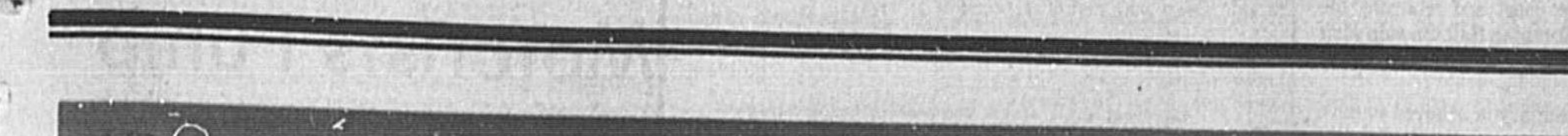

Inflammation Of Prostate Gland

By Lawrence E. Lamb, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - What is prostatitis? Why does a young man in his 30s get this? My mother says a man is running around with other women, straining his prostate gland which results in the prostatitis. Please help clear this up one way or the other. It's on my mind quite often. DEAR READER - Your mother may mean well, but she is misinformed and her statement could be causing a lot of unnecessary trouble. She is repeating a frequent misconception that has caused other people a lot of unhelpful trouble. Prostatitis means inflammation of the prostate gland, just as the ending "itis" means inflammation as applied to appendicitis, bronchitis, laryngitis, gastritis, cystitis and so on. The inflammation can be, and in the case of a young man usually is, caused by some bacteria. The bacteria involved in most cases is not the organism that causes sexual activity at all. A common source of the infection is one of the bacteria in the colon which some way escapes and lodges in the crypts of the prostate gland. Some urologists believe that such an infection is more likely to develop in a person who is not having as much sex as might be optimal and the over-distended prostate gland gets boggy and is more likely to become infected. It is true that the prostate gland can be involved in a venereal infection, but again, the bacteria commonly involved in most cases of prostatitis are different germs entirely. The kind of prostatitis that a man commonly gets when he is older is often related to enlargement of the gland. This may be from some hormonal imbalance or from chronic infection. In Murder Case Outlaw Member Seeks Immunity

Defense attorney Edward Kirkland says former "Outlaw" motorcycle gang member Joseph Robert "Crazy Joe" Spaziano will seek immunity from prosecution in the Altamonte dump murder if he is required to produce two letters he wrote from jail to a Tampa woman. Spaziano is scheduled for trial on a first-degree murder charge Jan. 19 in the August 1973 slaying of 18-year-old Orlando hospital clerk Laura Lynn Harbert. Miss Harbert's decomposing body was found on an Altamonte Springs garbage heap and Spaziano was indicted for the slaying after a 24-month investigation. Spaziano, 36, who is serving a life prison term for an Orange County rape conviction, also faces trial in Sanford the week of Jan. 26 for the Dec. 28, 1973 rape of a south Seminole woman. Assistant State Atty. Claude Van Hook told Circuit Judge Virgil B. Conkling in a Friday hearing that the state witness in the murder case had received letters from Spaziano while he was in the Orange County jail. Van Hook said the state subpoenaed the letters, but the woman failed to produce them. Van Hook said the unidentified woman was ordered to show cause why she shouldn't be held in contempt of court, but law enforcement officers couldn't locate her. Sheriff's Lieutenant George Abbig said efforts by police in Daytona Beach, Jacksonville, Hollywood and Tampa were fruitless. Abbig said during the taking of a deposition in the murder case on Nov. 12 that

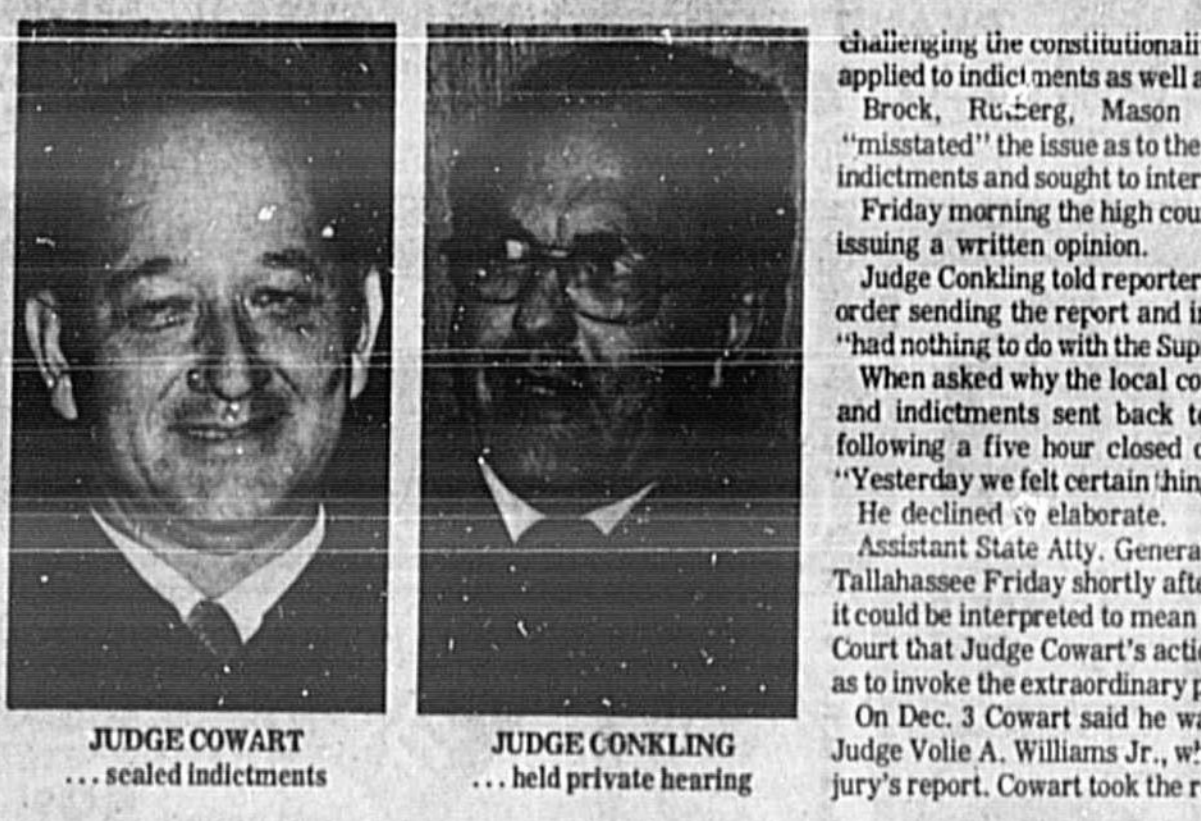

To Consider Interim Report, Indictments

Seminole County Grand Jury Expected To Reconvene

The Seminole County Grand Jury is expected to convene Monday or Tuesday to reconsider an interim report and four indictments returned Dec. 3 after a four-week reported probe of county government actions. Two Seminole-Brevard circuit court judges late Friday ordered the report and "attachments" returned to the grand jury for reconsideration because the report and some of the documents accompanying it "contained improper matters." Circuit Judges Virgil B. Conkling and Joe A. Cowart Jr. ordered the interim report and indictments returned to grand jury foreman Gary Hill following a closed door hearing of nearly two hours with Assistant State Atty. Bill Heffernan and private attorneys Newman Brock, Gerald Rutberg, J. Cheney Mason and Franklin T. Walden. Judge Cowart ordered both the jury report and the four indictments sealed for 15 days on Dec. 3, citing a state law allowing persons named in a grand jury report, but not indicted, time to ask the court to suppress or expunge the report or portions concerning the unindicted persons. State Atty. Abbott Herring asked Cowart to release the indictments so persons named could be arrested but Cowart refused to do so. Herring then appealed to the Florida Supreme Court

challenging the constitutionality of the law cited by Cowart when applied to indictments as well as a grand jury report. "Brook, Rutberg, Mason and Walden claim J. Herring 'mistakenly' issued the order on the basis of Cowart's order sealing the indictments and sought to intervene in the Supreme Court appeal. Friday morning the high court denied Herring's appeal without issuing a written opinion. Judge Conkling told reporters Friday night that the local court order sending the report and indictments back to the grand jury "had nothing to do with the Supreme Court ruling." "When asked why the local court hadn't ordered the jury report and indictments sent back to the grand jurors on Thursday following a five hour closed door hearing, Conkling answered, "Yesterday we felt certain things hadn't been disposed of." He declined to elaborate. Assistant State Atty. General Raymond L. Markey Jr. said in Tallahassee Friday shortly after the Supreme Court's ruling that it could be interpreted to mean that "in the minds of the Supreme Court that Judge Cowart's actions to this point haven't been such as to invoke the extraordinary power to step him." On Dec. 3 Cowart was following the advice of Circuit Judge Volie A. Williams Jr., who was to have received the grand jury report. Cowart took the return while Williams was at lunch



Today Must Make Restitution Crowder Sentenced To Prison

A man that prosecutors say was the major "fence" for property stolen by members of a multi-county "steal-to-order" theft ring has been sentenced in circuit court to a prison term plus probation and a fine and has been ordered to make restitution to 23 theft and burglary victims. Circuit Court Judge Robert B. McGregor meted the sentences to 44-year-old Altamonte Springs bar owner Donald R. Crowder. McGregor said a presentence investigation reflected "very substantial involvement" by Crowder "in buying stolen property from Yates and company." Calvin Yates Jr., 28, of Casselberry, was the key state witness against Crowder and others charged in connection with what police called a multi-county theft and burglary ring doing a million-dollar-a-year business. Yates, who furnished information to sheriff's agents in

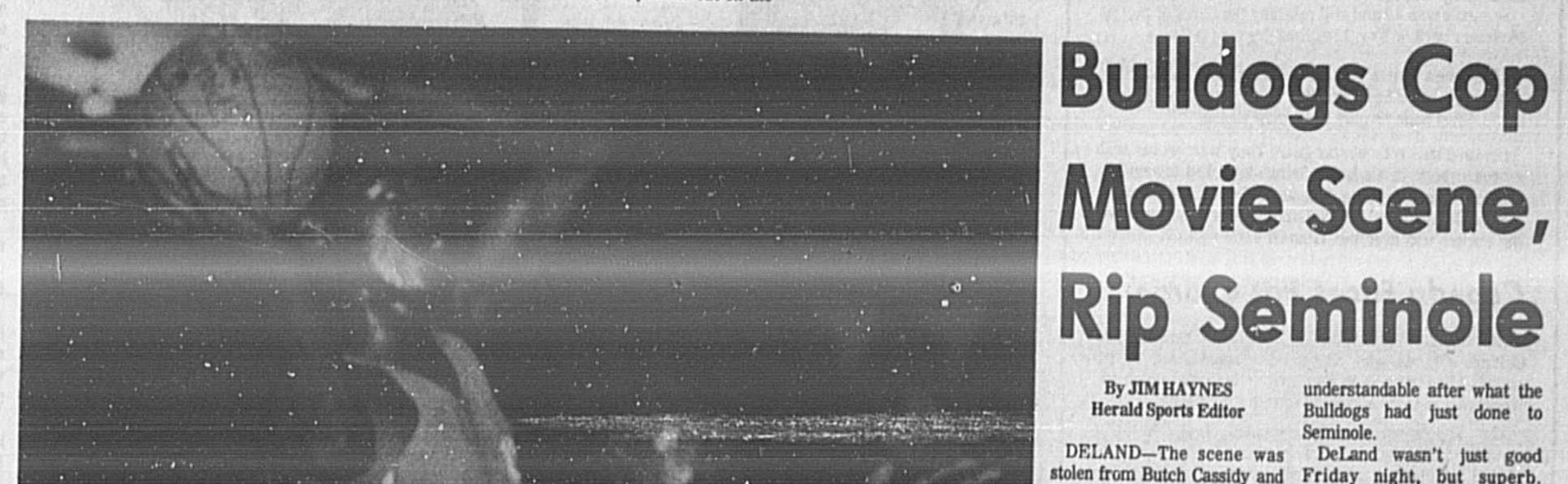

- 1 teaspoon salt
- Dash pepper
- 1 can (16 oz.) cream of shrimp soup
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- Dash nutmeg
- 1/4 cup cooked rice
- 1/4 cup toasted blanched slivered almonds
- 1/4 cup chopped parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Dash pepper

Thaw frozen fillets. Skin fillets and cut into serving-size portions. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Combine soup, cream, and nutmeg. Reserve 1/4 cup of soup mixture for topping. Combine remaining soup mixture, rice, almonds, parsley, salt, and pepper. Spread rice mixture over bottom of a well-greased baking pan, 12 x 8 x 2 inches. Arrange fish over rice. Spread reserved soup mixture over fish. Sprinkle with almonds and parsley. Bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F., for 35 to 40 minutes or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork. Serves 6.

Add crabmeat and heat, stirring occasionally, until hot and bubbly, 5 to 10 minutes. For serving, spear cubes of bread with fondue fork and swirl in figure-eight motion. If fondue thickens on standing, stir in a little additional milk of sherry. Makes about 4 cups fondue.

Note: If you do not have a fondue pot, mixture may be made in a double boiler and either served from that or transferred to a chafing dish.

HOLIDAY OYSTER STEW

- 2 cans (12 ea.) oysters, fresh or frozen
- 2 slices bacon, chopped
- One-third cup chopped onion
- 1 can (1 1/4 ea.) condensed cream of potato soup
- 4 cups oyster liquor and half and half cream
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Dash white pepper
- Chopped parsley

Thaw frozen oysters. Drain oysters, reserving liquor. Fry bacon until crisp. Remove bacon from fat. Cook onion in bacon fat until tender. Add soup, oyster liquor, cream and seasonings; heat, stirring occasionally. Add bacon and oysters; heat for 3 to 5 minutes longer or until oysters begin to curl. Sprinkle with parsley. Serves 6.

- 1 lb. smoked mallet, or other smoked fish
- 1 package (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon chopped onion
- 1 teaspoon horseradish

For Older People Sodium Is Often A Hidden Enemy

BY THE EDITORS OF CONSUMER REPORTS (Fourth in a Series)

Although sodium is an important mineral in maintaining health, people with certain types of heart disease or high blood pressure may be advised by their doctors to reduce the amount of sodium in their diets.

Limiting salt means limiting sodium (including the sodium naturally contained in many foods). Many people on sodium-restricted diets are allowed no more than 2 grams (2,000 milligrams) of sodium daily - equivalent to about 1 teaspoon of table salt.

If you're on a salt-restricted diet, Consumers Union's medical consultants suggest that you avoid the following meat products, pickles, other vegetables, soups, and snack foods:

Meats: Smoked or prepared meats such as bacon, bologna, corned beef, ham, liverwurst, luncheon meats, pastrami, pepperoni, smoked tongue, sausage, and salami.

Soups: Most canned soups (check the label for sodium or salt), bouillon cubes or mixes.

Spices and Seasonings: Table salt, so-called "flavor enhancers" (such as Accent), ketchup, prepared mustard, salted meats, soy sauce, and pickles.

Vegetables: Sauerkraut, pickles, other vegetables prepared in brine.

Sheriff's deputies and police were searching Seminole today for suspects in a series of burglaries that netted thieves cash and property totaling more than \$28,000.

White returned home to find the residence ransacked and \$10,000 in foreign and U.S. coins and currency missing from a bedroom locker.

Joe Lemons, 171 First St., Chuluota, reported jewelry valued at \$1,131 was missing after a burglary at his residence.

Deputy Randy Pittman said items valued at \$1,000 were stolen in a break-in at the residence of Charles R. Perry, 200 Fern Park Blvd., Fern Park. Listed as missing were a color television, pocket electronic calculator, \$500 cash and clothing.

Foyllis A. Reynolds, Pine Grove Trailer Park, Fern Park, reported four diamond rings valued at \$5,210 were missing after her residence was burglarized, according to a report filed by deputy John L. Poole.

Deputy Don Seaman said \$3,000 cash and \$3,000 in checks contained in a bank bag were reported stolen in a burglary at the 350 Academy Drive residence of Gerald Ekstrom at Forest City.

Sanford police today reported a burglar literally broke out of Touchton's Drug Store, First St., in Downtown Sanford with \$85 in coins and currency.

Patrolmen R. A. McIntyre and Ray Bronson responded Sunday afternoon to a burglar alarm at the drug store to find a lock on a rear door had been removed from the inside with a screwdriver.

Police said the burglar apparently had hidden in a rest room until the store closed and then took the money and made good his escape.

An inventory of the store was being made today to determine if anything else was taken, police said.

Chase and Company officials were reported making an inventory at their SR 419 facility at Five Points south of Sanford today. Chester Miller told \$4,000 was stolen from a motel west of Sanford.

Deputy J. F. Bennett said Lorya reported a 19-foot Scot Craft boat with 135-horsepower motor and trailer was taken from in front of his room at Days Inn, SR 46 and I-4.

Sanford police are investigating the theft of two pistols, a tape deck, diamond ring, watch and two electric heaters in a burglary at Dave's Used Furniture, 500 Sanford Ave.

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Grand Jury To Reconvene

The Seminole County Grand Jury is scheduled to reconvene at 9 a.m. Tuesday to reconsider a report and four indictments refused by circuit judges because the documents contained "improper matters."

Assistant State Atty. Bill Staley confirmed the grand jury session but declined to speculate on the length of the session.

Staley directed the grand jury's four-week reported probe into allegations of wrong-doing in county government and of sunshine law violations.

The jury's interim report and the indictments were returned Dec. 3 and immediately sealed by Circuit Judge Joe A. Cowart Jr. Jr.

State Atty. Abbott Herring tried to get the indictments released so arrests could be made, but his effort was refused by both the local circuit court and the Florida Supreme Court.

On Friday, after a closed door hearing with Herring's representative, Assistant State Atty. Bill Heffernan and defense attorneys Newman Brock, Gerald Ruberg, J. Cheney Mason and Franklin T. Walden, Chief Circuit Judge Virgil B. Conkling and Judge Cowart ordered the sealed grand jury report and indictments returned to Grand Jury Foreman Gary Hall with directions that the grand jury "reconsider the form of the report and its attachments and re-submit such matters as they see fit."

The week leading up to the court's refusal to publish the grand jury return and bouncing it back to the grand jurors was highlighted by two closed door hearings from which the press and public were barred, a pushing incident involving another circuit judge and a television cameraman and two marches on the Sanford courthouse by sign-waving pickets and citizens protesting the "cover-up" of the grand jury report by the court in sealing the documents.

Cowart said a state law allowing unindicted persons named in grand jury reports time to reply and seek suppression of the report when he ordered the documents sealed for 15 days.

Taxi Service Heads Commission's Agenda

The issue of taxi service is scheduled for discussion at tonight's meeting of the Sanford City Commission.

According to a memorandum from City Manager Warren Knowles to the city commission, city attorney Vernon Mize will deliver a report on revocation of taxi licenses in the event service is not provided.

In a memorandum from Knowles to Mize dated Dec. 9, Knowles said, "I believe this is a legal problem for you to set up a procedure by which to define use; set criteria for use; and then to have it enforceable by the Police Department to determine if they (licenses) are not used."

Also on the agenda for tonight's meeting is a request for a time extension on condemnation proceedings on property owned by Robert Walton. Knowles reportedly has approved a recommendation by housing inspectors that Walton be given a 90-day extension for the property, located at 1110 West Seventh St.

Knowles, according to a memorandum to the commission dated Dec. 10, also will report on the reconstruction and repaving of Pennington Avenue from 13th Street to McCracken Road; and the material costs of the SR-46A sidewalk project.

The city manager is expected to request commission action to waive bid requirements on a closed circuit television security system for the Sanford Police Department and to discuss a recommended change in the fee schedule for building, mechanics and plumbing.

J.S. Ryan To Report On SCOPA

James S. Ryan, administrator of the Seminole County Port Authority (SCOPA) is scheduled to report on the status of Standard Systems, Inc. (SSI) as well as barge movements, at tonight's SCOPA meeting.

According to Assistant Administrator Dennis Delger, two barges, each carrying more than 9,000 barrels of oil, have visited the port authority during the past two weeks.

Also on the agenda are reports on Small Business Administration guaranteed loans, Florida ports and water resources and advertising-marketing preparations by SCOPA.

At County Courthouse No Flowers For Fountains

The cooling waters of the fountains and pools that flow around the Seminole County Courthouse will not be still. No flowers will spring up to replace the soothing sounds of flowing waters.

In short the proposal to turn the pools surrounding the courthouse into flowerbeds is dead.

That is the word from County Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski, who was assigned the dubious task of studying the proposal.

Kwiatkowski said that a study by the county's Office of Management Analysis and Evaluation (OME) shows it would be "economically unfeasible" to switch from fountains to flowers.

Commissioners objected to the yearly cost of maintenance for the water fountains.

Also, the commission felt the fountains were not doing the job they were installed to do. The word was the fountains were supposed to help keep the courthouse windows clean, and commissioners said that just wasn't happening.

But the Sanford architectural firm of Gutmann and Dragage, the architectural firm that provided plans for the courthouse, said the fountains never were intended to keep windows clean.

However, architects did say the fountains were constructed for purposes other than aesthetics. Namely, the cool air rising upward from the water was designed to help cool the building, thus cutting down on the costs of air conditioning during the hot summers.

When the proposal first was announced, a number of citizens protested any move to eliminate the fountains.

Commissioners asked about the project said whether fountains will disappear depends entirely on economics, or which is cheaper.

According to Kwiatkowski the initial cost of removing fountains isn't worth it.

So, it looks as if Seminole courthouses entering the courthouses will bear water bubbling for years to come.

And if they feel lucky, a penny can be tossed into the fountain for a wish.

Two rape trials scheduled for this week in circuit court have been continued to the week of Jan. 12.

Trials continued by the court to the week of Jan. 12 were:

—Rocco Anthony Conti, 41, of Pompano Park in Broward County, accused of two counts of involuntary sexual battery in connection with the Nov. 15 rape of an Altamonte Springs woman at her home.

—Albert Bradley, 18, Lake Monroe Terrace, Sanford, accused of sexual battery in the June 21 rape of a 28-year-old woman on a Sanford street at 3 a.m. The woman told police she was assaulted by an attacker who "jumped out of the bushes" alongside the street while she was walking home.

—Paul Hoxter, 40, Baltimore, Md., accused of obtaining lodging at the Sheraton Sanford Inn, 14 and SR-46 west of Sanford, in January with intent to defraud.

Cases expected to go to trial before a jury this week include:

—Albert Lee Hampton, 36, owner of the Cool Breeze Bar on SR-46 east of Sanford. Hampton is accused of possession of a controlled substance; marijuana. Sheriff's deputies arrested Hampton Nov. 3 after seizing a pound of marijuana found under the hood of an auto.
