would come if MTV were live. The free-spirited nature of rock 'n' roll seems slightly stilted when confined to MTV's prepackaged format. But then, the bulk of what's on the channel — the video clips themselves — are packaged in the same vein. After all, what could be more artificial than a group lip-synching lyrics and pretending to play their instruments?

department picks the playlist. A core of about 10 writers prepare the fact sheets for the v.j.'s.

Goodman, a former disc jockey for WMMR in Philadelphia and WPLJ in New York, delivers so smoothly that it looks as if he's reading from a

Teleprompter. While this makes for a highly polished, professional show, it comes off a bit canned; he's got no leeway to surprise the viewer. And indeed, Goodman says, "On tape I have to work at being

One of the earliest to tell the world that he would not have lived as long, and certainly not as productively, had he not won his battle with the bottle is Dana Andrews. Silver-haired, handsome and still in demand in regional theaters, he tells of being a two-time loser with cures before he found his way to being an outspoken recovered alcoholic.

Jason Robards, with a smile unfamiliar in his early career, has told the good news on television and is now being seen, too, in public

service print advertisements, saying, "I'm living proof you don't have to die for a drink."

Daniel J. Travanti, whose portrayal of Capt. Furillo on NBC's "Hill Street Blues" has won him two best actor Emmy Awards, says he was among the last to know he had a drinking problem. He credits supportive friends and spiritual faith.

One of the most touching, and youngest to speak out is 31-year-old Jack Scalia, who plays Rock Hudson's son on NBC's "The Devil in Con-

nection."

A good-natured guy who's quick with a quip, he grows serious when he says there's much still to be learned about chemically addictive personalities like his. But he knows that boredom and peer pressure pushed him toward drugs and alcohol at 15.

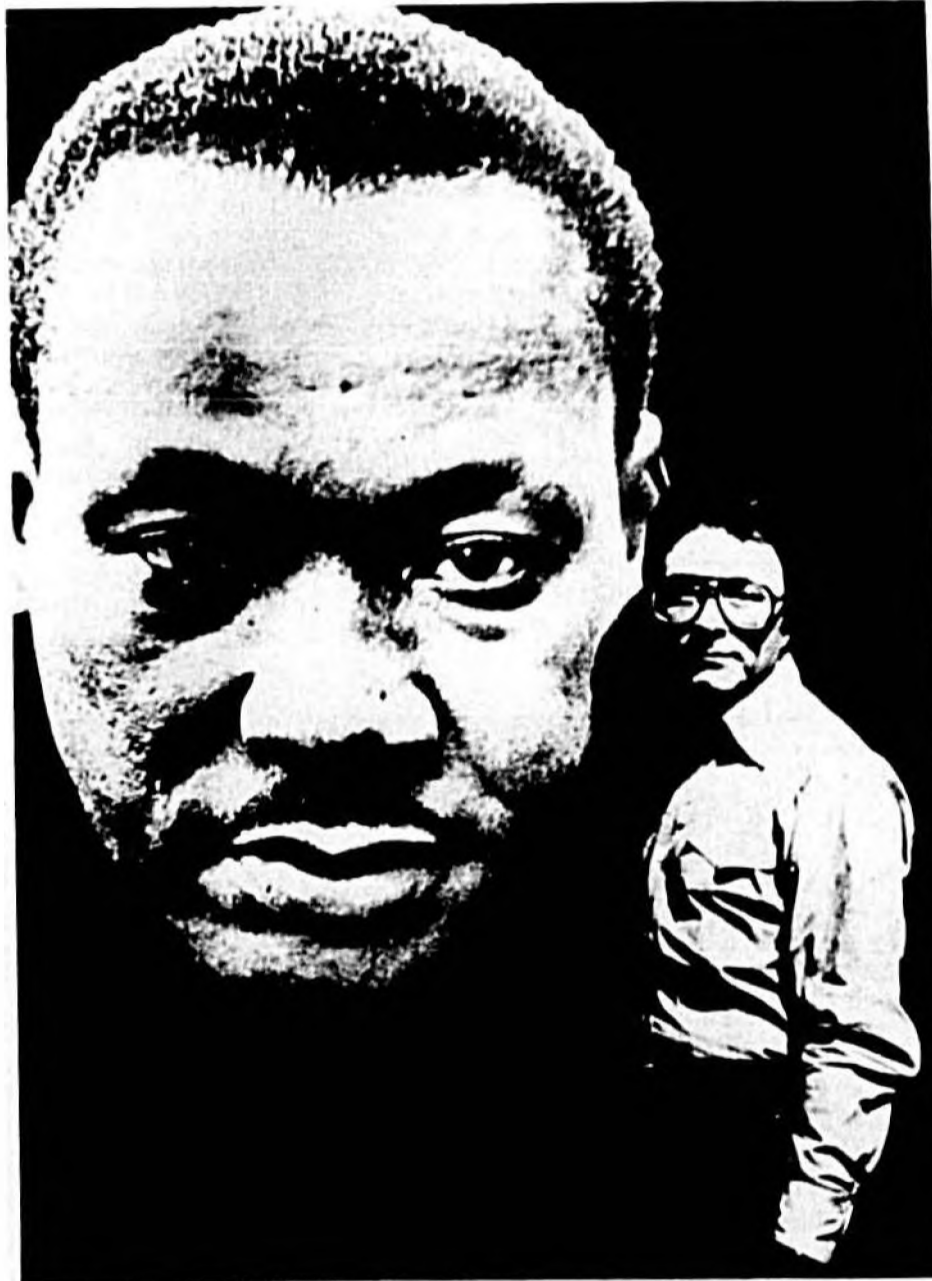
Later, as a successful model, he didn't feel worthy of the "you look great, Jack" compliments. He spent time in a treatment center, lives the one-day-at-a-time philosophy, has praise for

Alcoholics Anonymous and says if his going on the Merv Griffin Show with his story helps even one person, it's worth it.
