LOUGHRAN WINS CLOSE DECISION FROM EMANUEL

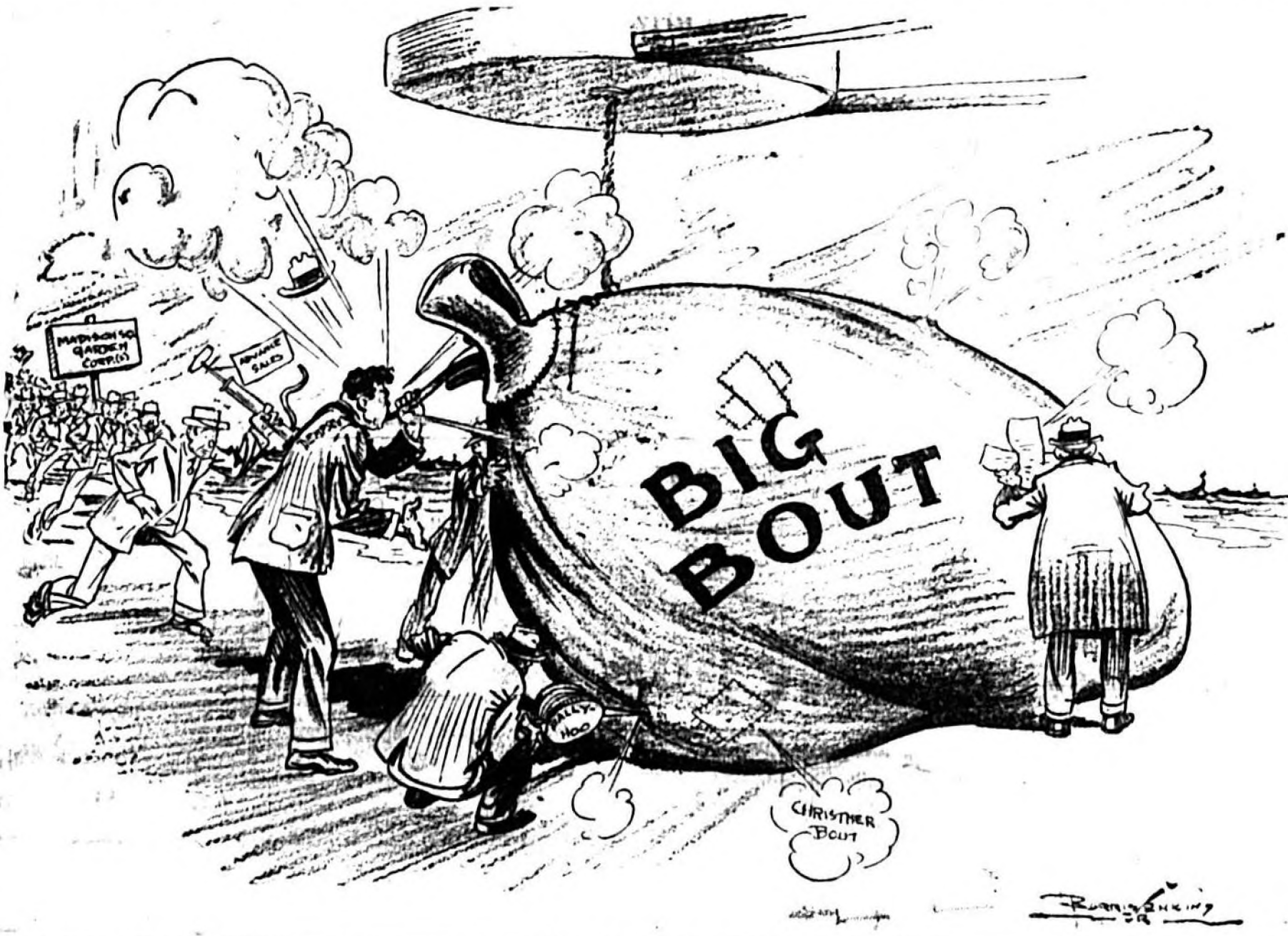
Frisco Hebrew Pushes Champion In Hotly Contested Battle

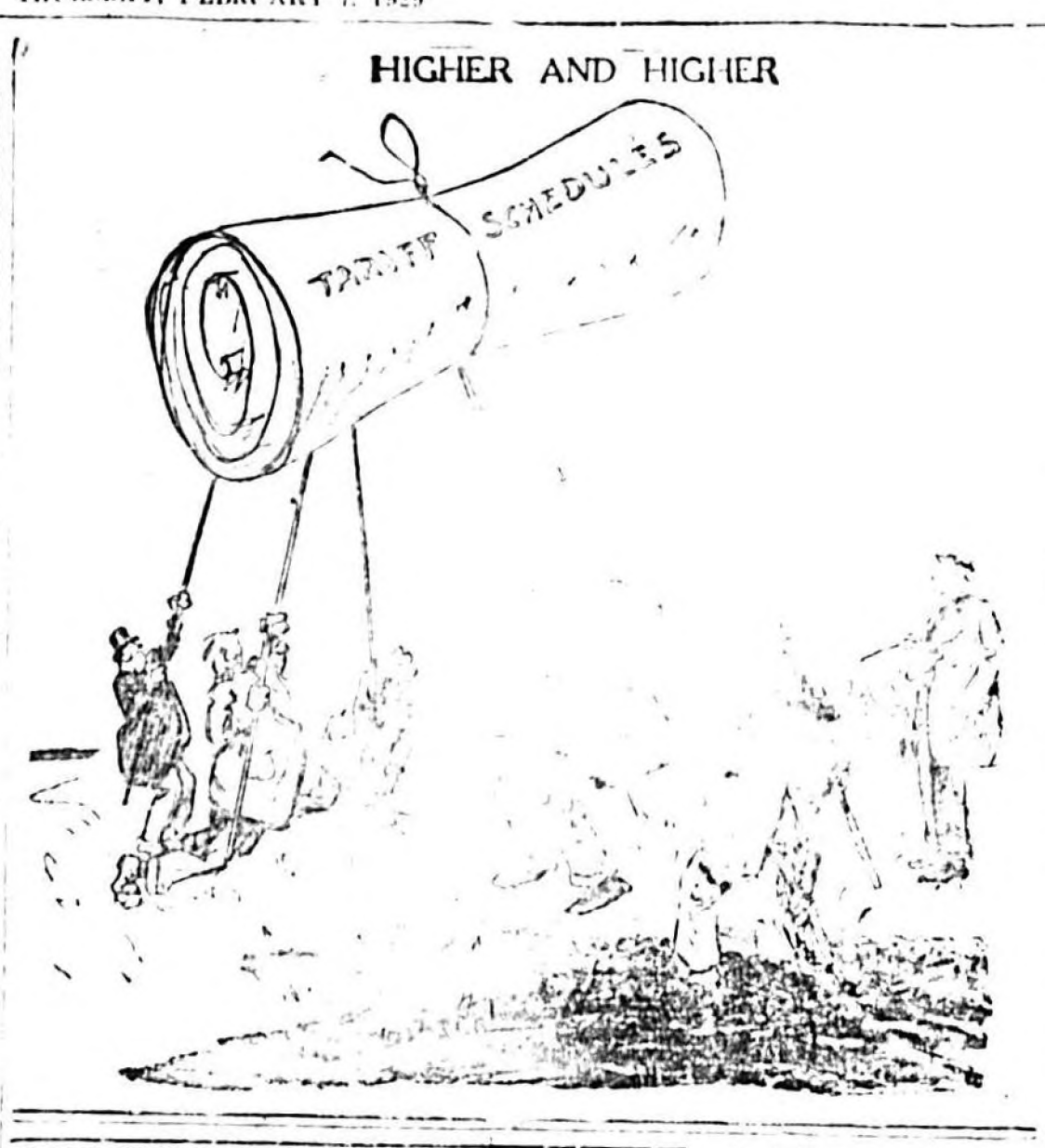

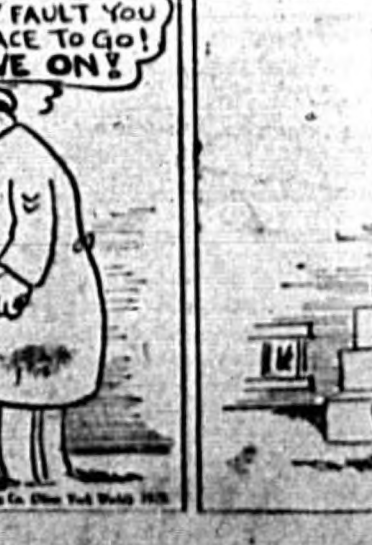
