DY RESTS ER LANDING LOAD OF MAIL

Crowd Cheers As
Landing Colonel De-
livers Air Consign-
ment At CanalZone

"Lone Eagle" Will Depart On Sunday

Spends Night On Board
Plane Carrier And
Watches Maneuvers

HARBOA CANAL ZONE, Feb. 7.—(INS)—Having delivered his first consignment of air mail ever flown from the United States to the Panama Canal Zone, Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh today rested from his arduous three day journey and viewed the maneuvers of the United States fleet in Panama Bay from the airplane carrier Saratoga.

Landing at Farnes Field near Cristobal and Colon on the Atlantic side of the Panama Canal at 4:30 P. M. yesterday, the famous flier received a tremendous "well done" from 2,000 spectators on the field.

During the last few miles of the trip eight United States escort planes escorted the giant twin-motored Sikorsky amphibian plane of the Pan-American Airways, Inc., in which Col. Lindbergh covered more than 2,000 miles in less than 20 hours of actual flying time.

After checking his six mail sacks and obligingly posing for photographers, the Colon flier here to the dinner guest of Admiral Harry W. aboard the flagship Texas.

Later he came aboard the Saratoga but the night. He will remain here during the manuevers today and tomorrow until he flies back to France Field tomorrow evening to be the guest of Colonel Arthur Fisher, commander of the Flying Field.

Col. Lindbergh will start his return trip to Miami Sunday morning. He will follow the same route as on the way down. The mail plane is expected back in Miami late Tuesday.

HEARST'S PAPERS WITH PROTESTS SEEK RADIO USE

Federal Commission Will Hold Hearings Asked By Syndicate

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—(INS)—The Federal Radio Commission will hold hearings on Feb. 18 on a protest filed by John Francis Neyland, of San Francisco, acting as attorney for the Hearst newspapers, against the proposed allocation of 20 short wave channels to big newspapers represented by the American Publishers Committee. Announcement to this effect was made today.

Neyland's petition set forth that Joseph Pierson, chairman of the publishers' committee had ignored the rights of the American public and press and deliberately refused to allocate a single domestic station to any of the 26 Hearst newspapers. He charged that Pierson is a subordinate editor of the Chicago Tribune and that the "proto-allocation" was arrived at in a case of manipulation and trickery.

He further charged that the proposed allocation taken in conjunction with the allocation of trans-oceanic waves previously made by the publishers' committee, would give to "the newspaper, the Chicago Tribune, and others of its associates, direct or indirect control of 17 of the total of 40 trans-oceanic and domestic waves allocated to the press of the United States."

Neyland in his protest to the commission said that the allocation had been made without reference to public interest, convenience or necessity. Waves had been assigned to single newspapers "not because of their importance to the public, but for the sole reason that they have contractual and working agreements with the Chicago Tribune." He added that they were not made because of the needs of a particular journal, but as a part of a scheme of manipulation and trickery in connection with the purposes of said Chicago Tribune.

Jack Dempsey will accompany Sharkey to Tampa on Friday to oversee the opening of the Tampa ticket office, this move being necessitated by a strong demand from that city, one of the best fight towns in the South. Continuing his career as a public speaker, into which he has plunged enthusiastically since he became a promoter Dempsey will address the Tampa Rotary Club at noon luncheon Friday.

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MIAMI

(INS)—The inauguration of Herbert Hoover as President of the United States on March 4 will witness a concerted effort on the part of the citizens of the National Capital to recapture some of the by-gone elements of pageantry that once placed these affairs at least on a semblance of parity with like ceremonies in the capitals of the continent for color and display.

Hoover's plans, embodying a three-day celebration with the city playing host to an expected influx of 200,000 visitors, have been worked out. For the two days preceding the day Mr. Hoover takes down Pennsylvania Avenue to take the oath of office on Capitol Plaza, there will be air parades, flyings, naval demonstrations, riding processions by the pick of the cavalry, street exhibitions and monster concerts by massed bands.

Pennsylvania Avenue from the White House to the Capitol will be swathed in masses of bunting, flags, and electric lights.

At high noon, on the steps of the Capitol, the oath will be administered. It is expected 100,000 people will be jammed into the Plaza to hear Mr. Hoover's inaugural address—an elaborate amplifying arrangement making that possible. The speech will be broadcast to every corner of the country through a national hook-up embracing about 75 stations.

Austrians Pay Fees For Radio Privileges

VIENNA, Feb. 6—(INS)—The number of subscribers of the Austrian semi-state broadcasting during the last five years, as shown by the year-book of this Association. At the present over 12 per cent of all Austrian families possess a radio receiving set, and pay the legal dues (two Schillings, or 30 cents per month) for the Vienna broadcasting program, which is regarded as one of the most artistic services of Europe.

Members of educational and charitable institutions were exempt from payment as were also all unemployed radio listeners.

Especially the musical part of the broadcasting program was well received by the public. During last season 31 operas, 26 operettas, 72 concerts, choruses and folk-song recitals, 5 chamber music performances, and 343 light music programs were broadcast from Vienna, and were partly transmitted by radio stations all over the world.

INAUGURATION OF HOOVER PLANNED TO BE COLORFUL

Efforts Being Made To Make Ceremony Impressive Occasion

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6—(INS)

—The inauguration of Herbert Hoover as President of the United States on March 4 will witness a concerted effort on the part of the citizens of the National Capital to recapture some of the by-gone elements of pageantry that once placed these affairs at least on a semblance of parity with like ceremonies in the capitals of the continent for color and display.

Hoover has said he would not attend the ball, but 4,000 tickets of admission have gone out. Nevertheless, The Washingtonians are spending their money, not the Government, and they are determined the spectacle shall be worthy of the event in view of visitors that may come.

The cost of 55,000 grandstands along the line of march and White House plus generous cash subscriptions from local merchants, will defray the expenses of "washing up the city."

The thousands of people who will flock to Washington will pay their own expenses. They voted for Mr. Hoover and they want to have a part in the celebration of the victory.

REVOLT LEADERS IN SPAIN FORCED TO QUIT COUNTRY

One-time Premier And Son Of Ibáñez Among Those Forced Away

MADRID, Feb. 6—(INS)

Former Premier José Sanchez Guerra, who was arrested and placed in a Valencia jail for his part in the revolutionary outbreak against the Spanish government last week, today was put aboard the passenger steamer Canalejas.

The exact destination of the steamer has not been revealed. It is reported that Guerra will be exiled somewhere along the lonely Moroccan coast. Up until the time of the outbreak at Ciudad Real last week, Guerra had been in hiding in France.

The government is taking every step to stamp out the smoldering embers of revolt. Many leaders opposed to the government have been arrested. Among these are former ministers of war, General Sáenz and Delano, and Vicente Blasco Ibáñez, son of the famous author.

Nevertheless, quietness is prevalent all over the country. There is a widespread censorship of the strictest kind. All telephone lines are tapped and government censors have been placed in all newspaper offices. To eliminate the possibility of a military revolt Primo de Rivera, dictator and premier, has disbanded more than 50,000 troops, representing about half of Spain's standing army.

The disbandment of such a large portion of the army is causing a widespread sensation. It was the first time in the country's history that the government was forced to adopt such a radical method of preventing a revolt. In 1920 the same method was used but only against a single regiment of the artillery corps. The burden of preserving order now falls upon the civil guard which is the strongest arm of General Rivera's directorate. However, even here some disaffection is reported.
